High School Graduation Requirements

- English 4 years (40 credits)
- Mathematics 2 years (20 credits)
 - must pass Integrated Math II OR
 - 2 years of math (subject to change)
 - if you started at Integrated Math II in the 9th grade



- 2 years of physical science (Physics and Chemistry in the Earth system and 1 year of biological science (Biology or Living Earth)
- World History-1 year (10 credits)
- US History 1 year (10 credits)

High School Graduation Requirements

- Government/Economics-1 semester each (5 credits each)
- Fine Arts- 1 year (10 credits)
- Career Preparation 1 semester (5 credits)
- Health/Guidance- 1 semester each(5 credits each)
- Physical Education 2 years (20 credits)
- Elective Classes (60 credits)
- 220 credits (earned 9th through 12th grade)



A-G College Entrance Requirements

- "a" History/Social Science 2 years
- "b" English 4 years
- "c"- Mathematics 3 years+
- "d"- Laboratory Science 2 years
 - 1 year Biology AND 1 year either Physics or Chemistry in the Earth system
- "e"- Language other than English 2 years
- "f"- Visual and Performing Arts 1 year
- "g" College-Preparatory Elective 1 year

Honors & AP Courses

- Digital AP Contracts will be included in your registration paperwork
- To take an AP class you and your parent must have attended the orientation for that class. If you missed an AP orientation session & AP Parent Night, you must review the presentation for that AP class and indicate that you've done so on your course planning sheet.

- Attending an AP orientation/ requesting an AP class/ turning in an AP contract does not guarantee your placement in an AP class
 - Placement in AP classes will be based on teacher recommendations and/or pre-requisites
- If you are taking an AP course, you should be planning to take the AP Exam
- AP classes are <u>year-long</u> commitments!!!

Honors & AP Classes

If you sign up for an AP course and change your mind, you MUST let your counselor know by August 31st or it will remain on your schedule for a semester.

Summer School

- Glendale Unified School District Remedial Summer School classes are offered free of charge
- □ Semester 1: June 21-July 7
- Semester 2: July 8-July 25
- 5 hours a day; 5 days a week
 - Making up an F grade in a class needed for high school graduation
 - Making up a D/F grade ONLY in Integrated Math I-III (no advancement)
 - Integrated Bridge B/C courses will be offered for advancement (must have A or B in Integrated II/III courses respectively + teacher recommendation

Things to Consider...

- Your ALTERNATE courses must be different from your PRIMARY course selections.
- You may choose only one introductory course from each art pathway if you have not already started a pathway
 - > Example: Art 1-2 & Design 1-2
- Check the bottom of the course offering list for prerequisites
- In May you will have access to your course requests in the portal. AP/Honors course placements will be reflected in your course list at that time. You will be asked to notify your counselor of any changes at that time.
- Sophomore Planning Sheet must be turned in by FEBRUARY 21 in order for your counselor to begin reviewing your course requests. After FEBRUARY 21 you will no longer have access to the form.
- ❖ If you have a **D/F** in current your math, English or social science classes, your counselor will contact you when GUSD Summer School information becomes available.

Motivation and Background

District Goals: Culturally relevant and responsive education (CRRE) committee meetings in order to prepare for social justice standards

State Expectations: Assembly Bill 101 (reintroduced) will require Ethnic Studies course completion in high school for graduation. It is already a requirement in College.

Sense of Belonging: Clark student Panorama survey results indicate a need of belonging, connectedness, and understanding. This course offers opportunities for connectedness and community involvement.

Student Needs: Students have expressed great concern and willingness to partake in social justice related events that correspond to Ethnic Studies topics (local social justice protests in Glendale, Artsakh volunteering and food drives etc.) This course specializes in cultural understanding and civic engagement.



Film as Literature

Film as Literature is a course aimed to provide students with the essential tools needed to critique and analyze different aspects of film the way they would novels or other literary texts. Students will use film as a platform to discuss culture, history, philosophy, human nature, and other related topics.
