Why do we have bond measures?

- Oregon tax law limits funding for schools
 - Not sufficient for school operations
 - No funds for building or renovating schools
- Local funding options:Capital bonds and operating levies
 - Bonds are for buildings and lasting capital improvements
 - Levies are for learning and operating costs
 - If capital costs are paid for with bond dollars, the general fund can go to teaching and learning



What could a bond provide?



Facility needs

- Buildings are aging and need repair or replacement
- Changing educational needs require changing spaces



Curriculum needs

- Our instructional materials are out of date
- Modernized curriculum materials help our students meet new and more challenging academic standards



Technology needs

- Updates are needed for student learning devices, classroom technology and infrastructure
- Modern technology helps students access information, apply concepts, expand knowledge, practice new skills

Long-Range Facilities Plan

Protecting our community's investment in schools

- Established in 2002
- Updated in 2013
- Details need for multiple bond measures over time for repairs, renovations and replacements



\$170 million May 21, 2013











Building 4J's future

Our buildings are aging



Our buildings are aging

- Most of 4J's schools are more than 50 years old.
 - Nearly all were built during the Baby Boom. Some are even older.
 - Some are approaching the end of their useful life.
 - Older buildings are inefficient and costly to heat and cool.
 - They require many repairs.
- Older school buildings were designed for an earlier era.
 - They don't support modern teaching and learning activities.
 - They don't easily integrate modern technology that is critical today.
 - They were not designed with safety and school security in mind.
 - Schools built today are more secure, more sustainable, and are designed differently because teaching and learning are different.



Why a bond now?

- Support strong schools for our community and educational outcomes for our students
- Address facility needs:
 - Our children deserve better facilities
 - Growing enrollment and crowded classrooms
 - Need to increase security and safety
- Address 21st century learning needs:
 - Career technical education (vocational) Modern curriculum
 Early childhood education Special education Technology needs

What would a bond cost? (estimated tax rates)

Bond Amount	\$70-75 million	\$250 million	\$350 million		\$500 million
Increase per month for median home	\$0	\$8	\$13	\$16	\$20
Increase per year for median home	\$0	\$95	\$151	\$195	\$238
Tax increase per \$1,000 AV (est.)	\$0	\$0.47	\$0.74	\$0.96	\$1.17
Total bond tax rate per \$1,000 AV (est.)	\$1.60	\$2.05	\$2.32	\$2.54	\$2.75
