Kristina Kugaevskaya, and 11th grade student at Glendale High School, was the winner of the Glendale Unified ACSA Student Oratory Contest and the winner in the regional ACSA competition. She will be honored in April by ASCA.

2. Verdugo Academy Student Wins Second Place in Los Angeles Area Stock Market Game

Shawheen Balouch, an 8th grade student at Verdugo Academy, took second place in the Los Angeles area stock market game. The SIFMA Foundation's Stock Market GameTM is an online academic and life-skills educational program used by hundreds of California teachers to boost students' math, economics, and personal finance knowledge, while also improving their test scores and instilling essential skills for financially independent futures.

Twenty-eight students will receive awards from Glendale Council PTA to commemorate their outstanding work in this annual competition, which is part of the National PTA Reflections Program. Highlights

Glendale High School Aquatic Center - On July 16, 2019, the Board approved the award of contract to Balfour Beatty Construction for the Glendale High School Aquatic Center Project. Construction began in fall 2019, and a groundbreaking ceremony was held on October 15, 2019. This project was completed in April 2021, and a socially-distanced ribbon cutting ceremony was held on April I, 2021. It included the installation of a new 38-meter by 25-yard pool, with a shallow end to accommodate students learning to swim, accessible entrance to the pool, locker rooms, strooms, storage, and coaches' offices. The project experienced several delays due to COVID-19 pandemic. However, staff worked with the contractor to minimize the impact of the delays on the project and complete the work in a timely manner. As a part of the project, improvements were also made to the adjacent baseball and softball The Glendale High School Aquatic Center will serve not only the students of GUSD, but also the entire Glendale Community.

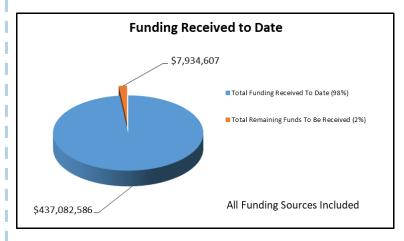
Clark Magnet High School CTE Building - On December 12, 2017, the Board approved the allocation of \$3.5 million for the construction of a new CTE building at Clark Magnet High School. In October 2018, the District submitted a Grant application to OPSC for matching funds. On September 25, 2019, the District received apportionment approval of \$3 million in matching State funds. Plans were approved by DSA in September 2020 and construction began in June 2021. The project is anticipated to be completed by summer 2022, to be ready for students to occupy the building for the 2022-2023 school year.

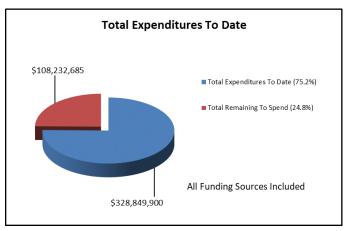


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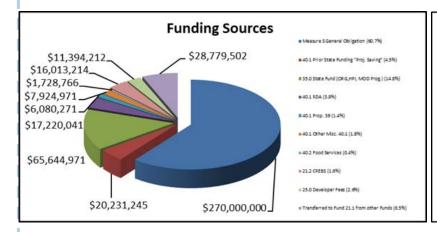
Status of Funding & Expenditures to Date

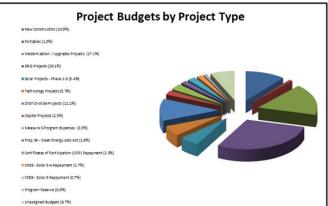
The District Issued the first, second, third, fourth and fifth series of Measure S bonds for \$270 million plus other funding totaling approximately \$437,082,585. This represents 98% of the overall current anticipated funding of \$445,017,193. Total expenditures reported to date through June 30, 2021 represent 75.2% of currently available funds. The pie charts below and on the following page indicate utilization of total available funding, funding sources, and project budgets by project type.

Independent Auditor's Report

Measure S bonds are Proposition 39 bonds issued by GUSD. The passage of Proposition 39 in November 2000 amended the California Constitution to include accountability provisions. Specifically, the District must conduct an annual independent performance audit to ensure that funds have been expended only on specific projects listed as well as an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds until all of the proceeds have been expended. CliftonLarsonAllen, LLP, conducted an independent audit of the financial statements for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2021. In their opinion, the financial statement presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Measure S bond and the results of its operations. The Performance Audit indicates that the proceeds of the sale of Measure S funds were only used for the purposes set forth in the ballot measures and not for any other purposes. — Reports can be reviewed at www.gusd.net/page/607

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Projects in Motion

GLENOAKS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL NEW CLASSROOM BUILDING - On May 19, 2020, the Board approved the allocation of \$12.8 million for the construction of a new 10-classroom modular building at Glenoaks Elementary School. Relocation of the Interim Housing buildings that will house students during construction began in June 2021. Construction of the new building was scheduled to begin immediately following the completion of this relocation and DSA approval of plans. The building is anticipated to be completed in time for the start of the 2022-2023 school year.

MONTE VISTA ELEMENTARY SCHOOL NEW CLASSROOM BUILDING - On May 19, 2020, the Board approved the allocation of \$12.7 million for the construction of a new 10-classroom modular building at Monte Vista Elementary School. The project will also include the installation of a new ADA-accessible ramp from the upper area to the lower field. Relocation of the Interim Housing buildings that will house students during construction began in June 2021. Construction of the new building was scheduled to begin immediately following the completion of this relocation after having obtained DSA approval of plans. The building is anticipated to be completed in time for the start of the 2022-2023 school year.

VERDUGO WOODLANDS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL BRIDGE - On February 5, 2019, the Board approved a budget allocation of \$2,000,000 for the Verdugo Woodlands Bridge project. On May 18, 2021, the Board approved a budget adjustment of \$1,250,000, resulting in a total project budget of \$3,250,000. Following this approval, staff continued to work with NAC Architects to obtain DSA approval of the plans and begin construction. This bridge would allow for a more direct path to the safe dispersal area located across the bridge on the playground area. The start of construction was scheduled for fall 2021.

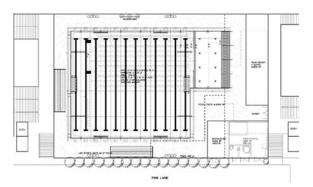

HOOVER HIGH SCHOOL POOL EXPANSION AND RENOVATION - On March 6, 2018, the Board approved a project and budget allocation of \$5,000,000 for the expansion and renovation of the Hoover High School pool. On June 1, 2021, the Board approved a budget adjustment for the project, resulting in a total project allocation of \$8,225,000. Staff has begun working with District-approved architectural firm tBP Architecture to begin planning for the project.

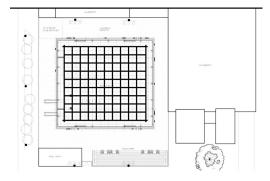
CRESCENTA VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL POOL EXPANSION AND RENOVATION - On March 6, 2018, the Board approved a project and budget allocation of \$4,000,000 for the renovation of the Crescenta Valley High School pool. On June 1, 2021, the Board approved a budget adjustment for the project, resulting in a total project allocation of \$5,510,750 for the renovation and expansion of the pool. Staff has begun working with District-approved architectural firm tBP Architecture to begin planning for the project.

MARSHALL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CAFETERIA/MULTIPURPOSE BUILDING PROJECT - On May 19, 2020, the Board approved a budget allocation of \$50,000 for design services for a possible new cafeteria/multipurpose building at Marshall Elementary School. Following the Board's approval of a full budget allocation, staff will continue to work with NAC Architecture to continue planning for this project.

CRESCENTA VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL FIELD IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT - On June 4, 2018, the board approved the award of contract for CEQA consulting services for the potential Crescenta Valley High School Field Improvements Project. Staff has worked diligently to complete the CEQA process and to finalize and distribute a final Environmental Impact Report (EIR). Following the approval and certification of the EIR, and Board approval of a budget allocation, staff will continue to work with tBP Architecture to continue planning for the project.

(Refer to Action Report No. 2)

During each fiscal year, two interim financial reports are required. In each of these reports, the Board of Education must determine if it will be able to meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years. One of the following certifications must be made:

- 1. Positive the district <u>will be able</u> to meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years.
- 2. Qualified the district <u>may not be able</u> to meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years.
- 3. Negative the district <u>will be unable</u> to meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years.

Along with the Interim Financial Report, districts are required to furnish a narrative for each fund, a cash flow analysis, criteria and standards review, and a report of Average Daily Attendance (ADA). The financial information and certification form included with this report indicates that the District will be able to meet its financial obligations through 2023-24.

In 2021-22, there is a 5.07% COLA increase to Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF). LCFF funding is projected to get COLA only increases in future years. It is prudent to remember that revenue assumptions may decrease if the legislation appropriation priorities shift, other unexpected State tax shortfalls occur, or the District's student enrollment, ADA, or demographic changes.

While there are many positive economic indicators, there is still a level of economic uncertainty due to the unpredictability of COVID-19. Inflation has also become a major

concern and the cost of everyday goods and services continue to rise to levels not seen since 1982. The Federal Reserve's response to inflation, including interest rate hikes, could impact the stock market and the State budget.

Given the positive balances in all three years, the District is recommending a "positive" certification for the Second Interim Report. A "positive" Second Interim was only achieved using budget assumptions that include utilizing all of the current and future year LCFF growth, all current undesignated reserves, as well as, the 2022-23 (net) \$6.0 million and the 2023-24 \$16.5 million Fiscal Stabilization Plan.

At this point in the budget cycle, it is prudent to begin planning the Fiscal Stabilization Plan that will likely be required for 2023-24.

This item is included in the March 8, 2022 agenda for approval by the Board of Education as Action Report No. 2.

SUBJECT: School-Age Before and After School Programs for 2022-2023

The Child Development and Child Care department (CDCC) is making significant changes to the before and after school programs offered at the elementary schools for the 2022-2023 school year. These changes have come about as a result of the availability of State funding for the Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELO-P) from AB 130, shifts in the child care needs of GUSD families, and the desire to create more equitable and accessible programs.

In previous years, CDCC ran multiple programs at each elementary school site. Programs were developed around their funding source and resulted in a separation of children, staffing, and resources. For the 2022-2023 school year, CDCC will be running one before and after school program at each elementary site. The priorities for this program include:

- Giving access to all families who need care.
- Making the program affordable to private pay families.
- Providing quality programming that engages all students.
- Maintaining financial solvency within the parameters of the program's various funding sources.

The before and after school program run by CDCC will be called GUSD "CARES." "CARES" stands for:

- <u>Care</u>
- <u>A</u>cademic support
- Recreation
- Enrichment
- Before and after School

The program will consist of homework time, snack, physical activity, and enrichment. All students enrolled will participate in the same program.

In order to meet the needs of all families, options for GUSD "CARES" include:

- <u>AM Child Care</u>: Provides supervision beginning at 6:30 a.m. until the school gates open (\$90 per month, free to eligible families).
- <u>TK/Kinder Bridge</u>: Provides supervision from TK/Kinder dismissal until school dismissal (\$180 per month, free to eligible families).
- <u>Dismissal +60</u>: Provides supervision only for children whose parents need a little extra time to pick up (\$90 per month, free to eligible families).
- After School Care: The full after-school expanded learning program that includes homework assistance, snack, physical education, and enrichment activities from school dismissal until 6 p.m. (\$270 per month, free to eligible families).

GUSD "CARES" will be a multi-funded program:

- California Department of Education subsidized child care contract (CCTR)
- After School Education & Safety grant (ASES) from the State
- Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELO-P) apportionment from the State
- Private pay fees

Student eligibility for State funded childcare will maximize the number of students served. Students will be matched to the funding source based on the following criteria:

- CCTR Subsidized child care is based on a family's financial status and documented need for care.
- ASES aims to serve students who qualify for free and reduced priced meals, can then be made available to all families as space allows, and has a mandatory fiveday a week attendance requirement.
- Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELO-P) serves unduplicated students (foster/homeless youth, English Language Learners), and those who qualify for free or reduced-price meals as indicated by GUSD data.
- Fee-based Child Care for families who do not qualify for one of the above mentioned State funded programs.

Students participating in the CCTR program will be maintained (28:1) in compliance with State regulations as compared to ASES/ELO-P (20:1/10:1). All other aspects of the program will be consistent so that students have equitable access to activities.

Enrollment for GUSD CARES opened on February 22, 2022, and families were asked to sign up by March 18, 2022. Families of unduplicated students were notified of their eligibility via email and were mailed an invitation to access ELO-P. Families of students currently enrolled in CDCC child care, families currently on the waiting list and those

families who are not eligible for ELO-P were notified that sign-ups for the program were open. Information about child care is included with TK/Kinder and new student registration packets, a District-wide communication will go out in an upcoming newsletter, and a link can be found on the homepage of GUSD's website that leads the parents to the updated information.

CDCC will be reviewing responses to sign-up forms and will be confirming enrollment for families by the end of April. CDCC will continue to accept requests throughout the year and will work to find fully qualified staff in order to serve all students.

Planning is underway for the GUSD summer camp program. CDCC will offer summer child care camps at selected school sites for grades TK-6 to subsidized families with an option for private pay families to attend at a cost of \$50 per day. Plans will be finalized in the coming weeks and will be shared with the Board of Education, the school sites and GUSD families.

Relations and Students-Welfare

This report provides the Board of Education with information on the need to revise existing Board Policies (BP) 1312.3 (Uniform Complaint Procedures) and BP 5148 (Child Care and Development) as recommended by the California School Boards Association (CSBA) and to comply with Education Code and federal and state laws.

BP 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures

CSBA Update: December 2021 Last GUSD Update: February 2021

Staff recommends that the Board update the policy to reflect a new law (AB 131, 2021), which:

- Renumbers the license-exempt California State Preschool Program code sections.
- Ensures consistency with the California Department of Education's 2021-22 federal program monitoring instrument.
- Clarifies that districts may not offer or facilitate an informal resolution process to resolve allegations that an employee sexually harassed a student.
- Adds Item #3 to the section regarding "Non-UCP Complaints" that any complaint alleging that a student, while in an education program or activity as specified, was subjected to sexual harassment as defined in 34 CFR 106.30 be addressed through federal Title IX complaint procedures.
- Clarifies in Item #5 that complaints alleging a physical safety concern that interferes with a free appropriate public education is a non-UCP complaint.

BP 5148 - Child Care and Development

CSBA Update: December 2021 Last GUSD Update: November 2021 Glendale Unified School District Information Report No. 7 March 8, 2022 Page 2

Staff recommends the Board update the policy to reflect a new law (AB 131, 2021), which repealed the Child Care and Development Services Act from the Education Code and reenacted the laws in the Welfare and Institutions Code with responsibility for administering child care programs transferring to the California Department of Social Services (CDSS). The policy is also updated to reflect another new law (AB 130, 2021) pursuant to which a child's eligibility for transitional kindergarten may not impact family eligibility for a child care program and which requires, as a condition of funding, that a child care program that is physically closed by local or state public health order or guidance due to the COVID–19 pandemic, but funded to be operational, provide distance learning services as specified by CDSS.

The proposed revisions to these policies are presented to the Board for first reading. Should the consensus be to move forward, the policies will be on the April 5, 2022, meeting agenda for approval. Upon approval of the BPs, revisions will be made to the accompanying Administrative Regulations as needed following the normal District process.

Uniform Complaint Procedures

The Board of Education recognizes that the District has the primary responsibility to ensure compliance with applicable state and federal laws and regulations governing educational programs. The Board encourages the early resolution of complaints whenever possible. To resolve complaints which may require a more formal process, the Board shall adopt the uniform system of complaint processes specified in 5 CCR 4600-4670 and the accompanying administrative regulation.

Complaints Subject to the UCP

The District's uniform complaint procedure (UCP) shall be used to investigate and resolve the following complaints regarding the following programs and activities:

Discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying in District programs and activities, including in those programs or activities funded directly by or that receive or benefit from any state financial assistance, based on the a person's actual or perceived characteristics of race or ethnicity, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, immigration status, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital status, pregnancy, parental status, physical or

mental disability, medical condition, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, or genetic information, or any other characteristic identified in Education Code 200 or 220, Government Code 11135, or Penal Code 422.55, or based on the person's association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics (5 CCR 4610)

- 11. Educational and graduation requirements for students in foster care, homeless students, students from military families, students formerly in a juvenile court school, migrant students, and immigrant students participating in a newcomer program (Education Code 48645.7, 48853, 48853.5, 49069.5, 51225.1, 51225.2)
- 12. Every Student Succeeds Act (Education Code 52059.5; 20 USC 6301 et seq.)
- 13. Local control and accountability plan (Education Code 52075)

complaint process or anyone who has acted to uncover or report a violation subject to this policy

25. Any other state or federal educational program the Superintendent of Public Instruction or designee deems appropriate

The Board recognizes that alternative dispute resolution (ADR) can, depending on the nature of the allegations, offer a process for resolving a complaint in a manner that is acceptable to all parties. An ADR process such as mediation may be offered to resolve complaints that involve more than one student and no adult. However, mediation shall not be offered or used to resolve any complaint involving sexual assault or where there is a reasonable risk that a party to the mediation would feel compelled to participate. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the use of ADR is consistent with state and federal laws and regulations.

The District shall protect all complainants from retaliation. In investigating complaints, the confidentiality of the parties involved shall be protected as required by law. For any complaint alleging retaliation or unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying), the Superintendent or designee shall keep the identity of the complainant and/or the subject of the complaint, if different from the complainant, confidential when appropriate and as long as the integrity of the complaint process is maintained.

When an allegation that is not subject to the UCP is included in a UCP complaint, the District shall refer the non-UCP allegation to the appropriate staff or agency and shall investigate and, if appropriate, resolve the UCP-related allegation(s) through the District's UCP.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training to District staff to ensure awareness and knowledge of current law and requirements related to UCP, including the steps and timelines specified in this policy and the accompanying administrative regulations.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a record of each complaint and subsequent related actions, including steps taken during the investigation and all information required for compliance with 5 CCR 4631 and 4633.

Non-UCP Complaints

The following complaints shall not be subject to the District's UCP but shall be investigated and resolved by the specified agency or through an alternative process:

1. Any complaint alleging child abuse or neglect shall be referred to the County Department

- of Social Services, Protective Services Division, and the appropriate law enforcement agency. (5 CCR 4611)
- 2. Any complaint alleging health and safety violations by a child development program shall, for licensed facilities, be referred to the Department of Social Services. (5 CCR 4611)
- 3. Any complaint alleging that a student, while in an education program or activity in which the district exercises substantial control over the context and respondent, was subjected to sexual harassment as defined in 34 CFR 3 Policy Reference Disclaimer: 106.30 shall be addressed through the federal Title IX complaint procedures adopted pursuant to 34 CFR 106.44-106.45, as specified in AR 5145.71 Title IX Sexual Harassment Complaint Procedures.
- 3.4. Any complaint alleging employment discrimination or harassment shall be investigated and resolved by the District in accordance with the procedures specified in AR 4030 Nondiscrimination in Employment, including the right to file the complaint with the California Department of Fair Employment and Housing.
- 4.5. Any complaint alleging a violation of a state or federal law or regulation related to special education, a settlement agreement related to the provision of a free appropriate public education (FAPE), failure or refusal to implement a due process hearing order to which the District is subject, or a physical safety concern that interferes with the District's provision of FAPE, or a due process hearing order shall be submitted to the California Department of Education (CDE) in accordance with AR 6159.1 Procedural Safeguards and Complaints for Special Education. (5 CCR 3200-3205)
- 5.6. Any complaint alleging noncompliance of the District's food service program with laws regarding meal counting and claiming, reimbursable meals, eligibility of children or adults, or use of cafeteria funds and allowable expenses shall be filed with or referred to CDE in accordance with BP 3555 Nutrition Program Compliance. (5 CCR 15580-15584)
- 6.7. Any allegation of discrimination based on race, color, national origin, sex, age, or disability in the District's food service program shall be filed with or referred to the U.S. Department of Agriculture in accordance with BP 3555 Nutrition Program Compliance. (5 CCR 15582)
- 7.8. Any complaint related to sufficiency of textbooks or instructional materials, emergency or urgent facilities conditions that pose a threat to the health or safety of students or staff, or teacher vacancies and misassignments shall be investigated and resolved in accordance

Child Care and Development

The Board of Education recognizes that child development and child care programs are a necessity for many families in the Glendale Unified School District. The Board shall desires to provide child care and development services which meet the developmental needs of children and offer a convenient child care alternative for parents/guardians in the community. The programs shall be consistent with and support the District's regular education program.

The Board shall enter into a contract with the California Department of Social Services (CDSS) for the provision of child care and development services by the District.

The Superintendent or designee District shall work cooperatively with the local child care and development planning council, public and private agencies, parents/guardians, and other community members to assess child care needs in the community, establish program priorities, obtain ongoing feedback on program quality, and inform parents/guardians about child care options.

The Board shall approve, for the District's child care and development programs, a written philosophical statement, goals, and objectives that reflect the cultural and linguistic characteristics of the families to be served and address the program components specified in 5 CCR 18272-18281 and the accompanying administrative regulation. (5 CCR 18271)

When a District child care program is physically closed by local or state public health order due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the District shall provide distance learning when required to do so as a condition of funding or when required by law.

A. Eligibility and Enrollment

Child care admissions policies and procedures shall be in writing and available to the public. Such policies and procedures shall include: criteria designating those children whose needs can be met by the child care center's program and services, the ages of children who will be accepted, program activities, any supplementary services provided, any field trip provisions, any transportation arrangements, food service provisions, and health examination requirements. (5 CCR 18105; 22 CCR 101218)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that subsidized child care is provided to eligible families to the extent that state and/or federal funding is available and shall establish and in accordance with enrollment priorities specified in in accordance with Education Code 8263 Welfare and Institutions Code 10271 and 5 CCR 18106.

To the extent that space is available after the enrollment of children who are eligible for

subsidized services, priority for admissions shall be given to District students, children of District students, and children of District employees.

A child's eligibility for transitional kindergarten enrollment shall not impact family eligibility for a childcare or preschool program. (Education Code 48000)

B. Staffing

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that individuals working in child care and development programs have the necessary qualifications and have satisfied all legal requirements.

C. Facilities

Upon recommendation of the Superintendent or designee, the Board may approve any of the following for the provision of child care and development services:

- 1. The use of existing District facilities that have capacity.
- 2. Renovation or improvement of District facilities to make them suitable for such services.
- 3. Purchase of relocatable child care facilities.
- 4. Inclusion of child care facilities in any new construction.
- 5. Agreement with a public agency or community organization for the use of community facilities.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that facilities used for child care services meet all applicable health and safety standards. (5 CCR 18020; 22 CCR 101238-101239.2)

D. Complaints

For a licensed child care center, any complaint alleging health and safety violations shall be referred to the California Department of Social Services. (5 CCR 4611)

For a license-exempt facility, such complaints shall be referred to the appropriate District

administrator.

Any other alleged violation of state or federal laws governing child care and development programs shall be investigated and resolved using the District's procedures in BP/AR 1312.3 – Uniform Complaint Procedures.

E. Program Evaluation

The Superintendent or designee shall annually conduct an evaluation of the District's child care and development services in accordance with state requirements. The evaluation report shall be used to develop an action plan which establishes program goals and objectives for the coming year and addresses any areas identified as needing improvement. (5 CCR 18279-18281)

SUBJECT: Resolution No. 18 - Designating March 2022 as Arts Education

in California Month

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education adopt Resolution No. 18 to designate March 2022 as Arts Education in California Month to affirm the Board of Education's support of arts education for all students.

The Glendale Unified School District believes that the arts, music, literature, dance, drama, and visual arts are central to learning. Infusion of the arts in elementary, secondary, and continuing education curricula is key to the development of students.

The Art & Creative Materials Institute (ACMI) created Children's Art Month in 1961 as an event to emphasize the value to children from participating in visual art education. In 1969, the celebration expanded to include secondary school students, and the Children's Art Month event officially became known as Youth Art Month.

Celebrated in the month of March, the Arts Education in California Month celebrates arts education and includes dance, music, theater, literature, design, and various visual arts. These experiences encourage creative learning in children and young adults. It is important that the schools recognize and celebrate the essential role of arts education. Kisda and Bowen (2019) found that an increase in arts educational experiences has "remarkable impacts on students' academic, social, and emotional outcomes." This included a 3.6 percentage point reduction in disciplinary infractions, an improvement of 13 percent of a standard deviation in standardized writing scores, and an increase of 8 percent of a standard deviation in their compassion for others. The authors summarized that those students who received more arts education experiences are more interested in how other people feel and more likely to want to help people who are treated badly. For elementary aged students, increases in arts learning positively and significantly affect students' school engagement, college aspirations, and their inclinations to draw upon works of art as a means for empathizing with others.

WHEREAS, the arts teach children the skills necessary to succeed in life, including learning to solve problems and make decisions, learning to think creatively, building self-esteem and self- discipline, articulating a vision, developing the ability to imagine what might be, and accepting responsibility to complete tasks from start to finish; and

WHEREAS, studies have shown that the arts play a unique role in increasing student achievement; and

WHEREAS, CREATE CA, California's Standards Arts Education Coalition, states in its Blueprint for Creative Schools that creativity is crucial to youth voice, the desire to learn, diversity, and public participation in intercultural works; and

WHEREAS, the California State Board of Education adopted the California Arts Standards for Public Schools, Kindergarten through Grade Twelve (Arts Standards), on January 9, 2019, and states in part that each student should receive a high quality, comprehensive arts

education program based on the adopted Visual and Performing Arts Framework for California Public Schools, Kindergarten Through Grade Twelve;

SUBJECT: Second Interim Financial Report and Certification – AB 1200

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education approve the attached certification indicating that, based on the budgetary information available on January 31, 2022, the District will be able to meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years (positive certification). Additionally, the approval of this report will authorize the 2021-22 budget adjustments identified within this report.

The requirement for districts to prepare Interim Financial Reports is outlined in AB 1200 (Chapter 1213/1991) and AB 1708 (Chapter 924/1994). These statutes require county offices and the California Department of Education to closely monitor and review district budget and financial reports. Additionally, those agencies have been provided authority to intervene in district budget and financial matters and, as necessary, in other areas of school district operations.

During each fiscal year, two interim financial reports are required. In each of these reports, the Board of Education must determine if it will be able to meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years. One of the following certifications must be made:

- 1. Positive the district <u>will be able</u> to meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years.
- 2. Qualified the district <u>may not be able</u> to meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years.
- 3. Negative the district <u>will be unable</u> to meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years.

To Support 2021-22 Board Priority No. 4 – Maintain District Financial Responsibility – Ensure the fiscal health of the District, implement a fiscal plan to preserve the District resources, and plan for the District's future educational and facility needs.

Along with the Interim Financial Report, districts are required to furnish a narrative for each fund, a cash flow analysis, criteria and standards review, and a report of Average Daily Attendance (ADA). The financial information and certification form included with this report indicates that the District will be able to meet its financial obligations through 2023-24.

In 2021-22, there is a 5.07% COLA increase to Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF). Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) State funding is projecting to get COLA only increases in future years. It is prudent to remember that revenue assumptions may decrease if the legislation appropriation priorities shift, other unexpected State tax shortfalls occur, or the District's student enrollment, ADA, or demographic changes. While there are many positive economic indicators, there is still a level of economic uncertainty due to the unpredictability of COVID-19, as well as other global concerns. Inflation has also become a major concern as the cost of everyday goods and services continue to rise to levels not seen since 1982. The Federal Reserve's response to inflation, including interest rate hikes, could impact the stock market and the State budget.

Given the positive balances in all three years, the District is recommending a "**positive**" certification for the Second Interim Report. A "**positive**" Second Interim was only achieved using budget assumptions that include utilizing all of the current and future year LCFF growth, all current undesignated reserves, as well as, the 2022-23 (net) \$6.0 million, and the 2023-24 \$16.5 million Fiscal Stabilization Plan. See Attachment C.

UNRESTRICTED GENERAL FUND NARRATIVE

The Interim Financial Report is submitted in the format prescribed by the State Office of Fiscal Management and Accountability, and approved by the California Department of Education. The Interim Financial Report is a result of a coordinated effort by the accounting staff, the Financial Analyst, and various departments and staff across the District.

The information in this report represents the actual and projected financial position of the General Fund as of January 31, 2022. Column A (Original Budget) represents summarized income or expenditure figures as approved in the adopted budget. Column B (Board-Approved Operating Budget) represents the revised budget as changed by budget revisions and appropriation transfers through January 31, 2022. Column C (Actuals to Date) shows the funds actually received or spent through January 31, 2022. Column D (Projected Year Totals) provides projections for the income or expenditure figures through June 30, 2022. Column E (Difference) reflects the difference between Column B and Column D, which represents positive or negative variances in projected balances. A positive difference in a revenue item indicates that actual income is projected to exceed budgeted income. A positive difference in an expenditure item indicates that actual expenditures will be less than budgeted expenditures.

General Fund Highlights

Multi-Year Budget Assumptions

The LCFF establishes base grants for four grade spans with supplemental and concentration add-on for English Learners (EL), free and reduced-price meal eligible students and foster youth students, and

provides additional funding for TK-3 CSR, Grades 9-12, Home-to-School Transportation and the Targeted Instructional Improvement Grant (TIIG). Please see "Attachments A and B" for comparison of projection changes and assumptions.

The Second Interim budget adjustments in Attachment B include several important items to highlight. The following are adjustments to the 2021-22 Second Interim Budget:

- Other Programs
 - Revised LCFF Funding Variables
 - 2021-22 Special Education Disproportionality Program Appropriation
 - 2021-22 One-Time Projected Actuals vs. Budget

The multi-year plan also reflects adjustments to the LCFF revenue projection. The COLA/ADA assumptions are listed in Attachment A. Given the future years of LCFF revenue increases are only estimates, based on the State's proposals, and the State will not have finalized the LCFF calculation until year-end, the Los Angeles County Office of Education has cautioned school districts of using or committing these future revenue increases. As it is noted in Attachment B, the future year LCFF revenue increases have been utilized or budgeted and they are no longer being reserved. However, if these increases and/or the \$6.0 million plan for 2022-23 and the \$16.5 million plan for 2023-24 do not materialize, the District will have a negative Unassigned Balance in the out years, and will be unable to meet its financial obligation in future years.

Local Control Funding Formula Income (LCFF)

The 2021-22 LCFF calculation results in a net \$11.5 million funding increase, which reflects a 5.07% COLA. This is a net change of \$461 per ADA and a total grade span average of \$10,069 per ADA. Current year funded ADA is projected to be 24,723 (based on 2019-20 hold harmless). In the State Budget Act, it was anticipated that there would be a COLA increase of 5.33% in 2022-23. This COLA of 5.33% combined with the ADA cliff for 2022-23, results in an estimated total LCFF reduction of \$6.5 million. The 2023-24 and 2024-25 COLAs are 3.61% and 3.64%, respectively. Attachment B highlights the fiscal impact of the change in COLA and ADA.

Other State Revenue

The Governor's January Proposal reflects categorical COLAs at 5.33% for 2022-23, 3.61% for 2023-24, and 3.64% for 2024-25.

Lottery

Lottery income for years 2021-22 through 2023-24 is based on estimates provided by the California Department of Education, the Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE), and School Services of California. The District's estimates \$163 per ADA in the Unrestricted General Fund and \$65 in the Restricted General Fund.

Interest

The current projection for General Fund interest income is \$969,300. In 2020-21, the General Fund received \$219,892 in interest income.

Employee Compensation Adjustments

Certificated and classified salaries have been adjusted to reflect step and column salary adjustments, as applicable, for certificated and classified employees. The cost of 1% salary increase is approximately \$2.3 million. The 2021-22 projection also reflects an annual increase in health and welfare cost of \$0.4 million. There is an increase of \$2.5 million each year for 2022-23 and 2023-24.

Special Education Funding Formula

The January Governor's budget proposes commitments for ongoing special education funding, \$500 million in Proposition 98, General Fund, and 5.33% COLA adjustment. The increased, ongoing allocation to the new base funding formula results in a 2021-22 base rate of \$715 per ADA, and in 2022-23 a base rate of \$820 per ADA.

BUDGET ADJUSTMENTS

In response to the State Budget Act and estimated actuals, the Board of Education is being asked to approve "Attachment B" budget adjustments. These adjustments are reflected in the attached interim report projections. Other adjustments will be considered in future months as details unfold from the State and through the budget development process.

Financial Stability Plan

A board approved resolution was presented to LACOE with the 2021-22 First Interim Report for the 2022-23 Fiscal Stabilization Plan of \$6.0 million.

At this point in the budget cycle, it is prudent to begin planning the Fiscal Stabilization Plan required for 2023-24. The current 2023-24 FSP is \$16.5 million, but does not yet include the impact of compensation negotiations currently in progress.

A continuous analysis of the District Solvency and Financial Stability Plan will be done to monitor the actual savings and to modify, change, or increase savings as needed.

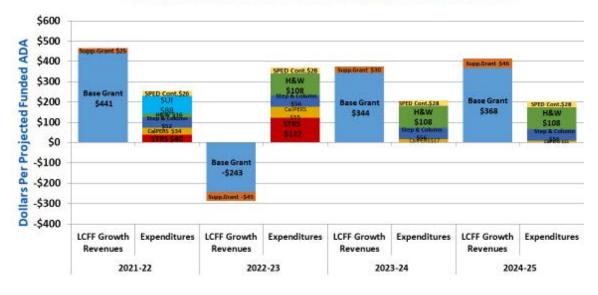
Cautions and Challenges

- The academic challenges of COVID-19, post COVID-19.
- Declining enrollment and no ADA hold harmless provision for 2021-22 and beyond which will impact the District's LCFF funding in 2022-23

- Drop in Unduplicated Pupil Counts (UPP) especially in 2022-23.
- Current Federal and State Pandemic Funding need to ensure compliance with spending regulations and spending deadlines. The District's total funding is \$119 million which has already been either expensed, obligated, or committed.
- ADA cliff and the drop in funded ADA in 2022-23
- Governor's Proposal of computed average ADA using the prior three years' average ADA
- Increases in CalPERS and CalSTRS employer contribution rates
- Increases in Health and Welfare Cost
- Implement the 2022-23 Fiscal Stabilization Plan of \$6.0 million and 2023-24 Fiscal Stabilization Plan of \$16.5 million. These plans may change depending on the State budget, and ongoing compensation negotiations.

Below is a visual comparison of the non-cumulative LCFF Base Gap Funding and ONLY the non-cumulative CalSTRS/CalPERS, Health and Welfare, Step and Column, and Special Education Contribution increases for the next four years. As illustrated, there is a significant drop in base revenue being below zero, while the expenses keep increasing. Please note that starting 2023-34 the STRS increase is zero because there are no estimated rate increases. When considering all other District expenditures, such as salary increases, instructional material costs, technology replacement, and the trend in declining enrollment, it will become increasingly difficult to achieve a balanced budget.





Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP)

The LCAP Plan for 2021-24 and the 2021-22 LCFF Budget Overview for Parents have been Board approved and posted on our website. New LCAP requirements came into effect in 2021-22, including:

1) The requirement for a mid-year, one-time supplement to the annual update, 2) carryover requirements for actions, expenditures and qualitative improvements contribution to increased and

improved services for targeted pupils, and 3) demonstration of how the additional concentration grant add-on funding is being used to increase the number of staff providing direct services in high-need schools.

OTHER FUNDS NARRATIVE

Student Activity Special Revenue Fund (08.0)

The California Department of Education (CDE) has required a special revenue fund to use to account for all the revenue and expenses for all the Associate Student Body (ASB) funds. The Governmental Accounting Standard Board Statement No. 84 (GASB84) was established to improve identification of fiduciary activity reporting by state and local governments. CDE has concluded that ASB activities are not fiduciary and, therefore, need to be included in the District's financials. As of 2020-21, the District has 16 elementary, 4 middle and 5 high school ASBs. The Student Activity Special Revenue Fund began the fiscal year with a balance of \$2,090,646.

Special Education Pass-Through Fund (10.0)

The California Department of Education has required a special revenue fund for use by the Administrative Unit (AU) of a Special Education Local Area Plan (SELPA) to account for Special Education inter-district pass-through revenues outside the General Fund. As of January 31, 2022, the cash balance in Fund (10.0) was \$0.

Child Development Fund (12.0)

General Child Care and Development Programs, and State Preschool Programs. This fund operates on an independent basis and does not encroach on the Unrestricted General Fund. The Child Development Fund began the fiscal year with a balance of \$614,611.

Nutrition Service Fund (13.0)

The source of revenue for this fund is based solely on meal sales. The revenue is received on a per meal basis from the State and Federal programs as well as student payments. The State funding for this program was reduced in 2007-08, 2008-09, 2009-10, and remains relatively flat for 2012-13 to 2019-20. This budget includes indirect cost charges of approximately \$290,000 that will be transferred to the Unrestricted General Fund for services performed by several administrative staff. In 2020-21 and 2021-22, due to COVID-19, the District has been providing free meals to all students. As of January 31, 2022, the fund had a cash balance of \$1,590,179.

Deferred Maintenance Fund (14.0)

All projects previously listed as Deferred Maintenance are charged to the Capital Projects Fund (40.1), and the Measure S Bond Fund (21.1). The fund balance has been earmarked for future year textbook purchases. As of January 31, 2022, the fund had a cash balance of \$5,441,382.

Building Fund (21.1)

This is the Measure S Bond Fund and is utilized to track expenditures related to the bond projects. The first issuance of the bond series in the amount of \$54 million occurred in August 2011. Another \$70 million was issued in August 2014; \$6.5 million of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds was utilized in 2014-15 to pay off the remaining balance of Certificates of Participation (COPs). Funds for capital projects are also transferred to the fund from the Developer Fee Fund (25.0), Capital Projects Fund (40.1), and the State Building Fund (35.0). Another series of GO Bonds, 2011 election series C, for \$70 million was issued in August 2016. In 2015-16, \$35.6 million was transferred to this fund from State Building Fund (35.0), \$7.7 million for Fremont Elementary School, \$6.8 million for Jefferson Elementary School, \$4.7 million for La Crescenta Elementary School, \$2.2 million for Lincoln Elementary School, \$3.7 million for Muir Elementary School, \$5.9 million for Glendale High School, and \$4.6 million for Hoover High School ORG Projects. In 2017-18, \$1.7 million was transferred to this fund from Developer Fee Fund (25.0) for the Dunsmore Elementary School ORG Project. In 2019-20, \$2.3 million was transferred from Capital Project Fund (40.1) for Glendale High School Pool Project. In 2020-21, \$735,000 was transferred to this fund from Capital Project Fund (40.1) for the GHS Chiller Replacement Project. In 2020-21, \$3 million was transferred to this fund from the County School Facilities Fund (35.0) for the Clark Magnet High School STEM building. In 2021-22, \$3.8 million was transferred from the Capital Project and Improvement Fund (40.1) for the Marshal Elementary School Cafeteria Multipurpose Building project. A \$38 million GO Bond Series D was issued in September 2018. The final Series E of GO Bonds of \$38 million was issued in October 2020. As of January 31, 2022, the cash balance in Fund (21.1) was \$89,463,409.

Clean Renewable Energy Bonds (CREBs) Fund (21.2)

Clean Renewable Energy Bonds (CREBs) are federal bonds used to finance photovoltaic and water heating installations at rates lower than most tax-exempt municipal bonds. The federal government subsidized the financing by lowering the borrowed interest rate (Net Effective Rate) in the form of federal tax credits.

CREBs Fund (21.2) was established to account for \$5.38 million in the second series of CREBs issued in October 2012. Due to the nature of tax-exempt bonds, the proceeds are held with a banking entity serving as the "Custodian" and the funds are disbursed to the "District" upon a reimbursement request. Deutsche Bank National Trust Company serves as the "Custodian" for Glendale Unified School District.

These bonds will mature in 11 years and are expected to be repaid using redevelopment agency proceeds. The annual payment is estimated at \$320,000 with a Net Effective Rate of 1.24%. This payment will be made from the Capital Projects Fund (40.1). Glendale High School, Roosevelt Middle School, Marshall Elementary School, Fremont Elementary School, Balboa Elementary School, and Franklin Elementary School Solar projects were financed with this second series of CREBs. In

October 2016, we received \$10.7 million for Clean Renewable Energy Bonds. These bonds will mature in 17 years and are expected to be repaid using redevelopment agency proceeds. The annual payment is estimated at \$872,703, with a Net Effective Rate of 3.43%. This payment will be made from the Capital Projects Fund (40.1). Cerritos Elementary School, Toll Middle School, Mann Elementary School, Muir Elementary School, R.D. White Elementary School, Jefferson Elementary School, Wilson Middle School, Glendale High School, Hoover High School Solar projects were financed with this series of CREBs. As of January 31, 2022, the fund had a cash balance of \$74,481.

Developer Fee Fund (25.0)

Developer Fee income is designated for the rental or purchase of modular classrooms, the purchase of property, and for other classroom facility needs, as approved by the Board of Education. In December 2009, the District utilized this Fund to purchase three properties that are contiguous to the District Administration building. In 2016-17, \$1.25 million was transferred to the Measure S Project Fund (21.1) for R.D. White Elementary School, \$1.0 million for Glendale High School, and \$0.7 million for Dunsmore Elementary School ORG Projects. In 2017-18, \$1.7 million was transferred to Measure S Project Fund (21.1) for Dunsmore Elementary School ORG Project. In 2018-19, \$850,000 was transferred to the Capital Project Fund (40.1) for the Cloud Preschool Portable Project. In 2019-20, \$500,000 was transferred from Developer Fee Fund (25.0) to Capital Project Fund (40.1) for Cloud Preschool Portable Project. The fund began the current year, with a balance of \$10,828,884 and has received income of \$345,614 through January 31, 2022. It is projected that income for the fiscal year will be approximately \$1 million.

State Building Fund (35.0)

This fund was established to account for revenue and expenditures associated with those renovations, modernization, and new construction projects partially funded from State bond funds. In 2016-17, \$145,179 was transferred from this fund to Fund (21.1). In 2018-19, \$2.5 million was transferred from this fund to Fund (40.1) as a refund from State ORG funds for the Roosevelt ORG Project. In 2020-21, \$3 million was transferred from this fund to the Building Fund (21.1) for the Clark Magnet High School STEM building. As of January 31, 2022, this fund had a cash balance of \$6,335.

Capital Projects Fund (40.1)

In 2009-10 and 2010-11, funds were received from the State Allocation Board, deposited into Fund (35), and then transferred to Fund (40.1). In 2009-10, 2010-11, and 2011-12 this fund was utilized to assist with the construction payments for the Roosevelt Middle School, Glendale High School, and other projects. This is the fund that was utilized for Measure S construction projects in 2011-12, as a bridge until G.O. bond funds became available. In 2016-17, Proposition 39 funds were spent on energy efficiency projects in the District. In 2018-19, \$850,000 was transferred from the Developer Fee Fund (25.0) to Fund (40.1) for the Cloud Preschool Portable Project, and \$2.5 million was transferred from the State Building Fund (35.0) to Fund (40.1) as a refund of ORG funds for Roosevelt ORG Project. In 2019-20, \$2.3 million was transferred from Capital Project Fund (40.1) to Building Fund (21.1) for Glendale High School Pool Project. Also, in 2019-20, \$500,000 was transferred from Developer Fee Fund (25.0) to Capital Project Fund (40.1) for Cloud Preschool Portable Project. In 2020-21, \$735,000 was transferred to the Measure S Projects Fund (21.1) for the GHS Chiller Replacement Project. In

2021-22, \$3.8 million was transferred from the Capital Projects and Improvement Fund (40.1) to the Building Fund (21.1) for the Marshall Elementary School Cafeteria Multipurpose Building Project. As of January 31, 2022, the fund's cash balance was \$16,323,885.

Nutrition Service Capital Outlay Fund (40.2)

In prior years, the Nutrition Service Program has transferred monies into this fund for capital projects. As of January 31, 2022, the fund's cash balance was \$970,272.

Debt Service Fund (56.0)

The only revenue source in this fund is interest income. This fund was to be utilized to repay the Certificates of Participation (COPs). The annual payment was approximately \$1.3 million. Given Measure S paid off this loan, this reserve can now be utilized by the District for major "one-time" expenditures, i.e. new textbook adoptions. In 2015-16 and 2016-17 school years, a solvency transfer of \$1.4 million and \$1.5 million, respectively, was utilized to continue funding the Common Core State Standards with curriculum development. In 2017-18, a transfer of \$1.2 million to the General Fund was made to support textbook adoption purchases. In 2018-19, a transfer of \$600,000 to the General Fund was made to support textbook adoption purchases. In 2019-20, a solvency transfer of \$4.5 million was utilized for textbook adoption. In 2020-21, a solvency transfer of \$4.5 million was utilized for textbook adoption. As of January 31, 2022, this fund had a cash balance of \$2,457,446.

Self Insured Health Insurance (67.0)

The only revenues are the premiums for the dental and vision insurance plans that are offered to employees and interest earnings. The payroll system allocates the expense for the coverage to the various programs in all the funds. Then an offsetting transfer is made to the revenue account in self-insured fund. In 2012-13, the District transferred from the ASCIP JPA to ASCIG JPA for dental insurance. Due to GUSD leaving the ASCIP JPA the District received an equity distribution from ASCIP of \$1.18 million. The cost of the claims and transfers to the third party administrator are the only expense in this fund. Additionally, for the 2017-18 school year, the District "carved-out" the pharmaceutical services from the incumbent healthcare provider and is now self-funded, based on the decision and recommendation of the District's Benefits Committee. Pharmaceutical services are administered by MedImpact. Expenses and revenues of this program are allocated the same way as the vision and dental insurance plans. As of January 31, 2022, this fund had a cash balance of \$4,371,476.

Workers Compensation Fund (67.1)

This fund was established solely for the purpose of accounting for expenditures related to the workers compensation program. The ASCIP rate for "dollar one" coverage in 2021-22 is 1.675% of salaries.

The expenditures will include the payment to ASCIP for 2021-22 coverage, expenditures related to claims that occurred prior to 2005-06, consultant expenses for claims management, and other related expenses. As of January 31, 2022, the fund had a cash balance of \$4,353,744.

Early Retirement Benefits Fund (67.2)

This fund was established to set aside funds for the GASB 45 liability. In 2014-15, the calculated rate was 1.684%. However, to effectively transfer reserves from Fund (67.2) to the Unrestricted General Fund, the rate was lowered, resulting in a transfer of \$1.6 million in 2013-14 and \$2.4 million in 2014-15 of the fund reserves. The rates were decreased to 0.909% and 0.094%, respectively. In 2016-17, the rate was 1.298% with no decrease. The rate remained the same for 2017-18 and 2018-19, 1.298%. In 2019-20 and 2020-21, the rate of 1.357% was applied to payroll, and funds were used to pay premium costs. As of January 31, 2022, this fund had a cash balance of \$1,067,447.

McLennan Trust and Other Scholarships (73.0)

This fund's primary source funding is interest earnings and an occasional donation for a scholarship. Typically, the scholarship donations are managed through the ASB accounts at the high schools. However, if there is a donation that is not directly linked to a school site, it may be deposited into this fund. The only expenditures out of this fund are for student scholarships. As of January 31, 2022, this fund had a cash balance of \$337,003.

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education rescind the award of bid and terminate the contract with GMS Elevator for emergency repairs at the Administration Office, Building A, Bid No. 230-21/22.

On December 14, 2021, the Board of Education awarded a contract to GMS Elevator for emergency repairs to the elevators at the Administration Office, Building A in the amount of \$188,312, Bid No. 230-21/22.

Following the award of the contract, Planning and Development staff encountered delays in receiving the required contract documents from the vendor. Due to the urgency in completing this work, staff is recommending the Board of Education rescind the contract awarded at the December 14, 2021 Board meeting and terminate the contract with GMS Elevator for convenience pursuant to Article 23.3 of the General Conditions.

Following this approval staff will begin the solicitation of bids to complete this work and ensure fire/life safety requirements at the Administration Office are maintained. Bid details are available for review in the Procurement & Contract Services Department.

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education award a contract to Iceberg Heating and Air Conditioning, Inc. for filter replacement and HVAC unit servicing at all District sites for a not-to-exceed cost of \$1,051,000, funded by COVID-19 funds and

General Fund.

Following the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, GUSD's Facilities and Maintenance staff have installed MERV-13 filters in all HVAC systems in order to improve air exchange and reduce the risk of infection. These filters require more frequent changing in order to maximize air filtration, as well as additional servicing to maintain appropriate operation of the HVAC systems.

Per the Proclamation of a State of Emergency signed by Governor Gavin Newson on March 4, 2020, and Emergency Resolution No. 19 approved by the Glendale Unified School District Board of Education, competitive bidding requirements can be waived and agencies may enter into contracts needed to assist in preparing, containing, responding to, mitigating the effects of, and recovering from the spread of COVID-19. Staff has obtained a proposal from Iceberg Heating and Air Conditioning, Inc. to have this work completed as scheduled for one (1) year. This contractor has previously worked with the District to complete this type of work and has demonstrated to be cost efficient and reliable. Having Iceberg complete this work will not only ensure all HVAC systems continue to functioning properly, but also allow GUSD maintenance staff to continue the day-to-day servicing of HVAC units throughout the District.

The total cost of the contract is for a not-to-exceed amount of \$1,050,841. The work is scheduled to begin immediately, will be completed within one calendar year, and will be funded by COVID-19 funds and General Fund.

the SPURR Contract and Following E-Rate Rules and Regulations

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education authorize the District to submit E-Rate applications for discounts on network infrastructure equipment and make purchases through School Project for Utility Rate Reduction (SPURR) in the amount of \$3,816,300.82, paid from ESSER and E-Rate funds.

The E-Rate program is a federally funded program to help schools purchase technology services and products at discounted rates. The discount is determined by the percentage of students in the free and reduced lunch program. GUSD has benefited from the E-Rate program for several years with discounted telephone and data circuits, and network infrastructure upgrades. The E-Rate program has specific deadlines for when applications are to be filed. Applications are due at this time for any possible needs during the 2022-2023 school year.

SPURR (School Project for Utility Rate Reduction) is a joint powers authority of California public school districts, county offices of education, and community colleges. Their goal is to help members save time and money with technology purchases. The benefit of membership allows districts to take advantage of SPURR pricing, which offers significant discounts. SPURR membership is free and open to all California public K-12 school districts. GUSD has been a member of SPURR since 2013 and is therefore able to take advantage of its benefits.

Leveraging both E-Rate and SPURR for technology purchases simplifies the application process and ensures competitive pricing, saving the District time and money.

The necessary network infrastructure upgrades have been spread over two fiscal years, between July 2021 and June 2023. On March 9, 2021, the Board approved submitting E-Rate applications for network equipment and to begin purchasing the equipment, specifically the firewalls. The remaining balance of the equipment from last year's approved E-Rate application is scheduled to be purchased at this time and includes wireless access points, wireless controllers, and network switches to replace the aging components of our network infrastructure. The total cost of this

equipment is \$3,816,300.82. Approximately \$2 million will be funded by E-Rate and the rest will be paid by ESSER funds.

ETIS identified additional network infrastructure upgrades to submit for E-Rate discounts for the 2022-2023 school year. These include additional wireless access points and network switches, totaling approximately \$2.2 Million. There is no commitment to purchasing this equipment by applying for E-Rate discounts. It does, however, make GUSD eligible for discounts if the need arises to purchase any portion of them.

It is recommended to authorize GUSD to submit E-Rate applications for network equipment totaling approximately \$2.2 Million.

It is also recommended to approve purchasing wireless access points, wireless controllers, and network switches using SPURR in the amount of \$3,816,300.82.

SUBJECT: Approval of Elective Science Instructional Material Adoption

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education approve the adoption of instructional materials for elective science courses in high schools.

As outlined in the science pathways adopted by the Board of Education in March 2020, students in high school may take elective science courses to further enrich their understanding of science after completing the three-course science graduation requirements of Living Earth, Chemistry in the Earth System, and Physics of the Universe. GUSD has offered elective science courses for many years, but the materials are not aligned to current needs. New science instructional materials are needed that align with the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS), the 2016 Science Framework for California Public Schools, and/or the College Board Course Exam and Descriptions.

Elective science instructional materials reviewed for this adoption are updated with the shifts brought by the CA NGSS. Fundamental components of the CA NGSS are three-dimensional learning (Science & Engineering Practices, Disciplinary Core Ideas, and Crosscutting Concepts), phenomenon-driven inquiry, students engaged in sense making learning experiences, and incorporation of Environmental Principles and Concepts.

Recently, the College Board updated the course content for AP Chemistry and AP Environmental Science standards. The College Board regularly updates Advanced Placement (AP) course and test content. These changes typically require updated instructional materials to match the updated course content.

Review Process

The Science Curriculum Study Committee (CSC) formed the Elective Science Adoption Committee with representatives from Crescenta Valley High School, Glendale High School, Hoover High School, and Clark Magnet High School. The Teaching and Learning department reached out to publishers to obtain review copies of textbooks

aligned with current District science electives in need of updated materials. The Elective Science Adoption Committee used Glendale Unified School District textbook evaluation rubrics and the CA NGSS Toolkit for Instructional Materials Evaluation (TIME) to evaluate and recommend instructional materials. Team members evaluated instructional materials for the subject that they teach on three separate days.

Teaching and Learning Secondary Science Teacher Specialist, Avik Yahiayan, facilitated the evaluation and adoption process. The adoption process had eight steps, which included: pre-screen, content and standard alignment, program organization, assessment, universal access, instructional planning and support, appropriate supplemental instructional materials, and appropriate level of rigor for target audience. Each step of the process was scored based on rubrics aligned with the TIME toolkit.

Throughout the process, teachers came to a common understanding of the rubric components, indicators, and score values. Additionally, teachers learned the process used for developing consensus on individual lessons and units as a whole to provide rubric-based evidence for high-quality science instructional materials.

Recommendations

The Elective Science Adoption Committee reached consensus and made a recommendation to the Science CSC. The Science CSC approved the recommendation of the adoption and implementation for the following instructional materials in high school elective science courses on January 24, 2022:

The textbooks were posted for public review and comment for a two-week period and then the recommendation was presented to secondary principals for their review and recommendation. No public comments were offered to share with the principals. All secondary principals approved the recommendation to the Superintendent for approval of the six textbooks listed above.

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education approve an additional services agreement between Glendale Unified School District and Comprehensive Therapy Associates, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$400,000 to provide speech/language therapy, assistive technology, occupational/physical therapy, and psychological services to meet the needs of students for the remainder of the 2021-22 school year.

Comprehensive Therapy Associates, Inc. is an agency that provides speech/language therapy, assistive technology, occupational/physical therapy, and psychological services to special education students.

At its meeting of July 13, 2021, the Board of Education approved a contract with Comprehensive Therapy Associates, Inc. in the amount of \$400,000. Due to the vacancies created by staff on leave as well as increased staffing demand, it is estimated that an additional \$400,000 will be needed to cover services needed for the remainder of the 2021-2022 school year.

Special Education resources will be used to pay for these services.

SERVICES AGREEMENT

This Agreement for Professional Services ("Agreement") made and entered into by and between the Glendale Unified School District ("District"), a public entity, and Comprehensive Therapy Associates, Inc., herein after referred to as ("Contractor").

The Parties do hereby contract and agree as follows:

1. **Term**

Contractor shall commence providing services under this Agreement on or about February 23, 2022 and will diligently perform as required and complete performance by June 30, 2022.

2. Scope of Services

Provides Speech and Assessments

Contractor's specific program and services performed is described in "Scope of Work" attached hereto as Addendum A and fully incorporated herein.

3. Compensation

District agrees to pay the Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement a set for in Addendum A "Scope of Work." District shall pay Contractor the amount set forth in Addendum B "Cost Proposal" according to the following terms and conditions:

\$400,000.00 (Four hundred thousand)

Invoices should be submitted to Accounts Payable Department, Glendale Unified School District, 223 N. Jackson Street, Glendale, CA 91206.

4. Expenses

District shall not be liable to Contractor for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by Contractor in performing services for District that are not specifically identified in Addendum B "Cost Proposal" and factored into the compensation paid by the District to the Contractor.

5. Materials

Contractor shall furnish, at its own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement.

6. Independent Contractor

In the performance of this Agreement, Contractor shall be and act as an independent contractor. Contractor understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of the District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided to employees of the District and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. Contractor shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to Contractor's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, Contractor is an independent contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and directing the performance of the

details of the work, District being interested only in the results obtained.

7. Joint Employer

Neither Party shall be deemed a joint employer of the other Party's employees. Each Party shall indemnify the other Party from and against claims made by the indemnifying Party's employees that they are co-employed by the other Party. The indemnification requirements set forth in paragraph 11 shall be applicable to the indemnification obligations of each Party under this paragraph. Neither Party's employees will be deemed "leased" employees of the other for any purpose. In connection with this Agreement, each Party is an independent contractor and does not have any authority to bind or commit the other.

8. Contractor's Employee Processing

- Employee Eligibility Verification: The Contractor warrants that it fully complies with all (i) Federal and State statutes and regulations regarding the employment of aliens and others and that all its employees performing work under this Contract meet the citizenship or alien status requirement set forth in Federal statutes and regulations. The Contractor shall obtain, from all employees performing work hereunder, all verification and other documentation of employment eligibility status required by Federal or State statutes and regulations including, but not limited to, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, 8 U.S.C. §1324 et seq., as they currently exist and as they may be hereafter amended. The Contractor shall retain all such documentation for all covered employees for the period prescribed by the law. The Contractor shall indemnify, defend with counsel approved in writing by District, and hold harmless, the District, its agents, officers, and employees from employer sanctions and any other liability which may be assessed against the Contractor or the District or both in connection with any alleged violation of any Federal or State statutes or regulations pertaining to the eligibility for employment of any persons performing work under this Contract.
- (ii) Fingerprinting and Criminal Background Check: Contractor shall complete the background check requirements of California Education Code section 45125.1 for all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students. The Contractor shall not staff the program with any employees who have been convicted of a violent felony listed in California Penal Code section 1192.7(c). The Contractor shall provide the District with fingerprinting/criminal background check for all employees who will be used to staff the program.
- (iii) **Tuberculosis Clearance**: Contractor will ensure that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students are determined to be free of active tuberculosis by a medical professional. Contractor shall submit documentation to the District verifying that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites are determined to be free of active tuberculosis.
- (iv) COVID-19 Vaccination Status and Periodic Testing: Contractor will ensure that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students have been fully vaccinated for COVID-19. Contractor shall submit documentation to the District verifying that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites have received the complete COVID-19 vaccination within two weeks prior to starting to provide services at a District school site. Contractor further will require all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites to participate in regular COVID-19 testing in compliance with the District's current testing protocols. Contractor's employees can either participate in the District on-site testing program wherein the District will directly receive testing results or seek testing on their own and furnish their

test results to Contractor which upon receipt will immediately notify the District of the results.

9. Conduct on District Premises

Contractor shall, at all times, comply with and abide by all reasonable policies and procedures of the District (or that may be established thereby, from time to time) that pertain to conduct on the District's premises, possession or distribution of contraband, or the access to, and security of, the District's real property or facilities, to the extent that the Contractor has been provided with a copy of each such policy or procedure. Contractor shall exercise due care and diligence to prevent any injury to persons or damage to property while on the District's premises. The operation of vehicles by the Contractor's personnel on the District's property shall conform to posted and other applicable regulations and safe-driving practices. Vehicular accidents occurring on the District's property and involving either Party's personnel shall be reported promptly to the appropriate Party. Each Party covenants that at all times during the term it, and its employees, agents, and Subcontractors shall comply with, and take no action that results in the other Party being in violation of, any applicable federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, regulations, and rules. Each Party's personnel shall clearly identify themselves as the appropriate Party's personnel and not as employees of the other Party. When on the District's premises, Contractor's personnel shall wear and clearly display identification badges or tags, as approved by the District. Contractor's employees shall not smoke or use profanity or other inappropriate language while on site. Contractor's employees shall not enter the facility while under the influence of alcohol, drugs or other intoxicants and shall not have such materials in their possession. Contractor's employees shall plan their activities to minimize the number of times they must enter and exit a facility. Contractor's personnel should transport all tools, equipment and materials needed for the day at the start of the work period and restrict all breaks to the absolute minimum.

10. Anti-Discrimination

District programs, activities, practices shall be free from discrimination based on race, color, ancestry, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital or parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity or expression, or genetic information; the perception of one or more of such characteristics; or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics and therefore the Contractor agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and District policy. In addition, the Contractor agrees to require like compliance by all of its subcontractor(s).

11. Indemnification

To the furthest extent permitted by California law, Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold free and harmless the District, its Board of Education, agents, representatives, officers, contractors, employees, trustees, and volunteers ("the Indemnified Parties") from any and all claims, demands, causes of action, suits, actions, costs, expenses, judgments, liability, loss, damage or injury of any kind, nature and description, in law or equity ("Claim"), to property or persons including, but not limited to, personal injury, bodily injury, death, property damage, and Contractors' and/or attorneys' fees and costs, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the negligence, recklessness, errors or omissions, or willful misconduct of Contractor, its officials, officers, employees, subcontractors, Contractors, or agents, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the performance of the Services, the Project, or this Agreement, including without limitation the payment of all consequential

damages; or from any activity, work, or thing done, permitted, or suffered by the Contractor in conjunction with this Agreement, unless the claims are caused wholly by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the District. The District shall have the right to accept or reject any legal representation that Contractor proposes to defend the Indemnified Parties.

12. Limitation of District Liability

Other than as provided in this Agreement, the District's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall the District be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.

13. Confidentiality

The Contractor and all Contractor's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services. Contractor understands that student records are confidential and agrees to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement.

Both Parties will maintain in confidence and safeguard all confidential information, as defined in this paragraph, of the other Party, it affiliates, and its customers. "Confidential Information" means any information that is marked or otherwise identified as confidential or proprietary at the time of disclosure or by law, and includes but is not limited to, trade secrets, know-how, inventions, techniques, data, customers list, personal information, financial information, sales, and marketing plans of the other Party, its affiliates, or its customers. Both Parties recognize and acknowledge the confidential and proprietary nature of any Confidential Information and acknowledge the irreparable harm that could result if such confidential information is disclosed to a third Party or used for unauthorized purposes. Each Party agrees to use any Confidential Information only for the purpose of conducting business with each other and their clients in the manner contemplated by this Agreement. Both Parties will restrict disclosure of any Confidential Information to only those personnel who have a need to know and will bind such personnel to obligations of confidentiality to the same extent that each Party is bound by this Agreement. Upon request of the owner of the confidential information, the other Party will promptly return or destroy all materials incorporating any Confidential Information and any copies. The obligation under this paragraph do not apply to information that: 1) is or becomes generally known or in the public domain through no act or omission of the other Party; 2) was lawfully in Insight's or Client's possession without restriction as to use or disclosure before its receipt from the other Party; 3) is received from, or was made available to, a third Party without any obligation of confidentiality; 4) was independently developed; 5) is otherwise permitted to be disclosed under this Agreement; 6) is disclosed with the prior written consent of the disclosing Party; or 7) is required to be disclosed in any civil or criminal legal proceeding, regulatory proceeding or any similar process, however, the Party required to make the disclosure under the law shall give prompt notice of this to the other Party prior to such disclosure so that the other Party may seek an appropriate protective order or give its consent to such disclosure.

14. Insurance

The Contractor shall procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the Services the following insurance with minimum limits equal to the amount indicated below.

Contractor shall maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Services. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, the Contractor shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees. If any class of employee or employees engaged in performing any portion of the Services under this Agreement are not protected under the Workers' Compensation Statute, adequate insurance coverage for the protection of any employee(s) not otherwise protected must be obtained before any of those employee(s) commence performing any portion of the Services.

Contractor shall not commence performing any portion of the Services until all required insurance has been obtained and certificates indicating the required coverage have been delivered in duplicate to the District and approved by the District. Certificates and insurance policies shall include the following:

- (i) A clause stating: "SHOULD ANY OF THE ABOVE DESCRIBED POLICIES BE CANCELLED BEFORE THE EXPIRATION DATE THEREOF, NOTICE WILL BE DELIVERED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE POLICY PROVISION."
- (ii) Language stating in particular those insured, extent of insurance, location and operation to which insurance applies, expiration date, to which cancellation and reduction notice will be sent, and length of notice period.
- (iii) An endorsement stating that the District and its Board of Education, agents, representatives, employees, trustees, officers, contractors, and volunteers are named additional insured under all policies except Workers' Compensation Insurance, Professional Liability, and Employers' Liability Insurance. An endorsement shall also state that Contractor's insurance policies shall be primary to any insurance or self-insurance maintained by District. An endorsement shall also state that there shall be a waiver of any subrogation.
- (iv) All policies except the Professional Liability, Workers' Compensation Insurance, and Employers' Liability Insurance Policies shall be written on an occurrence form.

Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A: VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the District.

15. Termination

- (i) Without Cause by District: District may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Contractor only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by District shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by Contractor. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Contractor or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
- (ii) Without Cause by Contractor: Contractor may, upon sixty (60) days notice, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement. Upon this termination, District shall only be obligated to compensate Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by Contractor shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services to District. Contractor acknowledges that this sixty (60) day notice period is acceptable so that the District can attempt to procure the Services from another source.
- (iii) With Cause by District: District may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - a) Material violation of this Agreement by the Contractor;
 - b) Any act by Contractor exposing the District to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - c) Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt, Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of Contractor's insolvency.

Written notice by District shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within three (3) calendar days after that notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this Agreement shall upon the expiration of the three (3) calendar days cease and terminate. In the event of this termination, the District may secure the required services from another Contractor. If the expense, fees, and/or costs to the District exceed the cost of providing the service pursuant to this Agreement, the Contractor shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to the District upon the receipt of the District's notice of these expense, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to District.

16. Certificates/Permits/Licenses

Contractor and all Contractor's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such certificates, permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of Services pursuant to this Agreement.

17. **Delivery**

Time of delivery of goods or services is of the essence in this Agreement. District reserves the right to refuse any goods or services and to cancel all or any part of the goods not conforming to applicable specifications, drawings, samples or descriptions or services that do not conform to the prescribed statement of work. Acceptance of any part of the order of goods shall not District to accept shipments nor deprive it of the right to return goods already accepted at Contractor's expense. Over shipments and under shipments of goods shall be only as agreed to in writing by District. Delivery shall not be deemed to be complete until all goods or services have actually been received and accepted in writing by District.

18. Notice

Approval of Additional Services Agreement Between Glendale

Unified School District and The Genesis Group, Inc.

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education approve an additional services agreement between Glendale Unified School District and The Genesis Group, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$100,000 to provide speech therapy services to meet the needs of students for the remainder of the 2021-22 school year.

The Genesis Group, Inc. is an agency that provides speech/language pathologists and speech/language pathology assistants. At its meeting of July 13, 2021, the Board of Education approved a contract with The Genesis Group, Inc. in the amount of \$120,000. Due to the vacancies created by staff on leave as well as increased staffing demand, it is estimated that an additional \$100,000 will be needed to cover services needed for the remainder of the 2021-2022 school year.

Special Education resources will be used to pay for these services.

TO SUPPORT 2021-22 BOARD PRIORITY NO. 1: Maximize Student Achievement — Close the digital and equity gap; offer robust in-person and independent study learning programs; and accelerate learning and improve attendance and engagement.

SERVICES AGREEMENT

The Parties do hereby contract and agree as follows:

1. Term

Contractor shall commence providing services under this Agreement on or about Agreement on or about and will diligently perform as required and complete performance by June 30, 2022.

2. Scope of Services

Provides Psychological and Speech Services

Contractor's specific program and services performed is described in "Scope of Work" attached hereto as Addendum A and fully incorporated herein.

3. Compensation

District agrees to pay the Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement a set for in Addendum A "Scope of Work." District shall pay Contractor the amount set forth in Addendum B "Cost Proposal" according to the following terms and conditions:

\$100,000.00 (One hundred thousand)

Invoices should be submitted to Accounts Payable Department, Glendale Unified School District, 223 N. Jackson Street, Glendale, CA 91206.

4. Expenses

District shall not be liable to Contractor for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by Contractor in performing services for District that are not specifically identified in Addendum B "Cost Proposal" and factored into the compensation paid by the District to the Contractor.

5. Materials

Contractor shall furnish, at its own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement.

6. Independent Contractor

In the performance of this Agreement, Contractor shall be and act as an independent contractor. Contractor understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of the District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided to employees of the District and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. Contractor shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to Contractor's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, Contractor is an independent contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and directing the performance of the

details of the work, District being interested only in the results obtained.

7. Joint Employer

Neither Party shall be deemed a joint employer of the other Party's employees. Each Party shall indemnify the other Party from and against claims made by the indemnifying Party's employees that they are co-employed by the other Party. The indemnification requirements set forth in paragraph 11 shall be applicable to the indemnification obligations of each Party under this paragraph. Neither Party's employees will be deemed "leased" employees of the other for any purpose. In connection with this Agreement, each Party is an independent contractor and does not have any authority to bind or commit the other.

8. Contractor's Employee Processing

- Employee Eligibility Verification: The Contractor warrants that it fully complies with all (i) Federal and State statutes and regulations regarding the employment of aliens and others and that all its employees performing work under this Contract meet the citizenship or alien status requirement set forth in Federal statutes and regulations. The Contractor shall obtain, from all employees performing work hereunder, all verification and other documentation of employment eligibility status required by Federal or State statutes and regulations including, but not limited to, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, 8 U.S.C. §1324 et seq., as they currently exist and as they may be hereafter amended. The Contractor shall retain all such documentation for all covered employees for the period prescribed by the law. The Contractor shall indemnify, defend with counsel approved in writing by District, and hold harmless, the District, its agents, officers, and employees from employer sanctions and any other liability which may be assessed against the Contractor or the District or both in connection with any alleged violation of any Federal or State statutes or regulations pertaining to the eligibility for employment of any persons performing work under this Contract.
- (ii) Fingerprinting and Criminal Background Check: Contractor shall complete the background check requirements of California Education Code section 45125.1 for all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students. The Contractor shall not staff the program with any employees who have been convicted of a violent felony listed in California Penal Code section 1192.7(c). The Contractor shall provide the District with fingerprinting/criminal background check for all employees who will be used to staff the program.
- (iii) **Tuberculosis Clearance**: Contractor will ensure that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students are determined to be free of active tuberculosis by a medical professional. Contractor shall submit documentation to the District verifying that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites are determined to be free of active tuberculosis.
- (iv) COVID-19 Vaccination Status and Periodic Testing: Contractor will ensure that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students have been fully vaccinated for COVID-19. Contractor shall submit documentation to the District verifying that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites have received the complete COVID-19 vaccination within two weeks prior to starting to provide services at a District school site. Contractor further will require all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites to participate in regular COVID-19 testing in compliance with the District's current testing protocols. Contractor's employees can either participate in the District on-site testing program wherein the District will directly receive testing results or seek testing on their own and furnish their

test results to Contractor which upon receipt will immediately notify the District of the results.

9. Conduct on District Premises

Contractor shall, at all times, comply with and abide by all reasonable policies and procedures of the District (or that may be established thereby, from time to time) that pertain to conduct on the District's premises, possession or distribution of contraband, or the access to, and security of, the District's real property or facilities, to the extent that the Contractor has been provided with a copy of each such policy or procedure. Contractor shall exercise due care and diligence to prevent any injury to persons or damage to property while on the District's premises. The operation of vehicles by the Contractor's personnel on the District's property shall conform to posted and other applicable regulations and safe-driving practices. Vehicular accidents occurring on the District's property and involving either Party's personnel shall be reported promptly to the appropriate Party. Each Party covenants that at all times during the term it, and its employees, agents, and Subcontractors shall comply with, and take no action that results in the other Party being in violation of, any applicable federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, regulations, and rules. Each Party's personnel shall clearly identify themselves as the appropriate Party's personnel and not as employees of the other Party. When on the District's premises, Contractor's personnel shall wear and clearly display identification badges or tags, as approved by the District. Contractor's employees shall not smoke or use profanity or other inappropriate language while on site. Contractor's employees shall not enter the facility while under the influence of alcohol, drugs or other intoxicants and shall not have such materials in their possession. Contractor's employees shall plan their activities to minimize the number of times they must enter and exit a facility. Contractor's personnel should transport all tools, equipment and materials needed for the day at the start of the work period and restrict all breaks to the absolute minimum.

10. Anti-Discrimination

District programs, activities, practices shall be free from discrimination based on race, color, ancestry, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital or parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity or expression, or genetic information; the perception of one or more of such characteristics; or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics and therefore the Contractor agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and District policy. In addition, the Contractor agrees to require like compliance by all of its subcontractor(s).

11. Indemnification

To the furthest extent permitted by California law, Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold free and harmless the District, its Board of Education, agents, representatives, officers, contractors, employees, trustees, and volunteers ("the Indemnified Parties") from any and all claims, demands, causes of action, suits, actions, costs, expenses, judgments, liability, loss, damage or injury of any kind, nature and description, in law or equity ("Claim"), to property or persons including, but not limited to, personal injury, bodily injury, death, property damage, and Contractors' and/or attorneys' fees and costs, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the negligence, recklessness, errors or omissions, or willful misconduct of Contractor, its officials, officers, employees, subcontractors, Contractors, or agents, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the performance of the Services, the Project, or this Agreement, including without limitation the payment of all consequential

damages; or from any activity, work, or thing done, permitted, or suffered by the Contractor in conjunction with this Agreement, unless the claims are caused wholly by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the District. The District shall have the right to accept or reject any legal representation that Contractor proposes to defend the Indemnified Parties.

12. Limitation of District Liability

Other than as provided in this Agreement, the District's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall the District be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.

13. Confidentiality

The Contractor and all Contractor's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services. Contractor understands that student records are confidential and agrees to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement.

Both Parties will maintain in confidence and safeguard all confidential information, as defined in this paragraph, of the other Party, it affiliates, and its customers. "Confidential Information" means any information that is marked or otherwise identified as confidential or proprietary at the time of disclosure or by law, and includes but is not limited to, trade secrets, know-how, inventions, techniques, data, customers list, personal information, financial information, sales, and marketing plans of the other Party, its affiliates, or its customers. Both Parties recognize and acknowledge the confidential and proprietary nature of any Confidential Information and acknowledge the irreparable harm that could result if such confidential information is disclosed to a third Party or used for unauthorized purposes. Each Party agrees to use any Confidential Information only for the purpose of conducting business with each other and their clients in the manner contemplated by this Agreement. Both Parties will restrict disclosure of any Confidential Information to only those personnel who have a need to know and will bind such personnel to obligations of confidentiality to the same extent that each Party is bound by this Agreement. Upon request of the owner of the confidential information, the other Party will promptly return or destroy all materials incorporating any Confidential Information and any copies. The obligation under this paragraph do not apply to information that: 1) is or becomes generally known or in the public domain through no act or omission of the other Party; 2) was lawfully in Insight's or Client's possession without restriction as to use or disclosure before its receipt from the other Party: 3) is received from, or was made available to, a third Party without any obligation of confidentiality; 4) was independently developed; 5) is otherwise permitted to be disclosed under this Agreement; 6) is disclosed with the prior written consent of the disclosing Party; or 7) is required to be disclosed in any civil or criminal legal proceeding, regulatory proceeding or any similar process, however, the Party required to make the disclosure under the law shall give prompt notice of this to the other Party prior to such disclosure so that the other Party may seek an appropriate protective order or give its consent to such disclosure.

14. Insurance

The Contractor shall procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the Services the following insurance with minimum limits equal to the amount indicated below.

Contractor shall maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Services. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, the Contractor shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees. If any class of employee or employees engaged in performing any portion of the Services under this Agreement are not protected under the Workers' Compensation Statute, adequate insurance coverage for the protection of any employee(s) not otherwise protected must be obtained before any of those employee(s) commence performing any portion of the Services.

Contractor shall not commence performing any portion of the Services until all required insurance has been obtained and certificates indicating the required coverage have been delivered in duplicate to the District and approved by the District. Certificates and insurance policies shall include the following:

- (i) A clause stating: "SHOULD ANY OF THE ABOVE DESCRIBED POLICIES BE CANCELLED BEFORE THE EXPIRATION DATE THEREOF, NOTICE WILL BE DELIVERED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE POLICY PROVISION."
- (ii) Language stating in particular those insured, extent of insurance, location and operation to which insurance applies, expiration date, to which cancellation and reduction notice will be sent, and length of notice period.
- (iii) An endorsement stating that the District and its Board of Education, agents, representatives, employees, trustees, officers, contractors, and volunteers are named additional insured under all policies except Workers' Compensation Insurance, Professional Liability, and Employers' Liability Insurance. An endorsement shall also state that Contractor's insurance policies shall be primary to any insurance or self-insurance maintained by District. An endorsement shall also state that there shall be a waiver of any subrogation.
- (iv) All policies except the Professional Liability, Workers' Compensation Insurance, and Employers' Liability Insurance Policies shall be written on an occurrence form.

Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A: VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the District.

15. Termination

- (i) Without Cause by District: District may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Contractor only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by District shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by Contractor. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Contractor or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
- (ii) Without Cause by Contractor: Contractor may, upon sixty (60) days notice, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement. Upon this termination, District shall only be obligated to compensate Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by Contractor shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services to District. Contractor acknowledges that this sixty (60) day notice period is acceptable so that the District can attempt to procure the Services from another source.
- (iii) With Cause by District: District may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - a) Material violation of this Agreement by the Contractor;
 - b) Any act by Contractor exposing the District to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - c) Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt, Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of Contractor's insolvency.

Written notice by District shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within three (3) calendar days after that notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this Agreement shall upon the expiration of the three (3) calendar days cease and terminate. In the event of this termination, the District may secure the required services from another Contractor. If the expense, fees, and/or costs to the District exceed the cost of providing the service pursuant to this Agreement, the Contractor shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to the District upon the receipt of the District's notice of these expense, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to District.

16. Certificates/Permits/Licenses

Contractor and all Contractor's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such certificates, permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of Services pursuant to this Agreement.

17. Delivery

Time of delivery of goods or services is of the essence in this Agreement. District reserves the right to refuse any goods or services and to cancel all or any part of the goods not conforming to applicable specifications, drawings, samples or descriptions or services that do not conform to the prescribed statement of work. Acceptance of any part of the order of goods shall not District to accept shipments nor deprive it of the right to return goods already accepted at Contractor's expense. Over shipments and under shipments of goods shall be only as agreed to in writing by District. Delivery shall not be deemed to be complete until all goods or services have actually been received and accepted in writing by District.

18. Notice

Any notice required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be deemed to have been given, served, and received if given in writing and either personally delivered or deposited in the United States mail, registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt required, or sent by overnight delivery service, or facsimile transmission, addressed as follows:

Any notice personally given or sent by facsimile transmission shall be effective upon receipt. Any notice sent by overnight delivery service shall be effective the business day next following delivery thereof to the overnight delivery service. Any notice given by mail shall be effective three (3) days after deposit in the United States mail.

19. Assignment

The obligations of the Contractor pursuant to this Agreement shall not be assigned by the Contractor.

20. No Rights in Third Parties

This Agreement does not create any rights in, or inure to the benefit of, any third party except as expressly provided herein.

21. Integration/Entire Agreement of Parties

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties. In the event an express conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the terms of the any attachments or exhibits, the terms of this Agreement will prevail.

22. Submittal of Documents

The Contractor shall not commence the Services under this Agreement until the Contractor has submitted and the District has approved the certificate(s) and affidavit(s), and the endorsement(s) of insurance required as indicated below:

23. Force Majeure Clause

The Parties to the Contract shall be excused from performance thereunder during the time and to the extent that they are prevented from obtaining, delivering, or performing by act of God, fire, strike, loss, pandemic or epidemic, or shortage of transportation facilities, lock-out, commandeering of materials, products, plants or facilities by the government, when satisfactory

evidence thereof is presented to the other Party(ies), provided that it is satisfactorily established that the non-performance is not due to the fault or neglect of the Party not performing.

24. California Law

This Agreement shall be governed by and the rights, duties and obligations of the Parties shall be determined and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California, in the County of Los Angeles. The Parties further agree that any action or proceeding brought to enforce the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall be maintained in the county in which the District's administrative offices are located.

25. Waiver

The waiver by either Party of any breach of any term, covenant, or condition herein contained shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such term, covenant, condition, or any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant, or condition herein contained.

26. Severability

If any term, condition or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will nevertheless continue in full force and effect, and shall not be affected, impaired or invalidated in any way.

27. Provisions Required By Law Deemed Inserted

Each and every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted in this Contract shall be deemed to be inserted herein and this Contract shall be read and enforced as though it were included therein.

28. Authority to Bind Parties

Neither Party in the performance of any and all duties under this Agreement, except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, has any authority to bind the other to any agreements or undertakings.

29. Attorneys' Fees and Costs

Should litigation be necessary to enforce any terms or provisions of this Agreement, then each Party shall bear its own litigation and collection expenses, witness fees, court costs and attorneys' fees.

30. Headings

Paragraph headings in this Agreement are used solely for convenience, and shall be wholly disregarded in the construction of this Agreement. No provision of this Agreement shall be interpreted for or against a Party because that Party or its legal representative drafted such provision, and this Agreement shall be construed as if jointly prepared by the Parties.

31. Signature Authority

Each Party has the full power and authority to enter into and perform this Agreement, and the person signing this Agreement on behalf of each Party has been properly authorized and empowered to enter into this Agreement.

32. Counterparts

This Agreement and all amendments and supplements to it may be executed in counterparts, and all counterparts together shall be construed as one document.

Approval of Services Agreement with Bayha Group

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education approve a services agreement between Glendale Unified School District and Bayha Group in the amount of \$75,000 to provide work-based learning opportunities for Glendale Unified School District high school students in Summer 2022.

The Glendale Unified School District (GUSD) K12 Strong Workforce Program (SWP) application, Guided Pathways to Prepare Students for 21st Century Demands, indicated work-based learning activities as one of its main goals and objectives detailed in the program description. The Career and Technical Education (CTE) department has provided teachers in grades 6-12 the opportunity to utilize Nepris, a work-based learning tool accessible virtually to all students. To expand and complete the SWP program objective, staff recommends contracting with Bayha Group to build a robust work-based learning program for GUSD students, to include internships, guest speakers, mock interviews, and career readiness activities. The work-based learning (WBL) program is one of the goals and strategies outlined in the SWP application.

Bayha Group will partner with Glendale Unified School District to offer a Summer Work-Based Learning (WBL) Program and workshops to prepare for the internship summer opportunities. The Workplace Intelligence (WQ) workshops prior to the start of the internship will be open to anyone in a CTE pathway and Capstone course, from March to August 2022. The internship program will be open to 20 students who participate in a CTE pathway and Capstone course. Selected interns will collaborate on work-based learning projects for 7 weeks led by industry professionals. These Industry Leads will mentor interns in career exploration, industry knowledge, and Workplace Intelligence skills (WQ).

Following are the details of the Glendale Unified School District Summer WBL Program:

- 1. Workplace Intelligence (WQ) workshops will be available to anyone in a CTE pathway and Capstone course.
- 2. Twenty (20) spots will be available to students who participate in a CTE pathway and Capstone course during the summer.
- 3. Prospective interns will complete an online application that includes a customized resume and personal statement.
- 4. Industry professionals hired and paid by Bayha Group to be Industry Leads will review, interview, and hire interns based on their online application and resume.
- 5. Hired interns will collaborate with Leads to learn:
 - Workplace intelligence to include self-awareness of skills and strengths; employee onboarding; understanding appropriate workplace attire; time management; awareness of workplace expectations; email etiquette; professional written, phone, and video conference correspondence; and establishing, managing, and completing excellent, high-quality deliverables.
 - Work-based learning to include career exploration, hands-on project development, and portfolio showcase presentation.
- 6. Hired interns will receive a compensation of \$1,800 for their internship experience, paid by Bayha Group.

The K12 Strong Workforce Program Grant will fund the Bayha Group services agreement in the amount of \$75, 000 for the Summer Work-Based Learning Program.

SERVICES AGREEMENT

This Agreement for Professional Services ("Agreement") made and entered into by and between the Glendale Unified School District ("District"), a public entity, and Bayha Group , herein after referred to as ("Contractor").

The Parties do hereby contract and agree as follows:

1. Term

Contractor shall commence providing services under this Agreement on or about March 1, 2022 and will diligently perform as required and complete performance by August 5, 2022 .

2. Scope of Services

Summer Work-Based Learning (WBL) Program

Contractor's specific program and services performed is described in "Scope of Work" attached hereto as Addendum A and fully incorporated herein.

3. Compensation

District agrees to pay the Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement a set for in Addendum A "Scope of Work." District shall pay Contractor the amount set forth in Addendum B "Cost Proposal" according to the following terms and conditions: \$75,000 fixed price

Invoices should be submitted to Accounts Payable Department, Glendale Unified School District, 223 N. Jackson Street, Glendale, CA 91206.

4. Expenses

District shall not be liable to Contractor for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by Contractor in performing services for District that are not specifically identified in Addendum B "Cost Proposal" and factored into the compensation paid by the District to the Contractor.

5. Materials

Contractor shall furnish, at its own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement.

6. Independent Contractor

In the performance of this Agreement, Contractor shall be and act as an independent contractor. Contractor understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of the District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided to employees of the District and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. Contractor shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to Contractor's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, Contractor is an independent contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and directing the performance of the

details of the work, District being interested only in the results obtained.

7. Joint Employer

Neither Party shall be deemed a joint employer of the other Party's employees. Each Party shall indemnify the other Party from and against claims made by the indemnifying Party's employees that they are co-employed by the other Party. The indemnification requirements set forth in paragraph 11 shall be applicable to the indemnification obligations of each Party under this paragraph. Neither Party's employees will be deemed "leased" employees of the other for any purpose. In connection with this Agreement, each Party is an independent contractor and does not have any authority to bind or commit the other.

8. Contractor's Employee Processing

- Employee Eligibility Verification: The Contractor warrants that it fully complies with all (i) Federal and State statutes and regulations regarding the employment of aliens and others and that all its employees performing work under this Contract meet the citizenship or alien status requirement set forth in Federal statutes and regulations. The Contractor shall obtain, from all employees performing work hereunder, all verification and other documentation of employment eligibility status required by Federal or State statutes and regulations including, but not limited to, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, 8 U.S.C. §1324 et seq., as they currently exist and as they may be hereafter amended. The Contractor shall retain all such documentation for all covered employees for the period prescribed by the law. The Contractor shall indemnify, defend with counsel approved in writing by District, and hold harmless, the District, its agents. officers, and employees from employer sanctions and any other liability which may be assessed against the Contractor or the District or both in connection with any alleged violation of any Federal or State statutes or regulations pertaining to the eligibility for employment of any persons performing work under this Contract.
- (ii) Fingerprinting and Criminal Background Check: Contractor shall complete the background check requirements of California Education Code section 45125.1 for all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students. The Contractor shall not staff the program with any employees who have been convicted of a violent felony listed in California Penal Code section 1192.7(c). The Contractor shall provide the District with fingerprinting/criminal background check for all employees who will be used to staff the program.
- (iii) **Tuberculosis Clearance**: Contractor will ensure that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students are determined to be free of active tuberculosis by a medical professional. Contractor shall submit documentation to the District verifying that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites are determined to be free of active tuberculosis.
- (iv) COVID-19 Vaccination Status and Periodic Testing: Contractor will ensure that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students have been fully vaccinated for COVID-19. Contractor shall submit documentation to the District verifying that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites have received the complete COVID-19 vaccination within two weeks prior to starting to provide services at a District school site. Contractor further will require all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites to participate in regular COVID-19 testing in compliance with the District's current testing protocols. Contractor's employees can either participate in the District on-site testing program wherein the District will directly receive testing results or seek testing on their own and furnish their

test results to Contractor which upon receipt will immediately notify the District of the results.

9. Conduct on District Premises

Contractor shall, at all times, comply with and abide by all reasonable policies and procedures of the District (or that may be established thereby, from time to time) that pertain to conduct on the District's premises, possession or distribution of contraband, or the access to, and security of, the District's real property or facilities, to the extent that the Contractor has been provided with a copy of each such policy or procedure. Contractor shall exercise due care and diligence to prevent any injury to persons or damage to property while on the District's premises. The operation of vehicles by the Contractor's personnel on the District's property shall conform to posted and other applicable regulations and safe-driving practices. Vehicular accidents occurring on the District's property and involving either Party's personnel shall be reported promptly to the appropriate Party. Each Party covenants that at all times during the term it, and its employees, agents, and Subcontractors shall comply with, and take no action that results in the other Party being in violation of, any applicable federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, regulations, and rules. Each Party's personnel shall clearly identify themselves as the appropriate Party's personnel and not as employees of the other Party. When on the District's premises, Contractor's personnel shall wear and clearly display identification badges or tags, as approved by the District. Contractor's employees shall not smoke or use profanity or other inappropriate language while on site. Contractor's employees shall not enter the facility while under the influence of alcohol, drugs or other intoxicants and shall not have such materials in their possession. Contractor's employees shall plan their activities to minimize the number of times they must enter and exit a facility. Contractor's personnel should transport all tools, equipment and materials needed for the day at the start of the work period and restrict all breaks to the absolute minimum.

10. Anti-Discrimination

District programs, activities, practices shall be free from discrimination based on race, color, ancestry, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital or parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity or expression, or genetic information; the perception of one or more of such characteristics; or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics and therefore the Contractor agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and District policy. In addition, the Contractor agrees to require like compliance by all of its subcontractor(s).

11. Indemnification

To the furthest extent permitted by California law, Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold free and harmless the District, its Board of Education, agents, representatives, officers, contractors, employees, trustees, and volunteers ("the Indemnified Parties") from any and all claims, demands, causes of action, suits, actions, costs, expenses, judgments, liability, loss, damage or injury of any kind, nature and description, in law or equity ("Claim"), to property or persons including, but not limited to, personal injury, bodily injury, death, property damage, and Contractors' and/or attorneys' fees and costs, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the negligence, recklessness, errors or omissions, or willful misconduct of Contractor, its officials, officers, employees, subcontractors, Contractors, or agents, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the performance of the Services, the Project, or this Agreement, including without limitation the payment of all consequential

damages; or from any activity, work, or thing done, permitted, or suffered by the Contractor in conjunction with this Agreement, unless the claims are caused wholly by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the District. The District shall have the right to accept or reject any legal representation that Contractor proposes to defend the Indemnified Parties.

12. Limitation of District Liability

Other than as provided in this Agreement, the District's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall the District be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.

13. Confidentiality

The Contractor and all Contractor's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services. Contractor understands that student records are confidential and agrees to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement.

Both Parties will maintain in confidence and safeguard all confidential information, as defined in this paragraph, of the other Party, it affiliates, and its customers. "Confidential Information" means any information that is marked or otherwise identified as confidential or proprietary at the time of disclosure or by law, and includes but is not limited to, trade secrets, know-how, inventions, techniques, data, customers list, personal information, financial information, sales, and marketing plans of the other Party, its affiliates, or its customers. Both Parties recognize and acknowledge the confidential and proprietary nature of any Confidential Information and acknowledge the irreparable harm that could result if such confidential information is disclosed to a third Party or used for unauthorized purposes. Each Party agrees to use any Confidential Information only for the purpose of conducting business with each other and their clients in the manner contemplated by this Agreement. Both Parties will restrict disclosure of any Confidential Information to only those personnel who have a need to know and will bind such personnel to obligations of confidentiality to the same extent that each Party is bound by this Agreement. Upon request of the owner of the confidential information, the other Party will promptly return or destroy all materials incorporating any Confidential Information and any copies. The obligation under this paragraph do not apply to information that: 1) is or becomes generally known or in the public domain through no act or omission of the other Party; 2) was lawfully in Insight's or Client's possession without restriction as to use or disclosure before its receipt from the other Party; 3) is received from, or was made available to, a third Party without any obligation of confidentiality; 4) was independently developed; 5) is otherwise permitted to be disclosed under this Agreement; 6) is disclosed with the prior written consent of the disclosing Party; or 7) is required to be disclosed in any civil or criminal legal proceeding, regulatory proceeding or any similar process, however, the Party required to make the disclosure under the law shall give prompt notice of this to the other Party prior to such disclosure so that the other Party may seek an appropriate protective order or give its consent to such disclosure.

14. Insurance

The Contractor shall procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the Services the following insurance with minimum limits equal to the amount indicated below.

Contractor shall maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Services. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, the Contractor shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees. If any class of employee or employees engaged in performing any portion of the Services under this Agreement are not protected under the Workers' Compensation Statute, adequate insurance coverage for the protection of any employee(s) not otherwise protected must be obtained before any of those employee(s) commence performing any portion of the Services.

Contractor shall not commence performing any portion of the Services until all required insurance has been obtained and certificates indicating the required coverage have been delivered in duplicate to the District and approved by the District. Certificates and insurance policies shall include the following:

- (i) A clause stating: "SHOULD ANY OF THE ABOVE DESCRIBED POLICIES BE CANCELLED BEFORE THE EXPIRATION DATE THEREOF, NOTICE WILL BE DELIVERED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE POLICY PROVISION."
- (ii) Language stating in particular those insured, extent of insurance, location and operation to which insurance applies, expiration date, to which cancellation and reduction notice will be sent, and length of notice period.
- (iii) An endorsement stating that the District and its Board of Education, agents, representatives, employees, trustees, officers, contractors, and volunteers are named additional insured under all policies except Workers' Compensation Insurance, Professional Liability, and Employers' Liability Insurance. An endorsement shall also state that Contractor's insurance policies shall be primary to any insurance or self-insurance maintained by District. An endorsement shall also state that there shall be a waiver of any subrogation.
- (iv) All policies except the Professional Liability, Workers' Compensation Insurance, and Employers' Liability Insurance Policies shall be written on an occurrence form.

Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A: VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the District.

15. Termination

- (i) Without Cause by District: District may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Contractor only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by District shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by Contractor. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Contractor or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
- (ii) Without Cause by Contractor: Contractor may, upon sixty (60) days notice, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement. Upon this termination, District shall only be obligated to compensate Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by Contractor shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services to District. Contractor acknowledges that this sixty (60) day notice period is acceptable so that the District can attempt to procure the Services from another source.
- (iii) With Cause by District: District may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - a) Material violation of this Agreement by the Contractor;
 - b) Any act by Contractor exposing the District to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - c) Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt, Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of Contractor's insolvency.

Written notice by District shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within three (3) calendar days after that notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this Agreement shall upon the expiration of the three (3) calendar days cease and terminate. In the event of this termination, the District may secure the required services from another Contractor. If the expense, fees, and/or costs to the District exceed the cost of providing the service pursuant to this Agreement, the Contractor shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to the District upon the receipt of the District's notice of these expense, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to District.

16. Certificates/Permits/Licenses

Contractor and all Contractor's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such certificates, permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of Services pursuant to this Agreement.

17. Delivery

Time of delivery of goods or services is of the essence in this Agreement. District reserves the right to refuse any goods or services and to cancel all or any part of the goods not conforming to applicable specifications, drawings, samples or descriptions or services that do not conform to the prescribed statement of work. Acceptance of any part of the order of goods shall not District to accept shipments nor deprive it of the right to return goods already accepted at Contractor's expense. Over shipments and under shipments of goods shall be only as agreed to in writing by District. Delivery shall not be deemed to be complete until all goods or services have actually been received and accepted in writing by District.

18. Notice

Any notice required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be deemed to have been given, served, and received if given in writing and either personally delivered or deposited in the United States mail, registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt required, or sent by overnight delivery service, or facsimile transmission, addressed as follows:

20. No Rights in Third Parties

This Agreement does not create any rights in, or inure to the benefit of, any third party except as expressly provided herein.

21. Integration/Entire Agreement of Parties

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties. In the event an express conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the terms of the any attachments or exhibits, the terms of this Agreement will prevail.

22. Submittal of Documents

The Contractor shall not commence the Services under this Agreement until the Contractor has submitted and the District has approved the certificate(s) and affidavit(s), and the endorsement(s) of insurance required as indicated below:

26. Severability

If any term, condition or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will nevertheless continue in full force and effect, and shall not be affected, impaired or invalidated in any way.

27. Provisions Required By Law Deemed Inserted

Each and every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted in this Contract shall be deemed to be inserted herein and this Contract shall be read and enforced as though it were included therein.

28. Authority to Bind Parties

Neither Party in the performance of any and all duties under this Agreement, except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, has any authority to bind the other to any agreements or undertakings.

29. Attorneys' Fees and Costs

Should litigation be necessary to enforce any terms or provisions of this Agreement, then each Party shall bear its own litigation and collection expenses, witness fees, court costs and attorneys' fees.

30. Headings

Paragraph headings in this Agreement are used solely for convenience, and shall be wholly disregarded in the construction of this Agreement. No provision of this Agreement shall be interpreted for or against a Party because that Party or its legal representative drafted such provision, and this Agreement shall be construed as if jointly prepared by the Parties.

31. Signature Authority

Each Party has the full power and authority to enter into and perform this Agreement, and the person signing this Agreement on behalf of each Party has been properly authorized and empowered to enter into this Agreement.

32. Counterparts

This Agreement and all amendments and supplements to it may be executed in counterparts, and all counterparts together shall be construed as one document.

SUBJECT: Acceptance of K12 Strong Workforce Program Pathway

Improvement-Round 4 Funds

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education accept \$928,118 from the K12 Strong Workforce Pathway Improvement Plan-Round 4 Funds for the 2021-22 school year.

The California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office – Division of Workforce and Economic Development, in partnership with California Department of Education, formally announced the 2021-2022 funding awards for the K12 Strong Workforce Program Round 4. Glendale Unified School District was awarded \$928,118 for the pathway improvement plan, Expanding CTE for Student Success.

The K12 Strong Workforce funds will be used to work in partnership with community college partners to ensure that programs place primary emphasis on improving academic and technical skills and integrating academic and technical content. It will be used to develop Programs of Study that reflect all aspects of an industry and ensure that students are not restricted in their postsecondary and career pursuits. It will also emphasize application of technology in Career Technical Education (CTE) programs, regardless of industry area, to ensure that emerging technologies are included in the CTE programs.

Program Objectives:

1. The Strong Workforce Program 4 funds from the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (CCCCO) will expand and scale all 27 of its CTE pathways in 12 industry sectors: Hospitality, Tourism & Recreation; Education; Child Development & Family Services; Arts, Media, and Entertainment (CC's Information Communications Technologies/Digital Media); Transportation;

Public Services; Health Science and Medical Technology; Fashion and Interior Design; Engineering and Architecture; Business and Finance; Building and Construction Trades; and Manufacturing and Product Development. The District seeks Glendale Community College (GCC) as a partner to enhance dual enrollment opportunities, articulation to CTE courses, student outreach, and college and career planning to be bolstered in the District's 18 middle school pathways.

- 2. GUSD will focus on the strategies College and Career Exploration and Work Based Learning (WBL) and strengthening and scaling pathways to maintain and sustain industry relevance in high-demand, well-paying careers in priority sectors aligning with LA/OC SWP regional planning. The District's pathways cut across regional priority sectors, including the regional "emerging" sector Retail, Hospitality, and Tourism, an area of focus for the District as it plans to enhance Hoover High School's Food Service and Hospitality pathway with new, industry-standard culinary/kitchen equipment.
- 3. The District will partner with GCC Career Education (CE) program to:
 - a. Facilitate collaboration and college and career exploration via CE counselor advising and related activities for GUSD students.
 - b. Strengthen and build support systems at GCC to assist GUSD in the area of CE program outreach, career pathway presentations and general career advising.
 - c. Leverage existing degree and certificate programs to align with GUSD's 27 pathways.
 - d. Offer dual enrollment and/or articulation opportunities as well as industry-recognized certification in alignment with GUSD pathways.
 - e. Align college-level sequence of courses with GUSD's introductory/intermediate/advanced level CTE courses to create coherent, seamless transitions to further post-secondary work and successful advancement into entry-level careers.

4. Funds will also be used to:

- a. Continue formalized career exploration programs such as Xello career exploration (tool available for all students in grades 6-12), WorkWonder/Glendale Internship program (grades 10-11), and Individual Middle/High School College and Career Planning Guide.
- b. Pay for Career and Technical Student Organization (CTSOs) membership fees for student participation in leadership opportunities, certifications, competitions, and field trips that promote career exploration and guidance

- opportunities for all CTE pathway learners.
- c. Continue to fund the USC College Advising Corps partnership and contract.
- d. Train CTE teachers to use new equipment.
- e. Expand WBL through industry connections with faculty externships, job shadowing, mentoring, and student visits to job sites.
- f. Enhance existing Engineering and Manufacturing pathway (AM sector) at Glendale High School (GHS) with animatronic makerspace in collaboration with Garner Holt Education.
- g. Update to industry-standard equipment for students in the Culinary Program at Hoover High School (HHS) and Sports Medicine (Health sector) at Crescenta Valley High School (CVHS).

The terms of the K12 Strong Workforce Program Improvement Plan are from January 1, 2022, through June 30, 2024.

Test 3 (NNAT3)

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education approve the purchase of the new Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) screening tool – Naglieri Nonverbal Ability Test 3 (NNAT3) in the amount of \$83,490 to test all students in Grades 3-5.

An Information Report was presented to the Board of Education at the December 14, 2021, Board Meeting providing an overview of the process that the Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) Task Force used to recommend and adopt the Naglieri Nonverbal Ability Test 3 (NNAT3) as a universal online screening tool to determine student eligibility for GATE services, and to replace the previously used Otis-Lennon School Ability Test (OLSAT).

The NNAT test is a nonverbal measure of general ability that yields a norm-based score, helpful in identifying students with the potential for advanced scholastic achievement. NNAT provides a nonverbal, culturally neutral assessment of general ability that is ideal for use with a diverse student population. With the use of progressive matrices across grade levels, this versatile test is well-suited for identifying gifted and talented students. The test features pictorial direction and requires no spoken or written language, making it particularly useful for assessing minority students and those who might be English learners or who may have limited academic skills.

The total cost of the NNAT3 for the 2021-22 school year is \$83,490 to test all GUSD students in Grades 3-5 and will be covered by funds from the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF).

Crescenta Valley High is having a spring event on March 5. He asked if indoor events are approved for students. Clark Magnet seniors are planning a trip to Catalina on March 5. He provided an update on CTE and Student Wellness Services events. He is excited to receive a student board member patch.

PUBLIC COMMUNICATIONS

- 1. <u>Ani Toroyan</u>, parent, spoke about the absurdity of COVID restrictions placed on the students, the harm it is doing on their mental health, and the loss of learning. Pass a resolution making masks optional.
- 2. <u>Tamar Karacholian</u>, parent, spoke against the mask mandate for students. We do not need to comply or enforce this mandate. It is time to allow families the choice to send their student to school with or without masks.
- 3. Beatris Khodadadi, parent, spoke against the mask mandate for students.
- 4. <u>Annie Ayrapetyan</u>, parent, spoke against the mask mandate for students. What would happen if our children come to school without a mask? We demand that masks, indoor and outdoor, be optional and the freedom of medical choice for their children.
- 5. <u>Aneta Krpekyan</u>, parent, said if Board members, Mayor Garcetti, and Governor Newsom can take photos without their masks, then her child can go to school without a mask. The Board has the power to make wearing a mask a choice.
- 6. Narine Tadevosyan, parent, said they have become data analysts. All they want to do is keep our kids safe and happy. If nothing changes, she is going to assume that the Board did not hear what our parents have said. We want our children unmasks today.
- 7. <u>Celena Mesa</u> feels that staff is participating in harassment. Wearing masks are not healthy. She said when your child is not feeling well, submit a claim form to the district's insurance carrier.
- 8. <u>Anna Keshishyan</u>, parent, spoke against the mask mandate for students. She would like masks optional.
- 9. <u>Liana Khashakyan</u>, parent, spoke against the mask mandate for students. We need to unmask our kids and send them to school. Have them stand up for their rights.
- 10. Omry Maoz, parent, also believes that masks should be optional. He asked the Board to start developing a plan to move toward making masks optional. He suggested a survey be sent to parents.
- 11. <u>Gissell Amranyan</u>, classified employee for GUSD, asked the Board to reconsider their wages. Her job is physically and mentally challenging. She also translates and trains others, but is not compensated.
- 12. <u>Sona Aivazi</u>, classified employee, said our parents and community members do not know what their roles are. Social media is usually about teachers and students, not about classified employees. She spoke about wages for the classified employees.
- 13. <u>Vergineh Keshishian</u>, classified employee, said she is disappointed how the district is treating our classified personnel. Some of them don't take breaks because they have so much to do. District jobs are not that attractive because of the low pay.

PUBLIC COMMUNICATIONS (Continued)

- 14. Susan Stefun, classified employee, spoke about the hard-working classified staff. They are underpaid. School secretaries work hard to keep our schools running. COVID has added even more to their workday. The cost of living has been going up. She will not be here next year, but the decision has been made for her. She was told last week that unvaccinated employees would not have a job next year.
- 15. <u>Melanie Renolo</u>, Yard Duty Assistant, said her salary does not pay her college education, which it should. They are not being paid enough. Their wages are low.
- 16. <u>Aimee Nicolas</u>, LVN, said with COVID her duties have grown exponentially including mental health assistance. While many employees were working from home, many of them had to return to their position. The classified employees worked throughout the pandemic.
- 17. <u>Leslie Dickson</u>, parent, spoke in support of GTA and CSEA. GUSD has not kept up with COLA increases over the past few years. Our staff deserves a 10% raise and GUSD has the money to do it. Everyone has to do more work.
- 18. Pansy Sultan, parent, clarified that every person who attended the Super Bowl over the age of 5 had to be fully vaccinated in order to enter the SoFi Stadium. If all students in GUSD were vaccinated, we would be having a very different conversation right now. It has been an incredible two years for educators who have been asked to do more. GUSD should support GTA and CSEA wage proposals so we can retain our employees. We need to show them they are valued.

(CASPS)

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education approve the Services Agreement between Glendale Unified School District and the Committee for Armenian Students in Public Schools (CASPS) in the amount of \$65,000.00 to provide academic and social-emotional services to identified students and families, paid from ESSER III funds.

Glendale Unified School District has contracted with the Committee for Armenian Students in Public Schools (CASPS) to provide academic and social-emotional services to identified students and families.

Services being provided by CASPS include, but are not limited to:

- Intervention/Prevention Clinical Group Counseling offers services to all referred students in need to behavior modification and improved academic responsibility.
- Yes, I Can Tutoring assists high school Sophomores and includes middle school students at risk of failing in two or more subjects. Students will be provided in-home one-hour sessions in all subjects twice a week.
- *Bridge to High School* provides support to middle school students in preparation for high school. This program also includes support services for parents to discuss school/home issues, constructive approaches for redirecting negative behavior patterns, and encourage cooperation with teachers and family members.
- Leadership Development Workshop provides high-achieving Juniors an intensive half-day program titled "Connecting to Your Community" where students focus on one's potential and skills, and finds volunteering opportunities for community services.

• Art Contest is organized annually by CASPS for high school students. Students compete based on technical skills and merit, creativity and adherence to theme.

The services being provided by CASPS will allow students, that may have fallen behind during distance learning and the pandemic, to receive the added support needed for their academic success. Students also who have difficulty with communication and behavioral issues or inability to express themselves in their home environment will receive the assistance needed to express themselves through art, activity or discussion.

CASPS services are offered from February 2022-February 2023. The total cost for these services is \$65,000 which is covered by ESSER III funds.

SERVICES AGREEMENT

This Agreement for Professional Services ("Agreement") made and entered into by and between the Glendale Unified School District ("District"), a public entity, and the Committee For Armenian Students in Public Schools (CASPS), herein after referred to as ("Contractor").

The Parties do hereby contract and agree as follows:

1. Term

Contractor shall commence providing services under this Agreement on or about <u>February 2, 2022</u> and will diligently perform as required and complete performance by <u>February 2, 2023</u>.

2. Scope of Services

Contractor's specific program and services performed is described in "Scope of Work" attached hereto as Addendum A and fully incorporated herein.

3. Compensation

District agrees to pay the Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement a set for in Addendum A "Scope of Work." District shall pay Contractor the amount set forth in Addendum B "Cost Proposal" according to the following terms and conditions: NTE \$65,000.00 (Sixty:Five Thousand dollars).

Invoices should be submitted to Accounts Payable Department, Glendale Unified School District, 223 N. Jackson Street, Glendale, CA 91206.

4. Expenses

District shall not be liable to Contractor for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by Contractor in performing services for District that are not specifically identified in Addendum B "Cost Proposal" and factored into the compensation paid by the District to the Contractor.

5. Materials

Contractor shall furnish, at its own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement.

6. Independent Contractor

In the performance of this Agreement, Contractor shall be and act as an independent contractor. Contractor understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of the District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided to employees of the District and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. Contractor shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to Contractor's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, Contractor is an independent contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and directing the performance of the

details of the work, District being interested only in the results obtained.

7. Joint Employer

Neither Party shall be deemed a joint employer of the other Party's employees. Each Party shall indemnify the other Party from and against claims made by the indemnifying Party's employees that they are co-employed by the other Party. The indemnification requirements set forth in paragraph 11 shall be applicable to the indemnification obligations of each Party under this paragraph. Neither Party's employees will be deemed "leased" employees of the other for any purpose. In connection with this Agreement, each Party is an independent contractor and does not have any authority to bind or commit the other.

8. Contractor's Employee Processing

- (i) Employee Eligibility Verification: The Contractor warrants that it fully complies with all Federal and State statutes and regulations regarding the employment of aliens and others and that all its employees performing work under this Contract meet the citizenship or alien status requirement set forth in Federal statutes and regulations. The Contractor shall obtain, from all employees performing work hereunder, all verification and other documentation of employment eligibility status required by Federal or State statutes and regulations including, but not limited to, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, 8 U.S.C. §1324 et seq., as they currently exist and as they may be hereafter amended. The Contractor shall retain all such documentation for all covered employees for the period prescribed by the law. The Contractor shall indemnify, defend with counsel approved in writing by District, and hold harmless, the District, its agents, officers, and employees from employer sanctions and any other liability which may be assessed against the Contractor or the District or both in connection with any alleged violation of any Federal or State statutes or regulations pertaining to the eligibility for employment of any persons performing work under this Contract.
- (ii) Fingerprinting and Criminal Background Check: Contractor shall complete the background check requirements of California Education Code section 45125.1 for all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students. The Contractor shall not staff the program with any employees who have been convicted of a violent felony listed in California Penal Code section 1192.7(c). The Contractor shall provide the District with fingerprinting/criminal background check for all employees who will be used to staff the program.
- (iii) Tuberculosis Clearance: Contractor will ensure that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students are determined to be free of active tuberculosis by a medical professional. Contractor shall submit documentation to the District verifying that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites are determined to be free of active tuberculosis.
- (iv) COVID-19 Vaccination Status and Periodic Testing: Contractor will ensure that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students have been fully vaccinated for COVID-19. Contractor shall submit documentation to the District verifying that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites have received the complete COVID-19 vaccination within two weeks prior to starting to provide services at a District school site. Contractor further will require all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites to participate in regular COVID-19 testing in compliance with the District's current testing protocols. Contractor's employees can either participate in the District on-site testing program wherein the District will directly receive testing results or seek testing on their own and furnish their

test results to Contractor which upon receipt will immediately notify the District of the results.

9. Conduct on District Premises

Contractor shall, at all times, comply with and abide by all reasonable policies and procedures of the District (or that may be established thereby, from time to time) that pertain to conduct on the District's premises, possession or distribution of contraband, or the access to, and security of, the District's real property or facilities, to the extent that the Contractor has been provided with a copy of each such policy or procedure. Contractor shall exercise due care and diligence to prevent any injury to persons or damage to property while on the District's premises. The operation of vehicles by the Contractor's personnel on the District's property shall conform to posted and other applicable regulations and safe-driving practices. Vehicular accidents occurring on the District's property and involving either Party's personnel shall be reported promptly to the appropriate Party. Each Party covenants that at all times during the term it, and its employees, agents, and Subcontractors shall comply with, and take no action that results in the other Party being in violation of, any applicable federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, regulations, and rules. Each Party's personnel shall clearly identify themselves as the appropriate Party's personnel and not as employees of the other Party. When on the District's premises, Contractor's personnel shall wear and clearly display identification badges or tags, as approved by the District. Contractor's employees shall not smoke or use profanity or other inappropriate language while on site. Contractor's employees shall not enter the facility while under the influence of alcohol, drugs or other intoxicants and shall not have such materials in their possession. Contractor's employees shall plan their activities to minimize the number of times they must enter and exit a facility. Contractor's personnel should transport all tools, equipment and materials needed for the day at the start of the work period and restrict all breaks to the absolute minimum.

10. Anti-Discrimination

District programs, activities, practices shall be free from discrimination based on race, color, ancestry, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital or parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity or expression, or genetic information; the perception of one or more of such characteristics; or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics and therefore the Contractor agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and District policy. In addition, the Contractor agrees to require like compliance by all of its subcontractor(s).

11. Indemnification

To the furthest extent permitted by California law, Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold free and harmless the District, its Board of Education, agents, representatives, officers, contractors, employees, trustees, and volunteers ("the Indemnified Parties") from any and all claims, demands, causes of action, suits, actions, costs, expenses, judgments, liability, loss, damage or injury of any kind, nature and description, in law or equity ("Claim"), to property or persons including, but not limited to, personal injury, bodily injury, death, property damage, and Contractors' and/or attorneys' fees and costs, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the negligence, recklessness, errors or omissions, or willful misconduct of Contractor, its officials, officers, employees, subcontractors, Contractors, or agents, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the performance of the Services, the Project, or this Agreement, including without limitation the payment of all consequential

damages; or from any activity, work, or thing done, permitted, or suffered by the Contractor in conjunction with this Agreement, unless the claims are caused wholly by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the District. The District shall have the right to accept or reject any legal representation that Contractor proposes to defend the Indemnified Parties.

12. Limitation of District Liability

Other than as provided in this Agreement, the District's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall the District be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.

13. Confidentiality

The Contractor and all Contractor's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services. Contractor understands that student records are confidential and agrees to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement.

Both Parties will maintain in confidence and safeguard all confidential information, as defined in this paragraph, of the other Party, it affiliates, and its customers. "Confidential Information" means any information that is marked or otherwise identified as confidential or proprietary at the time of disclosure or by law, and includes but is not limited to, trade secrets, know-how, inventions, techniques, data, customers list, personal information, financial information, sales, and marketing plans of the other Party, its affiliates, or its customers. Both Parties recognize and acknowledge the confidential and proprietary nature of any Confidential Information and acknowledge the irreparable harm that could result if such confidential information is disclosed to a third Party or used for unauthorized purposes. Each Party agrees to use any Confidential Information only for the purpose of conducting business with each other and their clients in the manner contemplated by this Agreement. Both Parties will restrict disclosure of any Confidential Information to only those personnel who have a need to know and will bind such personnel to obligations of confidentiality to the same extent that each Party is bound by this Agreement. Upon request of the owner of the confidential information, the other Party will promptly return or destroy all materials incorporating any Confidential Information and any copies. The obligation under this paragraph do not apply to information that: 1) is or becomes generally known or in the public domain through no act or omission of the other Party; 2) was lawfully in Insight's or Client's possession without restriction as to use or disclosure before its receipt from the other Party; 3) is received from, or was made available to, a third Party without any obligation of confidentiality; 4) was independently developed; 5) is otherwise permitted to be disclosed under this Agreement; 6) is disclosed with the prior written consent of the disclosing Party; or 7) is required to be disclosed in any civil or criminal legal proceeding, regulatory proceeding or any similar process, however, the Party required to make the disclosure under the law shall give prompt notice of this to the other Party prior to such disclosure so that the other Party may seek an appropriate protective order or give its consent to such disclosure.

14. Insurance

The Contractor shall procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the Services the following insurance with minimum limits equal to the amount indicated below.

Contractor shall maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Services. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, the Contractor shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees. If any class of employee or employees engaged in performing any portion of the Services under this Agreement are not protected under the Workers' Compensation Statute, adequate insurance coverage for the protection of any employee(s) not otherwise protected must be obtained before any of those employee(s) commence performing any portion of the Services.

Contractor shall not commence performing any portion of the Services until all required insurance has been obtained and certificates indicating the required coverage have been delivered in duplicate to the District and approved by the District. Certificates and insurance policies shall include the following:

- (i) A clause stating: "SHOULD ANY OF THE ABOVE DESCRIBED POLICIES BE CANCELLED BEFORE THE EXPIRATION DATE THEREOF, NOTICE WILL BE DELIVERED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE POLICY PROVISION."
- (ii) Language stating in particular those insured, extent of insurance, location and operation to which insurance applies, expiration date, to which cancellation and reduction notice will be sent, and length of notice period.
- (iii) An endorsement stating that the District and its Board of Education, agents, representatives, employees, trustees, officers, contractors, and volunteers are named additional insured under all policies except Workers' Compensation Insurance, Professional Liability, and Employers' Liability Insurance. An endorsement shall also state that Contractor's insurance policies shall be primary to any insurance or self-insurance maintained by District. An endorsement shall also state that there shall be a waiver of any subrogation.
- (iv) All policies except the Professional Liability, Workers' Compensation Insurance, and Employers' Liability Insurance Policies shall be written on an occurrence form.

Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A: VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the District.

15. Termination

- (i) Without Cause by District: District may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Contractor only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by District shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by Contractor. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Contractor or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
- (ii) Without Cause by Contractor: Contractor may, upon sixty (60) days notice, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement. Upon this termination, District shall only be obligated to compensate Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by Contractor shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services to District. Contractor acknowledges that this sixty (60) day notice period is acceptable so that the District can attempt to procure the Services from another source.
- (iii) With Cause by District: District may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - a) Material violation of this Agreement by the Contractor;
 - b) Any act by Contractor exposing the District to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - c) Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt, Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of Contractor's insolvency.

Written notice by District shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within three (3) calendar days after that notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this Agreement shall upon the expiration of the three (3) calendar days cease and terminate. In the event of this termination, the District may secure the required services from another Contractor. If the expense, fees, and/or costs to the District exceed the cost of providing the service pursuant to this Agreement, the Contractor shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to the District upon the receipt of the District's notice of these expense, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to District.

16. Certificates/Permits/Licenses

Contractor and all Contractor's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such certificates, permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of Services pursuant to this Agreement.

17. Delivery

Time of delivery of goods or services is of the essence in this Agreement. District reserves the right to refuse any goods or services and to cancel all or any part of the goods not conforming to applicable specifications, drawings, samples or descriptions or services that do not conform to the prescribed statement of work. Acceptance of any part of the order of goods shall not District to accept shipments nor deprive it of the right to return goods already accepted at Contractor's expense. Over shipments and under shipments of goods shall be only as agreed to in writing by District. Delivery shall not be deemed to be complete until all goods or services have actually been received and accepted in writing by District.

18. Notice

Any notice required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be deemed to have been given, served, and received if given in writing and either personally delivered or deposited in the United States mail, registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt required, or sent by overnight delivery service, or facsimile transmission, addressed as follows:

Any notice personally given or sent by facsimile transmission shall be effective upon receipt. Any notice sent by overnight delivery service shall be effective the business day next following delivery thereof to the overnight delivery service. Any notice given by mail shall be effective three (3) days after deposit in the United States mail.

19. Assignment

The obligations of the Contractor pursuant to this Agreement shall not be assigned by the Contractor.

20. No Rights in Third Parties

This Agreement does not create any rights in, or inure to the benefit of, any third party except as expressly provided herein.

21. Integration/Entire Agreement of Parties

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties. In the event an express conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the terms of the any attachments or exhibits, the terms of this Agreement will prevail.

22. Submittal of Documents

The Contractor shall not commence the Services under this Agreement until the Contractor has submitted and the District has approved the certificate(s) and affidavit(s), and the endorsement(s) of insurance required as indicated below:

23. Force Majeure Clause

The Parties to the Contract shall be excused from performance thereunder during the time and to the extent that they are prevented from obtaining, delivering, or performing by act of God, fire, strike, loss, pandemic or epidemic, or shortage of transportation facilities, lock-out, commandeering of materials, products, plants or facilities by the government, when satisfactory

evidence thereof is presented to the other Party(ies), provided that it is satisfactorily established that the non-performance is not due to the fault or neglect of the Party not performing.

24. California Law

This Agreement shall be governed by and the rights, duties and obligations of the Parties shall be determined and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California, in the County of Los Angeles. The Parties further agree that any action or proceeding brought to enforce the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall be maintained in the county in which the District's administrative offices are located.

25. Waiver

The waiver by either Party of any breach of any term, covenant, or condition herein contained shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such term, covenant, condition, or any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant, or condition herein contained.

26. Severability

If any term, condition or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will nevertheless continue in full force and effect, and shall not be affected, impaired or invalidated in any way.

27. Provisions Required By Law Deemed Inserted

Each and every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted in this Contract shall be deemed to be inserted herein and this Contract shall be read and enforced as though it were included therein.

28. Authority to Bind Parties

Neither Party in the performance of any and all duties under this Agreement, except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, has any authority to bind the other to any agreements or undertakings.

29. Attorneys' Fees and Costs

Should litigation be necessary to enforce any terms or provisions of this Agreement, then each Party shall bear its own litigation and collection expenses, witness fees, court costs and attorneys' fees.

30. Headings

Paragraph headings in this Agreement are used solely for convenience, and shall be wholly disregarded in the construction of this Agreement. No provision of this Agreement shall be interpreted for or against a Party because that Party or its legal representative drafted such provision, and this Agreement shall be construed as if jointly prepared by the Parties.

31. Signature Authority

Each Party has the full power and authority to enter into and perform this Agreement, and the person signing this Agreement on behalf of each Party has been properly authorized and empowered to enter into this Agreement.

32. Counterparts

This Agreement and all amendments and supplements to it may be executed in counterparts, and all counterparts together shall be construed as one document.

The Intervention/Prevention Program is open to ALL students in ALL cultural groups, regardless of race, religion or ethnicity. CASPS provides equal access to clinical group counseling to all referred students in need of behavior modification and improved academic responsibility.

- 2. Yes, I Can Tutoring Program's goal is to assist high school sophomores, who are at risk of failing in two or more subjects, and to help them graduate and continue with higher education. The program has since evolved to include middle school students as well. The tutors provide hour long, in-home academic assistance in all subjects twice a week.
- 3. Bridge to High School programs goal is to provide support to students in middle school to help in their preparation for the high school years. The program was piloted towards students who were exhibiting apathy towards school and academic responsibility; thereafter, the support services were expanded to also include parents. The support services include discussions about school and home issues, suggestions of constructive approaches for redirecting negative behavior patterns, and encourages cooperation with teachers and family members.
- 4. Leadership Development Workshop High Achieving Juniors is an intensive half-day program titled "Connecting to Your Community". Through various interactive tasks, students learn to brainstorm, analyze video content, share reactions, and practice effective communication. The overarching goal of the day is focusing on one's potential, honing in on one's skills, and finding volunteering opportunities for community service. The workshop focuses on students with high GPA's who have been referred by their schools.
- 5. Art Contest High School Students Each year CASPS organizes and hosts an art contest for high school students at GUSD. The students compete based on technical skills and merit, adherence to theme, and creativity. Professional artists in the community are invited to judge the entries. All students receive recognition and monetary awards at an annual reception attended by their families, art teachers, community leaders, and district administrators and officials.

SERVICES AGREEMENT

This Agreement for Professional Services ("Agreement") made and entered into by and between the Glendale Unified School District ("District"), a public entity, and Outreach Concern Inc., herein after referred to as ("Contractor").

The Parties do hereby contract and agree as follows:

1. Term

Contractor shall commence providing services under this Agreement on or about and will diligently perform as required and complete performance by June 14, 2022 _____.

2. Scope of Services

Outreach Concern Inc. to provide Counseling and pupil personnel services to students at Incarnation Parish School. The scoop of work is to focus on students academic, social, behavioral and mental health needs.

Contractor's specific program and services performed is described in "Scope of Work" attached hereto as Addendum A and fully incorporated herein.

3. Compensation

District agrees to pay the Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement a set for in Addendum A "Scope of Work." District shall pay Contractor the amount set forth in Addendum B "Cost Proposal" according to the following terms and conditions: \$3,990.00 (portion of the total services which amount to 15,000.00)

Invoices should be submitted to Accounts Payable Department, Glendale Unified School District, 223 N. Jackson Street, Glendale, CA 91206.

4. Expenses

District shall not be liable to Contractor for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by Contractor in performing services for District that are not specifically identified in Addendum B "Cost Proposal" and factored into the compensation paid by the District to the Contractor.

5. Materials

Contractor shall furnish, at its own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement.

6. Independent Contractor

In the performance of this Agreement, Contractor shall be and act as an independent contractor. Contractor understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of the District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided to employees of the District and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. Contractor shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to Contractor's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, Contractor is an independent contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and directing the performance of the

details of the work, District being interested only in the results obtained.

7. Joint Employer

Neither Party shall be deemed a joint employer of the other Party's employees. Each Party shall indemnify the other Party from and against claims made by the indemnifying Party's employees that they are co-employed by the other Party. The indemnification requirements set forth in paragraph 11 shall be applicable to the indemnification obligations of each Party under this paragraph. Neither Party's employees will be deemed "leased" employees of the other for any purpose. In connection with this Agreement, each Party is an independent contractor and does not have any authority to bind or commit the other.

8. Contractor's Employee Processing

- Employee Eligibility Verification: The Contractor warrants that it fully complies with all (i) Federal and State statutes and regulations regarding the employment of aliens and others and that all its employees performing work under this Contract meet the citizenship or alien status requirement set forth in Federal statutes and regulations. The Contractor shall obtain, from all employees performing work hereunder, all verification and other documentation of employment eligibility status required by Federal or State statutes and regulations including, but not limited to, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, 8 U.S.C. §1324 et seq., as they currently exist and as they may be hereafter amended. The Contractor shall retain all such documentation for all covered employees for the period prescribed by the law. The Contractor shall indemnify, defend with counsel approved in writing by District, and hold harmless, the District, its agents, officers, and employees from employer sanctions and any other liability which may be assessed against the Contractor or the District or both in connection with any alleged violation of any Federal or State statutes or regulations pertaining to the eligibility for employment of any persons performing work under this Contract.
- (ii) Fingerprinting and Criminal Background Check: Contractor shall complete the background check requirements of California Education Code section 45125.1 for all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students. The Contractor shall not staff the program with any employees who have been convicted of a violent felony listed in California Penal Code section 1192.7(c). The Contractor shall provide the District with fingerprinting/criminal background check for all employees who will be used to staff the program.
- (iii) Tuberculosis Clearance: Contractor will ensure that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students are determined to be free of active tuberculosis by a medical professional. Contractor shall submit documentation to the District verifying that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites are determined to be free of active tuberculosis.
- (iv) COVID-19 Vaccination Status and Periodic Testing: Contractor will ensure that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students have been fully vaccinated for COVID-19. Contractor shall submit documentation to the District verifying that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites have received the complete COVID-19 vaccination within two weeks prior to starting to provide services at a District school site. Contractor further will require all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites to participate in regular COVID-19 testing in compliance with the District's current testing protocols. Contractor's employees can either participate in the District on-site testing program wherein the District will directly receive testing results or seek testing on their own and furnish their

test results to Contractor which upon receipt will immediately notify the District of the results.

9. Conduct on District Premises

Contractor shall, at all times, comply with and abide by all reasonable policies and procedures of the District (or that may be established thereby, from time to time) that pertain to conduct on the District's premises, possession or distribution of contraband, or the access to, and security of, the District's real property or facilities, to the extent that the Contractor has been provided with a copy of each such policy or procedure. Contractor shall exercise due care and diligence to prevent any injury to persons or damage to property while on the District's premises. The operation of vehicles by the Contractor's personnel on the District's property shall conform to posted and other applicable regulations and safe-driving practices. Vehicular accidents occurring on the District's property and involving either Party's personnel shall be reported promptly to the appropriate Party. Each Party covenants that at all times during the term it, and its employees, agents, and Subcontractors shall comply with, and take no action that results in the other Party being in violation of, any applicable federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, regulations, and rules. Each Party's personnel shall clearly identify themselves as the appropriate Party's personnel and not as employees of the other Party. Contractor's employees shall not smoke or use profanity or other inappropriate language while on site. Contractor's employees shall not enter the facility while under the influence of alcohol, drugs or other intoxicants and shall not have such materials in their possession. Contractor's employees shall plan their activities to minimize the number of times they must enter and exit a facility. Contractor's personnel should transport all tools, equipment and materials needed for the day at the start of the work period and restrict all breaks to the absolute minimum.

10. Anti-Discrimination

District programs, activities, practices shall be free from discrimination based on race, color, ancestry, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital or parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity or expression, or genetic information; the perception of one or more of such characteristics; or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics and therefore the Contractor agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and District policy. In addition, the Contractor agrees to require like compliance by all of its subcontractor(s).

11. Indemnification

To the furthest extent permitted by California law, Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold free and harmless the District, its Board of Education, agents, representatives, officers, contractors, employees, trustees, and volunteers ("the Indemnified Parties") from any and all claims, demands, causes of action, suits, actions, costs, expenses, judgments, liability, loss, damage or injury of any kind, nature and description, in law or equity ("Claim"), to property or persons including, but not limited to, personal injury, bodily injury, death, property damage, and Contractors' and/or attorneys' fees and costs, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the negligence, recklessness, errors or omissions, or willful misconduct of Contractor, its officials, officers, employees, subcontractors, Contractors, or agents, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the performance of the Services, the Project, or this Agreement, including without limitation the payment of all consequential

damages; or from any activity, work, or thing done, permitted, or suffered by the Contractor in conjunction with this Agreement, unless the claims are caused wholly by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the District. The District shall have the right to accept or reject any legal representation that Contractor proposes to defend the Indemnified Parties.

12. Limitation of District Liability

Other than as provided in this Agreement, the District's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall the District be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.

13. Confidentiality

The Contractor and all Contractor's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services. Contractor understands that student records are confidential and agrees to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement.

Both Parties will maintain in confidence and safeguard all confidential information, as defined in this paragraph, of the other Party, it affiliates, and its customers. "Confidential Information" means any information that is marked or otherwise identified as confidential or proprietary at the time of disclosure or by law, and includes but is not limited to, trade secrets, know-how, inventions, techniques, data, customers list, personal information, financial information, sales, and marketing plans of the other Party, its affiliates, or its customers. Both Parties recognize and acknowledge the confidential and proprietary nature of any Confidential Information and acknowledge the irreparable harm that could result if such confidential information is disclosed to a third Party or used for unauthorized purposes. Each Party agrees to use any Confidential Information only for the purpose of conducting business with each other and their clients in the manner contemplated by this Agreement. Both Parties will restrict disclosure of any Confidential Information to only those personnel who have a need to know and will bind such personnel to obligations of confidentiality to the same extent that each Party is bound by this Agreement. Upon request of the owner of the confidential information, the other Party will promptly return or destroy all materials incorporating any Confidential Information and any copies. The obligation under this paragraph do not apply to information that: 1) is or becomes generally known or in the public domain through no act or omission of the other Party; 2) was lawfully in Insight's or Client's possession without restriction as to use or disclosure before its receipt from the other Party; 3) is received from, or was made available to, a third Party without any obligation of confidentiality; 4) was independently developed; 5) is otherwise permitted to be disclosed under this Agreement; 6) is disclosed with the prior written consent of the disclosing Party; or 7) is required to be disclosed in any civil or criminal legal proceeding, regulatory proceeding or any similar process, however, the Party required to make the disclosure under the law shall give prompt notice of this to the other Party prior to such disclosure so that the other Party may seek an appropriate protective order or give its consent to such disclosure.

14. Insurance

The Contractor shall procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the Services the following insurance with minimum limits equal to the amount indicated below.

Contractor shall maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Services. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, the Contractor shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees. If any class of employee or employees engaged in performing any portion of the Services under this Agreement are not protected under the Workers' Compensation Statute, adequate insurance coverage for the protection of any employee(s) not otherwise protected must be obtained before any of those employee(s) commence performing any portion of the Services.

Contractor shall not commence performing any portion of the Services until all required insurance has been obtained and certificates indicating the required coverage have been delivered in duplicate to the District and approved by the District. Certificates and insurance policies shall include the following:

- (i) A clause stating: "SHOULD ANY OF THE ABOVE DESCRIBED POLICIES BE CANCELLED BEFORE THE EXPIRATION DATE THEREOF, NOTICE WILL BE DELIVERED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE POLICY PROVISION."
- (ii) Language stating in particular those insured, extent of insurance, location and operation to which insurance applies, expiration date, to which cancellation and reduction notice will be sent, and length of notice period.
- (iii) An endorsement stating that the District and its Board of Education, agents, representatives, employees, trustees, officers, contractors, and volunteers are named additional insured under all policies except Workers' Compensation Insurance, Professional Liability, and Employers' Liability Insurance. An endorsement shall also state that Contractor's insurance policies shall be primary to any insurance or self-insurance maintained by District. An endorsement shall also state that there shall be a waiver of any subrogation.
- (iv) All policies except the Professional Liability, Workers' Compensation Insurance, and Employers' Liability Insurance Policies shall be written on an occurrence form.

Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A: VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the District.

15. Termination

- (i) Without Cause by District: District may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Contractor only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by District shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by Contractor. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Contractor or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
- (ii) Without Cause by Contractor: Contractor may, upon sixty (60) days notice, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement. Upon this termination, District shall only be obligated to compensate Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by Contractor shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services to District. Contractor acknowledges that this sixty (60) day notice period is acceptable so that the District can attempt to procure the Services from another source.
- (iii) With Cause by District: District may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - a) Material violation of this Agreement by the Contractor;
 - b) Any act by Contractor exposing the District to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - c) Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt, Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of Contractor's insolvency.

Written notice by District shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within three (3) calendar days after that notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this Agreement shall upon the expiration of the three (3) calendar days cease and terminate. In the event of this termination, the District may secure the required services from another Contractor. If the expense, fees, and/or costs to the District exceed the cost of providing the service pursuant to this Agreement, the Contractor shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to the District upon the receipt of the District's notice of these expense, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to District.

16. Certificates/Permits/Licenses

Contractor and all Contractor's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such certificates, permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of Services pursuant to this Agreement.

17. Delivery

Time of delivery of goods or services is of the essence in this Agreement. District reserves the right to refuse any goods or services and to cancel all or any part of the goods not conforming to applicable specifications, drawings, samples or descriptions or services that do not conform to the prescribed statement of work. Acceptance of any part of the order of goods shall not District to accept shipments nor deprive it of the right to return goods already accepted at Contractor's expense. Over shipments and under shipments of goods shall be only as agreed to in writing by District. Delivery shall not be deemed to be complete until all goods or services have actually been received and accepted in writing by District.

18. Notice

Any notice required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be deemed to have been given, served, and received if given in writing and either personally delivered or deposited in the United States mail, registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt required, or sent by overnight delivery service, or facsimile transmission, addressed as follows:

The obligations of the Contractor pursuant to this Agreement shall not be assigned by the Contractor.

20. No Rights in Third Parties

This Agreement does not create any rights in, or inure to the benefit of, any third party except as expressly provided herein.

21. Integration/Entire Agreement of Parties

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties. In the event an express conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the terms of the any attachments or exhibits, the terms of this Agreement will prevail.

22. Submittal of Documents

The Contractor shall not commence the Services under this Agreement until the Contractor has submitted and the District has approved the certificate(s) and affidavit(s), and the endorsement(s) of insurance required as indicated below:

The waiver by either Party of any breach of any term, covenant, or condition herein contained shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such term, covenant, condition, or any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant, or condition herein contained.

26. Severability

If any term, condition or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will nevertheless continue in full force and effect, and shall not be affected, impaired or invalidated in any way.

27. Provisions Required By Law Deemed Inserted

Each and every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted in this Contract shall be deemed to be inserted herein and this Contract shall be read and enforced as though it were included therein.

28. Authority to Bind Parties

Neither Party in the performance of any and all duties under this Agreement, except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, has any authority to bind the other to any agreements or undertakings.

No provision of this Agreement shall be interpreted for or against a Party because that Party or its legal representative drafted such provision, and this Agreement shall be construed as if jointly prepared by the Parties.

31. Signature Authority

Each Party has the full power and authority to enter into and perform this Agreement, and the person signing this Agreement on behalf of each Party has been properly authorized and empowered to enter into this Agreement.

32. Counterparts

This Agreement and all amendments and supplements to it may be executed in counterparts, and all counterparts together shall be construed as one document.

Glendale Unified School District has contracted with Marianne Frostig Center for Educational Therapy to provide classroom consultation and coaching to teachers at Incarnation Parish School. Incarnation chose to participate and receive Title II, Part A funds, which may be used for professional development to support students' needs. The Marianne Frostig Center Consultation and Education Department will provide six (6) hours of classroom consultation and coaching to teachers. Educational Specialists will spend six (6) hours observing teachers' classrooms, provide feedback, and answer teachers' questions.

SERVICES AGREEMENT

This Agreement for Professional Services ("Agreement") made and entered into by and between the Glendale Unified School District ("District"), a public entity, and Marianne Frostig Center for Educational Therapy, herein after referred to as ("Contractor").

The Parties do hereby contract and agree as follows:

1. Term

Contractor shall commence providing services under this Agreement on or about 3/9/2022 and will diligently perform as required and complete performance by 06/30/2022.

2. Scope of Services
Marianne Frostig Center for Educational Therapy will provide 6 hours of classroom consultation and classroom coaching to Incarnation Parish School
teachers

Contractor's specific program and services performed is described in "Scope of Work" attached hereto as Addendum A and fully incorporated herein.

3. Compensation

District agrees to pay the Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement a set for in Addendum A "Scope of Work." District shall pay Contractor the amount set forth in Addendum B "Cost Proposal" according to the following terms and conditions: \$1,000.00

Invoices should be submitted to Accounts Payable Department, Glendale Unified School District, 223 N. Jackson Street, Glendale, CA 91206.

4. Expenses

District shall not be liable to Contractor for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by Contractor in performing services for District that are not specifically identified in Addendum B "Cost Proposal" and factored into the compensation paid by the District to the Contractor.

5. Materials

Contractor shall furnish, at its own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement.

6. Independent Contractor

In the performance of this Agreement, Contractor shall be and act as an independent contractor. Contractor understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of the District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided to employees of the District and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. Contractor shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to Contractor's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, Contractor is an independent contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and directing the performance of the

details of the work, District being interested only in the results obtained.

7. Joint Employer

Neither Party shall be deemed a joint employer of the other Party's employees. Each Party shall indemnify the other Party from and against claims made by the indemnifying Party's employees that they are co-employed by the other Party. The indemnification requirements set forth in paragraph 11 shall be applicable to the indemnification obligations of each Party under this paragraph. Neither Party's employees will be deemed "leased" employees of the other for any purpose. In connection with this Agreement, each Party is an independent contractor and does not have any authority to bind or commit the other.

8. Contractor's Employee Processing

- Employee Eligibility Verification: The Contractor warrants that it fully complies with all (i) Federal and State statutes and regulations regarding the employment of aliens and others and that all its employees performing work under this Contract meet the citizenship or alien status requirement set forth in Federal statutes and regulations. The Contractor shall obtain, from all employees performing work hereunder, all verification and other documentation of employment eligibility status required by Federal or State statutes and regulations including, but not limited to, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, 8 U.S.C. §1324 et seq., as they currently exist and as they may be hereafter amended. The Contractor shall retain all such documentation for all covered employees for the period prescribed by the law. The Contractor shall indemnify, defend with counsel approved in writing by District, and hold harmless, the District, its agents, officers, and employees from employer sanctions and any other liability which may be assessed against the Contractor or the District or both in connection with any alleged violation of any Federal or State statutes or regulations pertaining to the eligibility for employment of any persons performing work under this Contract.
- (ii) Fingerprinting and Criminal Background Check: Contractor shall complete the background check requirements of California Education Code section 45125.1 for all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students. The Contractor shall not staff the program with any employees who have been convicted of a violent felony listed in California Penal Code section 1192.7(c). The Contractor shall provide the District with fingerprinting/criminal background check for all employees who will be used to staff the program.
- (iii) Tuberculosis Clearance: Contractor will ensure that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students are determined to be free of active tuberculosis by a medical professional. Contractor shall submit documentation to the District verifying that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites are determined to be free of active tuberculosis.
- (iv) COVID-19 Vaccination Status and Periodic Testing: Contractor will ensure that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students have been fully vaccinated for COVID-19. Contractor shall submit documentation to the District verifying that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites have received the complete COVID-19 vaccination within two weeks prior to starting to provide services at a District school site. Contractor further will require all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites to participate in regular COVID-19 testing in compliance with the District's current testing protocols. Contractor's employees can either participate in the District on-site testing program wherein the District will directly receive testing results or seek testing on their own and furnish their

test results to Contractor which upon receipt will immediately notify the District of the results.

9. Conduct on District Premises

Contractor shall, at all times, comply with and abide by all reasonable policies and procedures of the District (or that may be established thereby, from time to time) that pertain to conduct on the District's premises, possession or distribution of contraband, or the access to, and security of, the District's real property or facilities, to the extent that the Contractor has been provided with a copy of each such policy or procedure. Contractor shall exercise due care and diligence to prevent any injury to persons or damage to property while on the District's premises. The operation of vehicles by the Contractor's personnel on the District's property shall conform to posted and other applicable regulations and safe-driving practices. Vehicular accidents occurring on the District's property and involving either Party's personnel shall be reported promptly to the appropriate Party. Each Party covenants that at all times during the term it, and its employees, agents, and Subcontractors shall comply with, and take no action that results in the other Party being in violation of, any applicable federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, regulations, and rules. Each Party's personnel shall clearly identify themselves as the appropriate Party's personnel and not as employees of the other Party. When on the District's premises, Contractor's personnel shall wear and clearly display identification badges or tags, as approved by the District. Contractor's employees shall not smoke or use profanity or other inappropriate language while on site. Contractor's employees shall not enter the facility while under the influence of alcohol, drugs or other intoxicants and shall not have such materials in their possession. Contractor's employees shall plan their activities to minimize the number of times they must enter and exit a facility. Contractor's personnel should transport all tools, equipment and materials needed for the day at the start of the work period and restrict all breaks to the absolute minimum.

10. Anti-Discrimination

District programs, activities, practices shall be free from discrimination based on race, color, ancestry, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital or parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity or expression, or genetic information; the perception of one or more of such characteristics; or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics and therefore the Contractor agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and District policy. In addition, the Contractor agrees to require like compliance by all of its subcontractor(s).

11. Indemnification

To the furthest extent permitted by California law, Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold free and harmless the District, its Board of Education, agents, representatives, officers, contractors, employees, trustees, and volunteers ("the Indemnified Parties") from any and all claims, demands, causes of action, suits, actions, costs, expenses, judgments, liability, loss, damage or injury of any kind, nature and description, in law or equity ("Claim"), to property or persons including, but not limited to, personal injury, bodily injury, death, property damage, and Contractors' and/or attorneys' fees and costs, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the negligence, recklessness, errors or omissions, or willful misconduct of Contractor, its officials, officers, employees, subcontractors, Contractors, or agents, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the performance of the Services, the Project, or this Agreement, including without limitation the payment of all consequential

damages; or from any activity, work, or thing done, permitted, or suffered by the Contractor in conjunction with this Agreement, unless the claims are caused wholly by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the District. The District shall have the right to accept or reject any legal representation that Contractor proposes to defend the Indemnified Parties.

12. Limitation of District Liability

Other than as provided in this Agreement, the District's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall the District be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.

13. Confidentiality

The Contractor and all Contractor's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services. Contractor understands that student records are confidential and agrees to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement.

Both Parties will maintain in confidence and safeguard all confidential information, as defined in this paragraph, of the other Party, it affiliates, and its customers. "Confidential Information" means any information that is marked or otherwise identified as confidential or proprietary at the time of disclosure or by law, and includes but is not limited to, trade secrets, know-how, inventions, techniques, data, customers list, personal information, financial information, sales, and marketing plans of the other Party, its affiliates, or its customers. Both Parties recognize and acknowledge the confidential and proprietary nature of any Confidential Information and acknowledge the irreparable harm that could result if such confidential information is disclosed to a third Party or used for unauthorized purposes. Each Party agrees to use any Confidential Information only for the purpose of conducting business with each other and their clients in the manner contemplated by this Agreement. Both Parties will restrict disclosure of any Confidential Information to only those personnel who have a need to know and will bind such personnel to obligations of confidentiality to the same extent that each Party is bound by this Agreement. Upon request of the owner of the confidential information, the other Party will promptly return or destroy all materials incorporating any Confidential Information and any copies. The obligation under this paragraph do not apply to information that: 1) is or becomes generally known or in the public domain through no act or omission of the other Party; 2) was lawfully in Insight's or Client's possession without restriction as to use or disclosure before its receipt from the other Party; 3) is received from, or was made available to, a third Party without any obligation of confidentiality; 4) was independently developed; 5) is otherwise permitted to be disclosed under this Agreement; 6) is disclosed with the prior written consent of the disclosing Party; or 7) is required to be disclosed in any civil or criminal legal proceeding, regulatory proceeding or any similar process, however, the Party required to make the disclosure under the law shall give prompt notice of this to the other Party prior to such disclosure so that the other Party may seek an appropriate protective order or give its consent to such disclosure.

14. Insurance

The Contractor shall procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the Services the following insurance with minimum limits equal to the amount indicated below.

Contractor shall maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Services. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, the Contractor shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees. If any class of employee or employees engaged in performing any portion of the Services under this Agreement are not protected under the Workers' Compensation Statute, adequate insurance coverage for the protection of any employee(s) not otherwise protected must be obtained before any of those employee(s) commence performing any portion of the Services.

Contractor shall not commence performing any portion of the Services until all required insurance has been obtained and certificates indicating the required coverage have been delivered in duplicate to the District and approved by the District. Certificates and insurance policies shall include the following:

- (i) A clause stating: "SHOULD ANY OF THE ABOVE DESCRIBED POLICIES BE CANCELLED BEFORE THE EXPIRATION DATE THEREOF, NOTICE WILL BE DELIVERED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE POLICY PROVISION."
- (ii) Language stating in particular those insured, extent of insurance, location and operation to which insurance applies, expiration date, to which cancellation and reduction notice will be sent, and length of notice period.
- (iii) An endorsement stating that the District and its Board of Education, agents, representatives, employees, trustees, officers, contractors, and volunteers are named additional insured under all policies except Workers' Compensation Insurance, Professional Liability, and Employers' Liability Insurance. An endorsement shall also state that Contractor's insurance policies shall be primary to any insurance or self-insurance maintained by District. An endorsement shall also state that there shall be a waiver of any subrogation.
- (iv) All policies except the Professional Liability, Workers' Compensation Insurance, and Employers' Liability Insurance Policies shall be written on an occurrence form.

Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A: VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the District.

15. Termination

- (i) Without Cause by District: District may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Contractor only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by District shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by Contractor. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Contractor or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
- (ii) Without Cause by Contractor: Contractor may, upon sixty (60) days notice, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement. Upon this termination, District shall only be obligated to compensate Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by Contractor shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services to District. Contractor acknowledges that this sixty (60) day notice period is acceptable so that the District can attempt to procure the Services from another source.
- (iii) With Cause by District: District may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - a) Material violation of this Agreement by the Contractor;
 - b) Any act by Contractor exposing the District to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - c) Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt, Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of Contractor's insolvency.

Written notice by District shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within three (3) calendar days after that notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this Agreement shall upon the expiration of the three (3) calendar days cease and terminate. In the event of this termination, the District may secure the required services from another Contractor. If the expense, fees, and/or costs to the District exceed the cost of providing the service pursuant to this Agreement, the Contractor shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to the District upon the receipt of the District's notice of these expense, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to District.

16. Certificates/Permits/Licenses

Contractor and all Contractor's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such certificates, permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of Services pursuant to this Agreement.

17. Delivery

Time of delivery of goods or services is of the essence in this Agreement. District reserves the right to refuse any goods or services and to cancel all or any part of the goods not conforming to applicable specifications, drawings, samples or descriptions or services that do not conform to the prescribed statement of work. Acceptance of any part of the order of goods shall not District to accept shipments nor deprive it of the right to return goods already accepted at Contractor's expense. Over shipments and under shipments of goods shall be only as agreed to in writing by District. Delivery shall not be deemed to be complete until all goods or services have actually been received and accepted in writing by District.

18. Notice

Any notice required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be deemed to have been given, served, and received if given in writing and either personally delivered or deposited in the United States mail, registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt required, or sent by overnight delivery service, or facsimile transmission, addressed as follows:

20. No Rights in Third Parties

This Agreement does not create any rights in, or inure to the benefit of, any third party except as expressly provided herein.

21. Integration/Entire Agreement of Parties

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties. In the event an express conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the terms of the any attachments or exhibits, the terms of this Agreement will prevail.

22. Submittal of Documents

The Contractor shall not commence the Services under this Agreement until the Contractor has submitted and the District has approved the certificate(s) and affidavit(s), and the endorsement(s) of insurance required as indicated below:

SUBJECT: Approval of Agreement Between Glendale Unified School

District and Berlitz Languages Inc.

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education approve an agreement between Glendale Unified School District and Berlitz Languages Inc. in the amount of \$28,702 to provide language instruction to FLAG students enrolled in the Independent Study Program.

At the beginning of the 2021-22 academic year, the District created the opportunity for FLAG students enrolled in the Independent Study program to receive lessons in the target language in addition to instruction in core subjects from their assigned Independent Study teachers. They were designed so that students could maintain their levels of language proficiency so that when they were ready to return to in-person learning, there would be a smooth transition with minimal disruption. The fall session, which ran from September 1, 2021, to December 17, 2021, served 114 students at its highest enrollment. An agreement in the amount of \$80,150 was approved by the Board of Education on September 14, 2021, for these services.

A survey was conducted before the session ended to determine each family's plan for instruction after winter break. Based on the feedback, the District adjusted groupings by languages and grade levels. For the winter session, 48 students have opted to continue participating in target language classes.

Students receive four 1-hour lessons during the week, focusing on language arts and communication skills in the target language. Groups are organized by no more than eight students, clustered by grade levels or grade level spans. Some classes are taught by GUSD teachers and substitutes for additional compensation outside of their contractual hours. One language is taught by an individual on a Personal Services Agreement. The majority of the groups are taught by instructors from an online language school called Berlitz

Languages Inc. with whom the District contracted for the fall session.

Instructors from Berlitz Languages Inc. are native speakers of the languages they teach. They are college-educated, experienced teachers who are trained through the Berlitz method of teaching, one that focuses on a full immersion approach, emphasizing communication through structured conversations, presentation, practice, and performance.

All target language classes in the winter session started January 10, 2022, and will be held through March 11, 2022. The cost for the winter session is \$18,997. The full cost is actually \$28,702; however, there was an unused balance of \$9,705 from the fall agreement that is credited to the winter agreement. The cost for these services will be paid from Independent Study/Verdugo Academy funding.

Before the winter session ends, another survey will be conducted to determine what the need will be for the final session of the year, which will run from March 22, 2022, through June 10, 2022. The agreement terms are valid through June 14, 2022, which allows for the District to continue services through the end of the 2021-22 school year should the survey warrant the need. Costs would be calculated based on how many students opt to continue participating in target language classes through the end of the school year.

STATEMENT OF WORK

This Statement of Work ("SOW" or "Agreement") is entered into between Berlitz Languages, Inc., a New York corporation with principal place of business at 7 Roszel Road, Princeton, New Jersey 08540 ("Berlitz") and Glendale Unified School District, 223 North Jackson St. Suite 204, Glendale, CA 91206 ("CLIENT") dated January 10, 2022.

I. GENERAL STATEMENT OF WORK

Berlitz will provide the professional services and deliverables to the CLIENT in accordance with this SOW, and any additional or new services or deliverables to which the Parties mutually agree in writing.

II. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR RELATIONSHIP

Berlitz's relationship to Client in the performance of the Agreement is that of an independent contractor. Any personnel of Berlitz performing services under the Agreement, ("Berlitz Personnel") shall at all times be under Berlitz's exclusive direction and control. Nothing contained herein shall be deemed to create the relationship of employer-employee, partners, joint ventures, or principals and agent. Berlitz shall in no event represent itself to third persons as acting on behalf of, or serving as the agent of, Client.

III. PROPRIETARY INFORMATION

Both parties agree that the services for which Berlitz is engaged may include the exchange of information of a proprietary nature to Client and to Berlitz. Each party shall receive such knowledge and information in confidence and shall not, except as authorized in writing by the party who owns the information, publish or disclose or authorize any other party to publish, disclose or make use of such information or knowledge shall have ceased to be proprietary as evidenced by general public knowledge. Each party will notify the other, in writing, when information is proprietary.

Confidential information does not include any information which 1) is already in the public domain or which becomes available to the public through no breach of confidentiality by the recipient; 2) was lawfully in **recipient's possession** on a non-confidential basis prior to receipt from the discloser; 3) is received by recipient independently on a non-confidential basis from a third party free to lawfully disclose such information to the recipient; or 4) is independently developed by recipient without use of the **discloser's confidential information**. The release of confidential information by the receiving party to satisfy the requirements of federal, state or local laws shall not be a breach of this agreement.

IV. TERM AND TERMINATION

- 1. The term of this SOW commences January 10, 2022, and terminates June 14, 2022, unless terminated earlier by either party as set forth herein or unless renewed upon written agreement of the parties.
- 2. Either party may, at any time upon thirty (30) days' prior written notice to the non-terminating party, terminate all or any portion of this Agreement or the Services without cause. Berlitz shall be entitled to compensation for Services actually performed prior to the effective date of termination. (In the event that all learners in a particular cohort return to in person school, Berlitz will require only 2 weeks' notice)



- 3. CLIENT may, by written notice, immediately terminate all or any portion of this Agreement or the Services for cause in any of the following circumstances:
 - (1) Berlitz materially breaches any obligation hereunder and does not cure such breach within thirty (30) days of written notice of same from CLIENT; or
 - (2) (a) Berlitz is adjudged insolvent or bankrupt; (b) proceedings are instituted by or against the BERLITZ seeking relief, reorganization or arrangement under any laws relating to insolvency; (c) Berlitz makes an assignment for the benefit of creditors; (d) there is an appointment of a receiver, liquidator or trustee of any of Berlitz' property or assets, or (e) upon liquidation, dissolution or winding up of Berlitz' business.
- 4. Berlitz may, by written notice, immediately terminate all or any portion of this Agreement or the Services if CLIENT breaches any of its material obligations under this Agreement, which breach is not cured within 30 days following receipt of notice thereof from Berlitz.

V. SUBCONTRACTING OR ASSIGNMENT

Berlitz shall not subcontract, assign or otherwise delegate any portions of the work or any moneys due hereunder without the prior written approval of Client.

VI. INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE

- 1. Berlitz shall maintain and provide, at its expense, appropriate Workers' Compensation coverage for its employees assigned to Client's location(s) at limits imposed by statute, including Employer Liability coverage.
- 2. Berlitz shall maintain for its own protection and benefit various other policies of insurance, including Comprehensive General Liability coverage, for its performance of the Services at Client's location(s), among others.
- 3. Client agrees that Berlitz is not an insurer of Client's operations, personnel or facilities. Except as provided elsewhere in this Agreement, Client assumes all risk of loss, physical damage and personal injury at its operations, to its personnel and/or facilities or any other property resulting from fire, theft or other casualty, and Client waives any right of recovery and its insurers' right of subrogation against Berlitz for any loss or damage resulting from any such occurrence.
- 4. Berlitz will protect, defend, hold harmless and indemnify Client, its directors, officers and employees from and against all claims, actions, liabilities, damages, losses, costs and expenses (including reasonable attorney's fees) (the "Losses") directly resulting from the performance of the Services expressly required under this Agreement, provided such Losses (1) are caused solely by the gross negligent failure of Berlitz to perform the Services required pursuant to this Agreement, or by other grossly negligent actions or omissions in the performance of those same Services by Berlitz, or through the willful misconduct or unlawful activity of Berlitz; and (2) are not caused in any way through the negligence, willful misconduct or unlawful activity of Client or otherwise resulting from Berlitz's compliance with specific direction from Client.
- 5. Client shall protect, defend, hold harmless and indemnify Berlitz, its respective successors and assigns, and its directors, officers and employees from and against all Losses asserted against Berlitz arising out of incidents or occurrences taking place or arising at Client's location provided that any such Losses are (1) attributable to bodily injury, sickness, disease or death or to damage to tangible property; and (2) are not caused in any way through the negligence, willful misconduct or unlawful activity of Berlitz, or the failure of Berlitz to perform the Services set forth in this Agreement.

Berlitz shall have the sole and exclusive right to exploit the Works in any form or medium provided, however, that no such



exercise of rights by Berlitz shall serve to limit Client's rights to use the Works as intended. To avoid doubt, Client acknowledges and agrees that exploitation of such rights by Berlitz shall include, but shall not be limited to, inclusion of some or all the Works in products and services developed by Berlitz for other clients.

- 2. To avoid doubt, it is expressly understood and agreed that as of the date hereof there is no intention by CLIENT or Berlitz that any Work Product be developed or created in the course of providing the Services that are the subject of this SOW. Furthermore, Client acknowledges and agrees that (i) possession of physical pedagogical and other materials and access to on-line materials furnished to students taking Berlitz training or courses, which may be kept or may have online access retained by those students after the training or courses are completed, does not create or give rise to a license or any other grant of rights to Client or to such student to copy, revise, distribute, display or exploit those materials or create any derivative works based thereon and (ii) that such materials are not and shall not be deemed to be Work Product as herein defined. All copyrights and other intellectual property rights in and to such materials owned or controlled by Berlitz shall remain the property of Berlitz. The provisions of this subparagraph are an essential part of this SOW and shall survive for the duration of copyright of any Berlitz materials encompassed hereby.
- 3. All copyrights and other intellectual property rights in and to Materials owned or controlled by Berlitz shall remain the property of Berlitz. The right to reproduce and use Berlitz Materials by Client in any internally delivered program shall be granted to Client only upon the purchase of a Material License from Berlitz.

X REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES

- a. Client and Berlitz respectively represent and certify to the other that its entry into and performance of the Agreement has been duly authorized and is in compliance with applicable charters, by-laws, governing statutory authority, regulations and applicable administrative procedures.
- b. Berlitz agrees that all work performed by Berlitz hereunder will be prepared with appropriate professional diligence and skill and shall meet reliability standards customary in the language services industry.
- c. Berlitz shall have all instructors submit to a comprehensive background check conducted in accordance with applicable law. Instructors shall be legally eligible to work with children.
- d. Client understands and agrees that Berlitz reserves the right, but shall not be obligated, to monitor/observe all instruction/classes for training and quality assurance purposes.
- e. Client understands and agrees that Instruction must be taken within the time period specified in the schedule. CLIENT and Berlitz shall have the right to re-schedule or change any scheduled class with mutual written consent of the other party, subject to the cancellation provisions set forth in this Agreement.

XI. BILLING

Tuition will be invoiced in two equal amounts: one invoice will be sent at contract signing. Payment terms on the invoices will be net 45 days.

XII. LIMITATION OF LIABILITY



IN NO EVENT WILL EITHER PARTY BE LIABLE TO THE OTHER PARTY FOR ANY LOST PROFITS OR LOST REVENUE, OR FOR ANY INDIRECT, SPECIAL, PUNITIVE, EXEMPLARY OR CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES ARISING OUT OF OR IN CONNECTION WITH THIS STATEMENT OF WORK; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, THAT THE FOREGOING LIMITATION OF LIABILITY WILL NOT APPLY TO A PARTY'S BREACH OF THE CONFIDENTIALITY PROVISIONS OF THIS STATEMENT OF WORK; ANY INFRINGEMENT OF INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS IN VIOLATION OF THIS STATEMENT OF WORK; OR ANY GROSS NEGLIGENCE OR WILLFUL MISCONDUCT BY A PARTY IN THE PERFORMANCE OF THIS STATEMENTOF WORK.

XII. NO SOLICITATION

Each party agrees that during the performance of any Services under this Statement of Work and for a period of twelve (12) months thereafter, neither party will intentionally solicit for employment any person known to be a current employee of the other who is or was assigned to provide such Services or otherwise involved with such Services under such Statement of Work. These restrictions shall not apply to, and nothing contained in this section is deemed to prohibit either party from, making general public solicitations (in any media) for particular positions or job classifications or from hiring any person (including any employee of the other party) responding to any such solicitations.

XIII. COMPLETE AGREEMENT, GOVERNING LAW AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

- 1. The SOW contains the full and complete understanding of the parties. No oral statements or agreements made prior to or at the signing of the SOW, if any, shall be deemed to supplement or modify the written terms hereof. Neither party shall claim any amendment, modifications, waiver or release from any provisions hereof unless the same is in writing, signed by the parties hereto.
- 2. This SOW shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of New York, applicable to agreements made and fully performed therein.
- 3. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to constitute the parties as a joint venture, nor shall any similar relationship be deemed to exist between them. No employee, officer or director of either party shall be or be deemed to be an employee of the other.

BP 6142.7 - Physical Education and Activity

CSBA Update July 2020

Last GUSD Update: November 2020

Revisions to Board Policy (BP) 6142.7 are made as required to resolve a finding discovered during the recent Federal Program Monitoring process conducted by the California Department of Education (CDE). The CDE reviewer found that the current BP, while aligned to the CSBA model, does not accurately represent the Education Code related to who has the authority to grant PE exemptions for students. The recommended change moves the power to grant PE exemptions to the Board of Education instead of the Superintendent or designee. This change will result in a Board consent item being added twice a year, before each semester, for the Board of Education to formally approve PE exemptions recommended to them by the school sites.

A copy of the revised BP 6142.7 is attached to this memo.

TO SUPPORT 2021-22 BOARD PRIORITY NO. 3: Ensure the Health and Safety of Students and Employees – Strengthen mental health support and programs; ensure best practices for safe and healthy learning environments; and support physical, social, and emotional wellbeing.

Physical Education and Activity

The Board of Education recognizes the positive benefits of physical activity on student health, well-being, and academic achievement. The District shall provide all students the opportunity to be physically active on a regular basis through high-quality physical education instruction and may provide additional opportunities for physical activity throughout the school day. The District's physical education and activity programs shall support the District's coordinated student wellness program and encourage students' lifelong fitness.

Physical education classes shall be conducted in the coeducational, inclusive manner prescribed by law. The District shall provide instruction in physical education that provides equal access and equal opportunities for participation for all students in grades 1-12 regardless of gender, gender expression, sexual orientation, and mental or physical disability. (Education Code 220, 221.5, 33352; 5 CCR 4900, 4930, 4931, 4940, 4960; 34 CFR 106.33, 106.34, 300.108)

The District's physical education program shall provide a developmentally appropriate sequence of instruction aligned with the state's model content standards and curriculum framework.

The District's physical education program shall engage students in age-appropriate moderate to vigorous physical activity, as defined in the accompanying administrative regulation, including aerobic, muscle-strengthening, and bone-strengthening activities. The Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies to monitor the amount of moderate to vigorous physical activity that takes place in the physical education instructional program.

For grades 9-12, the overall course of study shall include the effects of physical activity upon dynamic health, the mechanics of body movement, aquatics, gymnastics and tumbling, individual and dual sports, rhythms and dance, team sports, and combatives. (Education Code 33352; 5 CCR 10060)

The Board shall approve the courses in grades 9-12 for which physical education credit may be granted.

The Superintendent or designee may develop strategies to supplement physical education instruction with additional opportunities for students to be physically active before, during, and after the school day.

Students with disabilities shall be provided instruction in physical education in accordance with their individualized education program or Section 504 accommodation plan.

Physical Education and Activity

During air pollution episodes, extreme weather, or other inclement conditions, physical education staff shall make appropriate adjustments to the program or shall seek alternative indoor space to enable students to participate in active physical education.

Staffing

Physical education instruction shall be delivered by appropriately credentialed teachers who may be assisted by instructional aides, paraprofessionals, and/or volunteers.

The District shall provide physical education teachers with continuing professional development, including classroom management and instructional strategies designed to keep students engaged and active and to enhance the quality of physical education instruction and assessment.

Physical Fitness Testing

The Superintendent or designee shall annually administer the physical fitness test designated by the State Board of Education (FITNESSGRAM) to students in grades 5, 7, and 9. (Education Code 60800; 5 CCR 1041)

Temporary Exemptions

The governing board of a school district or the office of the county superintendent of schools of a county may grant a student a temporary exemption from physical education under either of the following conditions: (Education Code 51241)

- 1. The student is ill or injured and a modified program to meet his/her needs cannot be provided.
- 2. The student is enrolled for one-half time or less.

Two-Year Exemptions

With the student's consent, the governing board of a school district or the office of the county superintendent of schools of a county may exempt a student from physical education courses for any two years during grades 10-12 provided that the student has satisfactorily met at least five of the six standards of the FITNESSGRAM in grade 9. (Education Code 51241)

Physical Education and Activity

Upon request by students and/or their parents/guardians, the Superintendent or designee may administer the FITNESSGRAM to students in grades 10-12 who need to pass the test in order to qualify for a two-year exemption from physical education courses.

Students in grades 10-12 who have been granted a two-year exemption shall be offered a variety of elective physical education courses of not less than 400 minutes each 10 school days. (Education Code 51222)

Such students shall not be permitted to attend fewer total hours of courses and classes than they would have attended if enrolled in a physical education course. (Education Code 51241)

Permanent Exemptions

The governing board of a school district or the office of the county superintendent of schools of a county may grant a student a permanent exemption from physical education under any of the following conditions: (Education Code 51241)

- 1. The student is age 16 years or older and has been enrolled in grade 10 for one or more academic years. However, such a student shall not be permitted to attend fewer total hours of courses and classes than he/she would have attended if enrolled in a physical education course.
- 2. The student is enrolled as a postgraduate student.
- 3. The student is enrolled in a juvenile home, ranch, camp, or forestry camp school with scheduled recreation and exercise.

Students who have been granted a permanent exemption shall be offered a variety of elective physical education courses of not less than 400 minutes each 10 school days. (Education Code 33352)

Other Exemptions

The governing board of a school district or the office of the county superintendent of schools of a county may grant a student an exemption from physical education under the following special circumstances:

1. When the student is in any of grades 10-12 and is excused for up to 24 clock hours in order to participate in automobile driver training. However, any such student shall attend a

minimum of 7,000 minutes of physical education instruction during the school year. (Education Code 51222)

- 2. When the student is in any of grades 10-12, attends a regional occupational center or program, and, because of the travel time involved, would experience hardship to attend physical education courses. Any such student shall have a minimum school day of 180 minutes. (Education Code 52316)
- 3. When the student is in high school and is engaged in a regular school-sponsored interscholastic athletic program carried on wholly or partially after regular school hours. (Education Code 51242)

Program Evaluation

The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board each school's FITNESSGRAM results for each applicable grade level. He/she shall also report to the Board regarding the number of instructional minutes offered in physical education for each grade level, the number of two-year and permanent exemptions granted pursuant to Education Code 51241, and any other data agreed upon by the Board and the Superintendent or designee to evaluate program quality and the effectiveness of the District's program in meeting goals for physical activity.

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education accept funding from DonorsChoose in the amount of \$372 to support projects submitted by Horace Mann and Marshall Elementary Schools.

DonorsChoose is an organization that connects concerned individuals, called "Citizen Philanthropists," with classroom teachers, to provide funds or materials for class projects. Public school teachers create student project proposals and submit the one-page essay and list of resources needed. These concerned individuals fund the student projects of their choice, in whole or in part.

DonorsChoose purchases the student materials and ships items directly to the school, using a network of partnerships and vendors. Teachers are required to complete a feedback package, including documenting the project with photographs, which in turn are shared with the individual that funded the project.

The following projects were submitted and awarded by Donors Choose:

Horace Mann Elementary School – Kayla Vink, Teacher

Project: Sight Word Games for Early Learners

This project was awarded new educational games and early learner toys and materials, including an Alphabet stamp set, magnets, sight word mats, and Educational sentence builder boxes, valued at \$177. These new resources will be used during daily instruction and tutoring by Ms. Vink's first-grade students to help them progress in literacy and fluency, as more than half of the students in the class are English learners and experiencing in person schooling for the first time as a result of the pandemic.
