- C. Students study literary works in depth and at various levels of meaning
- D. When appropriate, students relate literature to other disciplines such as science, history, economics, mathematics, and art

- E. Students study various literary devices including versification and scansion of Latin poetry
- F. Students actively respond to classical literary works through various activities such as research, oral and written reports, etc.
- G. Students improve reading comprehension and thinking skills
- H. Through direct teaching, students study, as needed, grammar, usage, punctuation, and spelling
- I. Students develop vocabulary by studying words in context and by examining roots and affixes
- J. Students learn and practice study skills
