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





HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS CLASS OF 2024 AND BEYOND

Students must earn a "D" or better in the following areas:

3 years of History/Social Science (World History, U.S. History, American Gov, Economics)	30
4 years of English	
2 years of math (Integrated math I and II. Integrated III is always encouraged)	20



A-G REQUIREMENTS

- Minimum classes required to apply to a 4-year university directly after high school. All classes must be completed with a "C" or better.
- Take more academic classes than required. University admissions departments generally recommend an additional year of math (ideally getting to the highest level of math—Calculus), laboratory science, and foreign language.
- Take the most challenging classes available. Students should ask to be placed in honors or Advanced Placement (AP) classes. AP classes are considered college-level work and if a student passes the AP exam, he or she can receive college credit for the class.



UC Personal Insight Questions

How would you respond to the following?

Describe the most significant challenge you have faced and the steps you have taken to overcome this challenge. How has this challenge affected your academic achievement?



• Some students have a background, identity, interest, or talent that is so meaningful they believe their application would be incomplete without it. If this sounds like you, then please share your story.

- The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when you faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect you, and what did you learn from the experience?
- Reflect on a time when you questioned or challenged a belief or idea. What prompted your thinking? What was the outcome?
- Reflect on something that someone has done for you that has made you happy or thankful in a surprising way. How has this gratitude affected or motivated you?
- Discuss an accomplishment, event, or realization that sparked a period of personal growth and a new understanding of yourself or others.
- Describe a topic, idea, or concept you find so engaging that it makes you lose all track of time. Why does it captivate you?

What are colleges looking for in my application?

Academic Factors

- GPA
- SAT/ACT scores will not be used for admission or scholarship decisions, but may be used for placement in math and English classes.
- Performance in and number of courses beyond minimum A-G requirements.
- UC approved honors courses and advanced courses (max 8 semester honors/AP points)
- Quality of senior-year program of study.
- Outstanding performance in one or more academic subject areas

Non-Academic Factors

- Achievements in special projects
- Improvement in academic performance
- Special talents, achievements, and awards
- Extracurricular activity and depth of involvement.
- Leadership positions



California Community Colleges

- Low cost
- Small class size
- Honors programs
- Study abroad opportunities
- Vocational + academic exploration
- Athletics (chance to play)
- Clubs + extracurricular activities
- Teachers teach vs. publish






- Neighboring states are actively recruiting California students



- Not taking courses and grades seriously

- Belief in "good schools"
- Careless/incomplete applications



SCHOLARSHIPS

FREE money that may be awarded by organizations (private money), the university (institutional money), or individuals (private money). Also known as "Gift Aid".

GRANTS

FREE money that may be awarded by organizations (private money), the university (institutional money), or the government (federal and state money). Also known as "Gift Aid".

See a list of the most common grants awarded to students below.

4 TYPES 0F

WORK-STUDY

Students are offered an opportunity to work through an on-campus organization and EARN money to help pay for their cost of attendance.

- Work hours are flexible to fit students' class schedule.
- Wages are subsidized by the federal government or the university so employers are more willing to hire work-study students.



LOANS

Money that is BORROWED, accumulates interests, and must be paid back. Types of loans:

- Subsidized Federal Loans
- UNsubsidized Federal Loans
- Dream Loans
- Private Loans

COMPLETING A FINANCIAL AID APPLICATION HELPS YOU QUALIFY FOR:

GRANTS = FREE MONEY FOR COLLEGE

SCHOLARSHIPS = FREE MONEY FOR COLLEGE

LOANS = MONEY FOR COLLEGE THAT MUST BE REPAID

(WE USUALLY WANT TO AVOID LOANS AS MUCH AS POSSIBLE!)

FEDERAL MONEY

Money from the federal government.

US Citizens and **Eligible Non-Citizens** may qualify.



STATE MONEY

Money from the California state government.

US Citizens and Eligible Non-Citizens may qualify. Undocumented students who meet AB540 criteria may qualify too.



INSTITUTIONAL MONEY

Money from colleges & universities.

ALL students, regardless of legal status, may qualify.



PRIVATE MONEY

Money from organizations or individuals.

ALL students, regardless of legal status, may qualify.



FALL SENIOR COLLEGE PLANNING TIMELINE



September

- Check your transcripts to make sure you have the credits you need to into the college that interests you.
- Register for any standardized tests you plan on taking.
- Research colleges, attend college fairs, visit campuses.
- Complete Senior Brag Sheets
- If you are applying Early Action or Early Decision, keep track of deadlines

October

- Finalize your list of colleges, keep a file with application deadlines and admission requirements.
- Take the SAT/ACT (if required).
- Get started with essays. Give your essays to others for feedback.

November

• UC and CSU deadline for submission - November 30th
