


The Roosevelt Experience

No one knows for sure exactly when and where it started, but a little over five years ago some of the Roosevelt staff and students began to sense that a time for change was at hand. They began to take a close look at themselves and their school. They started to discuss what kind of a school Roosevelt was, and what sort of school it should become. What emerged was general agreement that new ways should be found to place more emphasis on the individual and try to make the school a place for learning rather than a place where teaching goes on.

Much study, thought, and discussion produced a beginning, a broad outline reflecting a new total school philosophy and basic changes in the structure of the program. It seemed to offer a hope for finding some of the answers to the questions that arose when they asked themselves, "What should schools be doing for kids today ?"

The district administration was helpful and supportive. Permission was granted for Roosevelt to begin a three-year program of experimentation and change. The Roosevelt program was begun.





The knowledge explosion is an awesome thing. It is said that the total sum of what man knows doubled every fifty years before 1800 and every ten years between 1800 and 1860. It is safe to assume that the pace will continue to accelerate and that man's total information will double each half decade for the next fifteen to twenty years.

Add to these kinds of facts the trend toward greater depersonalization in our mass society, the mobility of the population, and the effect of mass media on learning, and it becomes clear that public education systems today must be prepared for continuous drastic and radical changes.







From this philosophy emerged Roosevelt's four goals:

Agency

- to help each student become personally involved in his learning - to be free to explore actively his own resources and those of the school and the larger environment.

Motivation

- to help each student become his own agent, learn how to take charge of the development of his own potential, and to understand that only he, in the long run, is responsible for his learning.

We must develop in today's student an ability to cope with change. We must develop in young people skills, attitudes, habits of mind, and the kinds of knowledge and understanding that will be instruments for change and growth. We must fashion a system that provides for its own continuous renewal.

As teaching and learning improve, students will have for fewer gaps in their knowledge of how to work creatively in unfamiliar intellectual territory, and will be better able to evaluate information and reach decisions.

In the final analysis, each of us must learn for himself, and in the rapid pace of change in the world it is urgent that we produce skills in independent learning, from emphasis upon memory to emphasis upon creativity, attitudes, and values.



Creativity

- to help each student develop enough confidence in himself and in others to be able to think imaginatively and explore openly ideas, values, and relationships.



Scholarship

- to help students find true satisfaction in learning, and to understand that the subject matter skills aquired are not only useful in themselves, but are tools with which to meet situations and solve problems.

Roosevelt Junior High School is one of the outstanding educational institutions in the United States, but this did not come about accidentally. Changing norms and value systems brought the Roosevelt community to the realization that a positive self-concept is the most important virtue one can possess to cope with the confusion and frustration resulting from constant change. The foundations of the Roosevelt program then, is to find ways to help students develop a positive self-concept.

No clear-cut guidelines for success in this endeavor existed, but it seemed obvious that the first steps should involve the opportunity for students to make viable choices and be responsible for their consequences, and to attain multiples of success as a result of these experiences.

Roosevelt, therefore, provides students the opportunity to set up prescription schedules in a totally elective curriculum void of grades and grade levels. These steps allow for numerous success experiences and the development of basic skills with each day's attendance.

Teachers are allowed to offer classes of their choice, but they are accountable to the students and parents for their relevance and acceptance.

Student and teacher awareness of their good fortune to have been a part of this process will best be known to them when they reflect, years from now, on what happened to them at Roosevelt. I am looking forward to this myself.

Student Government at Roosevelt consist of several branches, which can be paralleled to branches of the Federal Government. The executive branch consists of the offices of Student Body President and Vice President, the treasurer, the secretary, and the historian. The Judicial branch is the CIC, of constitutional interpretation committee. The Legislative branch is the research committee, which reviews bills to be submitted to the student body for vote. It also consists of the twelve or thirteen students, one for each three houses, who have voting rights at faculty meetings. Elections are held at the beginning of the last quarter.

By the end of the quarter, a successful student is usually prepared for an ordeal termed registration. Preparation for this exciting event is very simple. 
