Summer Programs for HS Students

Summer opportunities provide a stimulating, supportive & safe environment for students during the summer - academic or otherwise! Check them out her.

Early Decision

Students can pick a single school to apply to, under a binding agreement - if they are admitted, they must attend.

Early Decision I

This is the main attempt for students to apply ED to a given school - and ususally has the most advantage for students in terms of admit rates.

Early Decision II

For students who aren't admitted in the first ED wave, some schools offer another round -there isn't usually as much advantage in admit rates here, but still better than regular admission.

Typical deadline: November 1st Typical decision release: December 15th

Early Action

Students apply earlier in the timeline. They aren't bound to enroll of they're admitted.

Regular Early Action

Students apply earlier in the cycle, to as many schools as they'd like. There's a slight advantage to admit rate, and students also get the benefit of learning the decisions earlier in the process.

Single-Choice Early Action

Students apply earlier in the cycle, but for these schools, they are only allowed to apply to a single school. There's a slight advantage to admit rate.

Typical deadline: November 1st Typical decision release: December 15th

Regular Decision

Students apply to as many schools as they'd like, and are not bound to enroll if they are offered admission.

Typical deadline: January 1st

Typical decision release: April 1st

Do you have free/reduced lunch and/or receive any financial assistance? If so, you qualify for a SAT fee waiver! A fee waiver covers the cost of up to two SAT tests and three SAT Subject Tests. It will also cover submitting college applications through the Common Application. If you need an SAT or ACT fee waiver please contact school counselor.

TEST OPTIONAL SCHOOLS: Test optional means that a school does not require SAT or ACT scores as a part of your application. Over 1,000 colleges and universities are test optional. Find a complete list at www.fairtest.org!

THE TOEFL EXAM: The Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) is a standardized test that measures English language ability for non-native speakers who plan to enroll in an English speaking college. The test evaluates listening, reading, writing, and speaking skills in relationship to academic tasks. Test costs range between \$150-\$225. Unfortunately, no financial aid is offered for the TOEFL test. Fee-based and free prep materials can be found on the <u>TOEFL website</u>, on <u>Canvas</u>, or in the College & Career Center (K007). 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

NESCA is hosting a webinar for families of students (or students themselves) who are planning a transition to college and want to better understand some of the supports that are available when students struggle with executive function, social engagement, self-advocacy, etc. This panel will feature several organizations who support students transitioning to college including Focus Collegiate, New Frontiers Executive Function Coaching, Mansfield Hall & Virtual Hall, and NESCA's

- College is a huge commitment of resources in terms of time as well as emotions and finances. For students who are neurodivergent or have learning disabilities/mental health issues, college is often an even larger endeavor. Moreover, data suggest that success rates are often poor for these students. While some colleges have their own autism or learning disability support programs, many do not. But that shouldn't prevent a student with a disability from being able to access the college that best fits their learning and social interests. What private supports are available for college students, especially those who struggle with executive functioning, social engagement, or self-advocacy? What programs already exist? How can students access these supports?
