Project description:

I want you to think about what would be going on in your character's mind if you could climb inside their brain. On the "head" cutout that is provided to you, please complete the following tasks considering your main character (this is the character that is the most prominent in the book). I am including a sample for you to use to guide you when completing your own character's head!

- 1. Write your character's name in LARGE print on the head
- 2. After reading the book, please find one quote that your character said, or that was said in your book, that you think is important.
- 3. Create TWO pictures (image) of different symbols in your book, or objects that you believe are important in the text. These can be concrete (you can hold them and see them) or abstract (you can imagine them).
- 4. Include THREE adjectives (describing words) that help describe your main character.
- 5. If the main character has a nickname, you can write it. If they don't, make one up that someone might call them!
- 6. Write a few sentences that explain a time in your book where something major happened that changed your character- we call these turning points!
- 7. Write down whether your character is STATIC or DYNAMIC.

STATIC: Your character does not change throughout the book- stays the same.

DYNAMIC: You character changes a lot throughout the book, and also contributes to the change of other characters.

8. Write the title, author and genre of your story.

GENRE: the category of story you read, such as realistic fiction, fantasy, or mystery.


9. Color the character's "head" in vibrant, bright colors (you may want to outline your words in black pen or sharpie, or type the words and paste them on.


- 10. Make sure the text is legible (if we can't read it, we can't grade it!)
- 11. Use a piece of construction paper or oaktag to reinforce the head that you make (make it stronger). You can then cut the head out so that the oaktag is like a backing for your project (we will hang these up!)
- 12. You will be graded on your use of correct spelling and grammar to the bet of your ability! Be careful and avoid silly errors to get the best score you can.


