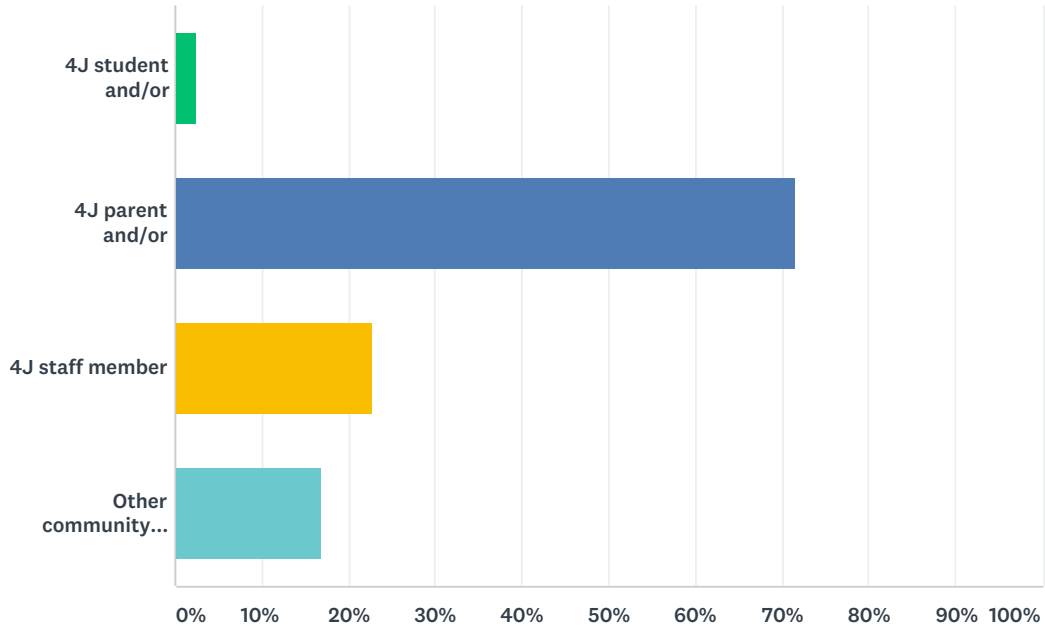


Q1 Are you a...

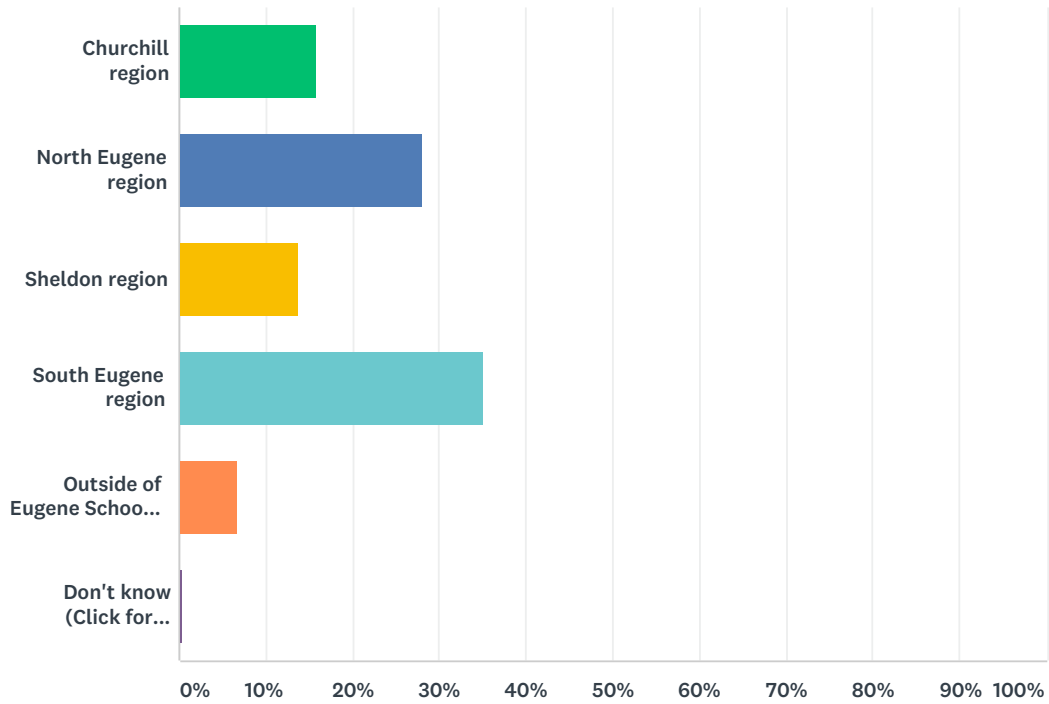

Q2 Where do you live?

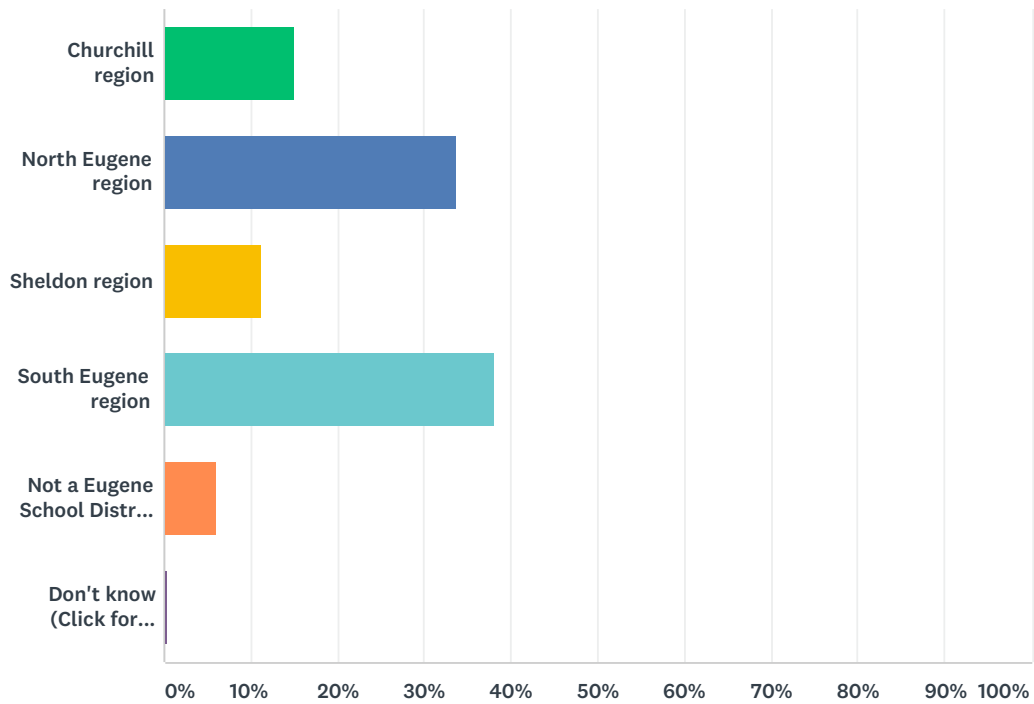

Q3 If you are a student or parent, where do you or your student attend school? (you may check more than one)

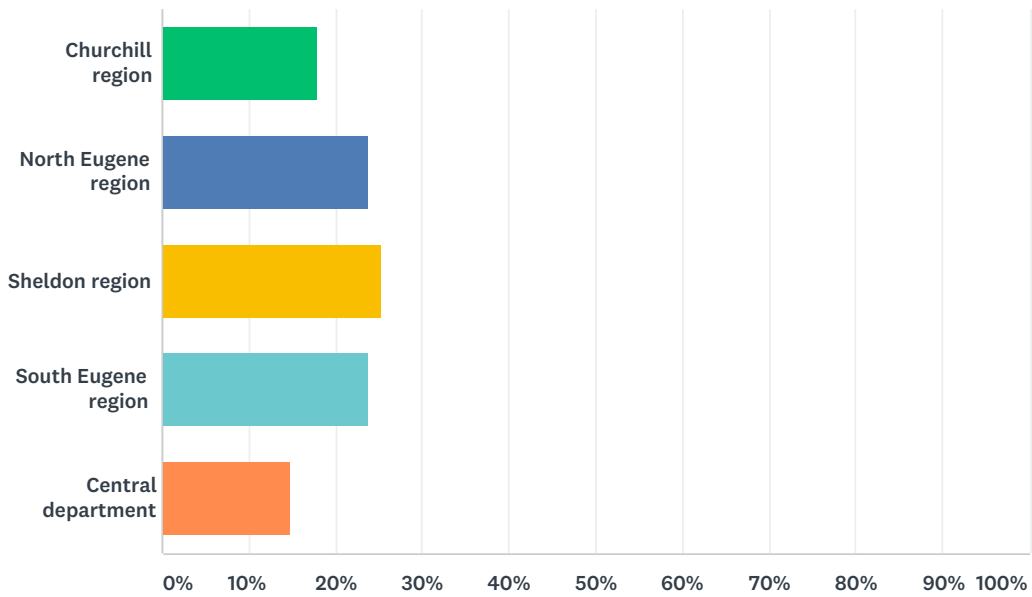

Our schools should be all inclusive with instructional offerings and design that meet the needs of all our students. Being part of a comprehensive high school provides ECCO students with a wealth of opportunities. Bailey Hill is a terrible location, and CTE investments of a shop and green house should go into the new NEHS or any existing high school if we are not going to build a regional CTE center. Under Equity, Access and Health, money going towards enhancing special education facilities in some cases is contrary to building access and equity, but rather supporting separation, and inappropriate learning environments for Special Education students. Two special education post high school programs need special consideration and location is essential. One program, Connections, is in a building between Churchill HS and Kennedy MS, this program should be downtown in a central location, as students transition into community college and or employment. The Community Living Program was located in the Fountain Villa apartments because of the appropriate instructional modality of skills being taught in the environments where those skills will be used. Multiple city bus lines, numerous stores and services are all within walking distance of the Fountain Villa apts. It is absolutely reprehensible that 4j is pitting the North Eugene community against each other. 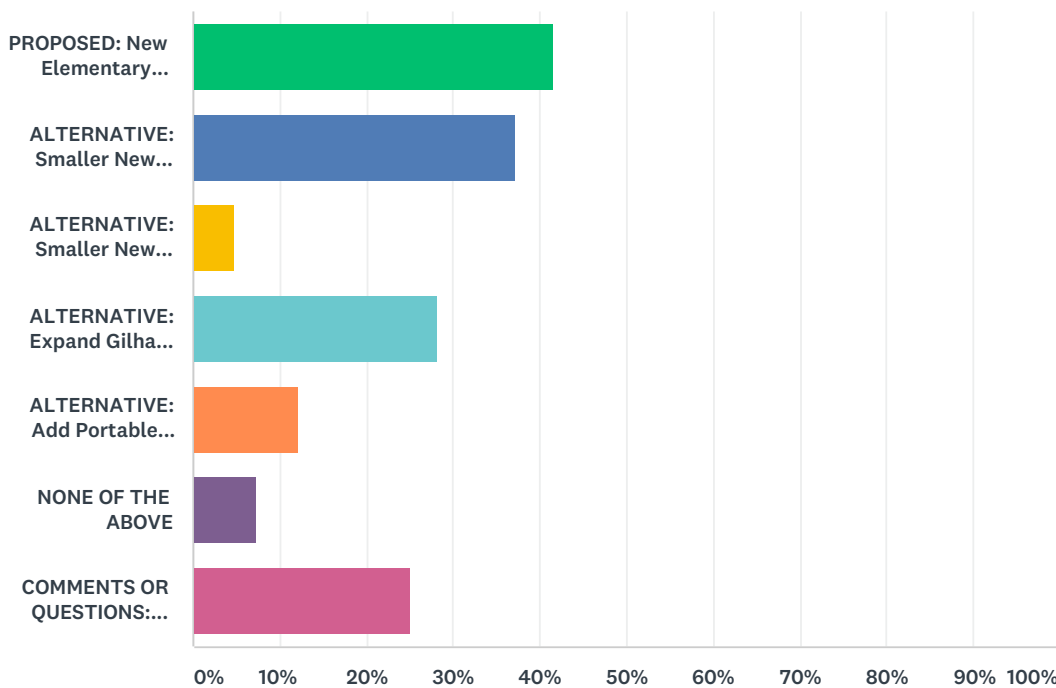

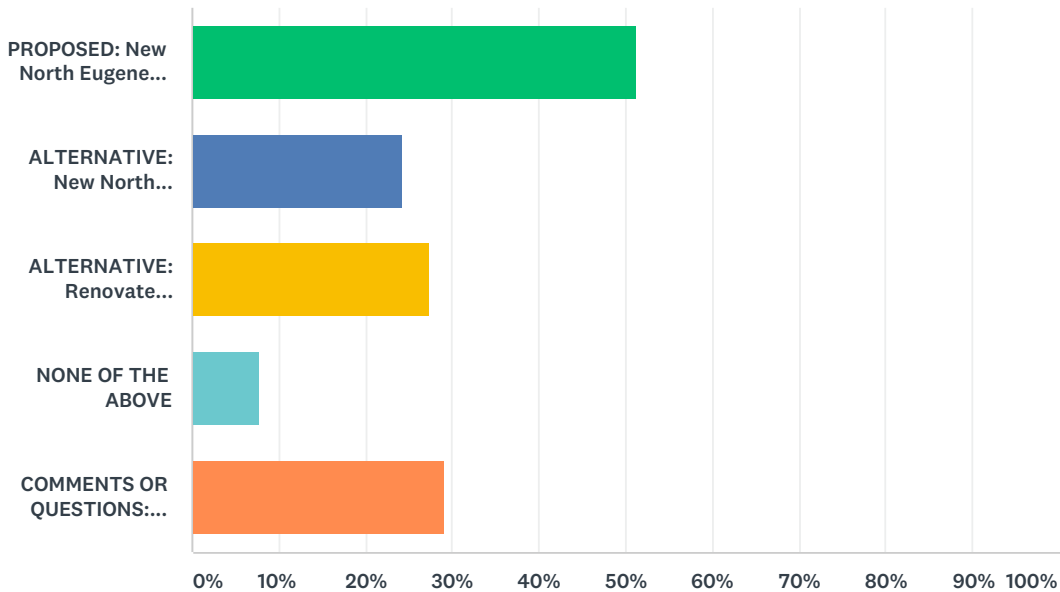
