OR from 11am-12pm on Friday, May 17th (in A202) - please sign-up for only one of the two sections.



Upcoming College Fairs

Attending a college fair will allow you to see just how many different types of colleges and universities are out there! Exploring one place with lots of different schools in attendance will help you build and narrow down your college list.



The **COMMON APPLICATION** is the backbone of all of the information a college/university needs to know about you to assess if you'd be a good fit for their school.

For the Class of 2025, the Common Application will open on August 1, 2024.

The majority of schools use the **Common Application** as their application portal. Some schools have an application portal built

into their website, and other schools use an application portal called the Coalition App (similar to the Common App; see schools that use the Coalition App here). Creating an account on any of these portals is free, but most colleges/universities have a cost associated with applying. All applications are created and submitted online.

The College Application Timeline



Early Decision

Students can pick a single school to apply to, under a binding agreement - if they are admitted, they must attend.

Early Decision I

This is the main attempt for students to apply ED to a given school - and ususally has the most advantage for students in terms of admit rates.

Early Decision II

For students who aren't admitted in the first ED wave, some schools offer another round -there isn't usually as much advantage in admit rates here, but still better than regular admission.

Typical deadline: November 1st Typical decision release: December 15th

Early Action

Students apply earlier in the timeline. They aren't bound to enroll of they're admitted.

Regular Early Action

Students apply earlier in the cycle, to as many schools as they'd like. There's a slight advantage to admit rate, and students also get the benefit of learning the decisions earlier in the process.

Single-Choice Early Action

Students apply earlier in the cycle, but for these schools, they are only allowed to apply to a single school. There's a slight advantage to admit rate.

Typical deadline: November 1st Typical decision release: December 15th

Regular Decision

Students apply to as many schools as they'd like, and are not bound to enroll if they are offered admission.


Typical deadline: January 1st

Typical decision release: April 1st

The College Essay

The college essay is an extremely important part of your college application—it is the one part of the application that is in your voice! To get help starting, editing, or putting your essay into your application early. It's a great idea to start drafting an essay and picking a topic to write about over the summer, before returning for senior year in the fall.

Make sure to check out the 'Writing YOUR Best College Essay' Canvas page for the college essay prompts, brainstorming ideas, rubrics, and advice from higher education admissions professionals.



Seniors applying to four-year colleges will most likely need one to two teacher letters of recommendation. However, they will need to find out the exact number required by checking the "application requirements" on the websites of the colleges to which they are applying. To request a teacher letter of recommendation, please follow the steps listed on the Teacher Recommendation Letter Guide. You should always plan to give your teachers a minimum of 15 school days notice prior to your first application deadline.



Counselor Letter of Recommendation

Seniors applying to four-year colleges will most likely need a counselor letter of recommendation. However, they will find out for sure by checking the "application requirements" on the websites of the colleges to which they are applying.

Teacher Letter(s) of Recommendation

4-year college apps likely need 1-2 teacher LOR (check LOR requirements on the website of each college). Plan to give your teachers a minimum of 15 school days notice prior to your first application deadline.

Standardized Testing - SAT, ACT, AP & TOEFL

Standardized Testing Info & Resources

Do you have free/reduced lunch and/or receive any financial assistance? If so, you qualify for a SAT fee waiver! A fee waiver covers the cost of up to two SAT tests and three SAT Subject Tests. It will also cover submitting college applications through the Common Application. If you need an SAT or ACT fee waiver please contact school counselor.

TEST OPTIONAL SCHOOLS: Test optional means that a school does not require SAT or ACT scores as a part of your application. Over 1,000 colleges and universities are test optional. Find a complete list at www.fairtest.org!

THE TOEFL EXAM: The Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) is a standardized test that measures English language ability for non-native speakers who plan to enroll in an English speaking college. The test evaluates listening, reading, writing, and speaking skills in relationship to academic tasks. Test costs range between \$150-\$225. Unfortunately, no financial aid is offered for the TOEFL test. Fee-based and free prep materials can be found on the <u>TOEFL website</u>, on <u>Canvas</u>, or in the College & Career Center (K007). SAT registration is open for the 2024-25 testing year. Many colleges consider SAT scores as part of their holistic admission and placement decisions, and your score is a valid way to show what you've learned. Most juniors take their first SAT in the spring, and many take it again in the fall of their senior year to improve their score. It can help you keep your college options open, demonstrate your unique strengths, and even qualify for scholarships.



Junior Rangers Summer Program (ages 14-15)

Tier One: Junior Rangers

• Age: 14-15-year-olds

• Focus: Project based learning/ soft skills and professional development

• Hours: 40-300 program hours

The tier one program is a project-based learning experience. Youth in this age group have a unique opportunity to learn and be prepared for the workforce through professional development, career development, and other soft skills training while creating a project that may have an impact on their community. The tier one participants will begin developing independent decision-making

skills in the workplace. The curriculum is split into several workforce-relevant topics including, but not limited to professionalism, accountability, diversity, goal setting, taking the initiative, communication skills, constructive criticism, presentation skills, branding, and social media presence. Throughout each section, participants will have the opportunity to work independently and as a team to problem-solve each task, and be open to a wide variety of discussions, ranging from dress code to discrimination.

The goal of the Tier one program is to implement material that would help the success of the participants. It allows each participant to grow and get ready for an hourly paying internship experience within our tier two program. - Ask questions and ask for help in a constructive manner.
