Map

Under Section 5019.5 of the Education Code, school districts that already elect their governing board members by area are required to review new census data to determine if the existing areas are in compliance with the population balance requirements of the California Voting Rights Act (CVRA).

GUSD has partnered with National Demographics Corporation (Dr. Douglas Johnson) and the law firm of AALRR (David Soldani) for CVRA legal counsel to ensure the timely and accurate completion of this process. These partners have confirmed that the 2020 Census data will require adjustments to the current GUSD trustee election areas. These adjustments must be completed and approved by the Board by December 15, 2021 in preparation for the next Board election on June 7, 2022.


Mr. Johnson and Mr. Soldani will attend the Board meeting virutally and present a new draft map that uses the 2020 Census data. They will review any input received at the public webinar that was held on October 25, 2021, as well as the remaining steps of the process up to the final adoption of the resolution and submission to the Los Angeles County Registrar's Office.

Following the presentation and Board discussion, the Board will open a public hearing to receive public input.







But First, Some Definitions and Background Information



At-Large Elections

Candidates must reside within the District's boundaries and are elected by all the voters who reside in the District's boundaries. (Education Code Section 5030(a).)

From-Trustee Area Elections

Candidates must reside in specific geographic areas within the District's boundaries called "Trustee Areas", but are elected by all the voters who reside in the District's boundaries. (Education Code Section 5030(c).)

By-Trustee Area Elections

Candidates must reside in specific Trustee Areas within the District's boundaries and are elected only by the voters who reside in the same Trustee Areas. (Education Code Section 5030(b).) **This is the only method immune from liability under the CVRA



New Requirements Since 2017

FAIR MAPS Act (2019)

- Assembly Bill 849 (2019), also known as "The Fair and Inclusive Redistricting for Municipalities and Political Subdivisions (FAIR MAPS) Act," applies to cities and counties.
- The FAIR MAPS Act specifies certain aspects of the public engagement process, including the number of public hearings and workshops required, and requires engagement with non-English speaking communities.
- The Act also alters how prisoners are counted and assigns them to the last known place of residence for redistricting processes.
- The Act does not apply to School Districts.



Process for Updating Trustee Areas

Decennial Updates

- By Law, Trustee Areas must be updated following every decennial census. (Education Code Section 5019.5).
- The 2010 census results were released in April of 2011
- The 2020 census results were delayed and only released at the end of September of 2021
- Areas must be updated by February 28, 2022, or the County Committee on School District Organization must update at the District's cost and expense



Process for Updating Trustee Areas

Decennial Updates

- Areas must remain "population balanced" utilizing latest census data.
- A MUCH more truncated process than creating areas.
- No specific process requirement but we recommend at least one public hearing.
- No further approvals needed from SBE or County Committee on School District Organization.
- What if no significant population change?


The 2021-22 CALPADS enrollment date this year was October 6, 2021, reflecting GUSD total enrollment of 24,233. This is a decrease of 691 (or 2.77%) from the 2020-21 enrollment of 24,924.

Attached is the Historical Enrollment graph which indicates that grades TK-6 decreased 423 students over the prior year (TK-3 alone decreased 328), grades 7-8 decreased 127 students, and grades 9-12 decreased 141 students, resulting in a total decrease of 691 students for all grades. The decrease in students continues the enrollment loss trend experienced from prior years, but became worse due to COVID-19's effect on TK to 3. Additional attachments provide detailed information per school, grade level, as well as preliminary estimates for 2022-23.

Mr. Eulmessekian will review additional enrollment information as part of the presentation.

Physical Education II A&B is based on the Physical Education Model Content Standards for California Public Schools. Contents of this course are referenced from the Physical Education Framework for California Public Schools. Course 2 addresses combatives, gymnastics/ tumbling, and team activities. Instruction on the effects of physical activity on dynamic health and the mechanics of body movement is integrated throughout the school year. Course 2 is designed to be taken after Course 1 is completed. Typically, tenth-graders enroll in Course 2, though some students will take Course 2 as eleventh- or twelfth-graders. Course 2 addresses three other content areas (combatives, gymnastics and tumbling, and team activities) as well as the effects of physical activity upon dynamic health and mechanics of body movement. The course sequence provides a blueprint for delivering the content in a manner that equips students to make a successful transition from the physical education instructional program to participation in physical activity during adulthood. The adult lifestyle demands that individuals initiate and monitor their own participation in physical activity. Family responsibilities, career demands, and individual choices influence physical activity patterns. High School Course 1 provides the foundation for high school instruction. Students develop proficient movement skills in each area of physical education; they expand their capabilities for independent learning; and they examine practices that

allow for sound decision making to enhance successful participation in movement activities.

Course Content:

First Semester: 12 weeks

I. Standard 1: Students demonstrate knowledge of and competency in motor skills, movement patterns, and strategies needed to perform a variety of physical activities.

- At this level of skill development, the students are refining their skills. They are becoming more successful and consistent in their performance. students demonstrate proficiency in aquatics, rhythms/dance, and individual and dual activities skills. If a swimming pool is unavailable, students still learn water-safety skills and dry-land strokes.
- Students combine movement patterns to perform advanced offensive, defensive, and transition strategies in aquatics and individual and dual activities. Once students perform, they evaluate the effectiveness of the strategy.
- Students combine movement patterns to create more complex rhythmic activities and dances.
- Students learn to use biomechanics to analyze and improve performance, such as leverage, force, inertia, rotary motion, opposition, and buoyancy.
- Students work on the skill-related fitness components to enhance their performance. The skill-related fitness components are speed, power, agility, coordination, reaction time, and balance.
- Students use their understanding of training and conditioning practices to improve skill acquisition and performance. Understanding the three areas (biomechanics, skill-related fitness, and training and conditioning), along with the role of emotions, provides learners with the comprehensive knowledge for improving performance in aquatics, rhythms/dance, and individual and dual activities.
- On their path to becoming independent learners of movement skills, students improve their understanding of motor learning concepts.

A. Learning Experiences

- Students will build off prior knowledge, as well as learn new academic language and terminology involved with performing a backhand stroke in tennis using the correct biomechanics. Students will work in small groups collaborating, pair-sharing, and evaluating their knowledge of this major tennis stroke. After learning the correct biomechanics, students will demonstrate how to combine and apply to the movement pattern.
- Students will learn academic language using Total Physical Response (TPR): Teaching language or vocabulary concepts by using physical

movement to react to verbal input. The process mimics the way that infants learn their first language, and it reduces student inhibitions and lowers stress. The purpose of TPR is to create a link between speech and action to boost language and vocabulary learning. Teacher will use modeling by saying the new vocabulary word for the students. Teacher uses gestures, facial expressions, props or body movement to illustrate the meaning of the word. Students will use modeling by mimicking the same gestures, facial expressions, use of props or body movement modeled as they say the word.

- Informal Assessment of a Story-board outlining the proper sequence/phases, and biomechanics of shooting a basketball
- Cognitive Assessment Quiz covering material involving the complex movement
- Peer and Teacher observations of the student performing the movement.
- By the end of the lesson, students will be able to cognitively understand and physically demonstrate how to perform a backhand stroke in tennis using the correct biomechanics and body positions. They will be able to use higher-order thinking to break the complex movement down into phases and study each phase to understand how to perform the movement as a whole proficiently. Students will develop academic terminology associated with the movement, such as: preparation phase, force, extension, release phase, launch angle, follow-through, and rotation. Students will then be able to connect newly acquired academic language with specific phases of the complex movement as a whole, before performing the movement.

B. Lessons

- Students will review movement patterns with Teachers to progress from simple to complex, through a variety of activities – including dual and individual sports as well as rhythms/dance and aquatics.
- Students will demonstrate movements, be able to articulate the movement, and apply it to an activity.
- Teacher will review the rubric of proficiency of movement with students in the various activities of individual and dual sports.
- Students will demonstrate the following skills (balance, reaction time, speed, agility, coordination, etc.) as they perform their individual and/or

- team activities. An example would be completing a run, walking on a straight line, learning the rules of volley in tennis, etc.
- Students will demonstrate knowledge of principles of offensive and defensive strategies in dual activities or in aquatics.
- Students will create an Individual and Dual Sport Goal and Plan to meet their continued personal performance goals.
- Students will participate in individual and dual sporting activities such as running and may create a log of activities designed to increase their progress. They will also evaluate their progress based on teacher feedback and peer observation.

- II. Standard 2: Students achieve a level of physical fitness for health and performance while demonstrating knowledge of fitness concepts, principles, and strategies.
 - Throughout the year students are assessed through scientifically based health-related physical fitness assessments to determine whether they meet health-related fitness performance standards. Students set goals based on the outcome of those assessments and develop and implement monthly personal physical fitness plans. By the end of Course 1, students meet the minimum health standards on a scientifically based health-related physical fitness assessment. Looking toward the future, students learn to transfer their knowledge of fitness to real-world situations. They identify the physical fitness requirements of future occupation choices. They also analyze consumer physical fitness products and programs for use in their future fitness plans. Finally, now that students are older and more mature, they learn the inherent risks associated with physical activity in extreme environments.

A. Learning Experiences

- Students develop and implement a one-month personal physical fitness plan based on the five health related fitness components(1) body composition, (2) flexibility, (3) muscular strength, (4) muscular endurance, and (5) cardiorespiratory endurance.
- After creating individual fitness goals, students will fill out a Frequency (F), Intensity (I), Time(T), Type (T) chart before creating a one-month

- physical fitness plan. Students will produce a one-month fitness plan for the teacher to assess.
- Students will learn: basic fitness principles and how to apply them to their own personal fitness goals, including the creation of a one-month physical fitness plan.

B. Lessons

- Students work with their instructor and peers to continue to review personal fitness goals, determine and understand body type, fitness, health limitations and body functions as they pertain to physical activity.
- Students will assess heart rate, work on breathing techniques, stretching and flexibility.
- Students will review basic fitness requirements with teachers, including some commercial equipment requirements and how to use them, examine for purpose and functionality, etc.
- Students will demonstrate understanding through use of fitness equipment.
- Students will review and compare community health resources and determine which are most helpful; they will present their findings verbally and in writing.
- Students will share available fitness resources in their community and their locations.
- Students will learn about and explain the various risks involved in exercise in extreme conditions and in every day physical activity.
- Students will learn about basic aerobic fitness terminology and model instructional objectives, including, walking, running, basic resistance, movement, muscle use, etc
- Students will apply their knowledge of principles of fitness during Fitness Unit both physically and through verbal and written means
- Students will use teacher resources to record fitness goals and fitness plans as well as fitness times, distances, etc. and will continue to evaluate performance during the month.

14 weeks

- III. Standard 3: Students demonstrate knowledge of psychological and sociological concepts, principles, and strategies that apply to the learning and performance of physical activity.
 - This standard addresses self-responsibility, social interaction, and group dynamics. Students in Course 1 evaluate their psychological responses to physical activity. They set goals and then describe the positive feelings they experience from successful participation in physical activity. They share the responsibility for creating and maintaining a physically and emotionally safe and nonthreatening

environment for all. And finally, they act independently and ignore negative peer pressure during physical activity. By the end of Course 1, students discuss the changing psychological and sociological needs of a diverse society in relation to physical activity. They understand that physical activity is universal, and all cultures around the world perform physical activities. Through participation in activities from different parts of the world, students gain greater insights into the history and traditions of different cultures. Students extend this learning to social interaction and cooperation at home as well as in their future workplace. Students learn that each group member brings different strengths and abilities and that it is important for the group to identify and utilize the strengths of each member to be successful in physical activities. They understand that success can be achieved only when students cooperate and interact positively with others.

A. Learning Experiences

- Students will work with peers and teachers in an open discussion to produce a list of classroom rules, procedures, and physical education expectations for class that centers around each individuals' personal responsibilities to create and maintain a physically and emotionally safe and nonthreatening environment for physical activity.
- Students complete assignments by engaging in class discussions about safety in physical education. Students will participate in restorative circles about past experiences in physical education and how important it is to exercise in a safe and welcoming environment.
- Student learns how to behave appropriately and will be responsible, not only for their own behavior, but will also assist in creating a positive and safe Physical Education class for others

B. Lessons

- Students are assigned to groups of four based on their interest in a particular culture. The groups research the significant physical activities, dances, and recreational activities of that culture.
- Each group selects a game or a dance from the culture. They learn the game or dance well enough to teach it to the rest of the class. While teaching the game or dance to others, the group also explains how the dance or game connects to the culture of origin.
- During closure, the teacher asks students to select two games or dances from different cultures for comparison. The students write a comparison of the relationship between each physical activity and its culture of origin.

- By the end of Course 2, students demonstrate proficiency in combatives, gymnastics/tumbling, and team activities. A personal defense class in which students learn how to avoid dangerous situations as well as how to defend themselves meets the combatives requirement.
- Proficiency gives the student the capacity for success leading to advanced levels
 of performance that increase the likelihood of continued participation well into
 adulthood.
- Students combine movement patterns to perform advanced offensive, defensive, and transition strategies in team sport situations. Once performed, students evaluate the effectiveness of the strategy.

- Students explain and use the skill-related fitness components to enhance their performance. The skill-related fitness components are speed, power, agility, coordination, reaction time, and balance.
- Students use their understanding of training and conditioning practices to improve skill acquisition and performance. Understanding these four areas (biomechanics, motor learning, skill-related fitness, and training and conditioning), along with the role of emotions, provides learners with the comprehensive knowledge for improving performance in combatives, gymnastics/tumbling, and team sport activities.
- On their path to becoming independent learners of movement skills, students increase their understanding of motor learning concepts.
- By the end of tenth grade, students create practice plans for improving their own performance in combatives, gymnastics/tumbling, and team sport activities. These practice plans are based on their personal strengths and weaknesses as identified

- II. Standard 2: Students achieve a level of physical fitness for health and performance while demonstrating knowledge of fitness concepts, principles, and strategies.
 - For some students, Course 2 may be the last opportunity to learn about physical fitness and achieve levels of excellence in physical fitness beyond the performance standards established by scientifically based health-related fitness assessments. Students will be assessed on each of the health related fitness components throughout the school year, so that physical activity can be adjusted to accommodate changes in age, growth and development, and goals. Students continue to develop an exercise habit by participating in challenging activities at a moderate to vigorous level for a minimum of four days each week based on individual needs and interests. During Course 2, students learn to be wise consumers by evaluating fitness products and programs, as well as fitness resources in the community. They also learn the facts about ergogenic aids that claim to enhance body composition, appearance, physical fitness, and performance. By the end of Course 2, students will develop and describe a physical

fitness plan that enhances personal health and performance. Their plans also take into consideration future leisure and workplace activities. Besides planning their own fitness programs, students will develop and implement appropriate personal physical fitness programs for family or community members.

A. Learning Experiences

- Students will participate in moderate to vigorous physical activity at least four days each week.
- Students will participate in challenging physical fitness activities using the principles of exercise to meet individual needs and interests.
- Students will identify and achieve levels of excellence in physical fitness that enhance physical and mental performance beyond the standards established by scientifically based health-related fitness assessments.
- Students assess levels of physical fitness and adjust physical activity to accommodate changes in age, growth, and development.
- Students will justify the use of particular physical activities to achieve desired fitness goals.
- Students will develop and describe a physical fitness plan that enhances personal health and performance in future leisure and workplace activities.
- Students will develop and implement an appropriate personal physical fitness program for a family or
- community member.
- Students will explain how to evaluate consumer physical fitness products and programs.
- Students will identify and evaluate ergogenic aids that claim to enhance body composition, appearance,
- physical fitness, and performance.
- Students will evaluate the availability and quality of fitness resources in the community.
- Students will use and analyze scientifically based data and protocols to assess oneself on the five components of health-related physical fitness.

B. Lessons

- The teacher provides students with a list of some important points to consider when they select physical fitness products and programs. For example:
 - Take time to compare prices, features, and quality.
 - Try out any piece of equipment or program before making a purchase.
 - Gather evidence about the program or product.
 - Evaluate the credibility of claims about the product or program.
 - Buy only quality equipment.

- Make sure you have a convenient place to use the equipment or that the program is available close to where you live.
- Decide on the features you really need.
- Decide whether there are less expensive ways to achieve the same goals without the product or program.
- Make sure there is a warranty.
- As a learning activity, students select a product or program in the community that they think will help them with their fitness.
 - Students use the list noted above as a starting point to evaluate the product or program.
 - Students investigate the product or program.
 - Each student must also write a summary statement explaining whether the product or program is worth the price.
 - This activity provides extension activities for use with other subject areas.

- III. Standard 3: Students demonstrate knowledge of psychological and sociological concepts, principles, and strategies that apply to the learning and performance of physical activity.
 - In Course 2, students learn to identify and participate in those activities that they enjoy. They learn that their choice of physical activities may change throughout their lives. They understand that physical activities may need to be modified to allow participation by individuals of various ages and those with special needs. Students realize they will need to evaluate and refine their personal goals continually to improve performance in physical activities. Through their participation in regular physical activity, students learn the psychological benefits of physical activity. They can explain the role of attitude, motivation, and determination in achieving personal satisfaction from challenging physical activities. As their social skills mature, students identify the effects of individual differences on preference for and participation in physical activity. These differences include age, gender, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, and culture. As to age and special needs, students learn how to select and modify physical activities so that everyone can participate. In terms of group dynamics, students learn to identify leadership skills. They learn to perform planned leadership assignments and also assume spontaneous leadership roles. By the end of Course 2, students know how to encourage others to be supportive and inclusive of individuals at all ability levels.

A. Learning Experience

- Students will demonstrate *self-responsibility* by doing the following:
 - Students will participate in physical activities for personal enjoyment.
 - Students will examine and explain the ways in which personal characteristics, performance styles, and preferences for activities may change over a lifetime.
 - Students will evaluate the psychological benefits derived from regular participation in physical activity.
 - Students will explain and analyze the role of individual attitude, motivation, and determination in achieving personal satisfaction from challenging physical activities.
 - Students will evaluate and refine personal goals to improve performance in physical activities.
- Students will demonstrate *social interaction* by doing the following:
 - Students will identify the effects of individual differences, such as age, gender, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, and culture, on preferences for and participation in physical activity.
 - Students will explain how to select and modify physical activities to allow for participation by younger children, the elderly, and individuals with special needs.
- Students will demonstrate *group dynamics* by doing the following:
 - Students will identify leadership skills, perform planned leadership assignments, and assume spontaneous leadership roles.
 - Students will encourage others to be supportive and inclusive of individuals of all ability levels.

B. Lessons

- The student leader creates a rubric for sport specific skills and/or positive interactions and evaluates each member of the team.
 - Each member then has the opportunity to evaluate the role of the leader.
 - For example, leaders are responsible for equipment, team line ups, evaluation of team members, and skill acquisition.
- The student is provided an opportunity to be a group leader in cooperative activities and group projects.
- Students will learn leadership skills including being an active group member, facilitating group interactions, teaching peers, encouraging group members, and sharing leadership responsibilities with others.
 - Successful leadership is demonstrated when students have learned the skills, concepts, and confidence of a leader.

SUBJECT: Proposed Revisions to Board Policies Relating to Students and

Instruction

This report provides the Board of Education with information on the need to revise existing Board Policies (BP) 5131 (Conduct); BP 5145.12 (Search and Seizure); BP 6146.1 (High School Graduation Requirements); BP 6164.4 (Identification and Evaluation of Individuals for Special Education); BP 6164.41 (Children with Disabilities Enrolled by Their Parents in Private School); and BP 6164.5 (Student Success Teams) as recommended by the California School Boards Association (CSBA) and to comply with Education Code and federal and state laws.

BP 5131 - Conduct

CSBA Update: October 2019 Last GUSD Update: November 2020

Staff is recommending the Board update Board Policy (BP) 5131 - Student Conduct to include language related to how staff will respond to and support students found to be using tobacco-based products including e-cigarettes and vapes. This will position the District to apply for a grant with the support of the American Heart Association that will provide additional resources to assist students in making healthy life choices around what they put into their bodies.

BP 5145. 12 - Search and Seizure

CSBA Update: June 2021 Last GUSD Update: April 2018 Glendale Unified School District Information Report No. 4 November 2, 2021 Page 2

Staff recommends that the Board update Board Policy (BP) 5145.12 to reflect a court decision upholding a school policy that called for limited searches without individualized suspicion if students left campus and returned in the middle of the day. The policy is also updated to reflect a law which places restrictions on searches of electronic devices such as cellular phones, a court decision regarding searches of lockers without individualized suspicion, and a court decision upholding the policy of random weapons screening with a handheld metal detector.

BP 6146.1 - High School Graduation Requirements

CSBA Update: September 2021 Last GUSD Update: May 2021

Staff recommends the Board update policy to reflect a new law (AB 104, 2021), which requires districts to exempt a student from district graduation requirements if the student was in the third or fourth year of high school during the 2020-21 school year and is not on track to graduate in four years, and to provide a student who was enrolled in the third or fourth year of high school during the 2020-21 school year and is not on track to graduate in the 2020-21 or 2021-22 school years the opportunity to complete the statewide coursework required for graduation, which may include, but is not limited to, completion of the coursework through a fifth year of instruction, credit recovery, or other opportunity to complete the required coursework.

BP 6164.4 - Identification and Evaluation of Individuals for Special Education

CSBA Update: September 2021 Last GUSD Update: August 2017

Staff recommends the Board update this policy to include the requirement to meet child find obligations.

BP 6164.41 - Children with Disabilities Enrolled by their Parents in Private School

CSBA Update: September 2021

Last GUSD Update: July 2014

Staff recommends the Board update the policy to reorganize and clarify material as it relates to who is responsible for the child find process for children with disabilities placed in private schools by their parent/guardian.

BP 6164.5 - Student Success Teams

CSBA Update: September 2021 Last GUSD Update: July 2014

Staff recommends the Board update Board Policy (BP) 6164.5 to reference that the student success team (SST) process reflects best practices; clarify those who are encouraged to collaborate in SSTs; include social and emotional difficulties when evaluating the strengths and needs of students and establishing interventions; emphasize the importance of each student maximizing their potential; specify who may refer students to SSTs; add types of materials appropriate for collection, analysis and review by the SST; provide for the development of a plan to support the student and adjustments to such plan; reflect that the SST process shall not delay or deny a referral for evaluation for eligibility for special education; reference interventions and the integration of SSTs with such supports; and add staff development, which may be provided to strengthen the effectiveness of SSTs.

The proposed revisions to these policies are presented to the Board for first reading. Should the consensus be to move forward, the policies will be on the November 16, 2021, meeting agenda for approval. Upon approval of the BPs, revisions will be made to the accompanying Administrative Regulations as needed following the normal District process.

Copies of the proposed revised BPs are attached to this memo.

The Board of Education believes that all students have the right to be educated in a safe and positive learning environment free from disruptions. Students shall be expected to exhibit appropriate conduct that does not infringe upon the rights of others or interfere with the school program while on school grounds, in a Distance Learning platform or virtual classroom setting (i.e., Google Classroom, Google Hangouts, Google Meets, Zoom, etc.), going to or coming from school, at school activities, or using District transportation.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each school site develops standards of conduct and discipline consistent with District policies and administrative regulations. Students and parents/guardians shall be notified of District and school rules related to conduct.

Prohibited student conduct includes but is not limited to:

- 1. Conduct that endangers students, staff, or others, including, but not limited to, physical violence, possession of a firearm or other weapon, and terrorist threats.
- 2. Discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying of students or staff, including sexual harassment, hate-motivated behavior, cyberbullying, hazing or initiation activity, extortion, or any other verbal, written, or physical conduct that causes or threatens to cause violence, bodily harm, or substantial disruption to the school program.
- 3. Conduct that disrupts the orderly classroom or school environment physical or virtual.
- 4. Willful defiance of staff's authority.
- 5. Damage to or theft of property belonging to the District, staff, or students.
- 6. Obscene acts or use of profane, vulgar, or abusive language.
- 7. Possession, use, or being under the influence of tobacco, alcohol, or other prohibited drugs.
- 8. Possession or use of a laser pointer, unless for a valid instructional or other school-related purpose with prior permission of the principal or designee. (Penal Code 417.27)
- 9. Use of a cell phone, smart watch, pager, or other mobile communication device during instructional time or in an unauthorized manner in violation of District policy.
- 10. Plagiarism or dishonesty on school work or tests.

- 11. Wearing of any attire that violates District or school dress codes, including gang-related apparel.
- 12. Tardiness or unexcused absence from school.
- 13. Failure to remain on school premises in accordance with school rules.

Employees are expected to enforce standards of conduct and, when they observe or receive a report of a violation of these standards, to appropriately intervene or seek assistance. As necessary, the employee shall refer the matter to a supervisor or the principal or designee.

When a school official suspects that a search of a student or student's belongings will turn up evidence of the student's violation of the law or school rules, such a search shall be conducted in accordance with BP/AR 5145.12 - Search and Seizure.

When a student uses any prohibited device, or uses a permitted device in an unauthorized manner, a District employee may confiscate the device. The employee shall store the device securely until it is returned to the student or turned over to the principal or designee, as appropriate.

Students who violate District or school rules and regulations may be subject to discipline including, but not limited to, suspension, expulsion, transfer to alternative programs, referral to a student success team or counseling services, or denial of participation in extracurricular or co-curricular activities or other privileges in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation. The Superintendent or designee shall notify local law enforcement as appropriate.

Students also may be subject to discipline, in accordance with law, Board policy, or administrative regulation, for any off-campus conduct during non-school hours which poses a threat or danger to the safety of students, staff, or District property, or substantially disrupts school activities.

Any violation involving possession or usage of tobacco or nicotine products shall result in: confiscation of tobacco products; notification of caregivers; the offer of information to the student about available tobacco education and/or cessation programs that are free or low-cost (e.g., through Medicaid or community partners), including nationally recognized *tobacco cessation programs*; facilitation of the enrollment of the student in an evidence-based tobacco cessation program if the student expresses an interest in quitting; and additional intervention as follows:

At the first violation involving possession or usage of tobacco products the following will occur:

• A *collaborative conversation* shall take place between the student and a designated staff member) to discuss:

- O What factors led to the violation, including information on student's tobacco product usage, possible triggers for use and knowledge of physical, social and emotional harm caused by tobacco.
- The policy's purpose, which is to protect students from the impacts of longterm commercial tobacco product use.
- O A verbal agreement on next steps between student and designated staff member.
- The student will be enrolled in an evidence-based tobacco education program as an alternative to suspension.
- The District shall designate a staff member to monitor the progress of the student found in violation of the policy.

Search and Seizure

The Board of Education is fully committed to promoting a safe learning environment and, to the extent possible, eliminating the possession and use of weapons, illegal drugs, and other controlled substances by students on school premises and at school activities. As necessary to protect the health and welfare of students and staff, and only as authorized by law, Board policy, and administrative regulation, school officials may search students, their property, and/or District property under their control and may seize illegal, unsafe, or otherwise prohibited items. School officials shall exercise discretion and use good judgement when conducting searches.

The Board urges that employees exercise discretion and good judgment. When conducting a search or seizure, employees shall act in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that staff who conduct student searches receive training regarding the requirements of the District's policy and administrative regulation and other legal issues, as appropriate.

A. <u>Individual Searches Searches Based on Individualized Suspicion</u>

- School officials may search any individual student, his/her the student's property, or District property under his/her the student's control when there is a reasonable suspicion that the search will uncover evidence that he/she the student is violating the law, Board policy, administrative regulation, or other rules of the District or the school. Reasonable suspicion shall be based on specific and objective facts that the search will produce evidence related to the alleged violation. The types of student property that may be searched by school officials include, but are not limited to, lockers, desks, purses, backpacks, student vehicles parked on District property, cellular phones, or other electronic communication devices.
- Any search of a student, his/her the student's property, or District property under his/her the student's control shall be limited in scope and designed to produce evidence related to the alleged violation. Factors to be considered by school officials when determining the scope of the search shall include the danger to the health or safety of students or staff, such as the possession of weapons, drugs, or other dangerous instruments, and whether the item(s) to be searched by school officials are reasonably related to the contraband to be found. In addition, school officials shall consider the intrusiveness of the search in light of the student's age, gender, and the nature of the alleged violation.

The types of student property that may be searched by school officials include, but are not limited to, lockers, desks, purses, backpacks, and student vehicles parked on District property.

A student's personal electronic device may be searched only if a school official, in good faith, believes that an emergency involving danger of death or serious physical injury to the student or others requires access to the electronic device information.

- Employees shall not conduct strip searches or body cavity searches of any student. (Education Code 49050)
- 4. Searches of individual students shall be conducted in the presence of at least two District employees.
- 5.—The principal or designee shall notify the parent/guardian of a student subjected to an individualized search as soon as possible after the search.

B. <u>Searches of Multiple Student Lockers and Desks</u>

- All student lockers and desks are the property of the District. The principal or designee may conduct a general inspection of school properties that are within the control of students, such as lockers and desks, on a regular, announced basis, with students standing by their assigned lockers or desks. Any items contained in a locker or desk shall be considered to be the property of the student to whom the locker or desk was assigned.
- 2. Any items contained in a locker or desk shall be considered to be the property of the student to whom the locker or desk was assigned.

C. <u>Use of Metal Detectors</u>

1. The Board believes <u>finds</u> that the presence of weapons in the schools threatens the District's ability to provide the safe and orderly learning environment to which District students and staff are entitled. The Board also <u>believes finds</u> that metal detector searches offer a reasonable means to keep weapons out of the schools and mitigate the fears of students and staff.

The Superintendent or designee shall use metal detectors at District schools as necessary to keep weapons out of schools and help provide a safe learning environment. He/she The

<u>Superintendent or designee</u> shall establish a plan to ensure that metal detector searches are conducted in a uniform and consistent manner.

D. <u>Use of Contraband Detection Dogs</u>

- 1. In an effort to keep the school site free of dangerous contraband, the District may use specially trained, nonaggressive dogs to sniff out and alert staff to the presence of substances prohibited by law or Board policy.
- The dogs may sniff the air around lockers, desks, or vehicles on District property or at District-sponsored events. Dogs shall not sniff within the close proximity of students or other persons and may not sniff any personal items on those persons without their consent individualized suspicion.

Instruction

High School Graduation Requirements

The Board of Education desires to prepare all students to successfully complete the high school course of study and obtain a diploma that represents their educational achievement and increases their opportunities for postsecondary education and employment.

- A. Minimum academic standards for a diploma of graduation from high schools in the Glendale Unified School District are as follows:
 - 1. Satisfactory completion of a minimum of two hundred and twenty (220) semester periods of credit earned in grades 9, 10, 11, and 12.
 - 2. Course Requirements

The following courses are required as part of the 220 semester credits taken in grades 9 through 12:

- a. English 4 years (40 credits), including Freshman and Sophomore English (Education Code 51225.3)
- b. Mathematics 20 credits Grades 9-12 including courses of study that include Integrated Math I and II Standards (Education Code 51225.3)

Integrated Math I and II courses successfully completed in grades 7 and or 8 can be used to meet this requirement. However, students are required to complete a minimum of 20 units of mathematics in grades 9-12 regardless of mathematics courses completed in grades 7 and 8. All students are encouraged to complete Integrated Math III and beyond to complete A-G requirements and be college and career ready.

c. Science – Requirements for the class of 2023 and prior years: 2 years (20 credits), including 1 year of Biological Science and 1 year of Physical Science (Education Code 51225.3)

Requirements beginning with the class of 2024: 3 years (30 credits), including 1 year of Living Earth, 1 year of Chemistry in the Earth System and 1 year of Physics of the Universe

d. Social Science - 3 years (30 credits), including 1 year World History, Culture and Geography, 1 year U.S. History, Culture and Geography, 1

semester American Government and Civics, and 1 semester Economics (Education Code 51225.3)

- e. World Languages/Languages other than English (LOTE)* 1 year (10 credits) OR Visual and Performing Arts (VAPA) 1 year (10 credits). A student who chooses to take one year of World Languages/LOTE to fulfill this requirement must also take at least one semester (5 credits) of VAPA (f).
 - * University of California A-G admission requirements include a minimum of 2 years of LOTE proficiency and 1 full year of VAPA credits.
- f. Visual and Performing Arts (VAPA)** 1 year (10 credits) VAPA course required unless fulfilled by "e" above or 1 year (10 credits) Career & Technical Education Course that qualifies as VAPA interdisciplinary art.
 - ** A CTE course must be approved as a University of California A-G "f" interdisciplinary art in order to fulfill the GUSD graduation and A-G requirement. To be counted towards meeting GUSD graduation requirements, a CTE course shall be aligned to the CTE model curriculum standards and framework adopted by the State Board of Education. (Education Code 51225.3)
- g. Career Preparation 1 semester (5 credits)

Beginning with the class of 2022, career preparation (5 credits) is no longer a GUSD graduation requirement.

- h. Health 1 semester (5 credits)
- i. Physical Education, unless the student has been otherwise exempted pursuant to other sections of the Education Code, 2 years (20 credits) (maximum of 40 semester credits applied toward graduation) (Education Code 51225.3)
- B. Because the prescribed course of study may not accommodate the needs of some students, the Board shall provide alternative means for the completion of prescribed courses in accordance with law.

High School Graduation Requirements

- C. Students in grade 12 shall be enrolled in at least five courses each semester. This requirement shall not apply to students enrolled in career and technical education programs, community college courses, independent study, continuation education classes, work experience education programs, and special education programs as designated by the individualized education program.
- D. Exemptions from District-Adopted Graduation Requirements

District students are required to complete graduation course requirements specified above, including the requirements imposed by Education Code 51225.3 and those adopted by the Board.

However, a foster youth, homeless student, former juvenile court school student, child of a military family, or migrant student who transfers into the District or between District schools any time after completing the second year of high school, or a newly arrived immigrant student who is in the third or fourth year of high school and is participating in a newcomer program, shall be exempted from any graduation requirements adopted by the Board that are in addition to statewide course requirements. This exemption shall not apply if the Superintendent or designee makes a finding that the student is reasonably able to complete the requirements in time to graduate by the end of the fourth year of high school.

Within 30 days of the transfer or of the commencement of participation in a newcomer program, as applicable, the Superintendent or designee shall notify any eligible student of the availability of the exemption and whether the student qualifies for it. (Education Code 51225.1)

If during the 2020-21 school year a student was in the third or fourth year of high school and is not on track to graduate in four years, the District shall exempt the student from any local graduation requirements adopted by the Board that are in addition to statewide course requirements specified in Education Code 51225.3. (Education Code 51225)

E. Additional Opportunities to Complete Required Coursework

The Superintendent or designee shall provide a student who was enrolled in the third or fourth year of high school during the 2020-21 school year and is not on track to graduate in the 2020-21 or 2021-22 school years the opportunity to complete the statewide coursework required for graduation, which may include, but is not limited to, completion of the coursework through a fifth year of instruction, credit recovery, or other opportunity to complete the required coursework. (Education Code 51225)

F. Retroactive Diplomas

Any student who completed grade 12 in the 2003-04 through 2014-15 school year and met all applicable graduation requirements other than the passage of the high school exit examination shall be granted a high school diploma. (Education Code 51413)

In addition, the District may retroactively grant high school diplomas to former students who: (Education Code 48204.4, 51430, 51440)

1. Departed California against their will while in grade 12 and did not receive a diploma because the departure interrupted their education, provided that they were in good academic standing at the time of the departure.

Persons may be considered to have departed California against their will if they were in custody of a government agency and were transferred to another state, were subject to a lawful order from a court or government agency that authorized their removal from California, were subject to a lawful order and were permitted to depart California before being removed from California pursuant to the lawful order, were removed or were permitted to depart voluntarily pursuant to the federal Immigration and Nationality Act, or departed due to other circumstances determined by the District that are consistent with the purposes of Education Code 48204.4.

In determining whether to award a diploma under these circumstances, the Superintendent or designee shall consider any coursework that may have been completed outside of the United States or through online or virtual courses.

2. Were interned by order of the federal government during World War II or who are honorably discharged veterans of World War II, the Korean War, or the Vietnam War, provided that they were enrolled in a District school immediately preceding the internment or military service and did not receive a diploma because their education was interrupted due to the internment or military service in those wars.

Deceased former students who satisfy these conditions may be granted a retroactive diploma to be received by their next of kin.

3. Are veterans who entered the military service of the United States while in grade 12 and who had satisfactorily completed the first half of the work required for grade

High School Graduation Requirements

12 in a District school.

4. Were in their senior year of high school during the 2019-20 school year, were in good academic standing and on track to graduate at the end of the 2019-20 school year as of March 1, 2020, and were unable to complete the statewide graduation requirements as a result of the COVID-19 crisis.

F. Honorary Diplomas

The Board may grant an honorary high school diploma to: (Education Code 51225.5)

- 1. An international exchange student who has not completed the course of study ordinarily required for graduation and who is returning to the home country following the completion of one academic school year in the District.
- 2. A student who is terminally ill.

The honorary diploma shall be clearly distinguishable from the regular diploma of graduation awarded by the District. (Education Code 51225.5)

Identification and Evaluation of Individuals for Special Education

The Board of Education recognizes the need to actively seek out and evaluate District residents from birth to age 21 who have disabilities in order to provide them with appropriate educational opportunities in accordance with state and federal law.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a comprehensive <u>child find</u> system that includes procedures for the identification, screening, referral, <u>assessment</u>, and regular and triennial assessment of individuals eligible for special education, as well as procedures for the planning, implementation, and review of the education and related services provided to such individuals. (Education Code 56301)

The District's identification procedures shall include <u>systematic</u> methods for utilizing referrals from parents/guardians, teachers, <u>agencies</u>, appropriate professionals, and <u>others other members of the public</u>, and shall be coordinated with school site procedures for referral of students whose needs cannot be met with modifications to the regular instructional program. (Education Code 56302)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians, in writing, of their rights related to identification, referral, assessment, instructional planning, implementation, and review, including the right to consent to any assessment concerning their child. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians of procedures for initiating a referral for assessment to identify individuals who need special education services. (Education Code 56301)

Special Education Local Plan Area

To meet the needs of students with exceptional needs as completely as possible, the District is a fully participating member of the Foothill Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA), with the Glendale Unified School District serving as the Responsible Local Agency (RLA).

The Foothill Special Education Local Plan, developed pursuant to the requirements of federal and state law, shall be submitted to the Glendale Unified School District Board of Education and other member District Boards for approval at times specified by the State Department of Education. The approved plan shall have the strength and status of policies and regulations of the District.

A copy of the plan for special education of the Foothill Special Education Local Plan Area shall be available for inspection in the Special Education Office at the Administration Center.

Children With Disabilities Enrolled By Their Parents In Private School

The Governing Board recognizes its obligations under federal and state law to identify, evaluate and provide equitable services to children voluntarily enrolled by their parents/guardians in private schools located within the district.

Pursuant to Education Code 56171 and 20 USC 1412(a)(3), districts, county offices of education, or SELPAs, as appropriate, are required to locate, identify, and evaluate all children with disabilities enrolled by their parents/guardians in private schools, including religious schools. 34 CFR 300.131 and 300.134 require the district, after a timely and meaningful consultation with private school representatives, to conduct a thorough "child find" process to determine the number of parentally-placed children with disabilities attending private schools located in the district, including those residing outside of the district or in another state. Pursuant to 34 CFR 300.131, the responsibility for "child find" is that of the district where the private school is located.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that activities to locate, identify, and evaluate children with disabilities enrolled by their parents/guardians in private schools within the district are comparable to activities undertaken for individuals with disabilities aged three to 22 in public schools within the district. (34 CFR 300.131; Education Code 56171)

The Superintendent or designee shall develop a budget for the provision of services to children with disabilities enrolled by their parents/guardians in private school based on the proportionate share of federal funds received and the number of eligible children, including the possibility of mid-year enrollees, and the types of services to be provided.

Student Success Teams

The Governing Board of Education encourages the collaboration of parents/guardians, teachers, resourcepersonnel, certificated and classified staff, administrators and students, as appropriate, in evaluating the strengths and needs of students having academic, attendance, social, emotional or behavioral difficulties and in identifying strategies and programs that may assist the such students in maximizing their potential. The Superintendent or designee shall establish student success teams (SST) as needed to address individual students' needs.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish and maintain a process for initiating referrals of students to the student success team SSTs, which may include referral by District staff, parents/guardians, and/or agency representatives. The Superintendent or designee may also establish and maintain a process for responding to SST referrals, which may include a determination by the District as to whether an SST shall be convened for an individual student.

Each SST may collect and analyze relevant student data, as appropriate. The SST may also review the student's educational history, work samples, strengths and areas for growth, and identify available resources and strategies.

Each student success team <u>SST</u> shall develop a plan to support the student which incorporates intervention strategies to assist the student. Such strategies may include changes in program placement or instructional methods, recommendation of supplemental educational services, parent involvement strategies, <u>social</u>, <u>emotional and/or</u> behavioral interventions, discipline, referrals to other agencies or resources, and/or other appropriate interventions.

The student success team <u>SST</u> shall monitor the student's progress, evaluate the extent to which the recommended strategies have been implemented, <u>make adjustments to the plan</u>, and develop additional interventions as needed.

The SST process shall not delay or deny a referral for evaluation for eligibility for special education, as may be required under state or federal law.

The Superintendent or designee may integrate SSTs into the District's multi-tiered system of support, including identification of students who need additional support, the level(s) of support, appropriate interventions, monitoring of progress, and whether the goal of intervention has been met.

To strengthen the effectiveness of SSTs, the Superintendent or designee may provide staff development in the identification of students who may need additional support, implementation of measurable and targeted interventions, and monitoring of progress and goal attainment.

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education adopt Resolution No. 7 –Recognizing a State of Emergency and Re-Authorizing Teleconferenced Meetings Pursuant to AB 361.

The report provides the Board of Education an opportunity to decide whether to reauthorize teleconference meetings pursuant to AB 361 for another 30 days. If the motion does not pass, the Board meetings will be open to the public and public comment will be received in-person. The Brown Act provisions regarding teleconference meetings will apply.

Background

On March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom proclaimed a State of Emergency because of the threat of COVID-19.

On March 17, 2020, Governor Newsom issued EO N-29-20 allowing local or state legislative bodies to hold meetings via teleconference and to make meetings accessible electronically without violating the open meeting laws found in the Brown Act.

On June 11, 2021, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-08-21, extending public agencies to hold teleconference meetings until September 30, 2021.

On September 16, 2021, Governor Newsom signed Assembly Bill 361 into law, effective immediately. The Bill amends the Ralph M. Brown Act to include new authorization for remote meetings, including remote public comment, for all local agencies. The new authorization, which largely extends the provisions of the Governor's Executive Order N-29-20 (signed March 17, 2020), is effective until January 1, 2024.

On September 28, 2021, Information Report No. 1 provided the Board of Education an opportunity to discuss the possibility of reopening the Board meetings to the public or continuing with virtual meetings pursuant to AB 361. Additionally, in accordance with Executive Order (EO) N-15-21, the Board of Education was asked to vote (Action Report No. 7) to determine, as a result of the

continuing pandemic, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees. The Board voted unanimously (5-0) that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.

At its meeting on October 12, 2021, Resolution No. 5 - Continuing Board of Education Authority to Hold Virtual Meetings Pursuant to AB 361- passed 5-0, reaffirming the Board's decision on September 28, 2021.

WHEREAS, on Sept. 16, 2021, Governor Newsom signed AB 361, which immediately amended the Brown Act allowing governing boards to continue holding virtual meetings outside the teleconferencing requirements of Government Code section 54953(b), if the board makes a finding that there is a proclaimed State of Emergency, and either (1) state or local officials have imposed or recommended social distancing measures, or (2) meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees due to the emergency; and

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom declared a statewide emergency arising from COVID-19 pursuant to Government Code section 8625; and

WHEREAS, on October 12, 2021 the governing board of the Glendale Unified School District passed Resolution 5 authorizing virtual board meetings for a 30-day period from October 12 to November 12, 2021, pursuant to AB 361.

WHEREAS, AB 361 requires governing boards to make findings every 30 days that the board has reconsidered the circumstances of the State of Emergency and that either the State of Emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person, or state or local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the recitals set forth above are true and correct and fully incorporated into this Resolution by reference.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the governing board of the Glendale Unified School District recognizes that a State of Emergency in the State of California continues to exist due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the governing board has reconsidered the circumstances of the State of Emergency and finds that COVID-19 continues to pose an imminent threat to the health and safety of the community and directly impacts the ability of the members to meet safety in person.

- 1. Services. The Consultant shall provide Class 1 DSA Project Inspection services to the Monte Vista New Modular CR Building Project, as further described in Exhibit "A," attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference ("Services").
- 2. Term. Consultant shall commence providing services under this Agreement on November 9, 2021 and will diligently perform as required and complete performance by November 9, 2022.
- 3. Submittal of Documents. The Consultant shall not commence the Services under this Agreement until the Consultant has submitted and the District has approved the certificate(s) and affidavit(s), and the endorsement(s) of insurance required as indicated below:

- 4. Compensation. District agrees to pay the Consultant for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement (as needed, as requested) a total fee not to exceed (NTE) One Hundred Eighteen Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$118,800.00) which includes reimbursable cost listed in item 5.1. District shall pay Consultant according to the following terms and conditions:
 - 4.1. Payment for the Work shall be made for all undisputed amounts based upon time and materials for not-to-exceed (NTE) fees referenced in Exhibit "A".
- 5. Expenses. District shall not be liable to Consultant for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by Consultant in performing services for District, except as follows:
 - 5.1. Not Applicable
- 6. Independent Contractor. Consultant, in the performance of this Agreement, shall be and act as an independent contractor. Consultant understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of the District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of the District and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Worker's Compensation. Consultant shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to Consultant's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, Consultant is

an independent contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and directing the performance of the details of the work, District being interested only in the results obtained.

- 7. Materials. Consultant shall furnish, at its own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement, except as follows:
 - 7.1. Not applicable.
- 8. Performance of Services.
 - 8.1. Standard of Care. Consultant represents that Consultant has the qualifications and ability to perform the Services in a professional manner, without the advice, control or supervision of District. Consultant's services will be performed, findings obtained, reports and recommendations prepared in accordance with generally and currently accepted principles and practices of its profession for services to California school Districts.

Consultant shall carefully study and compare all documents, findings, and other instructions and shall at once report to District, in writing, any error, inconsistency, or omission that Consultant or its employees may discover. Consultant shall have responsibility for discovery of errors, inconsistencies, or omissions.

- 8.2. Meetings. Consultant and District agree to participate in regular meetings on at least a monthly basis to discuss strategies, timetables, implementations of services, and any other issues deemed relevant to the operation of Consultant's performance of Services.
- 8.3. District Approval. The work completed herein must meet the approval of the District and shall be subject to the District's general right of inspection and supervision to secure the satisfactory completion thereof.
- 8.4. New Project Approval. Consultant and District recognize that Consultant's Services may include working on various projects for District. Consultant shall obtain the approval of District prior to the commencement of a new project.
- 9. Originality of Services. Except as to standard generic details, Consultant agrees that all technologies, formulae, procedures, processes, methods, writings, ideas, dialogue, compositions, recordings, teleplays and video productions prepared for, written for, or submitted to the District and/or used in connection with this Agreement, shall be wholly original to Consultant and shall not be copied in whole or in part from any other source, except that submitted to Consultant by District as a basis for such services.
- 10. Copyright/Trademark/Patent. Consultant understands and agrees that all matters produced under this Agreement shall become the property of District and cannot be used without District's express written permission. District shall have all right, title and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said matter in the name of the District. Consultant consents to use of Consultant's name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance and distribution of the matters, for any purpose and in any medium.
- 11. Audit. Consultant shall establish and maintain books, records, and systems of account, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, reflecting all business operations of Consultant transacted under this Agreement. Consultant shall retain these books, records, and systems of account during the Term of this Agreement and for five (5) years thereafter.

Consultant shall permit the District, its agent, other representatives, or an independent auditor to audit, examine, and make excerpts, copies, and transcripts from all books and records, and to make audit(s) of all billing statements, invoices, records, and other data related to the Services covered by this Agreement. Audit(s) may be performed at any time, provided that the District shall give reasonable prior notice to Consultant and shall conduct audit(s) during Consultant's normal business hours, unless Consultant otherwise consents.

12. Termination.

- 12.1. Without Cause By District. District may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Consultant only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by District shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by Consultant. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Consultant or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
- 12.2. Without Cause by Consultant. Consultant may, upon sixty (60) days notice, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement. Upon this termination, District shall only be obligated to compensate Consultant for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by Consultant shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services to District. Consultant acknowledges that this sixty (60) day notice period is acceptable so that the District can attempt to procure the Services from another source.
- 12.3. With Cause by District. District may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - 12.3.1. material violation of this Agreement by the Consultant; or
 - 12.3.2. any act by Consultant exposing the District to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - 12.3.3. Consultant is adjudged a bankrupt, Consultant makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of Consultant's insolvency.

Written notice by District shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within three (3) calendar days after that notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this Agreement shall upon the expiration of the three (3) calendar days cease and terminate. In the event of this termination, the District may secure the required services from another Consultant. If the expense, fees, and/or costs to the District exceed the cost of providing the service pursuant to this Agreement, the Consultant shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to the District upon the receipt of the District's notice of these expense, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to District.

13. Indemnification. To the furthest extent permitted by California law, Consultant shall defend, indemnify, and hold free and harmless the District, its Board of Education, agents, representatives, officers, consultants, employees, trustees, and volunteers ("the indemnified parties") from any and all claims, demands, causes of action, suits, actions, costs, expenses, judgments, liability, loss, damage or injury of any kind, nature and description, in law or equity ("Claim"), to property or persons including, but not limited to, personal injury, bodily injury, death, property damage, and consultants' and/or attorneys' fees and costs, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the negligence, recklessness, errors

or omissions, or willful misconduct of Consultant, its officials, officers, employees, subcontractors, consultants, or agents, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the performance of the Services, the Project, or this Agreement, including without limitation the payment of all consequential damages; or from any activity, work, or thing done, permitted, or suffered by the Consultant in conjunction with this Agreement, unless the claims are caused wholly by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the District. The District shall have the right to accept or reject any legal representation that Consultant proposes to defend the indemnified parties.

14. Insurance.

14.1. The Consultant shall procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the Services the following insurance with minimum limits equal to the amount indicated below.

- 14.1.1. Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability Insurance. Commercial General Liability Insurance and Any Auto Automobile Liability Insurance that shall protect the Consultant, the District, and the State from all claims of bodily injury, property damage, personal injury, death, advertising injury, and medical payments arising performing any portion of the Services. (Form CG 0001 and CA 0001, or forms substantially similar, if approved by the District.)
- 14.1.2. Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance. Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Services. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, the Consultant shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees. If any class of employee or employees engaged in performing any portion of the Services under this Agreement are not protected under the Workers' Compensation Statute, adequate insurance coverage for the protection of any employee(s) not otherwise protected must be obtained before any of those employee(s) commence performing any portion of the Services.
- 14.1.3. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions). Professional Liability Insurance as appropriate to the Consultant's profession.
- 14.2. Proof of Carriage of Insurance. The Consultant shall not commence performing any portion of the Services until all required insurance has been obtained and certificates indicating the required coverage have been delivered in duplicate to the District and approved by the District. Certificates and insurance policies shall include the following:

- 14.2.1. A clause stating: "This policy shall not be canceled or reduced in required limits of liability or amounts of insurance until notice has been mailed to the District, stating date of cancellation or reduction. Date of cancellation or reduction shall not be less than thirty (30) days after date of mailing notice."
- 14.2.2. Language stating in particular those insured, extent of insurance, location and operation to which insurance applies, expiration date, to whom cancellation and reduction notice will be sent, and length of notice period.
- 14.2.3. An endorsement stating that the District and its Board of Education, agents, representatives, employees, trustees, officers, consultants, and volunteers are named additional insured under all policies except Workers' Compensation Insurance, Professional Liability, and Employers' Liability Insurance. An endorsement shall also state that Consultant's insurance policies shall be primary to any insurance or self-insurance maintained by District. An endorsement shall also state that there shall be a waiver of any subrogation.
 - 14.2.4. All policies except the Professional Liability, Workers' Compensation Insurance, and Employers' Liability Insurance Policies shall be written on an occurrence form.
- 14.3. Acceptability of Insurers. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A: VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the District.
- 15. Assignment. The obligations of the Consultant pursuant to this Agreement shall not be assigned by the Consultant.
- 16. Compliance with Laws. Consultant shall observe and comply with all rules and regulations of the governing board of the District and all federal, state, and local laws, ordinances and regulations. Consultant shall give all notices required by any law, ordinance, rule and regulation bearing on conduct of the Work as indicated or specified. If Consultant observes that any of the Work required by this Contract is at variance with any such laws, ordinance, rules or regulations, Consultant shall notify the District, in writing, and, at the sole option of the District, any necessary changes to the scope of the Work shall be made and this Contract shall be appropriately amended in writing, or this Contract shall be terminated effective upon Consultant's receipt of a written termination notice from the District. If Consultant performs any work that is in violation of any laws, ordinances, rules or regulations, without first notifying the District of the violation, Consultant shall bear all costs arising therefrom.
- 17. Certificates/Permits/Licenses. Consultant and all Consultant's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such certificates, permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of Services pursuant to this Agreement.
- 18. Employment with Public Agency. Consultant, if an employee of another public agency, agrees that Consultant will not receive salary or remuneration, other than vacation pay, as an employee of another public agency for the actual time in which services are actually being performed pursuant to this Agreement.
- 19. Anti-Discrimination. It is the policy of the District that in connection with all work performed under Contracts there be no discrimination against any employee engaged in the work because of race, color, ancestry, national origin, religious creed, physical disability, medical condition, marital status, sexual orientation, gender, or age and therefore the Consultant agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code

- Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and District policy. In addition, the Consultant agrees to require like compliance by all of its subcontractor(s).
- 20. Fingerprinting of Employees. The Fingerprinting/Criminal Background Investigation Certification must be completed and attached to this Agreement prior to Consultant's performing of any portion of the Services.
- 21. No Rights in Third Parties. This Agreement does not create any rights in, or inure to the benefit of, any third party except as expressly provided herein.
- 22. District's Evaluation of Consultant and Consultant's Employees and/or Subcontractors. The District may evaluate the Consultant in any way the District is entitled pursuant to applicable law. The District's evaluation may include, without limitation:
 - 22.1. Requesting that District employee(s) evaluate the Consultant and the Consultant's employees and subcontractors and each of their performance.
 - 22.2. Announced and unannounced observance of Consultant, Consultant's employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s).
- 23. Limitation of District Liability. Other than as provided in this Agreement, District's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall District be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.
- 24. Confidentiality. The Consultant and all Consultant's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services. Consultant understands that student records are confidential and agrees to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement.
- 25. Notice. Any notice required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be deemed to have been given, served, and received if given in writing and either personally delivered or deposited in the United States mail, registered or certified mail, acknowledged email, postage prepaid, return receipt required, or sent by overnight delivery service, or facsimile transmission, addressed as follows:

Any notice sent by overnight delivery service shall be effective the business day next following delivery thereof to the overnight delivery service. Any notice given by mail shall be effective three (3) days after deposit in the United States mail.

- 26.Integration/Entire Agreement of Parties. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties.
- 27. California Law. This Agreement shall be governed by and the rights, duties and obligations of the Parties shall be determined and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California. The Parties further agree that any action or proceeding brought to enforce the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall be maintained in the county in which the District's administrative offices are located.
- 28. Waiver. The waiver by either party of any breach of any term, covenant, or condition herein contained shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such term, covenant, condition, or any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant, or condition herein contained.
- 29. Severability. If any term, condition or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will nevertheless continue in full force and effect, and shall not be affected, impaired or invalidated in any way.
- 30. Provisions Required By Law Deemed Inserted. Each and every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted in this Contract shall be deemed to be inserted herein and this Contract shall be read and enforced as though it were included therein.
- 31. Authority to Bind Parties. Neither party in the performance of any and all duties under this Agreement, except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, has any authority to bind the other to any agreements or undertakings.
- 32.Attorney Fees/Costs. Should litigation be necessary to enforce any terms or provisions of this Agreement, then each party shall bear its own litigation and collection expenses, witness fees, court costs and attorney's fees.
- 33. Captions and Interpretations. Paragraph headings in this Agreement are used solely for convenience, and shall be wholly disregarded in the construction of this Agreement. No provision of this Agreement shall be interpreted for or against a party because that party or its legal representative drafted such provision, and this Agreement shall be construed as if jointly prepared by the Parties.
- 34. Calculation of Time. For the purposes of this Agreement, "days" refers to calendar days unless otherwise specified.
- 35. Signature Authority. Each party has the full power and authority to enter into and perform this Agreement, and the person signing this Agreement on behalf of each Party has been properly authorized and empowered to enter into this Agreement.
- 36. Counterparts. This Agreement and all amendments and supplements to it may be executed in counterparts, and all counterparts together shall be construed as one document.
- 37. Incorporation of Recitals and Exhibits. The Recitals and each exhibit attached hereto are hereby incorporated herein by reference.

ARTICLE 1

CONSULTANT'S SERVICES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

The Consultant agrees to further the interests of the OWNER by furnishing the Consultant's and its Associates' skill and judgment in cooperation with, and in reliance upon, the services of the OWNER's Staff. The Consultant agrees to provide the OWNER with Certified Project Inspector Consulting Services in connection with OWNER's construction, modernization and/or rehabilitation projects, District-wide for whatever Projects designated by the District.

- 1.1 SCOPE OF CONSULTANT's SERVICES

 Basic--Services. The Consultant will act as an independent contractor performing the following tasks on a continuous basis as required by the OWNER and as defined in the ICA.
- 1.2 FEE STRUCTURE: Refer to Article 3.
- 1.3 Consultant Responsibilities Consultant and its Associates shall provide and perform, per DSA Regulations and California Title 24, PROJECT INSPECTOR services for Construction Projects under this agreement.
- 1.4 COMMUNICATIONS: All communications shall be copied to the OWNER and/or its authorized representative. Only the OWNER and/or its authorized representative, as designated, will have the authority to establish priorities and request the Consultant's additional services.

ARTICLE 2

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF WORK

- 2.1 RESPONSIBILITIES / QUALIFICATIONS / STATUS OF CONSULTANT
- 2.1.1 The Consultant and its Associates shall be subject to the approval of the *OWNER*, and Design Professional, and to meet the requirements of and obtain the approval of the Regulatory Agency.
- 2.1.2 Consultant and its Associates must meet the qualifications for on-site Project Inspector as provided in the State Building Code Part 1, Title 24 Section 4 Article 5.
- 2.1.3 The Consultant represents and maintains that the Consultant and its Associates are skilled in the professional calling necessary to perform all services, duties and obligations required by this agreement to fully and adequately complete the Project. The Consultant and its Associates shall perform the services and duties in conformance to and consistent with the standards generally recognized as being employed by professionals in the same discipline in the State of California. The Consultant further represents and warrants to the OWNER that it has all licenses, permits, qualifications, insurance policies, and approvals of whatever nature are legally required to practice its profession. The Consultant and its Associates further warrant that all such licenses and approvals will remain in effect during the term of this Agreement.
- 2.1.4 Designation of Inspector. Consultant designates _______ (or another District approved, DSA Project Inspector) as the Inspector who will provide and perform PROJECT INSPECTOR Services during construction of the Project(s). Consultant shall provide all necessary Project Inspector(s) and Assistant(s) to the Project Inspector as required by the Regulatory Agency or indicated by the condition or status of Project construction and to comply with applicable laws or regulations. Billing per Article 3.

- 2.1.5 The OWNER retains the Consultant on an Independent Contractor basis and the Consultant is not an employee of the OWNER. Personnel performing the Services under this Agreement on behalf of the Consultant shall at all times be reportable and responsible to the Consultant, the Regulatory Agency, the Design Professional and the OWNER.
- 2.1.6 Inspector Fees. The Consultant shall pay all amounts due such personnel in connection with their performance for services and as required by law. The Consultant, as applicable, shall be responsible for all reports and obligations respecting such personnel, including but not limited to, social security taxes, income tax withholdings, unemployment insurance, and workers' compensation insurance
- 2.2 CONSULTANT STAFF:
- a. The Consultant has been selected to perform the work herein because of the skills and expertise of key individuals.
- b. The designated Inspector, _______ (or another approved Inspector), and any other additional Certified Inspectors as may be subsequently approved by the OWNER and the Regulatory Agency in the required classification with the individual approved Inspectors shall remain so long as his/her performance continues to be required by and acceptable to the OWNER. Additionally, the Consultant must furnish the names, for approval by the OWNER, of all key people in Consultant's firm that will be associated with the Project.
- c. Consultant will be responsible to provide appropriate and approved temporary Inspection Personnel in the event of a temporary vacancy by the assigned Project Inspector. Any such Temporary Personnel will be approved in advance, whenever possible, by the OWNER, the Regulatory Agency and the Design Professional.
- d. All Consultant Personnel provided under this Agreement shall be subject to approval by the OWNER and the Regulatory Agency. Any changes in personnel from the individual(s) initially provided by Consultant shall require OWNER's and Regulatory Agency's approval.
- e. Changes in Inspection Personnel, directed or requested by either the OWNER or Consultant shall require 10 days written notice to the other party. Replacement Inspection Personnel shall meet all the approval requirements of this Agreement.
- f. If the assigned individual(s) fail to perform to the satisfaction of the OWNER or the Regulatory Agency, then, upon written notice, the Consultant will have ten (10) working days to remove that person from the Project and replace with one acceptable to the same.
- g. If the assigned individual is removed for cause at the owners request the removal and replacement shall be as immediate as reasonably possible.
- 2.3 OWNER's RIGHTS: The OWNER reserves the right to employ other Consultants in connection with the Project, or to perform work related to the Project with the OWNER's own forces. The Consultant shall notify the OWNER if any such independent action will in any way compromise the Consultant's responsibilities under this Agreement.
- RESPONSIBILITIES OF OWNER: The OWNER shall provide the Consultant with documented project information in its possession, which is reasonably necessary for the Consultant's performance of the work described herein. The OWNER shall designate a representative as the Consultant's primary contact for all project information; the representative shall be responsible for examining all documents submitted by the Consultant and shall render decisions and additional information in a prompt and effective manner as required to support the project.
- 2.4 TERMINATION; SUSPENSION
- 2.4.1 Per the provisions of the ICA except that notices may be given and received through confirmed email.
- 2.4.3 Design Professional / Regulatory Agency Approval. If either the Design Professional or the Regulatory Agency shall not approve the specified Associate to provide Project Inspector Services for Project construction, this Agreement shall be

- deemed terminated without further rights or obligations of the OWNER or Consultant hereunder. Unless the OWNER shall have directed Consultant's performance prior to the Project Architect and the Regulatory Agency approval of the Project Inspector, no part of the Contract Price shall be due Consultant if Consultant is not approved to provide Project Inspector Services by the Project Architect or the Department of General Services.
- 2.4.4 OWNER Suspension. The OWNER may direct suspension of Project construction and suspension of Consultant's services hereunder, given ten (10) days notice. If the OWNER so suspends the work, the Consultant reserves the right to place the assigned Inspectors on other sites and does not guarantee the return of any previously assigned personnel, perhaps thereby necessitating the submittal and subsequent approval of different Project Inspection personnel.
- 2.8 TIME SCHEDULE
- 2.8.1 Time is of the essence in this Agreement.
- a. The Consultant shall begin its services a minimum of one week in advance of project commencement or when the Notice to Proceed is issued to the Contractor from OWNER or its' Representative, whichever is first, and will continue until satisfactory completion and closeout of the project(s) or termination of Consultant's services or as otherwise directed by the owner.
- b. The Consultant shall diligently complete all appropriate tasks in cooperation with the OWNER, all Contractors, the Architect/Engineer, and Construction Manager, if any, in a timely manner. Additional billable time required to be expended by the Project Inspector shall be approved in advance by the party so designated to approve any additional expenditures.

ARTICLE 3

COMPENSATION AND PAYMENT (Hourly)

- 3.1 DESCRIPTION: The Consultant shall be paid a Hourly fee as set forth below. The amount to be paid to the Consultant, as prescribed herein, shall be the total compensation for services in the performance of the work described in this agreement, except as described below. Reimbursables shall be billed as agreed to in advance.
- 3.2 FEE DATA: Total compensation due and to be paid for Basic Services under this Agreement shall not exceed the amounts set forth in Article 3. Regular Time fees are based on full time services Monday through Saturday, or as required, as prescribed by 209 BUILDING STANDARDS ADMINISTRATIVE CODE (Part 1, Title 24, C.C.R. Section 4-211). The compensation for a project requiring a Class 1 Inspector shall be \$90.00 per hour per Project Inspector. A Class 2 Inspector shall be N/A per hour per Project Inspector.

Fees for inspection services will be determined by the cumulative number of business work hours days in any day minus any of the following recognized holidays: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, July 4th, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, day after Thanksgiving, and Christmas Day.

'Hourly Compensation' is defined as the appropriate compensation rate for the class of inspector as dictated by the DSA approved plans. Any change from the above must be by the GUSD Administrator, Facilities or Project Manager prior to performing service.

3.2.1 OVERTIME: Shall be deemed acceptable when the inspector works on any holidays listed in 3.2 above, works more than 10 hours in one day, or hours on a Sunday to accommodate the contractor's schedule. The compensated rate of pay will be 1½ times the hourly rate shown on the compensation schedule listed above. Alternatively, subject to the approval of the GUSD Project Manager, the inspector can schedule time off so that inspector's absence will not cause a significant detrimental impact on the project.

ARTICLE 4

SCOPE OF DSA INSPECTOR'S SERVICES:

The PROJECT INSPECTOR's services shall include, but not be limited to the following tasks as described in the DSA IR 8A:

- A. Provide inspection services to ensure compliance with code, plans, specifications and quality assurance required of an educational facility. Issue Deviation or Correction Notices, as necessary, and notify the Design Professional, the OWNER, and/or Construction Manager as the OWNER's Representative, in writing, if observed work does not conform to contract document.
- B. Inspect and verify that **Contractor's As**-Built record documents are updated monthly prior to processing of Contractor's monthly payment request.
- C. Maintain liaison with the Design Professional, the Construction Manager, if any, the Testing Lab, the OWNER and other regulatory agencies and governing bodies as necessary to maintain project continuity.
- D. Submit or make available on a timely basis, a semi-monthly report to the Architect, with copies to DSA, the owner and Construction Manager, if any, generally including the following information:
 - 1. Activities performed by the Contractors, and areas where work is performed.
 - 2. Manpower assigned to each Contractor and Subcontractor.
 - 3. Weather conditions.
 - 4. Observed equipment and materials delivered to the site.
 - 5. Construction equipment and vehicles utilized.
 - 6. Nature and location of the work being performed (starting and completion dates for various portions of the work).
 - 7. Verbal instruction to the Inspector.
 - 8. Inspection by representative of regulatory agency.
 - 9. Note observed occurrences or conditions that might affect Contract Sum or Contract Time.
 - 10. List visitors to the site, titles, and reason for visit.
 - 11. Record any work or material in place that does not correspond with the drawings or specifications, as well as resulting action taken.
 - 12.List any other problems or abnormal occurrences that arise during each day, including notations of any particular lack of activity on the part of the Contractor. Note corrective actions taken.
- E. PROJECT INSPECTOR shall comply with all federal, state, county and local governmental requirements, as applicable.
- F. **Review and monitor Contractor's** construction methods and procedures during all construction activities, including earthwork, concrete placement, masonry erection, welding procedures, all finishes, electrical, mechanical, fire alarm, etc. The Consultant or their Associates shall not issue instructions or directions regarding methods or means of

- job performance to the Contractor or in any way assume responsibility for the work performed.
- G. When possible, attend meetings as requested in contract documents and requested by OWNER, i.e., billing meetings, specification review meetings, coordination meetings, weekly progress meetings, pre-roofing meetings, etc.
- H. Assist the Construction Manager and OWNER in scheduling all required tests, and testing laboratory visitations required by the Contract documents. Observe and record dates and times of all test procedures.
- Inspect, verify and document Contractor's delivered equipment and materials to insure that they meet submittal and specification requirements. Such inspection must begin within 1 working day of Contractor's written notification to the Inspector of delivery of equipment or materials to the job site. The Contractor is responsible for providing identifying paperwork and documentation for all delivered materials and equipment supplied to the job.
- J. Submit, upon request by the Architect and/or the Construction Manager, in a timely manner, an Inspector's Report reviewing a Contractor's Request for Information (RFI), whenever any corrective change is perceived necessary in field construction that will result in a variance from the drawings or specifications as originally issued.
- K. **Review the Contractor's Payment** Requests at billing meetings.
- L. **When the Contractor's work** or a designated portion thereof is substantially complete, prepare for the OWNER a list of incomplete or unsatisfactory items via a "punch list" and submit to the Architect and the Construction Manager.
- M. Assist the OWNER in the review of Contractor's Submittals, upon request.
- N. Upon completion of project, deliver hard copies of all inspection records and project correspondence to the OWNER.
- O. Prior to commencement of work, PROJECT INSPECTOR will cooperate with the OWNER and Construction Manager to develop an inspection plan for the construction on and of the Schools.

OTHER REQUIREMENTS:

Facilities and Equipment:

- P. The OWNER will provide:
 - 1. An on-site separate, secure, uniquely lockable office (Note that although the following requirements are frequently in the District's contract with the Contractor, the Inspection Team does not contract with the Contractor. We request the District to enforce its Contract provisions with the Contractor.)
- Q. The Consultant will provide:
 - 1. A functional computer system and printer.
 - 2. All required code and reference data.
 - 3. A telephone and telephone answering machine.
 - 4. Reasonable office supplies.

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education approve Independent Consultant Agreement No. 631 with Converse Consultants for the Monte Vista Elementary School New Building Project's specialty inspection services in the amount of \$145,480, funded by Measure S funds.

On May 19, 2020, the Board approved a new project and budget allocation of \$12,700,000 for the Monte Vista Elementary School New Building project.

In support of the construction of this project at Monte Vista Elementary School, Planning & Development staff obtained a proposal from Converse Consultants to provide specialty inspection services for the project. Convers Consultants' proposal to provide these services is for a not-to-exceed amount of \$145,480. This agreement represents 1.15% of the total project costs, and is included in the approved project budget.

This project is funded by Measure S – Monte Vista Elementary School New Building Project funds. The Superintendent's Facility Advisory Committee voted to support this recommendation.

TO SUPPORT 2021-22 BOARD PRIORITY NO. 4: Maintain District Financial Responsibility – Ensure the fiscal health of the District; implement a fiscal plan to preserve the District resources; plan for the District's future educational and facility needs.

INDEPENDENT CONSULTANT AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES Geotechnical and Testing services at Monte Vista

Professional Service Number: 631

This Independent Consultant Agreement for Acoustical Consulting Profile Services ("Agreement") is made and entered into as of the 3rd day of November, 2021 by and between the Glendale Unified School District, ("District") and Converse Consultants ("Consultant"), (together, "Parties").

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

- 1. Services. The Consultant shall provide Acoustical Consulting services as further described in Exhibit "A," attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference ("Services").
- 2. Term. Consultant shall commence providing services under this Agreement on November 9th, 2021 and will diligently perform as required and complete performance by August 31st, 2022.
- 3. Submittal of Documents. The Consultant shall not commence the Services under this Agreement until the Consultant has submitted and the District has approved the certificate(s) and affidavit(s), and the endorsement(s) of insurance required as indicated below:

- 4. Compensation. District agrees to pay the Consultant for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement (as needed, as requested) a total fee not to exceed (NTE) One Hundred Forty-Five Thousand, Four Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$145,480.00) which includes reimbursable cost listed in item 5.1. District shall pay Consultant according to the following terms and conditions:
 - 4.1. Payment for the Work shall be made for all undisputed amounts based upon lump sum fees referenced in Exhibit "A".
- 5. Expenses. District shall not be liable to Consultant for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by Consultant in performing services for District, except as follows:
 - 5.1. Travel and instrumentation use charges estimated to be no more than \$250.00.
- 6. Independent Contractor. Consultant, in the performance of this Agreement, shall be and act as an independent contractor. Consultant understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of the District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of the District and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Worker's Compensation. Consultant shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to

Consultant's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, Consultant is an independent contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and directing the performance of the details of the work, District being interested only in the results obtained.

- 7. Materials. Consultant shall furnish, at its own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement, except as follows:
 - 7.1. Not applicable.
- 8. Performance of Services.
 - 8.1. Standard of Care. Consultant represents that Consultant has the qualifications and ability to perform the Services in a professional manner, without the advice, control or supervision of District. Consultant's services will be performed, findings obtained, reports and recommendations prepared in accordance with generally and currently accepted principles and practices of its profession for services to California school Districts.

Consultant shall carefully study and compare all documents, findings, and other instructions and shall at once report to District, in writing, any error, inconsistency, or omission that Consultant or its employees may discover. Consultant shall have responsibility for discovery of errors, inconsistencies, or omissions.

- 8.2. Meetings. Consultant and District agree to participate in one meeting to review findings and recommendations.
- 8.3. District Approval. The work completed herein must meet the approval of the District and shall be subject to the District's general right of inspection and supervision to secure the satisfactory completion thereof.
- 8.4. New Project Approval. Consultant and District recognize that Consultant's Services may include working on various projects for District. Consultant shall obtain the approval of District prior to the commencement of a new project.
- 9. Originality of Services. Except as to standard generic details, Consultant agrees that all technologies, formulae, procedures, processes, methods, writings, ideas, dialogue, compositions, recordings, teleplays and video productions prepared for, written for, or submitted to the District and/or used in connection with this Agreement, shall be wholly original to Consultant and shall not be copied in whole or in part from any other source, except that submitted to Consultant by District as a basis for such services.
- 10. Copyright/Trademark/Patent. Consultant understands and agrees that final documents produced under this Agreement shall become the property of District following final payment and cannot be used without District's express written permission. District shall have all right, title and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said matter in the name of the District. Consultant consents to use of Consultant's name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance and distribution of the matters, for any purpose and in any medium.
- 11.Audit. Consultant shall establish and maintain books, records, and systems of account, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, reflecting all business operations of Consultant transacted under this Agreement. Consultant shall retain these books, records,

and systems of account during the Term of this Agreement and for five (5) years thereafter. Consultant shall permit the District, its agent, other representatives, or an independent auditor to audit, examine, and make excerpts, copies, and transcripts from all books and records, and to make audit(s) of all billing statements, invoices, records, and other data related to the Services covered by this Agreement. Audit(s) may be performed at any time, provided that the District shall give reasonable prior notice to Consultant and shall conduct audit(s) during Consultant's normal business hours, unless Consultant otherwise consents.

12. Termination.

- 12.1. Without Cause By District. District may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Consultant only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by District shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by Consultant. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Consultant or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner. The District shall not use documents produced under this Agreement following any termination that was not caused by the Consultant default.
- 12.2. Without Cause by Consultant. Consultant may, upon sixty (60) days notice, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement. Upon this termination, District shall only be obligated to compensate Consultant for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by Consultant shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services to District. Consultant acknowledges that this sixty (60) day notice period is acceptable so that the District can attempt to procure the Services from another source.
- 12.3. With Cause by District. District may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - 12.3.1. material violation of this Agreement by the Consultant; or
 - 12.3.2. any act by Consultant exposing the District to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - 12.3.3. Consultant is adjudged a bankrupt, Consultant makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of Consultant's insolvency.

Written notice by District shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within three (3) calendar days after that notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this Agreement shall upon the expiration of the three (3) calendar days cease and terminate. In the event of this termination, the District may secure the required services from another Consultant. If the expense, fees, and/or costs to the District exceed the cost of providing the service pursuant to this Agreement, the Consultant shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to the District upon the receipt of the District's notice of these expense, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to District.

13.Indemnification. To the extent permitted by California law, Consultant shall indemnify, and hold harmless but shall have no obligation to defend the District, its Board of Education, representatives, officers, and employees, trustees, and volunteers ("the indemnified parties") from liability from damages or injury, to property or persons including, but not limited to, personal injury, bodily injury, death, property damage, to the extent actually caused by the

negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct of Consultant, its officials, officers, employees, subcontractors, consultants, or agents, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the performance of the Services, the Project, or this Agreement, unless the claims are caused by the negligence or willful misconduct of the District or any third party.

14.Insurance.

14.1. The Consultant shall procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the Services the following insurance with minimum limits equal to the amount indicated below.

- 14.1.1. Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability Insurance. Commercial General Liability Insurance and Hired and Non-Owned Auto Automobile Liability Insurance that shall protect the Consultant, the District, and the State from all claims of bodily injury, property damage, personal injury, death, advertising injury, and medical payments arising performing any portion of the Services. (Form CG 0001 and CA 0001, or forms substantially similar, if approved by the District.)
- 14.1.2. Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance. Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Services. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, the Consultant shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees. If any class of employee or employees engaged in performing any portion of the Services under this Agreement are not protected under the Workers' Compensation Statute, adequate insurance coverage for the protection of any employee(s) not otherwise protected must be obtained before any of those employee(s) commence performing any portion of the Services.
- 14.1.3. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions). Professional Liability Insurance as appropriate to the Consultant's profession.
- 14.2. Proof of Carriage of Insurance. The Consultant shall not commence performing any portion of the Services until all required insurance has been obtained and certificates indicating the required coverage have been delivered in duplicate to the District and approved by the District. Certificates and insurance policies shall include the following:

- 14.2.1. A clause stating: "This policy shall not be canceled until notice has been mailed to the District, stating date of cancellation. Date of cancellation shall not be less than thirty (30) days after date of mailing notice."
- 14.2.2. Language stating in particular those insured, extent of insurance, location and operation to which insurance applies, expiration date, to whom cancellation notice will be sent, and length of notice period.
- 14.2.3. An endorsement stating that the District and its Board of Education, agents, representatives, employees, trustees, officers, consultants, and volunteers are named additional insured under all policies except Workers' Compensation Insurance, Professional Liability, and Employers' Liability Insurance. An endorsement shall also state that Consultant's insurance policies shall be primary to any insurance or self-insurance maintained by District. An endorsement shall also state that there shall be a waiver of any subrogation.
 - 14.2.4. All policies except the Professional Liability, Workers' Compensation Insurance, and Employers' Liability Insurance Policies shall be written on an occurrence form.
- 14.3. Acceptability of Insurers. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A: VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the District.
- 15. Assignment. The obligations of the Consultant pursuant to this Agreement shall not be assigned by the Consultant. Mutual written consent tis required for assignment by either party.
- 16.Compliance with Laws. Consultant shall exercise due professional care to observe and comply with applicable rules and regulations of the governing board of the District and all federal, state, and local laws, ordinances and regulations. Consultant shall give all notices required by any law, ordinance, rule and regulation bearing on conduct of the Work as indicated or specified. If Consultant observes that any of the Work required by this Contract is at variance with any such laws, ordinance, rules or regulations, Consultant shall notify the District, in writing, and, at the sole option of the District, any necessary changes to the scope of the Work shall be made and this Contract shall be appropriately amended in writing, or this Contract shall be terminated effective upon Consultant's receipt of a written termination notice from the District. If Consultant performs any work that is in violation of any laws, ordinances, rules or regulations, without first notifying the District of the violation, Consultant shall bear all costs arising therefrom.
- 17. Certificates/Permits/Licenses. Consultant and all Consultant's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such certificates, permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of Services pursuant to this Agreement.
- 18. Employment with Public Agency. Consultant, if an employee of another public agency, agrees that Consultant will not receive salary or remuneration, other than vacation pay, as an employee of another public agency for the actual time in which services are actually being performed pursuant to this Agreement.
- 19.Anti-Discrimination. It is the policy of the District that in connection with all work performed under Contracts there be no discrimination against any employee engaged in the work because of race, color, ancestry, national origin, religious creed, physical disability, medical condition, marital status, sexual orientation, gender, or age and therefore the Consultant agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not

limited to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and District policy. In addition, the Consultant agrees to require like compliance by all of its subcontractor(s).

- 20. Fingerprinting of Employees. The Fingerprinting/Criminal Background Investigation Certification must be completed and attached to this Agreement prior to Consultant's performing of any portion of the Services.
- 21. No Rights in Third Parties. This Agreement does not create any rights in, or inure to the benefit of, any third party except as expressly provided herein.
- 22. District's Evaluation of Consultant and Consultant's Employees and/or Subcontractors. The District may evaluate the Consultant in any way the District is entitled pursuant to applicable law. The District's evaluation may include, without limitation:
 - 22.1. Requesting that District employee(s) evaluate the Consultant and the Consultant's employees and subcontractors and each of their performance.
 - 22.2. Announced and unannounced observance of Consultant, Consultant's employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s).
- 23.Limitation of District Liability. Other than as provided in this Agreement, District's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall either party be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.
- 24. Confidentiality. The Consultant and all Consultant's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services except for disclosures that are required for Consultant to provide services or are required by law. Consultant understands that student records are confidential and agrees to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement.
- 25. Notice. PlayPower LT Farmington, Inc. at Edison Elementary School

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education approve the purchase and installation of playground equipment and fall zone material with PlayPower LT Farmington, Inc. by using the Sourcewell National contract, Contract No. 030117-LTS for the Edison Elementary School kinder playground in the amount of \$280,657.46, plus a \$30,000 allowance.

Glendale Unified School District is a member of Sourcewell (formerly National Joint Powers Alliance, NJPA) which is a national cooperative purchasing group. Sourcewell awarded the contract for the purchase and installation of Little Tikes Commercial Play Systems and SofSurfaces Premium Tile fall zone material to PlayPower LT Farmington, Inc.

Staff is recommending the approval to use the Sourcewell contract #030117-LTS awarded to PlayPower LT Farmington, Inc. for the purchase and installation of new Little Tikes Commercial Play Systems and SofSurfaces Premium Tile fall zone material. Pursuant to California Public Contract Code 10298, a school district or public agency can use a cooperative purchasing agreement for the purchase and installation of equipment without further competitive bidding if it is in the district's best interest. PlayPower LT Farmington, Inc. uses only certified, factory-trained installers for the installation of this playground equipment and fall zone material, which will insure student safety and warranty of this equipment.

The total amount for purchase and installation at the Edison Elementary School kinder playground is \$280,657.46. An allowance of \$30,000 will be given on the project for unforeseen rocks and underground utilities, for a total project cost of \$310,657.46. This also includes the removal and disposal of existing playground equipment at the school site. This project will be funded by Measure S – Safety and Security, Phase 2 funds. The Superintendent's Facility Advisory Committee voted to support this recommendation.

HVAC Replacement Project

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education approve Independent Consultant Agreement No. 633 with HED for architectural and engineering services at the Rosemont Middle School HVAC replacement project in the amount of \$198,000, funded by COVID-19 funds.

Following the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, Planning and Development staff completed assessments of ventilation systems throughout the District to ensure they are properly functioning. Staff was made aware of the HVAC systems at the Rosemont Middle School 6000 building that were in need of replacement. The replacement of these systems is required to maintain healthy air quality and circulation to combat the spread of COVID-19.

Due to the scope of work on the project, the District will need to have architectural plans generated and obtain DSA approval prior to moving forward. Staff is recommending that the Board approve Independent Consultant Agreement No. 633 with HED in the amount of \$198,000 to provide architectural and engineering services for the Rosemont Middle School HVAC Replacement Project. This project is funded by COVID-19 funds.

INDEPENDENT CONSULTANT AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES Architecture Services @ Rosemont HVAC Replacement

This Independent Consultant Agreement for Professional Services ("Agreement") is made and entered into as of the 3rd day of November, 2021 by and between the Glendale Unified School District, ("District") and HED ("Consultant"), (together, "Parties").

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

- 1. Services. The Consultant shall provide Architectural services as further described in Exhibit "A," attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference ("Services").
- 2. Term. Consultant shall commence providing services under this Agreement on <u>November 3</u>, <u>2021</u> and will diligently perform as required and complete performance by <u>August 19</u>, <u>2022</u>.
- 3. Submittal of Documents. The Consultant shall not commence the Services under this Agreement until the Consultant has submitted and the District has approved the certificate(s) and affidavit(s), and the endorsement(s) of insurance required as indicated below:

- 4. Compensation. District agrees to pay the Consultant for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement (as needed, as requested) a total fee not to exceed (NTE) One Hundred Ninety-Eight Thousand Dollars (\$198,000.00) which includes reimbursable cost listed in item 5.1. District shall pay Consultant according to the following terms and conditions:
 - 4.1. Payment for the Work shall be made for all undisputed amounts based upon time and materials for not-to-exceed (NTE) fees referenced in Exhibit "A".
- 5. Expenses. District shall not be liable to Consultant for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by Consultant in performing services for District, except as follows:
 - 5.1. Not Applicable
- 6. Independent Contractor. Consultant, in the performance of this Agreement, shall be and act as an independent contractor. Consultant understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of the District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of the District and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Worker's Compensation. Consultant shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to Consultant's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, Consultant is an independent contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and

directing the performance of the details of the work, District being interested only in the results obtained.

- 7. Materials. Consultant shall furnish, at its own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement, except as follows:
 - 7.1. Not applicable.
- 8. Performance of Services.
 - 8.1. Standard of Care. Consultant represents that Consultant has the qualifications and ability to perform the Services in a professional manner, without the advice, control or supervision of District. Consultant's services will be performed, findings obtained, reports and recommendations prepared in accordance with generally and currently accepted principles and practices of its profession for services to California school Districts.
 - Consultant shall carefully study and compare all documents, findings, and other instructions and shall at once report to District, in writing, any error, inconsistency, or omission that Consultant or its employees may discover. Consultant shall have responsibility for discovery of errors, inconsistencies, or omissions.
 - 8.2. Meetings. Consultant and District agree to participate in regular meetings on at least a monthly basis to discuss strategies, timetables, implementations of services, and any other issues deemed relevant to the operation of Consultant's performance of Services.
 - 8.3. District Approval. The work completed herein must meet the approval of the District and shall be subject to the District's general right of inspection and supervision to secure the satisfactory completion thereof.
 - 8.4. New Project Approval. Consultant and District recognize that Consultant's Services may include working on various projects for District. Consultant shall obtain the approval of District prior to the commencement of a new project.
- 9. Originality of Services. Except as to standard generic details, Consultant agrees that all technologies, formulae, procedures, processes, methods, writings, ideas, dialogue, compositions, recordings, teleplays and video productions prepared for, written for, or submitted to the District and/or used in connection with this Agreement, shall be wholly original to Consultant and shall not be copied in whole or in part from any other source, except that submitted to Consultant by District as a basis for such services.
- 10. Copyright/Trademark/Patent. Consultant understands and agrees that all matters produced under this Agreement shall become the property of District and cannot be used without District's express written permission. District shall have all right, title and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said matter in the name of the District. Consultant consents to use of Consultant's name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance and distribution of the matters, for any purpose and in any medium.
- 11. Audit. Consultant shall establish and maintain books, records, and systems of account, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, reflecting all business operations of Consultant transacted under this Agreement. Consultant shall retain these books, records, and systems of account during the Term of this Agreement and for five (5) years thereafter.

Consultant shall permit the District, its agent, other representatives, or an independent auditor to audit, examine, and make excerpts, copies, and transcripts from all books and records, and to make audit(s) of all billing statements, invoices, records, and other data related to the Services covered by this Agreement. Audit(s) may be performed at any time, provided that the District shall give reasonable prior notice to Consultant and shall conduct audit(s) during Consultant's normal business hours, unless Consultant otherwise consents.

12. Termination.

- 12.1. Without Cause by District. District may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Consultant only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by District shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by Consultant. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Consultant or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
- 12.2. Without Cause by Consultant. Consultant may, upon sixty (60) days notice, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement. Upon this termination, District shall only be obligated to compensate Consultant for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by Consultant shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services to District. Consultant acknowledges that this sixty (60) day notice period is acceptable so that the District can attempt to procure the Services from another source.
- 12.3. With Cause by District. District may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - 12.3.1. material violation of this Agreement by the Consultant; or
 - 12.3.2. any act by Consultant exposing the District to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - 12.3.3. Consultant is adjudged a bankrupt, Consultant makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of Consultant's insolvency.

Written notice by District shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within three (3) calendar days after that notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this Agreement shall upon the expiration of the three (3) calendar days cease and terminate. In the event of this termination, the District may secure the required services from another Consultant. If the expense, fees, and/or costs to the District exceed the cost of providing the service pursuant to this Agreement, the Consultant shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to the District upon the receipt of the District's notice of these expense, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to District.

13. Indemnification. To the furthest extent permitted by California law, Consultant shall defend, indemnify, and hold free and harmless the District, its Board of Education, agents, representatives, officers, consultants, employees, trustees, and volunteers ("the indemnified parties") from any and all claims, demands, causes of action, suits, actions, costs, expenses, judgments, liability, loss, damage or injury of any kind, nature and description, in law or equity ("Claim"), to property or persons including, but not limited to, personal injury, bodily injury, death, property damage, and consultants' and/or attorneys' fees and costs, directly or

indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the negligence, recklessness, errors or omissions, or willful misconduct of Consultant, its officials, officers, employees, subcontractors, consultants, or agents, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the performance of the Services, the Project, or this Agreement, including without limitation the payment of all consequential damages; or from any activity, work, or thing done, permitted, or suffered by the Consultant in conjunction with this Agreement, unless the claims are caused wholly by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the District. The District shall have the right to accept or reject any legal representation that Consultant proposes to defend the indemnified parties.

14. Insurance.

14.1. The Consultant shall procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the Services the following insurance with minimum limits equal to the amount indicated below.

- 14.1.1. Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability Insurance. Commercial General Liability Insurance and Any Auto Automobile Liability Insurance that shall protect the Consultant, the District, and the State from all claims of bodily injury, property damage, personal injury, death, advertising injury, and medical payments arising performing any portion of the Services. (Form CG 0001 and CA 0001, or forms substantially similar, if approved by the District.)
- 14.1.2. Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance. Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Services. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, the Consultant shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees. If any class of employee or employees engaged in performing any portion of the Services under this Agreement are not protected under the Workers' Compensation Statute, adequate insurance coverage for the protection of any employee(s) not otherwise protected must be obtained before any of those employee(s) commence performing any portion of the Services.
- 14.1.3. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions). Professional Liability Insurance as appropriate to the Consultant's profession.
- 14.2. Proof of Carriage of Insurance. The Consultant shall not commence performing any portion of the Services until all required insurance has been obtained and certificates

indicating the required coverage have been delivered in duplicate to the District and approved by the District. Certificates and insurance policies shall include the following:

- 14.2.1. A clause stating: "This policy shall not be canceled or reduced in required limits of liability or amounts of insurance until notice has been mailed to the District, stating date of cancellation or reduction. Date of cancellation or reduction shall not be less than thirty (30) days after date of mailing notice."
- 14.2.2. Language stating in particular those insured, extent of insurance, location and operation to which insurance applies, expiration date, to whom cancellation and reduction notice will be sent, and length of notice period.
- 14.2.3. An endorsement shall also state that there shall be a waiver of any subrogation.
 - 14.2.4. All policies except the Professional Liability, Workers' Compensation Insurance, and Employers' Liability Insurance Policies shall be written on an occurrence form.
- 14.3. Acceptability of Insurers. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A: VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the District.
- 15. Assignment. The obligations of the Consultant pursuant to this Agreement shall not be assigned by the Consultant.
- 16. Compliance with Laws. Consultant shall observe and comply with all rules and regulations of the governing board of the District and all federal, state, and local laws, ordinances and regulations. Consultant shall give all notices required by any law, ordinance, rule and regulation bearing on conduct of the Work as indicated or specified. If Consultant observes that any of the Work required by this Contract is at variance with any such laws, ordinance, rules or regulations, Consultant shall notify the District, in writing, and, at the sole option of the District, any necessary changes to the scope of the Work shall be made and this Contract shall be appropriately amended in writing, or this Contract shall be terminated effective upon Consultant's receipt of a written termination notice from the District. If Consultant performs any work that is in violation of any laws, ordinances, rules or regulations, without first notifying the District of the violation, Consultant shall bear all costs arising therefrom.
- 17. Certificates/Permits/Licenses. Consultant and all Consultant's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such certificates, permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of Services pursuant to this Agreement.
- 18. Employment with Public Agency. Consultant, if an employee of another public agency, agrees that Consultant will not receive salary or remuneration, other than vacation pay, as an employee of another public agency for the actual time in which services are actually being performed pursuant to this Agreement.
- 19. Anti-Discrimination. It is the policy of the District that in connection with all work performed under Contracts there be no discrimination against any employee engaged in the work because of race, color, ancestry, national origin, religious creed, physical disability,

medical condition, marital status, sexual orientation, gender, or age and therefore the Consultant agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and District policy. In addition, the Consultant agrees to require like compliance by all of its subcontractor(s).

- 22. District's Evaluation of Consultant and Consultant's Employees and/or Subcontractors. The District may evaluate the Consultant in any way the District is entitled pursuant to applicable law. The District's evaluation may include, without limitation:
 - 22.1. Requesting that District employee(s) evaluate the Consultant and the Consultant's employees and subcontractors and each of their performance.
 - 22.2. Announced and unannounced observance of Consultant, Consultant's employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s).
- 23. Limitation of District Liability. Other than as provided in this Agreement, District's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall District be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.
- 24. Confidentiality. The Consultant and all Consultant's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services. Consultant understands that student records are confidential and agrees to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement.
- 25. Notice. Any notice required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be deemed to have been given, served, and received if given in writing and either personally delivered or deposited in the United States mail, registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt required, or sent by overnight delivery service, or facsimile transmission, addressed as follows:

Any notice personally given or sent by facsimile transmission shall be effective upon receipt. Any notice sent by overnight delivery service shall be effective the business day next following delivery thereof to the overnight delivery service. Any notice given by mail shall be effective three (3) days after deposit in the United States mail.

- 26.Integration/Entire Agreement of Parties. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties.
- 27. California Law. This Agreement shall be governed by and the rights, duties and obligations of the Parties shall be determined and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California. The Parties further agree that any action or proceeding brought to enforce the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall be maintained in the county in which the District's administrative offices are located.
- 28. Waiver. The waiver by either party of any breach of any term, covenant, or condition herein contained shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such term, covenant, condition, or any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant, or condition herein contained.
- 29. Severability. If any term, condition or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will nevertheless continue in full force and effect, and shall not be affected, impaired or invalidated in any way.
- 30. Provisions Required By Law Deemed Inserted. Each and every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted in this Contract shall be deemed to be inserted herein and this Contract shall be read and enforced as though it were included therein.
- 31. Authority to Bind Parties. Neither party in the performance of any and all duties under this Agreement, except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, has any authority to bind the other to any agreements or undertakings.

- 34. Calculation of Time. For the purposes of this Agreement, "days" refers to calendar days unless otherwise specified.

- 35. Signature Authority. Each party has the full power and authority to enter into and perform this Agreement, and the person signing this Agreement on behalf of each Party has been properly authorized and empowered to enter into this Agreement.
- 36. Counterparts. This Agreement and all amendments and supplements to it may be executed in counterparts, and all counterparts together shall be construed as one document.
- 37. Incorporation of Recitals and Exhibits. The Recitals and each exhibit attached hereto are hereby incorporated herein by reference.

1. Week of the School Administrator

The second week in October is recognized as the "Week of the School Administrator." The Board recognized the important role our school administrators play in helping our students succeed. Additionally, Congressman Adam Schiff, Supervisor Kathryn Barger, Senator Anthony Portantino, Assembly Member Laura Freidman, Mayor Paula Devine, and CV Town Council President Harry Leon presented certificates in recognition of our outstanding school leaders.

2. National Merit Scholarship Corporation Announces High School Student Semifinalists

Students in 11th grade entered the academic competition by taking the 2020 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. The Board of Education recognized the nine semifinalists: Abdullah Ahmed and Matthew Keshishian from Clark Magnet High; Miriam Awan, Ellena Kim, Nathan Kim, David Yoon Kim and Seon-Jae Yoon from Crescenta Valley High; Lilly Armstrong from Glendale High; and Sarine Mardirosian from Hoover High. Students will compete for a share of 7,500 scholarships worth nearly \$30 million. Winners will be announced nationally between April and July 2022.

3. PBIS Gold Award

The Board of Education recognized Hoover High School for receiving the PBIS Gold Award from the California PBIS Coalition.

STUDENT BOARD MEMBER REPORT

Student Board Member Brandon Doronila reported on activities and events happening at the schools around the District. On October 26 is our Student Voice Panel via Zoom. The SAC met to determine topics: Engagement, health and safety, school spirit, and sense of belonging. This week, each high school will select the panelists. Last week, he met with the CSBA validator for the Golden Bell Award. All of our high schools are having homecoming events. Proof of vaccinations or negative COVID testing will be required to attend the events. Last Thursday, over 600 students attended the virtual college fair. He spoke about students wanting off-campus lunch and students wanting police officers to patrol the campuses in the morning. In the morning, parents drive very aggressively, so having officers patrolling the area will benefit the schools' campuses. He wants everyone to be safe. They want to focus on learning not focus on reckless drivers.

PUBLIC COMMUNICATIONS

1. <u>Elizabeth Vitanza</u>, parent, said it is exhausting to have to continue to make public comments supporting our teachers and curriculum in response to the ongoing, outside agitation about Critical Race Theory in GUSD. It is frustrating to see the same misinformed anti-CRT commenters week after week, none of whom appear to actually have children enrolled in GUSD schools. If you are not hearing from the vast majority of GUSD parents who support anti-racist, inclusive teaching and learning in our schools, that is because we are too busy. We are the parents helping our kids get to school safely, fundraising, etc. Our principals are working 10 hours days and weekends. Our GUSD teachers remind our children how to be good citizens and to treat their peers with dignity. Are the anti-CRT people calling in to every GUSD Board meeting actually doing the day-to-day work of supporting the students they are so worried about by volunteering at the schools?

PUBLIC COMMUNICATIONS (Continued)

- 2. <u>Deborah Pasachoff</u> thanked Dr. Ekchian and the Board for their ongoing commitment to Culturally Relevant & Responsive Education and for providing a safe place for all of our students. She read a passage from the book, "Change Sings A Children's Anthem," by Amanda Gorman and illustrated by Loren Long. The vast majority of parents respects and appreciates what the district is doing.
- 3. <u>Jordan Henry</u>, parent, requested that GUSD sponsor a public forum with a diverse panel to include parents and teachers who prefer and reject Critical Race Theory. It can be a community event. Let us put the restorative justice model to work. The tax paying residents of Glendale deserve an unbiased dialogue. He commented on Ms. Alicia Harris and Mr. Conrad Pruitt's statements at the last board meeting. He thanked them for being honest about their preference for CRT and Marxism.
- 4. <u>Ingrid Gunnell</u>, parent, thanked Dr. Ekchian for responding to her email request about the football game coming up. She spoke about the Women's Studies adoption on the agenda. She is pleased. The goal of Women's Studies is to provide students with the skills and knowledge necessary to think critically about the diverse experiences of women around the world. This includes the intersection of race, class, gender, and other areas of one's identify. She is looking forward to the Board adopting this course. She is happy that the State of California requires students to take Ethnic Studies to graduate from high school.
- 5. <u>David Anthony</u>, spoke about Critical Race Theory (CRT). CRT is not being taught in our schools; anti-racists are being taught. Yet we are inundated with calls that CRT is taught in our schools. Is this going to end? This is a movement by right wing activists. It came out of Seattle with Mr. Chris Rufo. Days later, he is on the Tucker Carlson Show and now we have to deal with this. It is a waste of our time. Can the Board limit the discussion about something that is not real? It is crazy having to deal with this with all that is going on.
- 6. <u>Dorit Waldman</u> said the Learning for Justice materials has not been appropriately vetted. Some of the materials are inappropriately sexual in nature. Learning for Justice states that their recommended book list is "a good starting place for educators who need to diversify their curricula and classroom libraries." One of the elementary school book on the reading list is called, "Sex is a Funny Word." Another book is called "Gender Queer." She recited excerpts from both of these books. This curriculum is inappropriate and a violation of parental rights. We must immediately remove Learning for Justice materials from the GUSD.
- 7. Alison McCann, parent, spoke about comments made at the previous Board meeting regarding the recommendation that GUSD discontinue the use of Learning for Justice materials. Chris Davis said it seemed like an ad for FAIR, and the ship has sailed regarding the choice of supplemental learning materials. We recommend other materials on civil rights and race relations. The Board is elected to represent the public. Busy parents trust the Board with curriculum, which is not political in nature or indoctrinate our students to be racists or Marxists. The Board has violated that trust. The Learning for Justice curriculum is a total waste since the Board members

were derelict in their duties to properly vet these materials. It is very likely that the Board does not understand what they have authorized in the LFJ curriculum.

8. Angie Vroom Givant, parent, said since the last time she spoke, she was lucky to have educators from our district talking about their considerable professional experience. Within hours of this public comment, Jordan Henry shared videos of their statements to an online forum in an attempt to disparage them. These tactics mirrors campus actions. Our teachers and students need to be protected from this well-documented, well-funded ideological assault. This is a nationwide attempt to try to walk pass the progress and implement fear in committing to inclusive education supporting students and individuals of all identities. The underlining agenda is to defund public education and to funnel money to charter private schools. The organization FAIR has been named check and understanding who serves on their advisory board provides some idea to their agenda. Members of their advisory board members include Samantha Harris, Peter Boghossian, Megyn Kelly, and Christopher Rufo.

Mr. Krikorian spoke about his trip to Armenia visiting schools. It appears the whole world is on edge. Everyone has different views and opinions. It is also evident in our Public Communication sessions. However, everyone has the right to voice their opinions without being ridiculed. He will be reaching out to some teachers to learn more about some of our courses.

Mrs. Freemon said she is enjoying seeing the fall sports and seeing students on campus. The Glendale High Aquatic Center has created a wonderful environment for our students for water sports and supporting each other. Homecoming is coming up. She is very excited that we approved the Women's Studies course. Our students will have access to a higher level, critical thinking type of class that will prepare them for college and provide an understanding of themselves, their values, and the world around them. It is an elective for our high school students who are ready for this college level-type work. This week, we have been told that we have officially endorsed Marxism and CRT, which she is disputing. What we are seeing is the simple fact that our schools are taking a view of history that is inclusive. We are

making a concerted effort to make sure that the many voices who make up America is heard. This is being equitable. She teaches 8th grade history and is proud of the work we have done in this district. It is disappointing to see that it is being viewed as something negative. They do have an agenda to undermine public education. She applauds the work of our teachers and looks forward to continuing this work as we move forward.

Ms. Nahabedian said we live in a democracy and have critical conversations. Part of democracy is being well informed. To repeat, we appreciate those participating in public communications who are talking about facts. The fact is that in 2020, we created the Culturally Relevant & Responsive Education (CRRE) working group. which met multiple times. In working together, we came up with the curriculum needed in GUSD. We are teaching history, teaching it clearly and relevant for our students. We will continue to do so in preparing our students for college and career. The Women's Studies course is an elective course. Because we shifted our schedules in middle and high schools, we have the opportunity to provide additional electives. A year ago, that was not possible. We are growing our elective courses. We will be able to give students the skills to think critically about diverse experiences around the world, and be able to reflect on one's own identity. She attended the Five Star Coalition meeting. GUSD's commitment to provide free COVID tests on all campuses is unique in comparison to other districts. If you like humor, check out the SNL Board of Education meeting video. It is important to laugh.

<u>Dr. Gharpetian</u> spoke about the Cloud Computing Family Night at GHS. It's an innovative program. She thanked the Glendale Educational Foundation for hosting the State of the Schools virtual event. She participated in the CSBA validation visit for our Student Voice Panel program. It was an amazing experience to hear current and former students speak about how it impacted them. She was very proud of our students who participated. When some city and county officials post on social media their attendance at a huge gala where they are not wearing masks, it sends conflicting messages. If indoor masking is mandated for everyone, then it's for everyone. As Board members, we must hear from all of our constituents. If you are a parent or community member, you have the right to be heard. Let us keep conversations respectful. Our next Student Voice Panel is scheduled for October 26, 5 p.m. and will be held virtually.

Mr. Sahakian said he loves public communication because it is an open forum for members of our community to share their thoughts. We also have the responsibility to correct false information especially when there is an intent to harm and to spread lies in our community. When we talk about CRRE, we went through an entire process engaging the school community. This particular working group was brought together in such an inclusive way. Everyone was welcome to join and participate. We intentionally made it inclusive. From that process, many positive recommendations were considered. He is excited for GHS for the electives they are offering. Again, it is another opportunity for our students. In public comment, he has heard more about Marxism than he has heard in his 12-years of education. The

<u>Dr. Ekchian</u> said she wants everyone to know that our curriculum committees carefully study our core and supplemental curriculum. It is not randomly selected. We have come a long way in addressing implicit and explicit bias in our school system and curriculum. As Superintendent, she has a responsibility to address it. It is not an easy task. We should be proud of that instead of shying away from it.

SUBJECT: Approval of Services Agreement between Glendale Unified

School District and SWUN Math

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education approve a Services Agreement between Glendale Unified School District and SWUN Math in the amount of \$40,000 for professional development and coaching/support for staff at Columbus Elementary School.

Glendale Unified School District, in partnership with SWUN Math, will offer four content and instructional-based professional development and monthly coaching/support for teachers and site administrators at Columbus Elementary School to increase student achievement in mathematics. SWUN Math will utilize pacing guides to promote and support instruction of Common Core Standards as well as grade level alignment. Math benchmark, unit, and fluency assessments are also provided for each site teacher. SWUN Math will provide all teacher manuals/materials only.

The contract period runs from November 20, 2021, to June 10, 2022. The cost for the tutoring services funded out of Columbus Elementary School's Title III funds is \$40,000.

SERVICES AGREEMENT

This Agreement for Professional Services ("Agreement") made and entered into by and between the Glendale Unified School District ("District"), a public entity, and SWUN MATH ______, herein after referred to as ("Contractor").

The Parties do hereby contract and agree as follows:

1. Term

Contractor shall commence providing services under this Agreement on or about November 20 and will diligently perform as required and complete performance by June 10, 2022.

2. Scope of Services

To increase student achievement in mathematics.

Contractor's specific program and services performed is described in "Scope of Work" attached hereto as Addendum A and fully incorporated herein.

3. Compensation

District agrees to pay the Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement a set for in Addendum A "Scope of Work." District shall pay Contractor the amount set forth in Addendum B "Cost Proposal" according to the following terms and conditions:\$40,000.00

Invoices should be submitted to Accounts Payable Department, Glendale Unified School District, 223 N. Jackson Street, Glendale, CA 91206.

4. Expenses

District shall not be liable to Contractor for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by Contractor in performing services for District that are not specifically identified in Addendum B "Cost Proposal" and factored into the compensation paid by the District to the Contractor.

5. Materials

Contractor shall furnish, at its own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement.

6. Independent Contractor

In the performance of this Agreement, Contractor shall be and act as an independent contractor. Contractor understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of the District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided to employees of the District and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. Contractor shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to Contractor's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, Contractor is an independent contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and directing the performance of the

details of the work, District being interested only in the results obtained.

7. Joint Employer

Neither Party shall be deemed a joint employer of the other Party's employees. Each Party shall indemnify the other Party from and against claims made by the indemnifying Party's employees that they are co-employed by the other Party. The indemnification requirements set forth in paragraph 11 shall be applicable to the indemnification obligations of each Party under this paragraph. Neither Party's employees will be deemed "leased" employees of the other for any purpose. In connection with this Agreement, each Party is an independent contractor and does not have any authority to bind or commit the other.

8. Contractor's Employee Processing

- Employee Eligibility Verification: The Contractor warrants that it fully complies with all (i) Federal and State statutes and regulations regarding the employment of aliens and others and that all its employees performing work under this Contract meet the citizenship or alien status requirement set forth in Federal statutes and regulations. The Contractor shall obtain, from all employees performing work hereunder, all verification and other documentation of employment eligibility status required by Federal or State statutes and regulations including, but not limited to, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, 8 U.S.C. §1324 et seq., as they currently exist and as they may be hereafter amended. The Contractor shall retain all such documentation for all covered employees for the period prescribed by the law. The Contractor shall indemnify, defend with counsel approved in writing by District, and hold harmless, the District, its agents, officers, and employees from employer sanctions and any other liability which may be assessed against the Contractor or the District or both in connection with any alleged violation of any Federal or State statutes or regulations pertaining to the eligibility for employment of any persons performing work under this Contract.
- (ii) Fingerprinting and Criminal Background Check: Contractor shall complete the background check requirements of California Education Code section 45125.1 for all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students. The Contractor shall not staff the program with any employees who have been convicted of a violent felony listed in California Penal Code section 1192.7(c). The Contractor shall provide the District with fingerprinting/criminal background check for all employees who will be used to staff the program.
- (iii) Tuberculosis Clearance: Contractor will ensure that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students are determined to be free of active tuberculosis by a medical professional. Contractor shall submit documentation to the District verifying that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites are determined to be free of active tuberculosis.
- (iv) COVID-19 Vaccination Status and Periodic Testing: Contractor will ensure that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites with students have been fully vaccinated for COVID-19. Contractor shall submit documentation to the District verifying that all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites have received the complete COVID-19 vaccination within two weeks prior to starting to provide services at a District school site. Contractor further will require all of its employees who will be working on the District's school sites to participate in regular COVID-19 testing in compliance with the District's current testing protocols. Contractor's employees can either participate in the District on-site testing program wherein the District will directly receive testing results or seek testing on their own and furnish their

test results to Contractor which upon receipt will immediately notify the District of the results.

9. Conduct on District Premises

Contractor shall, at all times, comply with and abide by all reasonable policies and procedures of the District (or that may be established thereby, from time to time) that pertain to conduct on the District's premises, possession or distribution of contraband, or the access to, and security of. the District's real property or facilities, to the extent that the Contractor has been provided with a copy of each such policy or procedure. Contractor shall exercise due care and diligence to prevent any injury to persons or damage to property while on the District's premises. The operation of vehicles by the Contractor's personnel on the District's property shall conform to posted and other applicable regulations and safe-driving practices. Vehicular accidents occurring on the District's property and involving either Party's personnel shall be reported promptly to the appropriate Party. Each Party covenants that at all times during the term it, and its employees, agents, and Subcontractors shall comply with, and take no action that results in the other Party being in violation of, any applicable federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, regulations, and rules. Each Party's personnel shall clearly identify themselves as the appropriate Party's personnel and not as employees of the other Party. When on the District's premises, Contractor's personnel shall wear and clearly display identification badges or tags, as approved by the District. Contractor's employees shall not smoke or use profanity or other inappropriate language while on site. Contractor's employees shall not enter the facility while under the influence of alcohol, drugs or other intoxicants and shall not have such materials in their possession. Contractor's employees shall plan their activities to minimize the number of times they must enter and exit a facility. Contractor's personnel should transport all tools, equipment and materials needed for the day at the start of the work period and restrict all breaks to the absolute minimum.

10. Anti-Discrimination

District programs, activities, practices shall be free from discrimination based on race, color, ancestry, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital or parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity or expression, or genetic information; the perception of one or more of such characteristics; or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics and therefore the Contractor agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and District policy. In addition, the Contractor agrees to require like compliance by all of its subcontractor(s).

11. Indemnification

To the furthest extent permitted by California law, Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold free and harmless the District, its Board of Education, agents, representatives, officers, contractors, employees, trustees, and volunteers ("the Indemnified Parties") from any and all claims, demands, causes of action, suits, actions, costs, expenses, judgments, liability, loss, damage or injury of any kind, nature and description, in law or equity ("Claim"), to property or persons including, but not limited to, personal injury, bodily injury, death, property damage, and Contractors' and/or attorneys' fees and costs, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the negligence, recklessness, errors or omissions, or willful misconduct of Contractor, its officials, officers, employees, subcontractors, Contractors, or agents, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the performance of the Services, the Project, or this Agreement, including without limitation the payment of all consequential

damages; or from any activity, work, or thing done, permitted, or suffered by the Contractor in conjunction with this Agreement, unless the claims are caused wholly by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the District. The District shall have the right to accept or reject any legal representation that Contractor proposes to defend the Indemnified Parties.

12. Limitation of District Liability

Other than as provided in this Agreement, the District's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall the District be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.

13. Confidentiality

The Contractor and all Contractor's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services. Contractor understands that student records are confidential and agrees to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement.

Both Parties will maintain in confidence and safeguard all confidential information, as defined in this paragraph, of the other Party, it affiliates, and its customers. "Confidential Information" means any information that is marked or otherwise identified as confidential or proprietary at the time of disclosure or by law, and includes but is not limited to, trade secrets, know-how, inventions, techniques, data, customers list, personal information, financial information, sales, and marketing plans of the other Party, its affiliates, or its customers. Both Parties recognize and acknowledge the confidential and proprietary nature of any Confidential Information and acknowledge the irreparable harm that could result if such confidential information is disclosed to a third Party or used for unauthorized purposes. Each Party agrees to use any Confidential Information only for the purpose of conducting business with each other and their clients in the manner contemplated by this Agreement. Both Parties will restrict disclosure of any Confidential Information to only those personnel who have a need to know and will bind such personnel to obligations of confidentiality to the same extent that each Party is bound by this Agreement. Upon request of the owner of the confidential information, the other Party will promptly return or destroy all materials incorporating any Confidential Information and any copies. The obligation under this paragraph do not apply to information that: 1) is or becomes generally known or in the public domain through no act or omission of the other Party; 2) was lawfully in Insight's or Client's possession without restriction as to use or disclosure before its receipt from the other Party; 3) is received from, or was made available to, a third Party without any obligation of confidentiality; 4) was independently developed; 5) is otherwise permitted to be disclosed under this Agreement; 6) is disclosed with the prior written consent of the disclosing Party; or 7) is required to be disclosed in any civil or criminal legal proceeding, regulatory proceeding or any similar process, however, the Party required to make the disclosure under the law shall give prompt notice of this to the other Party prior to such disclosure so that the other Party may seek an appropriate protective order or give its consent to such disclosure.

14. Insurance

The Contractor shall procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the Services the following insurance with minimum limits equal to the amount indicated below.

Contractor shall maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Services. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, the Contractor shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees. If any class of employee or employees engaged in performing any portion of the Services under this Agreement are not protected under the Workers' Compensation Statute, adequate insurance coverage for the protection of any employee(s) not otherwise protected must be obtained before any of those employee(s) commence performing any portion of the Services.

Contractor shall not commence performing any portion of the Services until all required insurance has been obtained and certificates indicating the required coverage have been delivered in duplicate to the District and approved by the District. Certificates and insurance policies shall include the following:

- (i) A clause stating: "SHOULD ANY OF THE ABOVE DESCRIBED POLICIES BE CANCELLED BEFORE THE EXPIRATION DATE THEREOF, NOTICE WILL BE DELIVERED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE POLICY PROVISION."
- (ii) Language stating in particular those insured, extent of insurance, location and operation to which insurance applies, expiration date, to which cancellation and reduction notice will be sent, and length of notice period.
- (iii) An endorsement stating that the District and its Board of Education, agents, representatives, employees, trustees, officers, contractors, and volunteers are named additional insured under all policies except Workers' Compensation Insurance, Professional Liability, and Employers' Liability Insurance. An endorsement shall also state that Contractor's insurance policies shall be primary to any insurance or self-insurance maintained by District. An endorsement shall also state that there shall be a waiver of any subrogation.
- (iv) All policies except the Professional Liability, Workers' Compensation Insurance, and Employers' Liability Insurance Policies shall be written on an occurrence form.

Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A: VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the District.

15. Termination

- (i) Without Cause by District: District may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Contractor only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by District shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by Contractor. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Contractor or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
- (ii) Without Cause by Contractor: Contractor may, upon sixty (60) days notice, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement. Upon this termination, District shall only be obligated to compensate Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by Contractor shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services to District. Contractor acknowledges that this sixty (60) day notice period is acceptable so that the District can attempt to procure the Services from another source.
- (iii) With Cause by District: District may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - a) Material violation of this Agreement by the Contractor;
 - b) Any act by Contractor exposing the District to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - c) Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt, Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of Contractor's insolvency.

Written notice by District shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within three (3) calendar days after that notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this Agreement shall upon the expiration of the three (3) calendar days cease and terminate. In the event of this termination, the District may secure the required services from another Contractor. If the expense, fees, and/or costs to the District exceed the cost of providing the service pursuant to this Agreement, the Contractor shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to the District upon the receipt of the District's notice of these expense, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to District.

16. Certificates/Permits/Licenses

Contractor and all Contractor's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such certificates, permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of Services pursuant to this Agreement.

17. Delivery

Time of delivery of goods or services is of the essence in this Agreement. District reserves the right to refuse any goods or services and to cancel all or any part of the goods not conforming to applicable specifications, drawings, samples or descriptions or services that do not conform to the prescribed statement of work. Acceptance of any part of the order of goods shall not District to accept shipments nor deprive it of the right to return goods already accepted at Contractor's expense. Over shipments and under shipments of goods shall be only as agreed to in writing by District. Delivery shall not be deemed to be complete until all goods or services have actually been received and accepted in writing by District.

18. Notice

Any notice required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be deemed to have been given, served, and received if given in writing and either personally delivered or deposited in the United States mail, registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt required, or sent by overnight delivery service, or facsimile transmission, addressed as follows:

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education accept \$22,500 in funding for the Colton-Redlands-Yucaipa Regional Occupational Program (CRY-ROP) Career Technical Education (CTE) TEACH grant to assign mentors to support CTE teacher success and retention.

The Glendale Unified School District's CTE department submitted the CTE TEACH grant application for consideration and was selected as one of the districts to receive funding to assign mentors to support CTE teacher success and retention. CRY-ROP's CTE TEACH department, in partnership with the California Department of Education, has offered a professional development program for K-12 school districts to provide the demonstrated critical support needed for CTE teacher success with the CTE TEACH grant.

Program Description

The CTE TEACH program, administered by CRY-ROP, is a comprehensive professional development program modeled after their highly successful Teacher Induction Program that has received Model Practices award recognition from the California Department of Education. This model professional development program replicates what was learned from the Teacher Induction Program and is designed for beginning career/technical education teachers to provide an effective transition from industry into the teaching profession. CTE TEACH involves administrative supervision overseeing the use of Mentor Teachers to provide structured training for beginning CTE educators, as well as technical assistance and informal observation intended to guide and support the new teacher related to the training. The CTE TEACH professional development training

Program Requirements

Three Mentor Teachers will be identified to complete the number of designated hours assigned in the Memorandum of Understanding of the CTE TEACH program work including conducting training following the CTE TEACH professional development curriculum; classroom visits; teacher observations (including related non-evaluative coaching); and other forms of technical assistance to support the beginning CTE teachers.

A Memorandum of Understanding, outlining the terms of the program, which is in effect from October 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022, is attached to this report.

CTE TEACH Site Memorandum of Understanding

This memorandum of understanding sets forth the terms of agreement between the Colton-Redlands-Yucaipa Regional Occupational Program (hereafter CRY-ROP) and

I. <u>Background</u>

The California State Plan for Career and Technical Education, 2008-2012, identifies as an essential element of a world-class CTE system the need for initial preparation and on-going professional development of CTE educators. Since 2009, CRY-ROP's CTE TEACH department, in partnership with the California Department of Education, has offered a professional development program for K-12 school districts, ROCPs, community colleges, and charter schools to provide the demonstrated critical support needed for CTE teacher success.

Recognizing that many local educational agencies have a need for professional development activities to support CTE educators, CRY-ROP offers CTE TEACH site grant opportunities to eligible educational agencies.

II. Purpose of Agreement

It is the purpose of this agreement to establish a cooperative and mutually beneficial relationship between the parties and to set forth the responsibilities of the parties as they relate to the implementation of the CTE TEACH professional development program for CTE educators.

III. <u>Duration of Agreement</u>

The term of this agreement shall be from October 1, 2021 through and including June 30, 2022 unless modified or terminated in writing. The termination can be exercised by either party 30 days following written notice.

IV. <u>Program Description</u>

The CTE TEACH program, administered by CRY-ROP, is a comprehensive professional development program modeled after their highly successful Teacher Induction Program (TIP) that has received Model Practices award recognition from the California Department of Education. This model professional development program replicates what was learned from the Teacher Induction Program and is designed for beginning career/technical education teachers to provide an effective transition from industry into the teaching profession. CTE TEACH involves administrative supervision overseeing the use of Mentor Teachers to provide structured training for beginning CTE educators, as well as technical assistance and informal observation intended to guide and support the new teacher related to the training. The CTE TEACH professional development training addresses all the teaching

practices proven to be effective and is presented in a sequenced and scaffolded structure that includes teaching methods, learning styles, lesson planning, CTE concepts, equity and diversity in the classroom, mandated reporting, and legal/ethical issues. This coordinated and comprehensive approach to professional development can enhance teacher success in the classroom and increase teacher retention in your program.

V. **Special Provisions**

- 1. This agreement is entered into by the duly authorized officials of each respective party.
- 2. It is understood by both parties that each will fulfill its responsibility under the agreement in accordance with the provisions of law and regulations that govern their activities. Nothing in this agreement is intended to negate or otherwise render ineffective any such provisions or operating procedures. If at any time either party is unable to perform its functions under this agreement the affected party shall immediately provide written notice to the other party to establish a date for mutual termination of the agreement.
- 3. This MOU constitutes the entire agreement hereto with respect to the subject matter hereof, and supersedes any prior understanding or written or oral agreements between the parties with respect to the subject matter of this MOU. No amendment, modification or alteration of the terms of the MOU shall be binding on either party unless submitted in writing, dated subsequent to the date of this MOU, and is duly executed by both parties.
- 4. Neither party may incur any debt, obligation, expense or liability of any kind of the other party without the other party's written approval.
- 5. This agreement may be amended by the mutual written consent of the parties here to.

VI. Responsibilities of the Parties under Agreement

In consideration of the mutual aims and desires of the parties to this agreement and in recognition of the benefit to be derived from the effective implementation of the program, the parties agree that their responsibilities under this agreement shall be as follows:

A. CRY-ROP shall:

- 1. Pay the Participating Agency for CTE TEACH services rendered and as specified, the total stipend amount of up to \$7,500 per mentor for up to three mentors per site. Base ratio is 5 mentees per mentor. Each site Mentor can mentor more than five mentees, but not less if the site has fewer than six mentees. Each mentor will report up to 150 hours, at a rate of \$50.00 per service hour, (not to exceed \$7,500), building and executing grant required activities.
- 2. Furnish all information and forms necessary to the performance of this agreement.
- 3. Provide curriculum and training for Mentor Teachers.
- 4. Provide administrator support focusing on strategies and practices needed to implement the CTE TEACH program.
- 5. Monitor the performance of the Participating Agency in regards to responsibilities under this MOU and advise the Participating Agency of any and all concerns.

B. Participating Agency Shall:

1. Identify at least one Participating Agency administrator that will oversee the CTE TEACH program on site. Specific responsibilities include the following:

- a. Be available for consultation with selected Mentor Teachers regarding instructional matters.
- b. Attend a Statewide Advisory Meeting hosted by CRY-ROP via video conference spring 2022.
- c. Submit fully completed Quarter Reports and a final invoice at end of grant year. All sections of the Quarter Reports must be completed, if applicable. The last Quarter Report and invoice must be received no later than June 30, 2022. Note that funds are to be paid directly to mentors and may not be used for sub costs, software, instructional supplies, equipment, or indirect costs. The reports are due no later than 30 days after the end of each quarter:
 - i. Quarter 1 ends September 31, 2021 Report due by October 31, 2021
 - ii. Quarter 2 ends December 31, 2021 Report due by January 31, 2022
 - iii. Quarter 3 ends March 31, 2022 Report due by April 30, 2022
 - iv. Quarter 4 ends June 30, 2022 Report due by June 30, 2022 (No Exceptions)
- d. Administrators are responsible for reviewing Mentor logs for completeness and assurance that all tasks/activities align with the objectives of the grant.
- e. Submit additional documentation and reports as required.

i. Including a program impact report due April 30, 2022

- 2. Identify at least one Mentor Teacher to complete the number of designated hours assigned in this MOU of CTE TEACH program work including: conducting training following the CTE TEACH professional development curriculum, classroom visits, teacher observations (including related non- evaluative coaching) and other forms of technical assistance to support the beginning CTE teacher. Specific responsibilities include the following:
 - a. Complete online the CTE Teach Mentor Training modules available through CTE Online (www.cteonline.org) by the end of second quarter, December 31, 2021. Mentors added to the grant after December 31, 2021 will have 30 days after notifying CTE teach to complete the online training.
 - b. Participate in the <u>5 webinars</u> provided by CTE TEACH.
 - c. Attend a Statewide Advisory Meeting hosted by CRY-ROP via webinar, spring 2022.
 - d. Hold a minimum of 3 workshops outlined in the CTE TEACH curriculum for teachers.
 - e. Provide one-on-one time with individual teachers to discuss challenges via phone, email, or in person weekly.
 - f. Mentor and work closely with assigned teachers to provide support and assistance.
 - g. Provide information and guidance to teachers pertaining to instructional methodologies and resources, effective teaching strategies for classroom management, and lesson plan design and development.
 - h. Meet with assigned teachers and coordinate site visits, conducting teacher observations and providing peer coaching follow-up, and feedback pertaining to effective teaching strategies and student motivation.
 - i. Conduct a <u>minimum of two teacher observations</u> with feedback by June 2022 for each assigned teacher.
 - j. Be available on an "on-call" basis and visit or call each assigned teacher every month.
 - k. Function as a methodology specialist for specialty or content area as applicable.
 - l. Consult with teachers regarding instructional matters and site procedures, including attendance, record keeping, and forms.

- m. Coordinate and facilitate the sharing of resources and expertise. Consult with administrators regarding instructional matters.
- n. Serve as a professional role model for colleagues and favorably represent the site.
- o. Log their hours of instruction on the Mentor Teacher Activity Log and submit to the administrator in a timely manner.
- p. Submit additional documentation and reports as required.

VII. Failure to Provide Satisfactory Service, Abandonment of Program, Cancellation of Agreement

If, at any time during the performance of this agreement, CRY-ROP and the California Department of Education determines, at their discretion, that Participating Agency's services have become unsatisfactory, or if at any time during the performance of this agreement CRY-ROP determines, at its sole discretion, to suspend indefinitely work on CTE TEACH, CRY-ROP shall have the right to cancel this agreement regarding the Participating Agency's services related to CTE TEACH. In the event of such cancellation, CRY-ROP shall give written notice to the Participating Agency of its intention to cancel thirty (30) days in advance of the effective date of the cancellation.

If the cancellation is for unsatisfactory performance, CRY-ROP shall be obligated to pay the Participating Agency only for those services deemed by CRY-ROP to be satisfactory as of the effective date of the cancellation or termination. If the cancellation is the result of CRY-ROP's decision to suspend indefinitely or abandon the work under this agreement, CRY-ROP shall be obligated to pay the Participating Agency only for those services performed by the Participating Agency through the effective date of cancellation or termination.

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education approve revisions to Board Policies (BP) 5141.4 (Child Abuse Prevention and Reporting); BP 5141.52 (Suicide Prevention); BP 5142.2 (Safe Routes to School Program); BP 5145.9 (Hate-Motivated Behavior); and BP 5148 (Child Care and Development) as recommended by the California School Boards Association (CSBA) and to comply with Education Code and federal and state laws.

BP 5141.4 - Child Abuse Prevention and Reporting

CSBA Update June 2021 Last GUSD Update: February 2018

Board Policy (BP) 5141.4 is updated to:

- Clarify that districts are not required, but are authorized, to include age-appropriate
 and culturally sensitive child abuse prevention curriculum in the instructional
 program.
- Add material regarding displaying posters on campus notifying students of the appropriate telephone number to call to report child abuse or neglect.
- Include the requirement for student identification cards for students in grades 7-12 to include the National Domestic Hotline telephone number.
- Clarify that the training regarding duties of mandated reporters be according to law and administrative regulation.

BP 5141.52 – Suicide Prevention

This policy is updated to expand material regarding stakeholder engagement and best practices for suicide prevention, intervention, and postvention, and for consistency with CDE's Model Youth Suicide Prevention Policy. This includes:

- An enhanced list of participants for staff development.
- The importance of resiliency skills to student instruction.
- The review of materials and resources for alignment with safe and effective messaging.
- Information to be provided to parents/guardians and caregivers.
- The establishment of district and/or school site crisis intervention team(s).

The revision to the policy also clarifies that the policy may be reviewed more frequently than the five-year review requirement of law, and that district data pertaining to reports of suicidal ideation, attempts, or death and data that reflect school climate be periodically reviewed to aid in program development.

BP 5142.2 - Safe Routes to School Program

CSBA Update: June 2021 Last GUSD Update: October 2018

BP 5142.2 be updated to reflect new policies regarding the Safe Routes to School Program. Updating the BP will clarify potential liability issues and add materials regarding equitable access and opportunity to participate in the District's safe routes to school program.

BP 5145.9 - Hate-Motivated Behavior

CSBA Update June 2021 Last GUSD Update: July 2018

Board Policy 5145.9 is revised to bolster the Board's commitment to providing a respectful, inclusive, and safe learning environment, including:

- Adding a definition of hate-motivated behavior which incorporates a list of characteristics which may motivate prohibited behavior.
- Reflecting the importance of celebrating diversity.
- Enhancing the list of topics for student instruction and staff development.
- Adding material regarding regularly occurring staff training.
- Including student and staff discipline for engaging in hate-motivated behavior.

The policy is also updated to include the requirement to post the policy in a prominent location on the District's website and add that, in addition to other staff listed, complaints may be reported to the District's compliance officer.

BP 5148 Child Care and Development

CSBA Update: June 2021 Last GUSD Update: March 2016

Revisions to this policy include:

- Revising to reflect the transfer of responsibility for the state administration of child care programs from the California Department of Education (CDE) to the California Department of Social Services (CDSS).
- Revising to reflect the priority for enrollment in childcare programs, which includes subsidy eligible families, then district students, children of district students, and children of district employees.
- Revising to remove language regarding self-supporting programs.
- Updating to reflect current legal references, to correct minor grammatical and spacing errors, and to remove identical or nearly identical sections.

Upon approval of the BPs, revisions will be made to the accompanying Administrative Regulations as needed following the normal District process.

Copies of the revised BPs are attached to this memo.

Child Abuse Prevention and Reporting

The Board of Education is committed to supporting the safety and well-being of District students and desires to facilitate the prevention of and response to child abuse and neglect. The Superintendent or designee shall develop and implement strategies for preventing, recognizing, and promptly reporting known or suspected child abuse and neglect.

The Superintendent or designee may provide a student who is a victim of abuse with school-based mental health services or other support services and/or may refer the student to resources available within the community as needed.

Child Abuse Prevention

The District's instructional program shall include age-appropriate and culturally sensitive child abuse prevention curriculum. This curriculum shall explain students' right to live free of abuse, include instruction in the skills and techniques needed to identify unsafe situations and react appropriately and promptly, inform students of available support resources, and teach students how to obtain help and disclose incidents of abuse.

The District's program also may include age-appropriate curriculum in sexual abuse and sexual assault awareness and prevention. Upon written request of a student's parent/guardian, the student shall be excused from taking such instruction. (Education Code 51900.6)

The Superintendent or designee may display posters, in areas on campus where students frequently congregate, notifying students of the appropriate telephone number to call to report child abuse or neglect. (Education Code 33133.5)

In addition, student identification cards for students in grades 7-12 shall include the National Domestic Violence Hotline telephone number. (Education Code 215.5)

The Superintendent or designee shall, to the extent feasible, seek to incorporate community resources into the District's child abuse prevention programs and may use these resources to provide parents/guardians with instruction in parenting skills and child abuse prevention.

Child Abuse Reporting

The Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures for the identification and reporting of known and suspected child abuse and neglect in accordance with law.

Procedures for reporting child abuse shall be included in the District and/or school comprehensive safety plan. (Education Code 32282)

Child Abuse Prevention and Reporting

District employees who are mandated reporters, as defined by law and administrative regulation, are obligated to report all known or suspected incidents of child abuse and neglect.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training regarding the duties of mandated reporters as required by law and as specified in the accompanying administrative regulation. (Education Code 44691; Penal Code 11165.7)

Suicide Prevention

The Board of Education recognizes that suicide is a leading cause of death among youth, prevention is a collective effort that requires stakeholder engagement, and school personnel who regularly interact with students are often in a position to recognize the warning signs of suicide and to offer appropriate referral and/or assistance. In an effort to reduce suicidal behavior, its impact on students and families, and other trauma associated with suicide, the Superintendent or designee shall develop measures, strategies, practices, and supports for suicide prevention, intervention, and postvention.

In developing policy and procedures for suicide prevention, intervention, and postvention, the Superintendent or designee shall consult with school and community stakeholders such as administrators, other staff, parents/guardians, and students; school-employed mental health professionals such as school counselors, school psychologists, school social workers, and school nurses; suicide prevention experts such as local health agencies, mental health professionals, and community organizations; law enforcement; and, in developing policy for grades K-6, the county mental health plan. (Education Code 215)

Measures and strategies for suicide prevention, intervention, and postvention shall include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Staff development on suicide awareness and prevention for teachers, interns, school counselors, and other District employees who interact with students, including, as appropriate, substitute teachers, coaches, expanded day learning staff, crossing guards, tutors and volunteers.
- 2. Instruction to students in problem-solving, coping, and resiliency skills to promote students' mental, emotional, and social health and well-being, as well as instruction in recognizing and appropriately responding to warning signs of suicidal intent in others. As a result of this instruction, students should know how to access school-based and community prevention and intervention resources and supports.
- 3. Methods for promoting a positive school climate that enhances students' feelings of connectedness with the school and that is characterized by caring staff and harmonious interrelationships among students.
- 4. The review of materials and resources used in awareness efforts and communications to ensure they align with best practices for safe and effective messaging about suicide.
- 5. The provision of information to parents/guardians and caregivers regarding risk and protective factors and warning signs of suicide, the severity of the suicide problem among youth, the District's suicide prevention curriculum, the District's suicide prevention policy

and procedures, basic steps for helping suicidal youth, the importance of communicating with appropriate staff if suicide risk is present or suspected, access to suicide prevention training, and/or school and community resources that can help youth in crisis.

- 6. Encouragement for students to notify appropriate school personnel or other adults when they are experiencing thoughts of suicide or when they suspect or have knowledge of another student's suicidal intentions.
- 7. Crisis intervention procedures for addressing suicide threats or attempts.
- 8. Counseling and other postvention strategies for helping students, staff, and others cope in the aftermath of a student's suicide.
- 9. Establishment of District and/or school-site crisis intervention team(s) to ensure the proper implementation and review of this policy and other District practices related to the emotional and behavioral wellness of students, including, but not limited to, the oversight of mental health and suicide prevention training, collaboration with community mental health organizations, identification of resources and organizations that provide evidence-based treatment, collaboration to build community response, and compliance with Education Code 215

As appropriate, these measures and strategies shall specifically address the needs of students who are at high risk of suicide, including, but not limited to, students who are bereaved by suicide; students with disabilities, mental illness, or substance use disorders; students who are experiencing homelessness or who are in out-of-home settings such as foster care; and students who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or questioning. (Education Code 215)

The Board shall ensure that measures and strategies for students in grades K-6 are age appropriate and delivered and discussed in a manner that is sensitive to the needs of young students. (Education Code 215)

If a referral is made for mental health or related services for a student in grade K-6 who is a Medi-Cal beneficiary, the Superintendent or designee shall coordinate and consult with the county mental health plan. (Education Code 215)

District employees shall act only within the authorization and scope of their credential or license. Nothing in this policy shall be construed as authorizing or encouraging District employees to diagnose or treat mental illness unless they are specifically licensed and employed to do so. (Education Code 215)

The Board shall review, and update as necessary, this policy at least every five years. The Board may, at its discretion, review the policy more frequently. (Education Code 215)

The Superintendent or designee shall periodically review District data pertaining to school climate and reports of suicidal ideation, attempts, or death to identify patterns or trends and make recommendations regarding program development.

The Superintendent or designee shall post this policy on the District's web site, in a prominent location and in a manner that is easily accessible to parents/guardians and students. (Education Code 234.6)

Safe Routes to School Program

The Board of Education recognizes that walking, bicycling, and other forms of active transport to school promote students' physical activity and reduce vehicle traffic and air pollution in the vicinity of schools. As part of the District's coordinated approach to supporting student wellness and safety and enhancing student learning, the Superintendent or designee shall develop and implement strategies to establish and promote safe routes to school program activities.

All students shall have equitable access and opportunity to participate in the District's safe routes to school program.

The Superintendent or designee may identify a program coordinator or establish District and/or school site committees to oversee and coordinate related activities.

The Superintendent or designee may collaborate with local public works and public safety departments, transportation agencies, other city and county agencies, school staff, students, parents/guardians and parent organizations, health organizations, community organizations, and/or businesses in the development, implementation, and evaluation of strategies.

Strategies in support of the safe routes to school program shall be based on the grade levels of the students and an assessment of the conditions and needs of each school and the surrounding neighborhoods.

The Superintendent or designee shall explore the availability of grant funds and other sources of funding to support related projects and activities.

The Superintendent or designee shall periodically report to the Board on the implementation of program activities and progress toward program goals. Such reports may include, but not be limited to, levels of participation in promotional and educational activities, survey results of parent/guardian attitudes about allowing their child to walk or bicycle to school, tallies of the numbers of students using various modes of travel to and from school and how these numbers have changed over time, records of student attendance and on-time arrival, and injury data within the school and/or District attendance boundaries.

Hate-Motivated Behavior

The Board of Education is committed to providing a respectful, inclusive, and safe learning environment that protects students from discrimination, harassment, intimidation, bullying, and other behavior motivated by hate.

Hate-motivated behavior is any behavior intended to cause emotional suffering, physical injury, or property damage through intimidation, harassment, bigoted slurs or epithets, force or threat of force, or vandalism motivated in part or whole by bias or hostility towards the victim's real or perceived race, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, immigrant status, ethnic group identification, ethnicity, age, religion, marital status, pregnancy, parental status, physical or mental disability, medication condition, sex, gender, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, or genetic information, or any other characteristic identified in Education Code 200 or 220, Government Code 11135, or Penal Code 422.55.

The Superintendent or designee shall design strategies to promote harmonious relationships among students, prevent incidents of hate-motivated behavior to the extent possible, and address such incidents if they occur.

The Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with regional programs and community organizations to promote an environment where diversity is celebrated and hate-motivated behavior is not tolerated. Such collaborative efforts shall focus on the development of effective prevention strategies and response plans, provision of assistance to students affected by hate-motivated behavior, and/or education of students who have perpetrated hate-motivated acts.

The District shall provide students with age-appropriate instruction that:

- 1. Includes the development of social-emotional learning.
- 2. Promotes an understanding, awareness, appreciation, and respect for human rights, diversity, and acceptance in a multicultural society.
- 3. Explains the harm and dangers of explicit and implicit biases.
- 4. Discourages discriminatory attitudes and practices.
- 5. Provides strategies to manage conflicts constructively.

As necessary, the District shall provide counseling, guidance, and support to students who are victims of hate-motivated behavior and to students who exhibit such behavior.

Hate-Motivated Behavior

When appropriate, students who engage in hate-motivated behavior shall be disciplined.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide staff with training that:

- 1. Promotes an understanding of diversity, equity, and inclusion.
- 2. Discourages the development of discriminatory attitudes and practices.
- 3. Includes social-emotional learning and nondiscriminatory instructional and counseling methods.
- 4. Supports the prevention, recognition, and response to hate-motivated behavior.
- 5. Raises the awareness and sensitivity of staff to potentially prejudicial and discriminatory behavior.
- 6. Includes effective enforcement of rules for appropriate student conduct.

Employees who engage in hate-motivated behavior shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

Rules prohibiting hate-motivated behavior and procedures for reporting a hate-motivated incident shall be provided to students, staff, and parents/guardians.

This policy shall be posted in a prominent location on the District's web site in a manner that is readily and easily accessible to parents/guardians and students. (Education Code 234.6)

Complaints

Any staff member who is notified that hate-motivated behavior has occurred, observes such behavior, or otherwise becomes aware of an incident shall immediately contact the compliance officer responsible for conducting the District's response to complaints and complying with state and federal civil rights laws. As appropriate, he/she shall also contact law enforcement.

A student or parent/guardian who believes the student is a victim of hate-motivated behavior is strongly encouraged to report the incident to a teacher, the principal, the District's compliance officer, or other staff member.

Any complaint of hate-motivated behavior shall be investigated and, if determined to be

discriminatory, shall be resolved in accordance with law and the District's uniform complaint procedures specified in AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures or other applicable procedure. If, during the investigation, it is determined that a complaint is about nondiscriminatory behavior, the principal or designee shall inform the complainant and shall take all necessary actions to resolve the complaint.

Child Care and Development

The Board of Education recognizes that child development and child care programs are a necessity for many families in the Glendale Unified School District. The Board shall provide child care and development services which meet the developmental needs of children and offer a convenient child care alternative for parents/guardians in the community. The programs shall be consistent with and support the District's regular education program.

The Board shall enter into a contract with the California Department of Social Services (CDSS) for the provision of child care and development services by the District.

The Superintendent or designee shall work cooperatively with the local child care and development planning council, public and private agencies, parents/guardians, and other community members to assess child care needs in the community, establish program priorities, obtain ongoing feedback on program quality, and inform parents/guardians about child care options.

The Board shall approve, for the District's child care and development programs, a written philosophical statement, goals, and objectives that reflect the cultural and linguistic characteristics of the families to be served and address the program components specified in 5 CCR 18272-18281 and the accompanying administrative regulation. (5 CCR 18271)

A. Eligibility and Enrollment

Child care admissions policies and procedures shall be in writing and available to the public. Such policies and procedures shall include: criteria designating those children whose needs can be met by the child care center's program and services, the ages of children who will be accepted, program activities, any supplementary services provided, any field trip provisions, any transportation arrangements, food service provisions, and health examination requirements. (5 CCR 18105; 22 CCR 101218)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that subsidized child care is provided to eligible families to the extent that state and/or federal funding is available and shall establish enrollment priorities in accordance with Education Code 8263 and 5 CCR 18106.

To the extent that space is available after the enrollment of children who are eligible for subsidized services, priority for admissions shall be given to District students, children of District students, and children of District employees.

B. Staffing

Students Welfare

Child Care and Development

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that individuals working in child care and development programs have the necessary qualifications and have satisfied all legal requirements.

C. Facilities

Upon recommendation of the Superintendent or designee, the Board may approve any of the following for the provision of child care and development services:

- 1. The use of existing District facilities that have capacity.
- 2. Renovation or improvement of District facilities to make them suitable for such services.
- 3. Purchase of relocatable child care facilities.
- 4. Inclusion of child care facilities in any new construction.
- 5. Agreement with a public agency or community organization for the use of community facilities.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that facilities used for child care services meet all applicable health and safety standards. (5 CCR 18020; 22 CCR 101238-101239.2)

D. Complaints

For a licensed child care center, any complaint alleging health and safety violations shall be referred to the California Department of Social Services. (5 CCR 4611)

For a license-exempt facility, such complaints shall be referred to the appropriate District administrator.

Any other alleged violation of state or federal laws governing child care and development programs shall be investigated and resolved using the District's procedures in BP/AR 1312.3 – Uniform Complaint Procedures.

E. Program Evaluation

The Superintendent or designee shall annually conduct an evaluation of the District's child care and development services in accordance with state requirements. The evaluation report shall be used to develop an action plan which establishes program goals and objectives for the coming year and addresses any areas identified as needing improvement. (5 CCR 18279-18281)

This Affiliation Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into as of October 18, 2021 ("Effective Date") between West Coast University, Inc. (hereafter referred to as "University"), and Glendale Unified School District (hereafter referred to as "Facility"), agree that educational experiences will be provided at the Facility for students in the program of the University.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, clinical/community/externship experience is a required and integral component of the University curricula; and

WHEREAS, University desires the cooperation of Facility in implementing a clinical/community/externship experience to provide training to students in the practical applications of their fields of study as outlined in Schedule A – Program Contacts; and

WHEREAS, Facility wishes to assist the University in implementing the Program;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual agreements set forth herein, University and Facility enter into this Agreement on the terms and conditions set forth below.

1. Responsibilities of University

- A. <u>University Designee</u>. University shall designate a member of the University Staff to participate with the designee of Facility in planning, implementing, and evaluating the clinical experiences provided to students of University. The Designee shall provide Facility with contact information for same.
- B. <u>Student Assignments</u>. University shall assign students only to facilities that can provide the experience necessary to meet the objectives of the clinical experience.
- C. <u>Schedule of Assignments</u>. University shall notify Facility of its' planned schedule of student assignments, including the name(s) of the student(s), their level(s) of academic preparation, and length(s) and date(s) of planned clinical experience(s).
- D. <u>Student Profile</u>. University shall complete and provide to Facility a profile for each student who will be provided with training at Facility which shall include the appropriate student contact information prior to the beginning date of the planned clinical experience. The facility shall use such information for its own purposes and shall not release the information to any third party.
- E. <u>Faculty/Student Ratio</u>. University shall ensure that students are supervised by an appropriate University faculty member at a ratio agreed upon by University and Facility, and in compliance with regulations governing the clinical experience.

- F. <u>Rules and Regulations</u>. University shall enforce rules and regulations governing the students that are mutually agreed upon by University and Facility. University's students will comply with all applicable federal, state, county, and city regulatory requirements.
- G. <u>Student Insurance</u>. University shall provide Facility with written confirmation that each student being provided with training at Facility is covered by health insurance and professional liability insurance.
- H. The University agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the Facility, its agents, officers and employees from and against any and all liability, expense, including defense costs and legal fees, and claims for damages of any nature whatsoever, including, but not limited to, bodily injury, death, personal injury, or property damage suits arising from services performed by the University's enrolled students or University employees pursuant to this agreement.

2. <u>Responsibilities of the Faculty.</u>

- A. <u>Student Assignments</u>. University faculty members will assume responsibility, in collaboration with Facility staff, for the assignment of students consistent with the objectives of the clinical experience. When applicable, emphasis will be placed on the teaching and application of principles and practices according to professional standards.
- B. <u>Student Orientation</u>. A University faculty member, in collaboration with Facility designee, will provide students assigned to clinical experiences at Facility with an orientation to same prior to beginning their clinical experiences.
- C. <u>Clinical Objectives</u>. University faculty members will provide copies of current syllabi to Facility managers and educator as requested, and will make copies of the objectives for the clinical experience available to Facility staff where students are assigned.
- D. <u>Clinical Supervision</u>. University faculty members will be responsible for clinical supervision only of those students enrolled in University Program to which they are assigned.
- E. <u>Faculty Availability</u>. A University faculty member will be present at Facility at all times when students are present unless the student is assigned to a precepted experience, in which case University faculty member will be available by phone and/or email.
- F. <u>Student Evaluation</u>. A University faculty member will evaluate student performance, with input from Facility staff, according to guidelines outlined in the approved curriculum.

3. Responsibilities of the Student.

University shall notify the students that they are responsible for

- A. Following the clinical and administrative policies, procedures, rules and regulations of the Facility;
- B. Completing required Facility orientation.

- C. Maintaining confidentiality of patient information. No student shall have access to or have the right to receive any health record, except when necessary in the regular course of the clinical experience. The discussion, transmission or narration in any form by students of any patient information of a personal nature, medical or otherwise, obtained during the clinical experience is forbidden except as a necessary part of the clinical experience;
- D. Adhering to patient's rights in accordance with the Facility, state, and federal rules and regulations, as they apply;
- E. Adhering to rules and regulations developed by University to govern student activities during clinical experiences including following the dress code and wearing name badges identifying themselves as students;
- F. Arranging their own transportation when not provided by University;
- G. Arranging for and assuming the cost of their own health insurance;
- H. Assuming responsibility for personal illness; and necessary immunizations, titers, and tests, background checks, and annual health examinations, if required by the Facility;
- I. Refusing to accept financial compensation that is not previously authorized by both University and Facility, or any form of gratuity for rendering patient care;
- J. Attending all scheduled days at Facility;
- K. Obtaining supervision when performing procedures, when University or Facility regulations require such supervision or when lack of supervision my pose a safety risk;

4. Responsibilities of the Facility

- A. <u>The Facility Designee</u>. Facility shall designate a member of Facility Staff to participate with the designee of University in planning, implementing, and evaluating clinical experiences provided to students of University and shall provide University with contact information for such designee.
- B. <u>Facility Orientation</u>. Facility will provide University faculty members with students assigned to clinical experiences at said Facility with an orientation to same prior to the beginning date of the planned clinical experience.
- C. <u>Clinical Experience</u>. Facility shall accept from University the mutually agreed upon number of students enrolled in the aforementioned Program and shall provide said students with clinical experiences consistent with the objectives of the clinical experiences.
- D. <u>Access to Facilities</u>. Facility shall permit students enrolled in the Program access to Facility as appropriate and necessary for their Program, provided that the presence of the students shall not interfere with the activities of Facility.
- E. <u>Facility Communication with University</u>. Facility shall notify University designee and/or faculty member as soon as possible when concerns arise and provide University faculty with the opportunity to address/resolve said concern.

- F. <u>Withdrawal of Students</u>. Facility may request University to withdraw from Facility any student who Facility determines is not performing satisfactorily, or who refuses to follow Facility's administrative policies, procedures, rules and regulations. Such request must be in writing and must include a statement as to the reason or reasons Facility desires to have the student withdrawn.
- G. <u>Adequacy of Facility Staff</u>. Facility is responsible to assure that Facility staff is adequate in number and quality to insure safe and continuous health care services to their patients.
- H. <u>Emergency Health Care First Aid</u>. Facility shall, on any day when one or more students are receiving training at Facility, provide to students and/or faculty members of University necessary emergency health care or first aid for accidents occurring in Facility. Except as provided regarding such emergencies, Facility shall have no obligation to furnish medical or surgical care.
- I. The Facility agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the University, its agents, officers and employees from and against any and all liability, expense, including defense costs and legal fees, and claims for damages of any nature whatsoever, including, but not limited to, bodily injury, death, personal injury, or property damage suits arising from the negligent, reckless or willful acts of the Facility or its employees, agents or officers, pursuant to this agreement.

5. <u>Student Role</u>

The parties agree that students are fulfilling specific requirements for clinical experiences as part of a degree requirement and, therefore, regardless of the nature or extent of the acts performed by them, the students are not to be considered employees or agents of either the University or the Facility for any purpose, including Workers' Compensation or employee benefit programs. Students shall not be entitled to any monetary remuneration for services performed by them in the course of their training under this Agreement.

6. Term and Termination

The term of this agreement is one (1) year from the effective date. This agreement will automatically renew for one (1) year terms unless otherwise terminated in writing by either party. Either party may terminate this agreement on written notice to the other at least thirty (30) days in advance of the next training experience. Such termination shall not take effect, however, with regard to students already enrolled until such time as those students have completed their training for the University term during which such termination notice is given.

7. <u>Complete Agreement</u>

This Agreement constitutes the complete understanding of the University and the Facility regarding their relationship and it supersedes all prior understandings and agreements between the parties, whether written or oral. Any modification or amendment to this Agreement shall be effective only if it is in writing and signed by both parties.

8. <u>Governing Law</u>

This Agreement will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California applicable to agreements made and/or to be performed in California, without regard to any choice of law provisions thereof.

9. Arbitration

Any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of or relating to this Agreement, or breach thereof, shall be settled by arbitration in Orange County, California in accordance with the rules of the American Arbitration Association by a single arbitrator. The arbitrator's award shall be final and binding upon the parties, and judgment upon the award may be entered in any court of competent jurisdiction in any state of the United States or country or application may be made to such court for a judicial acceptance of the award and an enforcement as the law of such jurisdiction may require or allow.

10. <u>Severability</u>

Wherever possible, each provision of this Agreement will be interpreted in a manner to be effective and valid, but if any provision is held invalid or unenforceable by anybody of competent jurisdiction, then such provision will be ineffective only to the extent of such invalidity or unenforceability, without invalidating or affecting in any manner the remainder of such provision or the other provisions of this Agreement.

11. <u>Anti-Discrimination</u>

12. <u>Breach of Privacy and/or Security of Protected Health Information and/or Other Private Information, Documents and/or Data</u>

Pursuant to all applicable laws, rules, regulations and orders of any state, local, federal and non-U.S. jurisdiction and any administrative agency, both parties agree to notify the other within 24 business hours of any breach or suspected or potential breach of the privacy and/or security of any Protected Health Information and/or other private information, documents and/or any other data.

<u>FERPA</u>: Facility agrees to maintain the confidentiality of all participating students' academic records pursuant to the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, as amended.

HIPAA and Related Regulations: University hereby agrees to comply, and to cause its faculty members and students to comply, with all applicable requirements of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA), Public Law 104-191, and all amendments and regulations thereto, and agrees to inform the students and its' faculty members of these requirements. In addition, University will provide instruction to the students and faculty in safeguarding the privacy of Protected Health Information (PHI); and will maintain verification

of such training on file for the applicable time period pursuant to all pertinent and applicable local, state, and federal regulations, including HIPAA regulations.

13. <u>COVID-19 Vaccination</u>

University will guarantee that Student Teachers and university supervisors who will be working on the District's school sites with students have been fully vaccinated for COVID-19. University shall submit documentation to the District verifying that Student Teachers and university supervisors who will be working on the District's school sites have received the complete COVID-19 vaccination at least two weeks prior to starting to provide services at a District school site.

14. Notice

All notices to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing, given at the respective addresses of the parties as set forth below, unless notification of a change of address is given in writing. Any notice required by this Agreement shall be deemed to have been properly received when delivered in person or when mailed by registered or certified first class mail, return receipt requested, to the address as given herein, or such addresses as may be designated from time to time during this term of this Agreement.

Memorandum of Understanding

Overview of Early Childhood Special Education at CU Denver

The School of Education & Human Development at the University of Colorado Denver is committed to working in partnership with schools, communities and districts to support effective preparation of future teachers. In Early Childhood Special Education, we focus on preparing candidates to teach children with disabilities as well as provide support for general education teachers leading inclusive classrooms, playing an important role in the movement to include children with disabilities. Our curriculum ensures that candidates can providing culturally responsive, family-centered, developmentally effective early education in an inclusive setting with a strong background in assessment, teaching, intervention and collaboration. Our candidates complete extensive clinical experience throughout their coursework, embedded in practice based assignments. Students are required to maintain a placement in the field working with children ages birth-8.

Roles & Responsibilities of Each Partner

CU Denver School of Education & Human Development

- Provide Personal Identifiable Information (PII) consent forms for all assignments that may contain any confidential information. Student is responsible for communicating with family and storing form in a secure location.
- Communicate privacy and confidentiality expectations through assignment descriptions, requiring deidentification of all documents/work submitted.
- Provide feedback and assess assignments for continual improved practice.
- Collaborate with student and school in the event challenges arise.
- Collaborate closely with student to ensure that the assignments align with the context of the school/ECE site.
- Ensure that all candidates have cleared background checks—either submitted through the University or through the field work placement.

District/School Site

- If applicable, orient student to program/school, including discussion of the following:
 - Program/school philosophy/ curriculum models
 - o Policies and procedures (RtI, PBIS, IFSP/IEP meetings, discipline, emergencies, etc.)
 - o Introductions to teaching staff and special services personnel with whom student will have contact
 - o Dress code
 - o Visitor badges/ wearing CU Denver student ID/ procedures for signing in each day
 - o Parking locations/required sticker ortag
 - o Travel arrangements for home visits
- Allow the student to shadow other educators' work with children and attend IFSP/IEP meetings, parent conferences and team meetings.

- Support student in communication with families around consent and other required forms.
- Support student in completing field based coursework.
- Initiate immediate communication with the university in any instance where student performance and/or personal conduct raise any concern for the well-being of children, families, program staff, or the practicum student.
- Support and provide feedback throughout the educator preparation program.
- Encourage and allow teachers and educator candidates to implement innovative practice to meet the needs of diverse learners in the school.
