Learning to read is the job of a lifetime.

Two-and-three-year-old children who are read to a lot begin their reading careers early.

The day a child gets hold of a sentence pattern that works for him and reads it into the telephone directory or the Montgomery Ward catalog or his daddy's newspaper at night, he is launching himself on his reading career. He is role-playing himself as a successful reader. The day a child reads a book from memory, he is furthering his reading career.

He, in truth, is finding joy and power in the pages of a book, a psychological posture that every successful reader continuously brings to each reading encounter, knowing, subconsciously if not consciously, that he can make a go of print.

This is the first and foremost reading skill.
