














## THEODORE ROOSEVELT JUNIOR HIGH FALL 1925 - SPRING 1983


Theodore Roosevelt Junior High opened its doors for the first time in the fall of 1925. It was the second junior high in Eugene, and was originally housed in a building located at Eighteenth Avenue and Agate Street near the University of Oregon. The building was a two-story brick structure with a combination gymnasium-auditorium. Enrollment figures for 1934, the earliest reference located, record 350 students and thirteen staff members. As the Eugene community grew, so did Roosevelt's student population. Plans for a new building began in the late 1940's. "Old" Roosevelt Jr. High eventually became Condon Elementary School and presently houses both the Condon Elementary and Magnet-Arts programs. In the fall of 1983, however, the doors of Condon/Magnet Arts will be closed to students due to decreasing enrollment in Eugene.


"Old" Theodore Roosevelt Junior High moved to a new facility at Twenty-Fourth and Hilyard Street in September, 1950. This building was designed with junior high students specifically in mind and boasted two gyms, a cafeteria, a library and twenty-four classrooms. In 1958 Roosevelt was listed at the State Department of Education as, "one of the best plants for junior high school use" (despite the fact that black-boards and drinking fountains had been installed at heights suitable for second graders!). Enrollment in 1950 was recorded at 560 but fluctuated in the next few years with increases in population and the opening of new junior highs. The original building was added to in 1965 and 1968, and today includes thirty-three classrooms, three gyms, one cafeteria, one bandroom, one small theater, one library-media center and several small-group working areas. These rooms have been extensively used in recent years as the school, despite declining enrollment, has been filled to capacity; at one point we had 875 students enrolled in part due to students who transfer from other Eugene attendance areas to participate in Roosevelt's outstanding program.

There is a long history of educational excellence in Roosevelt's fifty-eight year history. Staffs have not shied away from leading the way in making changes and establishing programs. In a State Department day and one-half evaluation in 1958, Roosevelt's program was noted as "one of the best in the state." The staff was given credit for continuous study of its program, experimenting with new ideas and modifying and evaluating in terms of the needs of adolescents. A look through a history of Roosevelt from 1925 to 1964 shows one honor after another, a variety of popular and exciting activities, and many academic achievements. Students enjoyed being at Roosevelt.

Fourteen years ago the Roosevelt staff developed a very unique educational program. It was experimental in nature for the first three years, but renewed indefinitely following those years with continual evaluation and modification occurring to refine the program. Unlike any other junior high in the district and most in the state, Roosevelt's students (with parent and Advisor guidance) were given, every nine weeks, freedom to choose all their classes from a large variety of offerings. Letter grades were dropped and replaced with teacher-written evaluations. Courses were open to all seventh, eighth and ninth graders based on preference and ability rather than grade level. In order to provide continuity and a home base for Roosevelt students, "House" groups of twenty students were formed, with teachers assuming an "Advisor" role. The "Roosevelt Program," as it has been affectionately known for the past fourteen years, has been highly successful. Roosevelt Junior High has been a place where exciting things have happened educationally, where students have been given an opportunity to learn to be responsible for their own decisions, and where warm relationships have developed between students and staff. In general, it has been a place where both students and staff have wanted to be.

It is then, with definite pangs of sadness, that Roosevelt Junior High will end its fifty-eight year history in June of 1983. When the doors open again in the fall, they will welcome middle school students, grades six, seven and eight. For both students and staff it will be a time for new excitement, and for developing yet another outstanding educational experience. The new "Roosevelt Middle School" will begin its own unique and undoubtedly successful history.
