
MANDATORY SENIOR SURVEY: DUE MAY 10th

The senior survey is a MANDATORY requirement for all Class of 2024 students. It must be completed by Friday, May 10, 2024. This is a graduation requirement so please let us know if you need help accessing the Class of 2024 Senior Survey.

HOW TO ACCESS THE SURVEY:

- Log on to your NAVIANCE account: https://student.naviance.com/framingham If you forgot your password, recover it by clicking "forgot password" and a new one will be emailed to you. Please contact your counselor, House Office Manager, or Ms Ramirez (School Counseling Dept Head) at iramirez@framingham.k12.ma.us), if you are unable to access your account.
- Click on the dropdown below your initials to open tab on the upper right side > Surveys
 >Surveys From Your School > Senior Survey: Class of 2024.

• Question #7 is where you write the college or university you are attending, if applicable. Colleges require a final transcript and this is how we will know where to send yours! If you have not made a final decision, you may wait to submit the survey until you do so.

Upcoming College Fairs

Attending a college fair will allow you to see just how many different types of colleges and universities are out there! Exploring one place with lots of different schools in attendance will help you build and narrow down your college list.

The Common Application

The **COLLEGE APPLICATION** is the backbone of all of the information a college/university needs to know about you to assess if you'd be a good fit for their school. The majority of schools use the **Common Application** as their application portal. Some schools have an application portal built into their website, and other schools use an application portal called the **Coalition** App (similar to the Common App; see schools that use the Coalition App here). Creating an account on any of these portals is

common

free, but most colleges/universities have a cost associated with applying. All applications are created and submitted online.

Early Decision

Students can pick a single school to apply to, under a binding agreement - if they are admitted, they must

Early Decision I

This is the main attempt for students to apply ED to a given school - and ususally has the most advantage for students in terms of admit rates.

Early Decision II

For students who aren't admitted in the first ED wave, some schools offer another round -there isn't usually as much advantage in admit rates here, but still better than regular admission.

Typical deadline: November 1st Typical decision release: December 15th

Early Action

Students apply earlier in the timeline. They aren't bound to enroll of they're admitted.

Regular Early Action

Students apply earlier in the cycle, to as many schools as they'd like. There's a slight advantage to admit rate, and students also get the benefit of learning the decisions earlier in the process.

Single-Choice Early Action

Students apply earlier in the cycle, but for these schools, they are only allowed to apply to a single school. There's a slight advantage to admit rate.


Typical deadline: November 1st Typical decision release: December 15th

Regular Decision

Students apply to as many schools as they'd like, and are not bound to enroll if they are offered admission.

Typical deadline: January 1st

Typical decision release: April 1st



College Essay

The college essay is an extremely important part of your college application—it is the one part of the application that is in your voice! To get help *starting*, *editing*, or putting your essay into your application early.

Transcript Requests & Letters of Recommendation

Seniors applying to four-year colleges will most likely need one to two teacher letters of recommendation. However, they will need to find out the exact number required by checking the "application requirements" on the websites of the colleges to which they are applying. To request a teacher letter of recommendation, please follow the steps listed on the <u>Teacher Recommendation</u> <u>Letter Guide</u>. You should always plan to give your teachers a minimum of 15 school days notice prior to your first application deadline.

Transcript Request Form instructions

Counselor Letter of Recommendation

Seniors applying to four-year colleges will most likely need a counselor letter of recommendation. However, they will find out for sure by checking the "application requirements" on the websites of the colleges to which they are applying.

Teacher Letter(s) of Recommendation

4-year college apps likely need 1-2 teacher LOR (check LOR requirements on the website of each college). Plan to give your teachers a minimum of 15 school days notice prior to your first application deadline.

Do you have free/reduced lunch and/or receive any financial assistance? If so, you qualify for a SAT fee waiver! A fee waiver covers the cost of up to two SAT tests and three SAT Subject Tests. It will also cover submitting college applications through the Common Application. If you need an SAT or ACT fee waiver please contact school counselor.

TEST OPTIONAL SCHOOLS: Test optional means that a school does not require SAT or ACT scores as a part of your application. Over 1,000 colleges and universities are test optional. Find a complete list at www.fairtest.org!




THE TOEFL EXAM: The Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) is a standardized test that measures English language ability for non-native speakers who plan to enroll in an English speaking college. The test evaluates listening, reading, writing, and speaking skills in relationship to academic tasks. Test costs range between \$150-\$225. Unfortunately, no financial aid is offered for the TOEFL test. Fee-based and free prep materials can be found on the <u>TOEFL website</u>, on <u>Canvas</u>, or in the College & Career Center (K007).
