SUBJECT:	Student, Parent, and Employee Culture Surveys

This January/February, GUSD conducted student, parent, and employee culture surveys to gather stakeholder opinions about academics, culture, and safety on our campuses and in our District. Survey questions are aligned to GUSD's first Board priority to "promote a culture of caring, trust, and inquiry," and to our three LCAP goals:

- 1. Maximize Student Achievement
- 2. Create a Culture or Learning
- 3. Increase Engagement

This is the second year we have gathered student, parent, and employee culture survey data, allowing us to monitor any changes and track our progress toward achieving our LCAP goals.

Positive Results

Student Culture Survey

- Percent of students planning to attend a 4-year college or university remains high at 71%.
- Percent of students who feel safe at school declined slightly, but remains high at 78%. A slight decline was to be expected in the wake of heavily publicized school shootings nationally (the survey window closed one week after the Parkland shooting).
- Percent of students involved in a school activity increased to 58%.

Parent Culture Survey

• Percent of parents stating that their school helps them understand their child's college/career opportunities and what their child needs to do to achieve their college/career goals improved dramatically, particularly at the elementary and middle school levels.

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- Percent of parents who feel their child is safe at school remained very high at 86%. This is especially positive in the wake of heavily publicized school shootings nationally (the survey window closed one week after the Parkland shooting).
- Percent of parents who feel welcome on campus, and that staff treats them with respect, takes their concerns seriously, and responds to their concerns/needs/requests in a timely manner remained very high.
- Parent participation in school site events and volunteer activities is very high at more than 80%. GUSD hopes to increase parent participation in District-level events, particularly decision-making bodies such as LCAP and DELAC committees.

Employee Culture Survey

- Results remained high or improved in <u>every</u> category on the employee culture survey!
- Percent of employees who feel safe at work is very high at 84%.

LCAP Progress

GUSD LCAP annual measurable outcomes (AMOs) in the areas of student safety, social and emotional wellness, and student and parent engagement are tied to these survey results.

LCAP Priority 2: Create a Culture of Learning

AMO 2-1-1: Student, parent, and employee sense of safety as measured by GUSD Culture Surveys will increase by a minimum of 2% per year until it reaches and remains at 100% (students: all or most of the time, parents/staff: strongly agree or agree).

This information item is an update on the Board approved property exchange and the proposed amendment that will come back for vote at the April 17 meeting.

Background

On August 15, 2017, the GUSD Board of Education unanimously approved and entered into an agreement with Carmel Partners to exchange District owned properties for the Office building located at 425 Colorado Street, Glendale, CA.

Education code allows property exchanges as a way for California school districts to acquire real estate and meet their facility needs. The immediate and long-term benefits of this exchange to the GUSD include:

- 1. More operating space the current district offices are approximately 38,000 square feet and the new building is approximately 116,000 square feet.
- 2. The new building has enough space to house all of GUSD's departments, including EEELP and our Teaching & Learning departments, which are currently located away from the district offices.
- 3. The new building will have space to include a parent center.
- 4. The exchange will provide GUSD a more updated building that meets modern building standards.
 - a. It would cost GUSD around \$20 million dollars to upgrade the current building. Those upgrades would not include the additional square feet needed to meet our operational capacity needs.
- 5. The new building will comply with safety code standards for employees and visitors.
- 6. The new building is more energy efficient.
- 7. The new building offers approximately 200 more parking spaces for employees and visitors than our current district offices location.
- 8. While not a primary factor, the additional square footage in the new building offers the GUSD the opportunity to earn additional annual revenue.

Since the August approval, the GUSD administrative team has performed due diligence and is satisfied with the structural integrity of the Colorado building structure.

Important Tax Detail

• It is important to note that no Measure "S" or general fund dollars are targeted to complete this Board approved property exchange.

Property Exchange Amendment and Easements

In the interest of facilitating the close of escrow for the exchange of the District Office site with the Carmel Property, the following changes will be considered by the Board of Education.

- 1. Two easement agreements (April 3 and April 17 board meetings)
 - a. No build easement between Daily HS and the proposed development
 - b. Tieback agreement/easement
- 2. Amendment to Exchange Agreement (April 17, 2018 board meeting)
 - a. Two million dollar contribution from GUSD
 - b. Lot lines adjustments

<u>Timeline</u>

- Step 1. Tonight, the Board will vote to approve two "Notices of Intent" to grant easements as a part of the exchange. (*Ed code requires that easement resolutions take place over two public board meetings*).
- Step 2. The Board will hold a public hearing at the April 17 meeting and then take a final vote to approve or deny the easements.
- Step 3. The amendment to the exchange agreement will return for a final vote at the April 17 meeting.
- Step 4. Carmel Partners will need to obtain a project approval from the City of Glendale.
- Step 5. Upon completion of a successful exchange, GUSD will have through July 2019 to relocate its departments to the new building.

In accordance with Education Code 37202, "the governing board of a school district shall maintain all of the elementary day schools established by it for an equal length of time during the school year and all of the day high schools established by it for an equal length of time during the school year."

Instructional minutes for Grades 1-12 were approved by the Board of Education at the March 6, 2018 Board meeting. Staff asked for additional time to work with the Glendale Teachers Association before presenting proposed minutes for Transitional Kindergarten (TK) and Kindergarten.

The Superintendent is recommending the approval of the following total instructional minutes:

Transitional Kindergarten (TK) = 40,500 minutes Kindergarten = 42,300 minutes

Pursuant to *EC* 37202, TK programs operated by a district must be of equal length to any kindergarten programs operated by the same school site and/or district, unless there is an approved State Board of Education waiver on file. Upon approval by the Board of Education, staff will submit a waiver request to the State Board of Education for the slightly shorter instructional day for Transitional Kindergarten. The rationale for the request is to respect the developmental needs of the younger TK students, all of whom are four years of age when they start TK. The Kindergarten students are all 5-6 years old and are ready for a longer school day.

These minutes would be phased-in over a two-year period. Schools that are in the first year of a two-year District Review Committee (DRC) agreement will adhere to these new instructional minutes beginning with the 2019-2020 school year. All other schools will comply with the new instructional minutes beginning in 2018-2019.

SUBJECT:	Proposed High School Health Textbook Adoption

In January 2016, California adopted AB 329 -California Healthy Youth Act (CHYA), a new law covering comprehensive sexual health education and HIV education prevention education in public schools. The CHYA requires school districts to provide students with integrated, comprehensive, accurate, and inclusive comprehensive sexual health education and HIV prevention education, at least once in high school. Successful implementation of this law requires current, up-to-date curricular resources. The current Health curriculum used in the Glendale Unified School District is out of date (2004), was adopted before the standards and AB 329, is out of compliance, and needs to be replaced.

In August 2017, the Teaching and Learning Department reached out to five (5) leading publishers to begin the curriculum review and adoption process. Two publishers submitted materials for review:

- <u>Comprehensive Health</u>, 2nd Edition, by Sanderson, Catherine A, and Mark Zelman Published by The Goodheart-Willcox Company, 2018
- *Human Sexuality*, by Pruitt, B. E., et al. Published by Pearson, 2017

After a cursory glance, only *Comprehensive Health* meets both the requirements of AB 329 – California Healthy Youth Act and the California State Standards for Health. In September 2017, the Teaching and Learning Department reached out to publishers again, in person, to ensure all curricular options were available for review. At this point, it was determined that <u>Comprehensive Health</u> was the only potential viable curricular option.

Beginning November 27, 2017, the curricular options were available for display at the GUSD Administration Building and the Crescenta Valley High School lobby to ensure all

stakeholders had the ability to provide feedback. In addition to proposed curricula, AB 329 information sheets were available. These materials were on display until January 31, 2018. On December 11, 2017, there was a Health book fair from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. in the Board Room.

In October 2017, the Teaching and Learning Department identified an evaluation rubric through the California Department of Education in order to ensure instructional materials align with AB 329 criteria, in addition to alignment with California State Standards: Health Education. In December 2017, the evaluation rubric and the curriculum were sent to each high school Health Department Chair along with detailed instructions for review and a deadline of January 2018. In addition to Health Curriculum Study Committee (CSC) reviewing the instructional materials, Glendale High School teacher, Kimberly Sinclair, was also asked to review the materials. Kimberly has a Master's Degree in Public Health and spent the last year on the California Health Curriculum Framework and Evaluation Criteria Committee. She has an immense wealth of knowledge regarding state requirements and expectations for Health education and was an invaluable asset to the process.

The review of <u>*Comprehensive Health*</u> for AB 329 – CHYA compliance focused on the following questions.

- Does the curriculum provide pupils with the knowledge and skills necessary to protect their sexual and reproductive health from HIV and other sexually transmitted infections and from unintended pregnancy?
- Does the curriculum provide pupils with the knowledge and skills they need to develop healthy attitudes concerning adolescent growth and development, body image, gender, sexual orientation, relationships, marriage, and family?

The review found that all instruction and materials align with and support the purposes of AB 329, and do not conflict with them; however, some topics will need to be supplemented in order to be fully compliant. Glendale Unified School District is currently using the fully-aligned Positive Prevention Plus (PPP) curricular supplement in Health classes that will mitigate the areas in which <u>Comprehensive Health</u> is lacking depth. The following areas need to be supplemented (information regarding how the material will be supplemented is in parentheses):

1. Youth with Disabilities – There is no modification in the instructional materials for visually impaired students (Special Education Department)

- 2. Sexual Orientation Language use can be interpreted as heteronormative. (PPP & inclusivity training)
- 3. Gender Information on *cis*-gender and intersex identities, as well as the gender identity crisis, are lacking (PPP)
- 4. Transmission of HIV Risk behaviors and level of risk are not explicit (PPP)
- 5. Transmission of STIs Limited information on how STIs are NOT transmitted (PPP)
- 6. Methods of Protection, HIV and STIs Fails to mention that individuals with HIV still need to use protection or "superinfection," minimal information on survival rates and life-span (PPP)
- 7. Treatment of HIV and STIs Minimal information on anti-retroviral drugs (PPP)
- 8. Social Views About HIV and AIDS additional information on lifeexpectancy as it relates to proper and effective treatments is needed, as well as information regarding HIV testing (PPP)
- 9. Resources and Rights to Sexual and Reproductive Health Care Access lacking information on California specific pupil legal rights to access local resources for sexual and reproductive health care and how to access said services (PPP and District-provided local resources)
- 10. FDA Approved Contraceptive Methods does not discuss the impacts of smoking on the effectiveness of certain contraceptive methods, does not include effectiveness rates for most contraceptive methods (PPP)
- 11. Legally Available Pregnancy Outcomes lacking information about California specific abortion laws (PPP)
- 12. Rights to Obtain Confidential Services completely lacking (PPP)
- 13. Resources and Rights for LGBTQ pupils completely lacking (PPP)

Additionally, the review concluded that the curricular program fully aligns with the California State Health Standards as seen below:

- Nutrition and Physical Activity (Unit 2 & Unit 3)
- Growth, Development, and Sexual Health (Unit 5 & Unit 8)
- Injury Prevention and Safety (Background Lessons)
- Alcohol, Tobacco, and Other Drugs (Unit 4)
- Mental, Emotional, and Social Health (Unit 6)
- Personal and Community Health (Unit 5 & Unit 7)
- Overarching Concepts: (throughout)
 - Essential Health Concepts
 - Analyzing Health Influences
 - Accessing Valid Health Information
 - o Interpersonal Communication

- o Decision Making
- o Goal Setting
- o Practicing Health-Enhancing Behaviors
- o Health Promotion

On January 30, 2018, the Health Curriculum Study Committee engaged in a conversation with the goal of making a recommendation to the Secondary Education Council regarding textbook adoption. On February 5, 2018, the Health Curriculum Study Committee voted 4-0 to recommend the following program to the Secondary Education Council for adoption:

<u>Comprehensive Health</u>, 2nd Edition, by Sanderson, Catherine A, and Mark Zelman – Published by The Goodheart-Willcox Company, 2018

The Secondary Education Council met on February 28, 2018 and agreed with the CSC recommendation.

Cost of Instructional Materials

The instructional materials will cost approximately \$190,900.00. These funds have been allocated from the District's unrestricted textbook program account.

Training

All Health teachers received AB 329 – CHYA training in May 2017. Additional training on the new curriculum will take place in May 2018 during a single release day. This training will include teacher support materials, navigation of the Online Learning Suite, assessments, and all other relevant curricular topics.

Recommendation

The Health textbook adoption of <u>Comprehensive Health</u> is being presented for first reading. Should the consensus of the Board be to move forward, the textbook adoption will be placed as an Action item for approval by the Board of Education at its meeting on April 17, 2018.

This report will provide the Board of Education with information on the need to create new or revise existing Board Policies (BP) 0450 (Comprehensive Safety Plan); BP 5131.4 (Student Disturbances); BP 5142 (Safety); BP 5144.1 (Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process); BP 1340 (Access to District Records); and BP 1325 (Advertising and Promotion) as recommended by the California School Boards Association (CSBA) and to comply with Education Code and federal and state laws.

<u>BP 0450 – Comprehensive Safety Plan</u>

Staff is recommending the update to Board Policy (BP) BP 0450 to bring language current with California School Boards Association (CSBA) recommendation, state and federal laws, and Education Code.

BP 5131.4 – Student Disturbances

Upon review of policies and administrative regulations related to student safety, staff is recommending the consideration of a new Board Policy, 5131.4 - Student Disturbances, based on CSBA suggested language.

Staff is recommending the Board update BP 5142 to reflect current CSBA language, state and federal laws, and Education Code.

BP 5144.1 – Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process

Staff is recommending that the policy be updated to add homeless students as one of the numerically significant student subgroups for whom the District must monitor suspension/expulsion data, and to add Board review of disaggregated suspension/expulsion data for the purpose of identifying any disparities in the imposition of discipline. Upon approval of the policy, the administrative regulation will be updated to revise the grounds for suspension and expulsion to more directly reflect law, which separates out aiding or abetting a crime of physical violence from causing, attempting to cause, or threatening physical violence. The new regulation will also add the definition of cyber sexual bullying as a ground for suspension/expulsion and reflects a new State law (AB 667), which requires a student to be informed, during the informal conference required prior to suspension, of the other means of correction that were attempted before suspension.

BP 1340 – Access to District Records

CSBA Update	September 2003

Staff is proposing to update BP 1340 to reflect a new court decision (City of San Jose v. Superior Court), which held that using a personal account or device to send or receive communications regarding public business does not categorically exclude those records from disclosure in response to a request under the California Public Records Act and that public agencies are obliged to disclose applicable records that they can locate with reasonable effort. Revisions also brings the GUSD policy into alignment with the CSBA recommendations, Education Code, and other state and federal laws.

BP 1325 – Advertising and Promotion

Staff is recommending an update to Board Policy 1325 - Advertising and Promotion to remove the restriction for materials that are "religious, political, or controversial in nature" and add a disclaimer to all flyers distributed from outside organizations that states:

> This program is not sponsored by the School District. Participation is voluntary and at the discretion of the parent(s)/guardian(s). Approval to distribute flyers is a community service and does not imply endorsement.

Also, the policy is amended to allow for-profit organizations to distribute materials to bring policy in alignment with CSBA.

The proposed new or revised Board Policies are being presented for first reading. Should the consensus of the Board be to move forward, the policies will be presented at the April 17, 2018 Board meeting for approval. Further, upon approval of the policies, updates to the accompanying Administrative Regulations will be made as needed following current District procedures.

Additionally, should the update to BP 1325 be approved by the Board, future flyers will be approved for distribution even if they are religious or political in nature (this does not include flyers that advocate for a specific candidate or campaign as this would violate the Fair Political Practices Act). All flyers distributed on behalf of outside organizations will contain the above disclaimer. The disclaimer will be added automatically in Peachjar.

Philosophy - Goals - Objectives and Comprehensive Plans

Comprehensive Safety Plan

The Board of Education recognizes that students and staff have the right to a safe and secure campus where they are free from physical and psychological harm. The Board is fully committed to maximizing school safety and to creating a positive learning environment that teaches strategies for violence prevention and emphasizes high expectations for student conduct, responsible behavior, and respect for others.

Each principal or designee shall ensure the development of a site-level plan, in accordance with law, tailored to the specific concerns of each school. The school site council at each District school shall develop a comprehensive school safety plan relevant to the needs and resources of that particular school. New school campuses shall develop a safety plan within one year of initiating operations (Education Code 32281, 32286). The school safety plan shall take into account the school's staffing, available resources, and building design, as well as other factors unique to the site.

The school safety plans shall be reviewed and updated annually by March 1 of each year and forwarded to the Board for approval. (Education Code 32286, 32288)

The Board shall review the comprehensive safety plan(s) in order to ensure compliance with state law, Board policy, and administrative regulation and shall approve the plan(s) at a regularly scheduled meeting.

By October 15 of each year, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the California Department of Education of any schools that have not complied with the requirements of Education Code 32281. (Education Code 32288)

Tactical Response Plan

Notwithstanding the process described above, any portion of a comprehensive safety plan that includes tactical responses to criminal incidents that may result in death or serious bodily injury at the school site, including steps to be taken to safeguard students and staff, secure the affected school premises, and apprehend the criminal perpetrator(s), shall be developed by District administrators in accordance with Education Code 32281. In developing such strategies, District administrators shall consult with law enforcement officials and with a representative of an employee bargaining unit, if he/she chooses to participate.

When reviewing the tactical response plan, the Board may meet in closed session to confer with law enforcement officials, provided that any vote to approve the tactical response plan is announced in open session following the closed session. (Education Code 32281)

Public Access to Safety Plan(s)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that an updated file of all safety-related plans and materials is readily available for inspection by the public. (Education Code 32282)

However, those portions of the comprehensive safety plan that include tactical responses to criminal incidents shall not be publicly disclosed.

Students

Student Disturbances

The Board of Education desires to provide orderly campuses that create a positive school environment and are conducive to learning. When students initiate or are involved in a campus disturbance that has the potential to threaten the safety of students or staff, the Superintendent or designee may request law enforcement assistance.

The Superintendent or designee and the principal of each school shall include in the school safety plans strategies to curb disruptions which may lead to riots, violence, or vandalism at school or at school-sponsored events. In developing each school's plan, the Superintendent or designee shall consult with local law enforcement authorities to create guidelines for law enforcement support and intervention.

Staff are encouraged to be alert to conditions at school that may lead to a disturbance, such as racial or cultural conflict, student protests, or gang intimidation and confrontations. Staff who believe that a disturbance is imminent, or who see a disturbance occurring, shall immediately contact the principal or administrative designee.

Students who participate in a campus disturbance that threatens the safety of students or staff shall be subject to disciplinary action in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulations.

Students - Welfare

<u>Safety</u>

The Board of Education is responsible for ensuring that proper attention is paid to the safety of students.

The Board of Education directs the Superintendent to develop and implement regulations, which will produce as safe an educational environment as possible for the students as well as for the certificated and classified staff.

The adopted course of study shall provide instruction at the appropriate elementary and secondary grade levels and subject areas in personal and public safety and accident prevention.

The District holds students accountable for their behavior from the time they leave their homes for school until they return to their homes from school. They are also held accountable while on the playgrounds during recess and while they are on school premises and/or under supervision of District personnel.

It is the responsibility of the principal to provide for adequate supervision of playgrounds and other school facilities at all times when school is in session. Special attention shall be given to the prevention of accidents.

The principal should make full use of the cooperative services of local and county organizations, which provide safety services, such as fire, law enforcement, and disaster preparedness agencies. #

The Board of Education recognizes the importance of providing a safe school environment that is conducive to learning and helps ensure student safety and the prevention of student injury. The Superintendent or designee shall implement appropriate practices to minimize the risk of harm to students, including, but not limited to, practices relative to school facilities and equipment, the outdoor environment, educational programs, and school-sponsored activities.

Staff shall be responsible for the proper supervision of students during school hours, during school-sponsored activities, and while students are using District transportation to and from school.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that students receive appropriate instruction on topics related to safety, as well as injury and disease prevention.

Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process

The Board of Education desires to provide District students access to educational opportunities in an orderly school environment that protects their safety and security, ensures their welfare and well-being, and promotes their learning and development. The Board shall develop rules and regulations setting the standards of behavior expected of District students and the disciplinary processes and procedures for addressing violations of those standards, including suspension and/or expulsion.

The grounds for suspension and expulsion and the procedures for considering, recommending, and/or implementing suspension and expulsion shall be only those specified in law, in this policy, and in the accompanying administrative regulation.

Except when otherwise permitted by law, a student may be suspended or expelled only when his/her behavior is related to a school activity or school attendance occurring within any District school or another school district, regardless of when it occurs, including, but not limited to, the following: (Education Code 48900(s))

- 1. While on school grounds
- 2. While going to or coming from school
- 3. During the lunch period, whether on or off the school campus
- 4. During, going to, or coming from a school-sponsored activity

District staff shall enforce the rules concerning suspension and expulsion of students fairly, consistently, equally, and in accordance with the District's nondiscrimination policies.

A. Appropriate Use of Suspension Authority

Except when a student's act violates Education Code 48900(a)-(e), as listed in items #1-5 under "Grounds for Suspension and Expulsion: Grades K-12" of the accompanying administrative regulation, or when his/her presence causes a danger to others, suspension shall be used only when other means of correction have failed to bring about proper conduct. (Education Code 48900.5, 48900.6)

A student's parents/guardians shall be notified as soon as possible when there is an escalating pattern of misbehavior that could lead to on-campus or off-campus suspension.

No student in grades K-3 may be suspended for disruption or willful defiance, except by a teacher pursuant to Education Code 48910. (Education Code 48900)

Students shall not be suspended or expelled for truancy, tardiness, or absenteeism from assigned school activities.

B. On-Campus Suspension

To ensure the proper supervision and ongoing learning of students who are suspended for any of the reasons enumerated in Education Code 48900 and 48900.2, but who pose no imminent danger or threat to anyone at school and for whom expulsion proceedings have not been initiated, the Superintendent or designee shall establish a supervised suspension classroom program which meets the requirements of law.

Except where a supervised suspension is permitted by law for a student's first offense, supervised suspension shall be imposed only when other means of correction have failed to bring about proper conduct. (Education Code 48900.5)

C. Authority to Expel

A student may be expelled only by the Board. (Education Code 48918(j))

As required by law, the Superintendent or principal shall recommend expulsion and the Board shall expel any student found to have committed any of the following "mandatory recommendation and mandatory expulsion" acts at school or at a school activity off school grounds: (Education Code 48915)

- 1. Possessing a firearm which is not an imitation firearm, as verified by a certificated employee, unless the student had obtained prior written permission to possess the item from a certificated school employee, with the principal or designee's concurrence.
- 2. Selling or otherwise furnishing a firearm.
- 3. Brandishing a knife at another person.
- 4. Unlawfully selling a controlled substance listed in Health and Safety Code 11053-11058.
- 5. Committing or attempting to commit a sexual assault as defined in Penal Code 261, 266c, 286, 288, 288a, or 289, or committing a sexual battery as defined in Penal Code 243.4

6. Possessing an explosive as defined in 18 USC 921.

For all other violations listed in the accompanying administrative regulation under "Grounds for Suspension and Expulsion: Grades K-12" and "Additional Grounds for Suspension and Expulsion: Grades 4-12," the Superintendent or principal shall have the discretion to recommend expulsion of a student. If expulsion is recommended, the Board shall order the student expelled only if it makes a finding of either or both of the following: (Education Code 48915(b) and (e))

- a) That other means of correction are not feasible or have repeatedly failed to bring about proper conduct.
- b) That due to the nature of the violation, the presence of the student causes a continuing danger to the physical safety of the student or others.

A vote to expel a student shall be taken in a public session.

The Board may vote to suspend the enforcement of the expulsion order pursuant to the requirements of law and the accompanying administrative regulation. (Education Code 48917)

No student shall be expelled for disruption or willful defiance. (Education Code 48900)

D. Due Process

The Board shall provide for the fair and equitable treatment of students facing suspension and/or expulsion by affording them their due process rights under the law. The Superintendent or designee shall comply with procedures for notices, hearings, and appeals as specified in law and administrative regulation. (Education Code 48911, 48915, 48915.5, 48918)

E. Maintenance and Monitoring of Outcome Data

The Superintendent or designee shall annually present to the Board a report of the outcome data which the District is required to collect pursuant to Education Code 48900.8 and 48916.1, including the number of students recommended for expulsion, the grounds for each recommended expulsion, the actions taken by the Board, the types of referral made after each expulsion, and the disposition of the students after the expulsion period.

The report shall be disaggregated In presenting the report to the Board, the Superintendent or designee shall disaggregate data on suspension and expulsion by school and by numerically significant student subgroups, including, but not limited to, ethnic subgroups, socioeconomically disadvantaged students, English learners, students with disabilities, foster youth, and students with disabilities homeless students. The report also shall include information about Based on the data, the Board shall address any identified disparities in the imposition of student discipline and shall determine whether and how the District is meeting its goals for improving school climate as specified in its local control and accountability plan.

Public Activities Involving Staff, Students or School Facilities - Access to District Records

The Board of Education recognizes its legal requirement to provide, upon request, access to public records relating to the conduct of the District's business, as prescribed by law the right of citizens to have access to public records of the District.

- I. Access to District Records
 - A. During normal business hours, any person shall have the right to inspect the public records of the schools and District, as such records are defined in Government Section 6250 et seq. (the "California Public Records Act") and Administrative Regulation 1340.1. Any person may inspect or receive a copy of any identifiable public record. Records that are not subject to public disclosure are set forth in the California Public Records Act, California law pertaining to pupil records and Administrative Regulation 1340.1. The Board intends the District to provide any person reasonable access to the public records of the schools and District during normal business hours and within the requirements of law.
 - B. Public access shall not be given to confidential pupil records, as such records are defined in Education Code Section 49060 et seq., or other records listed as exempt from public disclosure in the California Public Records Act or other provisions of law. Public access shall not be given to records listed as exempt from public disclosure in the California Public Records Act and other state or federal law.
 - C. In response to a public records request, the Superintendent or designee shall make reasonable efforts to locate the requested records, including, but not limited to, any electronic communication substantively related to the records, such as email, text messages, instant messages, and other electronic communications, regardless of whether they are transmitted through a District-provided device or account or through an employee's or Board member's personal device or account.
 - D. In order to help maintain the security of District records, members of the public granted access shall examine records in the presence of a District staff member.
- II. Direct Costs of Duplication

The District may charge for copies of public records or other materials requested by individuals or groups. The Superintendent or designee shall determine the charge, based on direct costs of duplication. The per copy charge for duplication of written materials

for Public Records requests received on or after January 1, 2014 shall be 25 cents per page. The charge for videotapes of a Board of Education meeting shall be \$10 per meeting, with a maximum of two tapes per meeting. Additional tapes are subject to a \$10 charge. The District may charge for copies of public records or other materials requested by individuals or groups. The charge shall be based on actual costs of duplication, as determined by the Superintendent or designee and as specified in administrative regulation.

III. Superintendent to Develop Regulation(s)

The Superintendent shall formulate such regulation(s) as necessary to implement this policy.

Advertising and Promotion

The Governing Board establishes this policy to ensure effective and consistent implementation of its directions related to advertisements and promotions by non-school groups in school-sponsored print and online publications, websites, and social media, and on school facilities. Student speech shall be regulated in accordance with BP/AR 5145.2 - Freedom of Speech/ Expression.

Limited Public Forum

Glendale Unified School District desires to promote positive relationships between District schools and the community in order to enhance community support and involvement in the schools. Therefore, the Superintendent or designee may approve:

- 1. Distribution of noncommercial materials that publicize services, special events, public meetings, or other gatherings of interest to students or parents/guardians. Events or programs sponsored by a profit-making organization on behalf of a nonprofit organization may be acceptable for distribution depending upon the material itself.
- 2. Distribution of promotional materials of a commercial nature to students or parent/guardians.
- 2. <u>3.</u> Paid advertisements on school property, including, but not limited to, advertisements on billboards and scoreboards.
- 3. <u>4.</u> Paid advertisements in school-sponsored publications, yearbooks, announcements, and other school communications, including websites and social media.
- 4. <u>5.</u> Products and materials donated by commercial enterprises for educational use, including those that bear the name and/or logo of the donor, as long as they do not unduly promote the donor or any commercial activity or product.

Prior to the distribution, posting, or publishing of any non-school group's promotional materials or advertisement, the Superintendent or designee shall review the materials or advertisement based on the criteria listed below. He/she may not disapprove materials or advertisement in an arbitrary or capricious manner or in a way that discriminates against a particular viewpoint on a subject that is otherwise allowed by Board policy.

All materials to be distributed shall bear the name and contact information of the sponsoring entity. As necessary, the Superintendent or designee shall require The District will add a disclaimer on any non-school group's promotional materials to be distributed, posted, or published, stating that

the distribution, posting, or publishing of the materials does not imply District endorsement of the group's activities, products, or services.

Criteria for Approval

The Superintendent or designee shall not accept for distribution any materials or advertisements that:

- 1. Are lewd, obscene, libelous, or slanderous.
- 2. Incite students to commit unlawful acts, violate school rules, or disrupt the orderly operation of the schools.
- 3. Are religious, political, or controversial in nature.
- 4. <u>3.</u> Discriminate against, attack, or denigrate any group on account of any unlawful consideration.
- 5. <u>4.</u> Promote the use or sale of materials or services that are illegal or inconsistent with school objectives, including, but not limited to, materials or advertisements for tobacco, intoxicants, non-nutritious foods and beverages, and movies or products unsuitable for children.
- 6. <u>5.</u> Solicit funds or services for an organization, with the exception of solicitations authorized in Board policy.
- 7. <u>6.</u> Distribute unsolicited merchandise for which an ensuing payment is requested.

The Superintendent or designee also may consider the educational value of the materials or advertisements, the age or maturity of the students in the intended audience, and whether the materials or advertisements support the basic educational mission of the District, directly benefit the students, or are of intrinsic value to the students or their parents/guardians.

Schools may establish additional criteria pertaining to the content of advertisements in school publications and yearbooks, as deemed appropriate by the Superintendent or designee in accordance with law and Board policy.

The use of District or school names, logos, or images is limited to specific written approval by the Superintendent or designee.

Course Overview:	Healthcare Internship is the capstone course for the Health Science and Medical Technology Industry sector, Patient care pathway. In this capstone course, students will deepen their understanding of the Health Science and Medical Technology—Patient Care Industry through application and study of actual cases, through critical examination of the ethics and procedures involved in a clinical setting, and through an internship at a local medical facility (preferably a laboratory facility). First Semester-Course Content

Unit 1: The Immune System

(5 Weeks)

- A. In this unit, students will demonstrate an understanding of how the human body fights or fails to fight infection of viruses and bacteria.
- B. KEY ASSIGNMENT: Starve a Fever? Feed a Cold? Students research and write a paper on the differences between a cold and a flu. As part of their research, students will study the pathology of both illnesses (using cell and tissue structures to explain what is happening as the cold or flu makes the host ill and explain what constitutes a susceptible host. The paper will also include the following: How the diseases spread from person to person (Know the chain of infection & ways to break the chain) How the body fights the diseases (Know the Immune Response steps) Myth or fact when it comes to home cures for the diseases – research common home remedies to discover their efficacy (research homeopathic medicine) Why the flu can be deadly (Know stages of Infectious Disease) Possible immunizations and treatments for the diseases and how they work(Know Immunity Types & Classification of Vaccinations)

Unit 2: Prevention of Injury and Disease

(5 Weeks)

- A. Using their understanding of basic anatomy and physiology students will apply learned patient care protocols when discussing and evaluating specific injuries. Students will demonstrate transporting, transferring, and positioning patients who are injured. As they work, students will practice using prevention methods in order to assure no further injuries are incurred and/or no diseases are spread to or from the patient (Know Use of Standard Precautions & PPE).
- B. KEY ASSIGNMENT: An Accident! The teacher assigns student groups several different types of injuries (e.g., broken leg, concussion, puncture wound, etc.) Each group will design a scenario where all of these injuries could happen, and determine criteria for triage application. Students write a

> step-by-step description of the scene and what the protocols would be if a licensed health-care professional came across the scene. (Students will demonstrate an understanding of The Good Samaritan Law.) They would explain how the patients would be transported and how to keep them most comfortable. Once the groups have all the details down, they will role-play and act out their scenes, make corrections (if necessary), then turn in their descriptions.

Unit 3: Communication and Cultural Differences

(10 Weeks)

- A. In this unit, students will research how cultural differences and belief systems may require alternative treatment, a different approach in communication. Students will recognize the factors affecting therapeutic communication: age and gender; economic barriers; education and life experience; bias and prejudice; verbal roadblocks; patients defense mechanism; cultural and religious diversity; Maslow's hierarchy of human needs . Students will also demonstrate an understanding of the rights of the patient.
- B. KEY ASSIGNMENT: Who Are My Neighbors? Students research and create an infographic that shows the ethnic, religious, and socioeconomic make-up of their school and community. Students will write a research report on the traditional attitudes of each demographic towards Western medicine and alternative treatments (acupuncture, chiropractic, nutrition, stress-relief, etc.). Next, students will create a survey to test the actual attitudes of peers and community members towards different types of treatment. Surveys will include questions about why people resist different types of treatments. Students will share their survey results and compare expected answers with actual answers. Students have a class discussion on how to know what each patient needs. Ultimately, students should demonstrate that observation, asking appropriate questions, and listening skills need to be developed in order to understand any patient.

The tool must be free, public, and easy to hand out/distribute (Optional: Students collaborate with their peers in foreign language classes, Digital Media Arts, and Performing Arts to create multicultural and multilingual approaches to spreading their messages.)

Course Overview:	Digital Arts 1-2 is the introductory course for the Arts, Media and Entertainment industry sector and Design, Visual and Media Arts pathway. This course offers students a working understanding of art/design language while introducing them to digital art, design, and animation software. Students will develop fundamental skills in drawing, painting, sculpture and visual literacy that will prepare them for more advanced study in the areas of illustration, conceptual development, 3D computer graphics, animation and film. Emphasis is placed on traditional skills needed to produce viable content aligned with industry standards in animation, visual effects, game design, product design, graphic media, and film.

First Semester-Course Content

Unit 1: Drawing	g Basics - Observational/Conceptual	(4 weeks)

STANDARDS Visual and Performing Arts Standards 1.1; 1.2; 1.4 & 2.1 CTE Arts Media and Entertainment Arts - A. Design, Visual and Media Arts Pathway Standards A1.2; A1.3; A1.6 & A2.3

- A. Drawing is a critical skill that is applicable to all visual art areas. Observational drawing can be used to understand natural and artificial forms to be used later in original content. Drawing is also a powerful tool used in the conceptualization of ideas, sequences, etc. This unit focuses on establishing drawing proficiency for illustrating concepts that are applicable to a variety of art and design fields.
- B. Students will learn how to draw a variety of subjects form observation and learn how to represent them with accuracy. Students will also be required to use drawing as a tool to convey larger concepts and production ideas in the form visual storytelling. A rubric will be used for assessing craftsmanship and conceptual clarity, while verbal critique will offer collaborative analysis and discussion.

Unit 2: Elements/Principles of Art and Design

(4 weeks)

STANDARDS

Visual and Performing Arts Standards 1.1; 1.2; 1.4 & 1.6 CTE Arts Media and Entertainment Arts - A. Design, Visual and Media Arts Pathway Standards A1.2; A1.3; A1.6 & A4.3

- A. The elements of art/principles of design are the foundation for thoughtfully producing and analyzing works of art. This unit equips students with tools needed to discuss and analyze works by established artists, as well as in their own work. Vocabulary associated with the use of value, line, texture, shape, balance, movement, repetition, contrast, etc. will be explored. Students will learn how the manipulation of these elements/principles in art can create meaning and support expression.
- B. Students will create a reference poster, booklet, or presentation that illustrates and explains how each element/principle is used visually. Students will use this reference guide to inform their work throughout the course. Rubrics will be used to determine student success in creatively depicting concepts and written critique will be used to assess successful use of the elements of art and principles of design.

Unit 3: Composition and Visual Communication

(4 weeks)

STANDARDS Visual and Performing Arts Standards 2.1, 2.3, 3.3, 5.1 & 5.4 CTE Arts Media and Entertainment Arts - A. Design, Visual and Media Arts Pathway Standards A2.6, A2.7, & A2.9

- A. This unit establishes the framework needed for students to compose and communicate the meaning and/or function of products, environments, functional objects and characters in a three dimensional space or specific scenario while utilizing traditional and digital design tools. Compositional rules and visual vocabulary will allow students to determine artistic intent and facilitate the development of individual artistic style and voice. Students will be able to identify and design content for specific audiences while considering how historical and cultural elements affect message and meaning.
- B. Students will design and illustrate two dimensional drawings of original concepts in conjunction with written descriptions. Students will produce compositions demonstrating mastery of skills in the form of a poster, design sheet and/or advertisement. Students will learn to utilize a variety of communication methods and persuasive techniques while utilizing critique methods to reflect upon their processes.

Unit 4: Perspective Drawing

(4 weeks)

STANDARDS Visual and Performing Arts Standards 2.4 & 4.5 CTE Arts Media and Entertainment Arts - A. Design, Visual and Media Arts Pathway Standards A1.2, A2.3 & A4.4

- A. The course provides students with the necessary framework and skill set for understanding three dimensional representation in 2D space. Students will explore historical methods for achieving the illusion of space, and how a variety of art forms employ such tools.
- B. Students will use traditional perspective drawing techniques to create a realistic rendering of a proposed structure within an established environment. Students will explain and articulate the concept, purpose, and significance of the structure within an actual environment. Students will apply traditional drawing skills to digital media and participate in collaborative critique and rubric-based assessments to reflect upon their designs.

Unit 5: Intro to Light and Color Theory

(4 weeks)

STANDARDS Visual and Performing Arts Standards 1.4, 2.1 & 2.5 CTE Arts Media and Entertainment Arts - A. Design, Visual and Media Arts Pathway Standards A1.3, A2.9 & A2.9

- A. Using their knowledge of basic elements of art, students will delve deeper into color theory and the ways in which light and color can be manipulated to achieve artistic effects and enhance meaning.
- B. Students will design a color wheel, various color schemes, and original artwork to explore how variations in color can affect the meaning, mood, and interpretation in art. Students will produce original artwork and then create variations of them utilizing different color schemes and lighting iterations.

Second Semester-Course Content

Unit 6: Graphic Design

(4 weeks)

STANDARDS

Visual and Performing Arts Standards 1.1; 1.2; 1.4 & 5.1 CTE Arts Media and Entertainment Arts - A. Design, Visual and Media Arts Pathway Standards A1.2; A1.3; A1.9 & A2.2

- A. Students will become familiarized with the basics of graphic design and how the elements of art and principles of design can be used to create meaning. Students will learn about common techniques used in print and digital media, as well as proper techniques on how to effectively communicate ideas using images and text. Project based assignments will allow students to design concepts around summative assessments, and written/verbal critique will allow students to analyze and improve their work.
- B. Students will develop an original concept for a product or organization and create a brand identity for it. Students will manipulate text and imagery to create persuasive and visually engaging artwork. A rubric will be used for assessing proficiency and students will participate in verbal critique with peer input.

Unit 7: Illustration

(3 weeks)

STANDARDS

Visual and Performing Arts Standards 1.1; 1.2 & 5.1 CTE Arts Media and Entertainment Arts - A. Design, Visual and Media Arts Pathway Standards A21., A2.3, A3.3, & A5.7

- A. Students will become familiar with both traditional and digital tools used for visually depicting original concepts and narrative subjects. Students will learn how to use written elements to create engaging visual representations. They will also become familiar with the similarities and differences between traditional drawing/painting tools and digital ones.
- B. Students will analyze existing texts as well as create original written narrative scenes featuring detailed and descriptive imagery. They will then simulate a freelance illustration experience and enlist other classmates to illustrate their written work. Students will analyze and critique the various ways individuals interpret text, design, and apply individual style to make illustrations.

Unit 8: Traditional 3D Design

(3 weeks)

- A. Students will learn about various techniques for conceptualizing art in three dimensions. Students will learn how to create two dimensional designs that consider three dimensional space. They will then use a variety of physical materials to create tangible designs.
- B. Students will create an original design of a fictional or mythological animal. They will observe reference images of animals and combine anatomical elements to create original forms. Students will consider multiple angles and perspectives to visualize their design. They will then build a physical model that adheres to that design. Students will analyze and reflect upon the process of conceptualizing art in both two and three dimensional spaces through written and verbal critique.

Unit 9: Digital 3D Design

(6 weeks)

STANDARDS

Visual and Performing Arts Standards 1.6, 2.1 & 4.2 CTE Arts Media and Entertainment Arts - A. Design, Visual and Media Arts Pathway Standards A1.7, A2.5, A4.6 & A8.2, A8.4

- A. Students will build upon their experience working with physical, three dimensional materials and move to working in a virtual 3D space. Students will learn about the basics of 3D modeling through a variety of software packages. Students will compare techniques used for organic and inorganic modeling and how those models can be integrated into animation, design, and 3D printing processes.
- B. Students will model an interior space using basic forms through polygonal modeling. Students will then transition to organic modeling and digital sculpture to model a human head. Students will reference source imagery and anatomical reference to accurately reproduce their designs. Students will use industry-standard software and will be able to articulate the different processes and components used to create their designs.

Unit 10: Character Design

(4 weeks)

STANDARDS

- A. Students will learn about the concept design process used to create original character content for film, television, and games. Students will explore the relationship between written character material and visual representation. Students will analyze engaging characters from a variety of sources to understand how to make an appealing and memorable design.
- B. Students will generate an original character concept, complete with backstory and visual design elements. Students will then produce a digitally painted model sheet that displays their character from a variety of angles as well as information about the character. Students will then adapt their character into a digital 3D model that will be digitally painted, and 3D printed into a physical object. By the end of the unit, students will have a presentation worthy character design showing the process from concept to physical object. Students will then reflect upon and critique the process, meaning, and industry application.

This course offers students an expanded path of study in the principles and foundations of art and design. Emphasis is placed on working to translate written concepts/scripts into 2D/3D designs while promoting more advanced use of traditional and digital media skills. Students will interface with computer aided design software to transform concepts into digital paintings, storyboards, animations, and character/product design sheets. Students will work to develop

First Semester-Course Content

Unit 1: Principles of Animation

(5 weeks)

STANDARDS Visual and Performing Arts Standards 1.1; 1.2; 1.4 & 2.1 CTE Arts Media and Entertainment Arts - A. Design, Visual and Media Arts Pathway Standards A1.2; A1.3; A1.6 & A2.3

- A. Students will become familiarized with the 12 principles of animation and analyze examples of their use. Students will also become familiarized with handdrawn traditional animation techniques through a series of activities. Students will be able to connect animation concepts in this unit to filmmaking principles, elements of art, and emerging animation techniques.
- B. Students will work collaboratively to research the 12 principles and find examples online that illustrate successful use of the concepts. Students will then prepare a presentation and lead the class in explaining the concepts as well as analyze the effectiveness of their peers' examples. Students will then apply their understanding of animation principles to such activities as: stop motion, volumetric deformations, and timing/spacing exercises. Students will view and analyze their work among peers to critique technique.

Unit 2: Anatomy and Figure studies

(4 weeks)

STANDARDS

Visual and Performing Arts Standards 1.1; 1.2; 1.4 & 1.6 CTE Arts Media and Entertainment Arts - A. Design, Visual and Media Arts Pathway Standards A1.2; A1.3; A1.6 & A4.3

- A. Using observational drawing as a basis, students will analyze and reproduce natural forms found in human and animal anatomy. This will strengthen their observational and perceptual skills and help them access a greater range of movement and experience for animating figures in future lessons.
- B. Students will create a series of figure drawings in traditional media that highlight realistic, gestural representations of the human form. Students will then apply their drawings to more refined compositions featuring a variety of poses and subjects while employing the use of traditional and digital tools. Finally, students will analyze how the essence of motion can be captured within static images and will participate in individual reflection and group critique.

Unit 3: Storyboarding

(3 weeks)

STANDARDS

Visual and Performing Arts Standards 2.1, 2.3, 3.3, 5.1 & 5.4 CTE Arts Media and Entertainment Arts - A. Design, Visual and Media Arts Pathway Standards A2.6, A2.7, & A2.9

- A. Visual storytelling is critical to an engaging television, film, animation, and/or video game production. The skills needed to adapt written narratives to visual formats are applicable through storyboarding and pre visualization processes. Students will become familiar with filmmaking and compositional techniques using shots, angles, movements, transitions and text/audio integration to tell successful, sequential narratives.
- B. Students will create storyboards for both existing and original narratives. They will explore how storyboarding techniques can be applied to various industries including: film, television, advertising, games, etc. Students will then create an animatic or animated storyboard that utilizes camera movements and transitions, and incorporate multimedia elements to create an engaging narrative experience. Students will analyze their work by participating in individual reflection and group critique.

Unit 4: Animation Production

(8 weeks)

STANDARDS Visual and Performing Arts Standards 2.4 & 4.5 CTE Arts Media and Entertainment Arts - A. Design, Visual and Media Arts Pathway Standards A1.2, A2.3 & A4.4

- A. Students will utilize prior knowledge of animation concepts and visual storytelling to create an original narrative. Students will review the 12 animation principles as well as narrative and storytelling concepts from their introduction to cinematography to create a complete project that utilizes pre visualization and production techniques. Students will be introduced to new techniques and learn how to apply familiar concepts in new ways.
- B. Students will create a short animated narrative featuring a central character. They will design the character from multiple angles and animate that character in a variety of poses and situations to stress uniformity in design. Students will reference traditional animation as well as keyframe and timeline techniques, allowing them to manipulate their character in new ways. Students will also consider cinematic techniques and staging as they present their work. Students will screen their final films and critique them for clarity of concept and proper technique.

Second Semester-Course Content

Unit 5: Introduction to 3D Modeling

(5 weeks)

STANDARDS Visual and Performing Arts Standards 1.4, 2.1 & 2.5 CTE Arts Media and Entertainment Arts - A. Design, Visual and Media Arts Pathway Standards A1.3, A2.9 & A2.9

- A. This course introduces students to industry standard 3D modeling software that is used across a dynamic range of industries and professional fields. Students are provided with a dynamic overview of the interface and features and how they are used in a digital design pipeline.
- B. Students will learn how to create a virtual 3D environment utilizing the full range of tools and features found inside the digital modeling pipeline. Students will reference physical objects, spatial relationships, and previous experience with physical sculpture to observing and accurately creating virtual models.

Unit 6: 3D Character Modeling

(5 Weeks)

STANDARDS Visual and Performing Arts Standards 1.1; 1.2; 1.4 & 5.1 CTE Arts Media and Entertainment Arts - A. Design, Visual and Media Arts Pathway Standards A1.2; A1.3; A1.9 & A2.2

- A. This unit introduces students to industry standard digital sculpting software. Students will analyze industry specific pipeline skills and how they relate to traditional polygonal modeling software. Students will address how digital sculpting shapes the production of assets and products in a variety of industries. This unit builds upon previous study in the areas of traditional sculpture, figure drawing, and concept design and prepares students to create elaborate and engaging 2D and 3D assets.
- B. Students will design and complete a fully realized 3D digital sculpture as well as accompanying presentation materials. Students will conceptualize and realize an original character through writing, preliminary sketches, digital painting, and finally digital sculpture. Students will use industry standard software to design a functional model that can be used in animation, design, and 3D printing capacities. Students will present their final models and critique them for clarity of concept and proper technique.

Unit 7: Digital Production

(10 weeks)

STANDARDS

Visual and Performing Arts

Standards 1.1; 1.2; 1.4, 5.4 & 5.1

CTE Arts Media and Entertainment Arts - A. Design, Visual and Media Arts Pathway Standards A1.2; A1. A2.6, A2.8, A2.9, A4.6 & A5.2

- A. The final unit in this course serves as an opportunity to produce a preliminary portfolio series and cohesive body of work. Students will integrate elements of all previous untos and skills to create a series of works based on a central theme and/or narrative. The process will require students to recall and apply elements of art concepts, observational drawing, sequential storytelling, digital painting, graphic design, and 3D design to a finalized collection of work which will be presented to instructors, peers, industry partners, and post-secondary institutions for analysis and feedback.
- B. Students will create a body of work based on a central character and story that utilizes all of their previously learned skills. Students will produce a narrative that integrates original character designs, environmental designs, and sequential elements. They will collaborate on the production of original content that utilizes the elements of art and principles of design, figurative art, digital painting, and digital and physical 3D models. Students will create a presentation ready portfolio experience that highlights the cumulative work they have engaged in. The work will display evidence of proficiency in both software and technical skill.

Course Overview:	Digital Arts 5-6 serves as the capstone course for Arts, Media and Entertainment industry sector, Digital Arts pathway. Students will apply previously developed skill sets and technical knowledge to projects that align with specific industry pipelines and workflows. Students will collaborate on projects that utilize a variety of design and conceptual processes that integrate both traditional and digital media. Students will also get the opportunity to explore different production roles on projects that showcase industry-applicable skills and processes. Completion of the course will facilitate a foundational underpinning for advanced level work	

and yield a professional portfolio/reel that can be used for college applications, internships and the workplace.

First Semester-Course Content

Unit 1: Industry Research Portfolio Development

(2 weeks)

- A. Students will research specific roles in careers and industries that relate to design, 3D modeling/animation, visual effects, etc. They will then identify employers, studios, and post-secondary programs that offer opportunities for such jobs. Students will focus on gaining an understanding about the requirements and skills needed for specific industry careers and will plan a path to meet those requirements.
- B. Students will do a research presentation on a specific career position in digital arts and present to the class pertinent information about the job and how to achieve it. After students have learned about careers from their peers' presentations, they will then develop a plan for building a portfolio/reel in an industry role of their choosing and organize necessary scheduling and skill building options.

Unit 2: Skill Review and Concept Development

(3 weeks)

A. Once students have identified a specific industry role to work towards, they will then develop a conceptual narrative framework with which to organize and focus their skills. Productions in digital media and entertainment involve working collaboratively as well as displaying mastery of specific software and skills. To facilitate the organization and execution of summative work, students will consider and assume multiple roles needed to create a cohesive production.

B. Students will create or adapt a narrative work into a design concept that includes character development, environmental design, storyboard and accompanying assets. Students will then assume a specific, practical creative role and collaborate with other students on a selected concept. Finally, as a team students will identify and review necessary skills and techniques needed to achieve their goal. Instructor will advise and review as students prepare for production.

Unit 3: Collaborative Production 1

(5 weeks)

- A. Students will have the opportunity to integrate all of the skills explored in the pathway thus far and generate presentation-ready works while building their portfolios. Students will work collaboratively to plan, write, and execute a conceptual project within the digital arts industries.
- B. Students will collaborate on a cohesive concept such as an animation, film production, product development, environmental proposal, industrial design, etc. They will complete a conceptual framework as well as a finished product. Students will produce preliminary designs, simulations, storyboards, etc. as they work towards a finished product. All stages of work will be critiqued by peers and assessed by the instructor for clarity of vision and professional execution.

Unit 4: Collaborative Production 2

(5 weeks)

Students will work collaboratively to plan, write, and execute a conceptual project within the digital arts industries while focusing on skills in need of development or ideas yet to be realized.
- B. Students will again collaborate on a cohesive concept such as an animation, film production, product development, environmental proposal, industrial design,

> etc. They will complete a conceptual framework as well as a finished product while making a point to explore different roles and develop alternate skills. Students will produce preliminary designs, simulations, storyboards, etc. as they work towards a finished product. All stages of work will be critiqued by peers and assessed by the instructor for clarity of vision and professional execution.

Second Semester-Course Content

Unit 5: Portfolio Development

(5 weeks)

STANDARDS

- A. After reviewing their portfolio goals and gathering work from their two collaborative projects, students will begin to ready their portfolios for presentation. Students will continue to integrate all of the skills explored in the pathway while honing in on a concentration.
- B. Students will identify and analyze assets and pieces from their two previous collaborative projects to determine a focus that is aligned with a career or position previously researched or engaged in. Students will then work towards completing a supporting series of work to be used to fill out their portfolio/reel. Instructor and industry partners will provide guidance.

Unit 6: Community Service Project

(5 weeks)

A. The opportunity for creative industries to engage with society and perform civic duty are often overshadowed by more commonly associated entertainment opportunities. While still developing their portfolio, students will apply their design and conceptual skills to the creation of a community service project. They will identify a concern or issue in their local community and create a body of work based on raising awareness of or positively affecting that issue.

> B. Students will explore their local community and identify an opportunity to make a positive impact through the use of digital art and design skills. Students will research, produce, and present an advertising or public service campaign, documentary short, branding opportunity, narrative work, instructional piece, etc. that has the potential to impact their community.

Unit 7: Industry Internship / Final Project

(10 weeks)

- A. By the end of the third year of the Digital Arts pathway, students will have had the opportunity to acquire a variety of skills that can be applied to multiple creative industries. They will be able to conceptualize ideas and create engaging visual designs. While many industries require the knowledge of specific software or trade skills, students in the program will have gained a breadth of skills and an understanding of the collaborative nature of digital arts and entertainment design.
- B. For the summative portion of the course, students will either engage in an industry-sponsored internship opportunity or produce a final, individually produced film or narrative digital work. Students will be required to plan, and execute a fully-realized narrative work or complete a successful internship in the field.

Contract Term: The minimum contract term is from the award date through June 30, 2019.

Governing Law and Venue: This Agreement has been negotiated and executed in the state of California and shall be governed by and construed under the laws of the state of California. Such remedies shall be in addition to any other remedies provided by law.

Force Majeure Clause: The parties to the Contract shall be excused from performance thereunder during the time and to the extent that they are prevented from obtaining, delivering, or performing by act of God, fire, strike, loss, or shortage of transportation facilities, lock-out, commandeering of materials, products, plants or facilities by the government, when satisfactory evidence thereof is presented to the other party(ies), provided that it is satisfactorily established that the non-performance is not due to the fault or neglect of the party not performing.

Attorney fees: In any action or proceeding to enforce or interpret any provision of this Agreement, or where any provision hereof is validly asserted as a defense, each party shall bear its own attorney's fees, costs and expenses.

SERVICES AGREEMENT

WITNESSETH: The parties do hereby contract and agree as follows:

1. *Services Description*. CONTRACTOR will perform the services described in the "Scope of Work" attached hereto as Addendum A and made a part thereof.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

- 1. **Term**. Contractor shall commence providing services under this Agreement on <u>March 8</u>, 2018 and will diligently perform as required and complete performance by <u>June 30</u>, 2018
- 2. **Submittal of Documents**. The Contractor shall not commence the Services under this Agreement until the Contractor has submitted and the District has approved the certificate(s) and affidavit(s), and the endorsement(s) of insurance required as indicated below:
 - X Signed Agreement
 - X Workers' Compensation Certification
 - X Fingerprinting/Criminal Background Investigation Certification
 - X Insurance Certificates and Endorsements
 - X W-9 Form
 - X Non-collusion Declaration
 - X Tuberculosis Clearance
- 3. **Compensation**. District agrees to pay the Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement (as needed, as requested) a total fee not to exceed (NTE) One hundred thousand dollars (\$ 100,000.00) which includes reimbursable cost listed in item 4.1. District shall pay Contractor according to the following terms and conditions:

Note: Accounts Payable will not process payment until the services have been completed. Invoices should be submitted to Accounts Payable Department, Glendale Unified School District, 223 N. Jackson Street, Glendale, CA 91206.

4. **Expenses**. District shall not be liable to Contractor for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by Contractor in performing services for District, except as follows:

4.1. **N/A**

- 5. **Independent Contractor**. Contractor, in the performance of this Agreement, shall be and act as an independent contractor. Contractor understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of the District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of the District and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Worker's Compensation. Contractor shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to Contractor's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, Contractor is an independent contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and directing the performance of the details of the work, District being interested only in the results obtained.
- 6. **Materials**. Contractor shall furnish, at its own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement, except as follows:
- 7. **Copyright/Trademark/Patent**. Contractor understands and agrees that all matters produced under this Agreement shall become the property of District and cannot be used without District's express written permission. District shall have all right, title and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said matter in the name of the District. Contractor consents to use of Contractor's name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance and distribution of the matters, for any purpose and in any medium.

8. Termination.

- 8.1. **Without Cause by District**. District may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Contractor only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by District shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by Contractor. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Contractor or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
- 8.2. Without Cause by Contractor. Contractor may, upon sixty (60) days notice, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement. Upon this termination, District shall only be obligated to compensate Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by Contractor shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services to District. Contractor acknowledges that this sixty (60) day notice period is acceptable so that the District can attempt to procure the Services from another source.
- 8.3. With Cause by District. District may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - 8.3.1. material violation of this Agreement by the Contractor; or
 - 8.3.2. any act by Contractor exposing the District to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - 8.3.3. Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt, Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of Contractor's insolvency.

Written notice by District shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within three (3) calendar days after that notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this Agreement shall upon the expiration of the three (3) calendar days cease and terminate. In the event of this termination, the District may secure the required services from another Contractor. If the expense, fees, and/or costs to the District exceed the cost of providing the service pursuant to this Agreement, the Contractor shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to the District's notice of these expense, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to District.

9. Indemnification. To the furthest extent permitted by California law, Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold free and harmless the District, its Board of Education, agents, representatives, officers, Contractors, employees, trustees, and volunteers ("the indemnified parties") from any and all claims, demands, causes of action, suits, actions, costs, expenses, judgments, liability, loss, damage or injury of any kind, nature and description, in law or equity ("Claim"), to property or persons including, but not limited to, personal injury, bodily injury, death, property damage, and Contractors' and/or attorneys' fees and costs, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the negligence, recklessness, errors or omissions, or willful misconduct of Contractor, its officials, officers, employees, subcontractors, Contractors, or agents, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the performance of the Services, the Project, or this Agreement, including without limitation the payment of all consequential damages; or from any activity, work, or thing done, permitted, or suffered by the Contractor in conjunction with this Agreement, unless the claims are caused wholly by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the District. The District shall have the right to accept or reject any legal representation that Contractor proposes to defend the indemnified parties.

10. Insurance.

10.1. The Contractor shall procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the Services the following insurance with minimum limits equal to the amount indicated below.

10.1.1. **Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability Insurance**. Commercial General Liability Insurance and Any Auto Automobile Liability Insurance that shall protect the Contractor, the District, and the State from all claims of bodily injury, property damage, personal injury, death, advertising injury, and medical payments arising performing any portion of the Services. (Form CG 0001 and CA 0001, or forms substantially similar, if approved by the District.)

- 10.1.2. Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance. Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Services. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, the Contractor shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees. If any class of employee or employees engaged in performing any portion of the Services under this Agreement are not protected under the Workers' Compensation Statute, adequate insurance coverage for the protection of any employee(s) not otherwise protected must be obtained before any of those employee(s) commence performing any portion of the Services.
- 10.1.3. **Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions)**. Professional Liability Insurance as appropriate to the Contractor's profession.
- 10.2. **Proof of Carriage of Insurance**. The Contractor shall not commence performing any portion of the Services until all required insurance has been obtained and certificates indicating the required coverage have been delivered in duplicate to the District and approved by the District. Certificates and insurance policies shall include the following:
 - 10.2.1. A clause stating: "SHOULD ANY OF THE ABOVE DESCRIBED POLICIES BE CANCELLED BEFORE THE EXPIRATION DATE THEREOF, NOTICE WILL BE DELIVERED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE POLICY PROVISION."
 - 10.2.2. Language stating in particular those insured, extent of insurance, location and operation to which insurance applies, expiration date, to which cancellation and reduction notice will be sent, and length of notice period.
 - 10.2.3. An endorsement stating that the District and its Board of Education, agents, representatives, employees, trustees, officers, Contractors, and volunteers are named additional insured under all policies except Workers' Compensation Insurance, Professional Liability, and Employers' Liability Insurance. An endorsement shall also state that Contractor's insurance policies shall be primary to any insurance or self-insurance maintained by District. An endorsement shall also state that there shall be a waiver of any subrogation.
 - 10.2.4. All policies except the Professional Liability, Workers' Compensation Insurance, and Employers' Liability Insurance Policies shall be written on an occurrence form.
- 10.3. Acceptability of Insurers. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A: VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the District.
- 11. Assignment. The obligations of the Contractor pursuant to this Agreement shall not be assigned by the Contractor.

- 12. **Compliance with Laws**. **Debarment and Suspension**. Contractor warrants and certifies that neither Contractor, nor any person working for or acting on behalf of Contractor as part of this Agreement, has been or is debarred, penalized by, convicted, sanctioned, suspended, excluded or otherwise ineligible to participate in any state or federal program, or by any federal department or agency, or by Los Angeles County
- 13. **Certificates/Permits/Licenses**. Contractor and all Contractor's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such certificates, permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of Services pursuant to this Agreement.
- 14. **Employment with Public Agency**. Contractor, if an employee of another public agency, agrees that Contractor will not receive salary or remuneration, other than vacation pay, as an employee of another public agency for the actual time in which services are actually being performed pursuant to this Agreement.
- 15. Anti-Discrimination. District programs, activities, practices shall be free from discrimination based on race, color, ancestry, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital or parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity or expression, or genetic information; the perception of one or more of such characteristics; or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics and therefore the Contractor agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and District policy. In addition, the Contractor agrees to require like compliance by all of its subcontractor(s).
- 16. **Fingerprinting of Employees**. The Fingerprinting/Criminal Background Investigation Certification must be completed and attached to this Agreement prior to Contractor's performing of any portion of the Services.
- 17. No Rights in Third Parties. This Agreement does not create any rights in, or inure to the benefit of, any third party except as expressly provided herein.
- 18. District's Evaluation of Contractor and Contractor's Employees and/or Subcontractors. The District may evaluate the Contractor in any way the District is entitled pursuant to applicable law. The District's evaluation may include, without limitation:
 - 18.1. Requesting that District employee(s) evaluate the Contractor and the Contractor's employees and subcontractors and each of their performance.
 - 18.2. Announced and unannounced observance of Contractor, Contractor's employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s).
- 19. Limitation of District Liability. Other than as provided in this Agreement, District's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall District be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue,

arising out of or in connection with this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.

20. **Confidentiality**. The Contractor and all Contractor's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services. Contractor understands that student records are confidential and agrees to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement.

Both parties will maintain in confidence and safeguard all confidential information, as defined in this paragraph, of the other party, it affiliates, and its customers. "Confidential Information" means any information that is marked or otherwise identified as confidential or proprietary at the time of disclosure or by law, and includes but is not limited to, trade secrets, know-how, inventions, techniques, data, customers list, personal information, financial information, sales, and marketing plans of the other party, its affiliates, or its customers. Both parties recognize and acknowledge the confidential and proprietary nature of any Confidential Information and acknowledge the irreparable harm that could result if such confidential information is disclosed to a third party or used for unauthorized purposes. Each party agrees to use any Confidential Information only for the purpose of conduction business with each other and their clients in the manner contemplated by this Agreement. Both parties will restrict disclosure of any Confidential Information to only those personnel who have a need to know and will bind such personnel to obligations of confidentiality to the same extent that each party is bound by this Agreement. Upon request of the owner of the confidential information, the other party will promptly return or destroy all materials incorporating any Confidential Information and any copies. The obligation under this paragraph do not apply to information that: 1) is or becomes generally known or in the public domain through no act or omission of the other party; 2) was lawfully in Insight's or Client's possession without restriction as to use or disclosure before its receipt from the other party; 3) is received from, or was made available to, a third party without any obligation of confidentiality; 4) was independently developed; 5) is otherwise permitted to be disclosed under this Agreement; 6) is disclosed with the prior written consent of the disclosing party; or 7) is required to be disclosed in any civil or criminal legal proceeding, regulatory proceeding or any similar process, however, the party required to make the disclosure under the law shall give prompt notice of this to the other party prior to such disclosure so that the other party may seek an appropriate protective order or give its consent to such disclosure.

21. **Notice**. Any notice required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be deemed to have been given, served, and received if given in writing and either personally delivered or deposited in the United States mail, registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt required, or sent by overnight delivery service, or facsimile transmission, addressed as follows:

Any notice personally given or sent by facsimile transmission shall be effective upon receipt. Any notice sent by overnight delivery service shall be effective the business day next following delivery thereof to the overnight delivery service. Any notice given by mail shall be effective three (3) days after deposit in the United States mail.

- 22. **Integration/Entire Agreement of Parties**. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties. In the event an express conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the terms of the any attachments or exhibits, the terms of this Agreement will prevail.
- 23. **California Law**. This Agreement shall be governed by and the rights, duties and obligations of the Parties shall be determined and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California, in the County of Los Angeles. The Parties further agree that any action or proceeding brought to enforce the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall be maintained in the county in which the District's administrative offices are located.
- 24. **Waiver**. The waiver by either party of any breach of any term, covenant, or condition herein contained shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such term, covenant, condition, or any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant, or condition herein contained.
- 25. **Severability**. If any term, condition or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will nevertheless continue in full force and effect, and shall not be affected, impaired or invalidated in any way.
- 26. **Provisions Required By Law Deemed Inserted.** Each and every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted in this Contract shall be deemed to be inserted herein and this Contract shall be read and enforced as though it were included therein.
- 27. **Authority to Bind Parties.** Neither party in the performance of any and all duties under this Agreement, except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, has any authority to bind the other to any agreements or undertakings.
- 28. Attorney Fees/Costs. Should litigation be necessary to enforce any terms or provisions of this Agreement, then each party shall bear its own litigation and collection expenses, witness fees, court costs and attorney's fees.
- 29. **Captions and Interpretations.** Paragraph headings in this Agreement are used solely for convenience, and shall be wholly disregarded in the construction of this Agreement. No provision of this Agreement shall be interpreted for or against a party because that party or its legal

representative drafted such provision, and this Agreement shall be construed as if jointly prepared by the Parties.

- 30. **Calculation of Time.** For the purposes of this Agreement, "days" refers to calendar days unless otherwise specified.
- 31. **Signature Authority.** Each party has the full power and authority to enter into and perform this Agreement, and the person signing this Agreement on behalf of each Party has been properly authorized and empowered to enter into this Agreement.
- 32. **Counterparts.** This Agreement and all amendments and supplements to it may be executed in counterparts, and all counterparts together shall be construed as one document.
- 33. **Incorporation of Recitals and Exhibits**. The Recitals and each exhibit attached hereto are hereby incorporated herein by reference.
- 34. Force Majeure Clause. The parties to the Contract shall be excused from performance thereunder during the time and to the extent that they are prevented from obtaining, delivering, or performing by act of God, fire, strike, loss, or shortage of transportation facilities, lock-out, commandeering of materials, products, plants or facilities by the government, when satisfactory evidence thereof is presented to the other party(ies), provided that it is satisfactorily established that the non-performance is not due to the fault or neglect of the party not performing.
- 39. **Amendments.** No alteration or variation of the terms of this Contract shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by the parties; no oral understanding or agreement not incorporated herein shall be binding on either of the parties; and no exceptions, alternatives, substitutes or revisions are valid or binding on District unless authorized by District in writing.
- 40. **Delivery.** Time of delivery of goods or services is of the essence in this Contract. District reserves the right to refuse any goods or services and to cancel all or any part of the goods not conforming to applicable specifications, drawings, samples or descriptions or services that do not conform to the prescribed statement of work. 42. The Contractor shall retain all such documentation for all covered employees for the period prescribed by the law. The Contractor shall indemnify, defend with counsel approved in writing by District, and hold harmless, the District, its agents, officers, and employees from employer sanctions and any other liability which may be assessed against the Contractor or the District or both in connection with any alleged violation of any Federal or State statutes or regulations pertaining to the eligibility for employment of any persons performing work under this Contract.

SERVICES AGREEMENT

WITNESSETH: The parties do hereby contract and agree as follows:

1. *Services Description*. CONTRACTOR will perform the services described in the "Scope of Work" attached hereto as Addendum A and made a part thereof.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

- 1. **Term**. Contractor shall commence providing services under this Agreement on <u>March 8</u>, 2018 and will diligently perform as required and complete performance by <u>June 30</u>, 2018
- 2. **Submittal of Documents**. The Contractor shall not commence the Services under this Agreement until the Contractor has submitted and the District has approved the certificate(s) and affidavit(s), and the endorsement(s) of insurance required as indicated below:

 - X Workers' Compensation Certification
 - X Fingerprinting/Criminal Background Investigation Certification
 - X Insurance Certificates and Endorsements
 - X W-9 Form
 - X Non-collusion Declaration
 - X Tuberculosis Clearance
- 3. **Compensation**. District agrees to pay the Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement (as needed, as requested) a total fee not to exceed (NTE) <u>One hundred thousand</u> dollars (<u>\$ 100,000.00</u>) which includes reimbursable cost listed in item 4.1. District shall pay Contractor according to the following terms and conditions:

Note: Accounts Payable will not process payment until the services have been completed. Invoices should be submitted to Accounts Payable Department, Glendale Unified School District, 223 N. Jackson Street, Glendale, CA 91206.

4. **Expenses**. District shall not be liable to Contractor for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by Contractor in performing services for District, except as follows:

4.1. **N/A**

- 5. **Independent Contractor**. Contractor, in the performance of this Agreement, shall be and act as an independent contractor. Contractor understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of the District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of the District and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Worker's Compensation. Contractor shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to Contractor's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, Contractor is an independent contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and directing the performance of the details of the work, District being interested only in the results obtained.
- 6. **Materials**. Contractor shall furnish, at its own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement, except as follows:
- 7. **Copyright/Trademark/Patent**. Contractor understands and agrees that all matters produced under this Agreement shall become the property of District and cannot be used without District's express written permission. District shall have all right, title and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said matter in the name of the District. Contractor consents to use of Contractor's name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance and distribution of the matters, for any purpose and in any medium.

8. Termination.

- 8.1. **Without Cause by District**. District may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Contractor only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by District shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by Contractor. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Contractor or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
- 8.2. Without Cause by Contractor. Contractor may, upon sixty (60) days notice, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement. Upon this termination, District shall only be obligated to compensate Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by Contractor shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services to District. Contractor acknowledges that this sixty (60) day notice period is acceptable so that the District can attempt to procure the Services from another source.
- 8.3. With Cause by District. District may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - 8.3.1. material violation of this Agreement by the Contractor; or
 - 8.3.2. any act by Contractor exposing the District to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - 8.3.3. Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt, Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of Contractor's insolvency.

Written notice by District shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within three (3) calendar days after that notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this Agreement shall upon the expiration of the three (3) calendar days cease and terminate. In the event of this termination, the District may secure the required services from another Contractor. If the expense, fees, and/or costs to the District exceed the cost of providing the service pursuant to this Agreement, the Contractor shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to the District's notice of these expense, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to District.

9. Indemnification. To the furthest extent permitted by California law, Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold free and harmless the District, its Board of Education, agents, representatives, officers, Contractors, employees, trustees, and volunteers ("the indemnified parties") from any and all claims, demands, causes of action, suits, actions, costs, expenses, judgments, liability, loss, damage or injury of any kind, nature and description, in law or equity ("Claim"), to property or persons including, but not limited to, personal injury, bodily injury, death, property damage, and Contractors' and/or attorneys' fees and costs, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the negligence, recklessness, errors or omissions, or willful misconduct of Contractor, its officials, officers, employees, subcontractors, Contractors, or agents, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the performance of the Services, the Project, or this Agreement, including without limitation the payment of all consequential damages; or from any activity, work, or thing done, permitted, or suffered by the Contractor in conjunction with this Agreement, unless the claims are caused wholly by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the District. The District shall have the right to accept or reject any legal representation that Contractor proposes to defend the indemnified parties.

- 13. **Certificates/Permits/Licenses**. Contractor and all Contractor's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such certificates, permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of Services pursuant to this Agreement.
- 14. **Employment with Public Agency**. Contractor, if an employee of another public agency, agrees that Contractor will not receive salary or remuneration, other than vacation pay, as an employee of another public agency for the actual time in which services are actually being performed pursuant to this Agreement.
- 15. Anti-Discrimination. - 17. No Rights in Third Parties. This Agreement does not create any rights in, or inure to the benefit of, any third party except as expressly provided herein.
- 18. District's Evaluation of Contractor and Contractor's Employees and/or Subcontractors. The District may evaluate the Contractor in any way the District is entitled pursuant to applicable law. The District's evaluation may include, without limitation:
 - 18.1. Requesting that District employee(s) evaluate the Contractor and the Contractor's employees and subcontractors and each of their performance.
 - 18.2. Announced and unannounced observance of Contractor, Contractor's employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s).
- 19. Limitation of District Liability. Other than as provided in this Agreement, District's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall District be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue,

arising out of or in connection with this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.

20. **Confidentiality**. The Contractor and all Contractor's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services. Contractor understands that student records are confidential and agrees to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement.

Both parties will maintain in confidence and safeguard all confidential information, as defined in this paragraph, of the other party, it affiliates, and its customers. "Confidential Information" means any information that is marked or otherwise identified as confidential or proprietary at the time of disclosure or by law, and includes but is not limited to, trade secrets, know-how, inventions, techniques, data, customers list, personal information, financial information, sales, and marketing plans of the other party, its affiliates, or its customers. Both parties recognize and acknowledge the confidential and proprietary nature of any Confidential Information and acknowledge the irreparable harm that could result if such confidential information is disclosed to a third party or used for unauthorized purposes. Each party agrees to use any Confidential Information only for the purpose of conduction business with each other and their clients in the manner contemplated by this Agreement. Both parties will restrict disclosure of any Confidential Information to only those personnel who have a need to know and will bind such personnel to obligations of confidentiality to the same extent that each party is bound by this Agreement. Upon request of the owner of the confidential information, the other party will promptly return or destroy all materials incorporating any Confidential Information and any copies. 21. **Notice**. Any notice required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be deemed to have been given, served, and received if given in writing and either personally delivered or deposited in the United States mail, registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt required, or sent by overnight delivery service, or facsimile transmission, addressed as follows:

- 22. **Integration/Entire Agreement of Parties**. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties. - 34. Force Majeure Clause. The parties to the Contract shall be excused from performance thereunder during the time and to the extent that they are prevented from obtaining, delivering, or performing by act of God, fire, strike, loss, or shortage of transportation facilities, lock-out, commandeering of materials, products, plants or facilities by the government, when satisfactory evidence thereof is presented to the other party(ies), provided that it is satisfactorily established that the non-performance is not due to the fault or neglect of the party not performing.

Acceptance of any part of the order of goods shall not District to accept shipments nor deprive it of the right to return goods already accepted at Contractor's expense. Over shipments and under shipments of goods shall be only as agreed to in writing by District. Delivery shall not be deemed to be complete until all goods or services have actually been received and accepted in writing by District.

- 1. *Poetry Out Loud* Robert Peralta, student from Glendale High School came in first place at the District's Poetry Out Loud competition with the poems "The Gift" by Li-Young Lee and "Self-Portrait" by Robert Creeley. He also won at the county level and will be competing at the state level in Sacramento. Robert recited "The Gift" for the audience.
- 2. *GUSD Spelling Bee Winners* The Board recognized Elaine Pimentel from Franklin Elementary School and June Musurlian from Wilson Middle School for winning the Elementary and Middle School Spelling Bees, respectively.

PRESENTATION

City of Glendale Public Works: Safe Routes to School Improvement Projects

<u>Sarkis Oganesyan</u>, Senior Civil Engineer-Public Works Department from the City of Glendale, made a presentation to the Board of Education about the Safe Routes to School program, which started in 2010. The goals of the program are to enhance safety of the pathways, sidewalks, ADA accessibility, visibility, and crossings. He explained the scope of work that will take place this summer around the area of Keppel-Toll-Hoover.

STUDENT BOARD MEMBER REPORT

<u>Student Board Member Amira Chowdhury</u> reported on the activities at various schools. She met with the Toll Middle School ASB leaders to learn more about their school culture and experience. These students looked forward to high school and building upon their passion. Everyone is grateful to this district for providing free SAT tests. On February 25, she enjoyed CV High's performance of *Oliver*. Last night, Glendale High won the Scholastic Bowl. CVHS Open House is tomorrow. She spoke about the Cross Bridge program, which is free to low-income students. She recommends the program highly. They help you achieve your goal for college and career. High school students are collaborating on the walkout scheduled for March 14. The walkout is 100% student led and student organized. It is only for those students that are against gun violence. She is excited about the Hoover High pool improvement project; the Hoover family is grateful for this project.

COMMUNCIATIONS FROM THE PUBLIC

- 1. <u>David Meyerhof</u>, coordinator of the Holocaust Speaker Program, spoke about the program, which was presented to all 10th graders in the district. This program was highly successful. The speakers, nine of them were Holocaust survivors, had a strong impact on the students and teachers. Part of this program is the writing of thank you notes to the speakers. He read a thank you note from a Hoover student thanking the speaker for giving her a glimpse of living history. He received a number of letter that stated, "you changed my life." Representatives from Assembly member Laura Friedman's and Senator Anthony Portantino's offices thanked GUSD for offering this program to the high school students and thanked Mr. Meyerhof for coordinating this program. They provided certificates of appreciation to all of the Holocaust speakers as well.
- 2. <u>Stacy Toy</u>, CSEA president, spoke about the progress they have made in negotiations. She hopes they will continue their collaborate sessions. The Superintendent and Human Resources staff have treated her with respect and have been open to their ideas. Tonight, she is here to represent the 1200 classified employees. They believe GTA members are giving students a first-class education, but there are classified members who also need to be remembered for their contributions to the education process. They know that the minimum wage will be

increasing to \$15/hour, yet the vast majority of their members barely make more than the minimum wage. They are asking for fair acknowledgement of their daily contributions, not equal to other bargaining units, but equitable for their loyalty, years of service, and support they give at every level.

- 3. <u>Tina Gevorgian</u>, senior at Hoover High, spoke about her idea of adding volunteer service to the school curriculum. In the summer of 2017, she began to volunteer at a home health agency to see what the role of a nurse is since her career choice is to become a nurse. She is grateful for the things she learned. She was more astonished of the positive outcome that volunteering offers. Volunteering is a great way to learn about one's interest. It helps many gain valuable life skills. The reason why volunteering should be mandatory is that it can alleviate stress for those students who are undecided on their careers. Volunteering can promote happiness, social relationship, and reinforce academic achievement. It helps mental health. Those who volunteer regularly have a better chance of gaining employment.
- 4. <u>Tony Pasarella</u>, resident, spoke about the student walk out planned for next week and spoke as if he was talking to his students. He recited the second amendment of the constitution, which states, "A well-regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed." He explained we are the militia. (Senator) Dianne Feinstein said she would take all of the guns away nationwide, if she could. That is a red flag for him. He feels it is up to the children and their parents if they should walk out. However, Planned Parenthood is one of the sponsor of this movement, and he would not support any movement associated with Planned Parenthood. He said, "Guns are not bad, people are bad."
- 5. <u>Shelby Mann</u>, kindergarten teacher, thanked the staff for tabling the kinder instructional minutes. Do not assume that increasing minutes means increased learning. After four hours, kids are far less ready to learn. Behavioral issues rise as they are learning how to be students. She currently has 27 students. In addition to having special needs students in the class, there are other students who needs to be assessed. This is a developmental grade. Without an aide to assist, the amount of teaching becomes more limited. It is nearly impossible to give kids enough space or personalize attention. More kids mean more noise; it is so hard for kids to focus. Increasing the length of the day only exacerbates this. Without an assigned aide, she needs to rely on parent volunteers. If there is truly no money for aides, she is suggesting going back to the half-day kinder model, which will add ADA and extra room for other classes. She urges the Board to give them aides, reduce their class size so they can better address their students' needs. They are far above the state recommended minutes.
- 6. <u>Robyn Wisinski</u>, kindergarten teacher at Edison, said she is well aware that the district can unilaterally change the instructional minutes. She thanked the district for tabling the issue for kindergarten. She started teaching in 1989 and seen many changes over the years. Last year, she had 28 students, this year she has 25. Kindergarten testing is a one-on-one job, requiring many hours. To accomplish this,

she sacrifices her prep time and quality instruction while she tests. She understands more is not necessarily better. We need to examine how their day is structured. Last year, the kindergarten team thought outside the box and developed a model. Every site has its own unique culture and needs. Therefore, a model that works for Edison, may not work for other sites. This is just one idea to explore. However, anyone who has visited a kindergarten class understands it is a unique world that will require unique ideas.

- 7. Sierra Vasquez, GTA executive board member and a Mathematics teacher at CVHS said she loves and knows numbers. It troubles her when things do not add up. The GUSD budget has been increasing over the last five years. By law, the district must maintain 3% in their reserves. The district CBO shared 12% is considered a healthy reserve, yet GUSD maintains a 20% reserve and unwilling to support their wage offer. This does not add up. GTA has requested 1.5% wage increase for last year and 1.5% for this year. This will cost the district approximately \$5 million in ongoing costs. GUSD can afford this. They have uncovered several inactive accounts totaling \$6 million. The district could use some of the new ongoing dollars, \$17 million this year or the \$12 million new ongoing money we will receive next year. The district could also use money from the reserves. It is evident that the district can afford a 3% raise. This is their most reasonable request ever. The district not willing to agree to the raise does not add up.
- 8. Steve Field, GTA negotiations chair, has been representing GTA on the negotiations team since 2004. He is experienced in adversarial bargaining; however, the GTA Board directed the bargaining team not to play the adversarial wage proposal strategy asking for an inflated wage increase. The GTA Board wanted them to move towards interest-based bargaining and directed them to propose a 3% raise offer for two years. GTA did their forensic budget analysis with the experts at CTA. They compared figures with Mr. Dickinson. Based on the fact the district received \$17 million of new, on-going money from the state, the district is holding 20% in reserves, and that GTA has saved the district \$3 million ongoing by waiving class size reduction and agreeing to a pharmaceutical carve out, they concluded the district could afford a 3.5% increase. Since 2015, rents have gone up 11% and the cost of living has risen 9%. There is logic behind their unwillingness to move on their request; there is no compelling reason to do so. GTA will pursue interest-based bargaining training in cooperation with GUSD. They will apply those principles for the next round of negotiations and will continue to work hand-andhand to ensure the financial health and the quality education this district is known for.
- 9. <u>Alicia Harris</u>, GTA vice president, thanked her colleagues for reviewing with the community the financial details surrounding the negotiations. She spoke about the underlying reasons why they are here—they are not being heard and are not being treated with respect. The GTA Board made a strategic choice in directing their bargaining team to ask for a 3% raise for the last two years. The GTA Board directed their bargaining team to not play games, not to ask for more, but simply be

direct and present an offer that is easily affordable. She suspects had they asked for more, the district and GTA would have settled for 3%. The real way employers show appreciation to employees is through fair compensation. The GUSD has the money and will be getting more money next year. It is their hope that we can close out this contract by agreeing to 3%. If not, do expect more action from their members. They will not compromise on the wage increase nor on matters affecting their dignity.

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education approve the 2017-2018 Consolidated Programs Single Plans for Student Achievement (SPSAs) Addendum for schools participating in one or more state/federal programs.

School Site Councils and staff members from all sites have developed SPSAs to utilize the Categorical Programs funds to improve student achievement.

These plans are based on the Local Educational Agency (LEA) Plan and include updates to reflect the LCFF Supplemental funding source. All individual 2017-2018 SPSAs were approved by each School Site Council in the Spring of 2017, and approved by the GUSD Board on June 20, 2017. Recently, all SPSAs were amended and approved by School Site Councils to match the actual budget amounts that were released in January 2018.

The current SPSA utilizes the online template developed by the California Department of Education (CDE). Plan development began in the Spring with the review of available achievement data. Annual goals, actions and budget are completed by school site teams and the School Site Council (SSC), and then approved by SSC. The SPSAs are aligned to support the District's LCAP and revised annually based on updated data and budget information. All SPSAs must be reviewed and approved by the Governing Board of the District. In addition, the SPSAs have been reviewed by the Categorical Programs Office with the provisions of applicable state/federal laws and regulations and for consistency with District Board Policies, Board Priorities, and the Glendale Unified School District Strategic Plan.

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Copies of all SPSAs are available for review at the school sites and Categorical Programs Office.

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education approve a fee increase for the Early Education and Extended Learning Programs self-supporting programs to be in compliance with state regulations. This fee increase applies only to self-supporting full-time and three-quarters time preschool and school-age before and after school programs.

Effective July 1, 2018, the Early Education and Extended Learning Programs Department (EEELP) will raise fees for its self-supporting programs to be in compliance with the California Budget Act of 2017 that increased the Standard Reimbursement Rates (SRR).

The fee increase applies only to the following self-supporting programs:

- School-Age Before- and After-School Programs
- Self-Supporting Preschool

Fees were previously raised on January 1, 2017, for school-age programs and on July 1, 2017, for full-day preschool as an interim step towards full compliance. This additional increase matches the fees charged to self-supporting families to the State reimbursement rate. All self-supporting child care programs are required to charge no less than the State's reimbursement rate for subsidized programs.

The Board of Education was informed of the proposed fee increase at its meeting held on March 6, 2018.

SERVICES AGREEMENT

WITNESSETH: The parties do hereby contract and agree as follows:

1. *Services Description*. CONTRACTOR will perform the services described in the "Scope of Work" attached hereto as Addendum A and made a part thereof.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

- 1. **Term**. Contractor shall commence providing services under this Agreement on March 12, 2018 and will diligently perform as required and complete performance by June 30, 2018
- 2. **Submittal of Documents**. The Contractor shall not commence the Services under this Agreement until the Contractor has submitted and the District has approved the certificate(s) and affidavit(s), and the endorsement(s) of insurance required as indicated below:

 - X Insurance Certificates and Endorsements

 - X Non-collusion Declaration

- 3. **Compensation**. District agrees to pay the Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement (as needed, as requested) a total fee not to exceed (NTE)
 Thirty thousand______ dollars (\$ 30,000.00) which includes reimbursable cost listed in item 4.1. District shall pay Contractor according to the following terms and conditions:

Note: Accounts Payable will not process payment until the services have been completed. Invoices should be submitted to Accounts Payable Department, Glendale Unified School District, 223 N. Jackson Street, Glendale, CA 91206.

4. **Expenses**. District shall not be liable to Contractor for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by Contractor in performing services for District, except as follows:

4.1. **N/A**

- 5. **Independent Contractor**. Contractor, in the performance of this Agreement, shall be and act as an independent contractor. Contractor understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of the District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of the District and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Worker's Compensation. Contractor shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to Contractor's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, Contractor is an independent contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and directing the performance of the details of the work, District being interested only in the results obtained.
- 6. **Materials**. Contractor shall furnish, at its own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement, except as follows:
- 7. **Copyright/Trademark/Patent**. Contractor understands and agrees that all matters produced under this Agreement shall become the property of District and cannot be used without District's express written permission. District shall have all right, title and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said matter in the name of the District. Contractor consents to use of Contractor's name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance and distribution of the matters, for any purpose and in any medium.

8. Termination.

- 8.1. **Without Cause by District**. District may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Contractor only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by District shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by Contractor. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Contractor or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
- 8.2. Without Cause by Contractor. Contractor may, upon sixty (60) days notice, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement. Upon this termination, District shall only be obligated to compensate Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by Contractor shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services to District. Contractor acknowledges that this sixty (60) day notice period is acceptable so that the District can attempt to procure the Services from another source.
- 8.3. With Cause by District. District may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - 8.3.1. material violation of this Agreement by the Contractor; or
 - 8.3.2. any act by Contractor exposing the District to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - 8.3.3. Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt, Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of Contractor's insolvency.

Written notice by District shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within three (3) calendar days after that notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this Agreement shall upon the expiration of the three (3) calendar days cease and terminate. In the event of this termination, the District may secure the required services from another Contractor. If the expense, fees, and/or costs to the District exceed the cost of providing the service pursuant to this Agreement, the Contractor shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to the District's notice of these expense, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to District.

9. Indemnification. To the furthest extent permitted by California law, Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold free and harmless the District, its Board of Education, agents, representatives, officers, Contractors, employees, trustees, and volunteers ("the indemnified parties") from any and all claims, demands, causes of action, suits, actions, costs, expenses, judgments, liability, loss, damage or injury of any kind, nature and description, in law or equity ("Claim"), to property or persons including, but not limited to, personal injury, bodily injury, death, property damage, and Contractors' and/or attorneys' fees and costs, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the negligence, recklessness, errors or omissions, or willful misconduct of Contractor, its officials, officers, employees, subcontractors, Contractors, or agents, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from the performance of the Services, the Project, or this Agreement, including without limitation the payment of all consequential damages; or from any activity, work, or thing done, permitted, or suffered by the Contractor in conjunction with this Agreement, unless the claims are caused wholly by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the District. The District shall have the right to accept or reject any legal representation that Contractor proposes to defend the indemnified parties.

10. Insurance.

10.1. The Contractor shall procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the Services the following insurance with minimum limits equal to the amount indicated below.

10.1.1. **Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability Insurance**. Commercial General Liability Insurance and Any Auto Automobile Liability Insurance that shall protect the Contractor, the District, and the State from all claims of bodily injury, property damage, personal injury, death, advertising injury, and medical payments arising performing any portion of the Services. (Form CG 0001 and CA 0001, or forms substantially similar, if approved by the District.)

- 10.1.2. Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance. Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Services. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, the Contractor shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees. If any class of employee or employees engaged in performing any portion of the Services under this Agreement are not protected under the Workers' Compensation Statute, adequate insurance coverage for the protection of any employee(s) not otherwise protected must be obtained before any of those employee(s) commence performing any portion of the Services.
- 10.1.3. **Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions)**. Professional Liability Insurance as appropriate to the Contractor's profession.
- 10.2. **Proof of Carriage of Insurance**. The Contractor shall not commence performing any portion of the Services until all required insurance has been obtained and certificates indicating the required coverage have been delivered in duplicate to the District and approved by the District. Certificates and insurance policies shall include the following:
 - 10.2.1. A clause stating: "SHOULD ANY OF THE ABOVE DESCRIBED POLICIES BE CANCELLED BEFORE THE EXPIRATION DATE THEREOF, NOTICE WILL BE DELIVERED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE POLICY PROVISION."
 - 10.2.2. Language stating in particular those insured, extent of insurance, location and operation to which insurance applies, expiration date, to which cancellation and reduction notice will be sent, and length of notice period.
 - 10.2.3. An endorsement stating that the District and its Board of Education, agents, representatives, employees, trustees, officers, Contractors, and volunteers are named additional insured under all policies except Workers' Compensation Insurance, Professional Liability, and Employers' Liability Insurance. An endorsement shall also state that Contractor's insurance policies shall be primary to any insurance or self-insurance maintained by District. An endorsement shall also state that there shall be a waiver of any subrogation.
 - 10.2.4. All policies except the Professional Liability, Workers' Compensation Insurance, and Employers' Liability Insurance Policies shall be written on an occurrence form.
- 10.3. Acceptability of Insurers. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A: VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the District.
- 11. Assignment. The obligations of the Contractor pursuant to this Agreement shall not be assigned by the Contractor.

- 12. **Compliance with Laws**. **Debarment and Suspension**. Contractor warrants and certifies that neither Contractor, nor any person working for or acting on behalf of Contractor as part of this Agreement, has been or is debarred, penalized by, convicted, sanctioned, suspended, excluded or otherwise ineligible to participate in any state or federal program, or by any federal department or agency, or by Los Angeles County
- 13. **Certificates/Permits/Licenses**. Contractor and all Contractor's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such certificates, permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of Services pursuant to this Agreement.
- 14. **Employment with Public Agency**. Contractor, if an employee of another public agency, agrees that Contractor will not receive salary or remuneration, other than vacation pay, as an employee of another public agency for the actual time in which services are actually being performed pursuant to this Agreement.
- 15. Anti-Discrimination. District programs, activities, practices shall be free from discrimination based on race, color, ancestry, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital or parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity or expression, or genetic information; the perception of one or more of such characteristics; or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics and therefore the Contractor agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and District policy. In addition, the Contractor agrees to require like compliance by all of its subcontractor(s).
- 16. **Fingerprinting of Employees**. The Fingerprinting/Criminal Background Investigation Certification must be completed and attached to this Agreement prior to Contractor's performing of any portion of the Services.
- 17. No Rights in Third Parties. This Agreement does not create any rights in, or inure to the benefit of, any third party except as expressly provided herein.
- 18. District's Evaluation of Contractor and Contractor's Employees and/or Subcontractors. The District may evaluate the Contractor in any way the District is entitled pursuant to applicable law. The District's evaluation may include, without limitation:
 - 18.1. Requesting that District employee(s) evaluate the Contractor and the Contractor's employees and subcontractors and each of their performance.
 - 18.2. Announced and unannounced observance of Contractor, Contractor's employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s).
- 19. Limitation of District Liability. Other than as provided in this Agreement, District's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall District be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue,

arising out of or in connection with this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.

20. **Confidentiality**. The Contractor and all Contractor's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services. Contractor understands that student records are confidential and agrees to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement.

Both parties will maintain in confidence and safeguard all confidential information, as defined in this paragraph, of the other party, it affiliates, and its customers. "Confidential Information" means any information that is marked or otherwise identified as confidential or proprietary at the time of disclosure or by law, and includes but is not limited to, trade secrets, know-how, inventions, techniques, data, customers list, personal information, financial information, sales, and marketing plans of the other party, its affiliates, or its customers. Both parties recognize and acknowledge the confidential and proprietary nature of any Confidential Information and acknowledge the irreparable harm that could result if such confidential information is disclosed to a third party or used for unauthorized purposes. Each party agrees to use any Confidential Information only for the purpose of conduction business with each other and their clients in the manner contemplated by this Agreement. Both parties will restrict disclosure of any Confidential Information to only those personnel who have a need to know and will bind such personnel to obligations of confidentiality to the same extent that each party is bound by this Agreement. Upon request of the owner of the confidential information, the other party will promptly return or destroy all materials incorporating any Confidential Information and any copies. The obligation under this paragraph do not apply to information that: 1) is or becomes generally known or in the public domain through no act or omission of the other party; 2) was lawfully in Insight's or Client's possession without restriction as to use or disclosure before its receipt from the other party; 3) is received from, or was made available to, a third party without any obligation of confidentiality; 4) was independently developed; 5) is otherwise permitted to be disclosed under this Agreement; 6) is disclosed with the prior written consent of the disclosing party; or 7) is required to be disclosed in any civil or criminal legal proceeding, regulatory proceeding or any similar process, however, the party required to make the disclosure under the law shall give prompt notice of this to the other party prior to such disclosure so that the other party may seek an appropriate protective order or give its consent to such disclosure.

21. **Notice**. Any notice required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be deemed to have been given, served, and received if given in writing and either personally delivered or deposited in the United States mail, registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt required, or sent by overnight delivery service, or facsimile transmission, addressed as follows:

Any notice personally given or sent by facsimile transmission shall be effective upon receipt. Any notice sent by overnight delivery service shall be effective the business day next following delivery thereof to the overnight delivery service. Any notice given by mail shall be effective three (3) days after deposit in the United States mail.

- 22. **Integration/Entire Agreement of Parties**. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties. In the event an express conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the terms of the any attachments or exhibits, the terms of this Agreement will prevail.
- 23. **California Law**. This Agreement shall be governed by and the rights, duties and obligations of the Parties shall be determined and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California, in the County of Los Angeles. The Parties further agree that any action or proceeding brought to enforce the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall be maintained in the county in which the District's administrative offices are located.
- 24. **Waiver**. The waiver by either party of any breach of any term, covenant, or condition herein contained shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such term, covenant, condition, or any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant, or condition herein contained.
- 25. **Severability**. If any term, condition or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will nevertheless continue in full force and effect, and shall not be affected, impaired or invalidated in any way.
- 26. **Provisions Required By Law Deemed Inserted.** Each and every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted in this Contract shall be deemed to be inserted herein and this Contract shall be read and enforced as though it were included therein.
- 27. **Authority to Bind Parties.** Neither party in the performance of any and all duties under this Agreement, except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, has any authority to bind the other to any agreements or undertakings.
- 28. Attorney Fees/Costs. Should litigation be necessary to enforce any terms or provisions of this Agreement, then each party shall bear its own litigation and collection expenses, witness fees, court costs and attorney's fees.
- 29. **Captions and Interpretations.** Paragraph headings in this Agreement are used solely for convenience, and shall be wholly disregarded in the construction of this Agreement. No provision of this Agreement shall be interpreted for or against a party because that party or its legal

representative drafted such provision, and this Agreement shall be construed as if jointly prepared by the Parties.

- 30. **Calculation of Time.** For the purposes of this Agreement, "days" refers to calendar days unless otherwise specified.
- 31. **Signature Authority.** Each party has the full power and authority to enter into and perform this Agreement, and the person signing this Agreement on behalf of each Party has been properly authorized and empowered to enter into this Agreement.
- 32. **Counterparts.** This Agreement and all amendments and supplements to it may be executed in counterparts, and all counterparts together shall be construed as one document.
- 33. **Incorporation of Recitals and Exhibits**. The Recitals and each exhibit attached hereto are hereby incorporated herein by reference.
- 34. Force Majeure Clause. The parties to the Contract shall be excused from performance thereunder during the time and to the extent that they are prevented from obtaining, delivering, or performing by act of God, fire, strike, loss, or shortage of transportation facilities, lock-out, commandeering of materials, products, plants or facilities by the government, when satisfactory evidence thereof is presented to the other party(ies), provided that it is satisfactorily established that the non-performance is not due to the fault or neglect of the party not performing.
- 39. **Amendments.** No alteration or variation of the terms of this Contract shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by the parties; no oral understanding or agreement not incorporated herein shall be binding on either of the parties; and no exceptions, alternatives, substitutes or revisions are valid or binding on District unless authorized by District in writing.
- 40. **Delivery.** Time of delivery of goods or services is of the essence in this Contract. District reserves the right to refuse any goods or services and to cancel all or any part of the goods not conforming to applicable specifications, drawings, samples or descriptions or services that do not conform to the prescribed statement of work. Acceptance of any part of the order of goods shall not District to accept shipments nor deprive it of the right to return goods already accepted at Contractor's expense. Over shipments and under shipments of goods shall be only as agreed to in writing by District. Delivery shall not be deemed to be complete until all goods or services have actually been received and accepted in writing by District.
- 41. **Conduct on District Premises.** Contractor shall, at all times, comply with and abide by all reasonable policies and procedures of the District (or that may be established thereby, from time to time) that pertain to conduct on the District's premises, possession or distribution of contraband, or the access to, and security of, the Party's real property or facilities, to the extent that the Contractor has been provided with a copy of each such policy or procedure. Contractor shall exercise due care and diligence to prevent any injury to persons or damage to property while on the other Party's premises. Each Party's personnel shall clearly identify themselves as the appropriate Party's personnel and not as employees of the other Party. When on the other Party's premises, each Party's personnel shall wear and clearly display identification badges or tags, as approved by the other Party. Contractor's employees shall not smoke or use profanity or other inappropriate language while on site. Contractor's employees shall not enter the facility while under the influence of alcohol, drugs or other intoxicants and shall not have such materials in their possession. Contractor's employees shall plan their activities to minimize the number of times they must enter and exit a facility. They should transport all tools, equipment and materials needed for the day at the start of the work period and restrict all breaks to the absolute minimum.

42. Employee Eligibility Verification: The Contractor warrants that it fully complies with all Federal and State statutes and regulations regarding the employment of aliens and others and that all its employees performing work under this Contract meet the citizenship or alien status requirement set forth in Federal statues and regulations. In review of safety procedures and policies, Board Policy (BP) 5145.12 - Search and Seizure is being updated to reflect current California School Boards Association (CSBA) language, Education Code, and federal and state laws.

Upon approval of the policies, updates to the accompanying Administrative Regulations will be made as needed following current District procedures.

Copies of the revised policies are included with this report.

Personnel

Classified Personnel

The Governing Board recognizes that classified personnel provide essential services that support and enhance the District's educational program. The Board shall fill each of its classified positions with qualified persons, consistent with position requirements.

The Board shall classify all employees and positions not requiring certification qualifications as the classified service, except for those employees and positions specifically exempt from classified service. (Education Code 45103)

Individuals who possess certification qualifications shall not be prohibited from being employed in a classified position. (Education Code 45104)

Each classified position shall have a designated title and regular minimum number of assigned hours per day, days per week, and months per year.

Classified employees shall be assigned by their immediate supervisors with the approval of the Superintendent or designee. They shall be required to perform those duties prescribed by the Board for the position the employee holds, in accordance with applicable job descriptions and collective bargaining agreements.

Each classified employee shall be held accountable for duties assigned to him/her and shall undergo regular performance evaluations in accordance with collective bargaining agreements.

Substitute and Short-Term Employees

The District may employ a substitute employee to replace a classified employee who is temporarily absent from duty. (Education Code 45103)

If the District is in the process of hiring a permanent employee to fill a classified position, the Board may fill the vacancy with one or more substitute employees for no more than 60 calendar days, unless the applicable collective bargaining agreement provides for a different period of time. (Education Code 45103)

The District may employ a short-term employee to perform a service for the District when that service or similar services will not be extended or needed on a continuing basis. Before employing a short-term employee, the Board, at a regularly scheduled meeting, shall specify the service required to be performed by the employee and shall certify the ending date of the service. The Board may shorten or extend the ending date, but the date shall not be extended beyond 195 work days per year, including holidays, sick leave, vacation, and other leaves of absence, irrespective of the number of hours worked per day. (Education Code 45103)

The Governing Board expects District employees to maintain the highest ethical standards, behave professionally, follow District policies and regulations, abide by state and federal laws, and exercise good judgment when interacting with students and other members of the school community. Employees shall engage in conduct that enhances the integrity of the District, advances the goals of the District's educational programs, and contributes to a positive school climate.

The Board of Education fully supports a Code of Ethics for the Glendale Unified School District based on the twelve principals of Respect, Honesty, Trustworthiness, Loyalty, Courtesy, Self-Discipline, Integrity, Fairness, Responsibility, Cooperation, Citizenship, and Compassion.

The Board of Education directs the Superintendent to develop a document entitled "Glendale Unified School District Code of Ethics," that reflects twelve guiding principles of ethical conduct.

Each employee is expected to acquire the knowledge and skills necessary to fulfill his/her responsibilities and to contribute to the learning and achievement of district students.

Inappropriate Conduct

Inappropriate employee conduct includes, but is not limited to:

- 1. Engaging in any conduct that endangers students, staff, or others, including, but not limited to, physical violence, threats of violence, or possession of a firearm or other weapon.
- 2. Engaging in harassing or discriminatory behavior towards students, parents/guardians, staff, or community members, or failing or refusing to intervene when an act of discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying against a student is observed.
- 3. Physically abusing, sexually abusing, neglecting, or otherwise willfully harming or injuring a child.
- 4. Engaging in inappropriate socialization or fraternization with a student or soliciting, encouraging, or maintaining an inappropriate written, verbal, or physical relationship with a student.
- 5. Possessing or viewing any pornography on school grounds, or possessing or viewing

child pornography or other imagery portraying children in a sexualized manner at any time.

- 6. Using profane, obscene, or abusive language against students, parents/guardians, staff, or community members.
- 7. Willfully disrupting District or school operations by loud or unreasonable noise or other action.
- 8. Using tobacco, alcohol, or an illegal or unauthorized substance, or possessing or distributing any controlled substance, while in the workplace, on district property, or at a school-sponsored activity.
- 9. Dishonesty with students, parents/guardians, staff, or members of the public, including, but not limited to, falsifying information in employment records or other school records.
- 10. Divulging confidential information about students, District employees, or District operations to persons or entities not authorized to receive the information.
- 11. Using District equipment or other District resources for the employee's own commercial purposes or for political activities.
- 12. Using District equipment or communications devices for personal purposes while on duty, except in an emergency, during scheduled work breaks, or for personal necessity.

Employees shall be notified that computer files and all electronic communications, including, but not limited to, email and voice mail, are not private. To ensure proper use, the Superintendent or designee may monitor employee usage of District technological resources at any time without the employee's consent.

- 13. Causing damage to or engaging in theft of property belonging to students, staff, or the District.
- 14. Wearing inappropriate attire

Reports of Misconduct

An employee who observes or has evidence of another employee's inappropriate conduct shall immediately report such conduct to the Principal or Superintendent or designee. An employee

who has knowledge of or suspects child abuse or neglect shall file a report pursuant to the District's child abuse reporting procedures as detailed in AR 5141.4 - Child Abuse Prevention and Reporting.

Any reports of employee misconduct shall be promptly investigated. Any employee who is found to have engaged in inappropriate conduct in violation of law or Board policy shall be subject to disciplinary action and, in the case of a certificated employee, may be subject to a report to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing. The Superintendent or designee shall notify local law enforcement as appropriate.

An employee who has knowledge of but fails to report inappropriate employee conduct may also be subject to discipline.

The District prohibits retaliation against anyone who files a complaint against an employee or reports an employee's inappropriate conduct. Any employee who retaliates against any such complainant, reporter, or other participant in the District's complaint process shall be subject to discipline.

The section(s) of the District's employee code of conduct addressing interactions with students shall be provided to parents/guardians at the beginning of each school year and shall be posted on school and/or District web sites. (Education Code 44050)

The Board of Education is fully committed to promoting a safe learning environment and, to the extent possible, eliminating the possession and use of weapons, illegal drugs, and other controlled substances by students on school premises and at school activities. As necessary to protect the health and welfare of students and staff, school officials may search students, their property, and/or District property under their control and may seize illegal, unsafe, or otherwise prohibited items.

The Board urges that employees exercise discretion and good judgment. When conducting a search or seizure, employees shall act in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that staff who conduct student searches receive training regarding the requirements of the District's policy and administrative regulation and other legal issues, as appropriate.

A. <u>Individual Searches</u>

- 1. School officials may search any individual student, his/her property, or District property under his/her control when there is a reasonable suspicion that the search will uncover evidence that he/she is violating the law, Board policy, administrative regulation, or other rules of the District or the school. Reasonable suspicion shall be based on specific and objective facts that the search will produce evidence related to the alleged violation. The types of student property that may be searched by school officials include, but are not limited to, lockers, desks, purses, backpacks, student vehicles parked on District property, cellular phones, or other electronic communication devices.
- 2. Any search of a student, his/her property, or District property under his/her control shall be limited in scope and designed to produce evidence related to the alleged violation. Factors to be considered by school officials when determining the scope of the search shall include the danger to the health or safety of students or staff, such as the possession of weapons, drugs, or other dangerous instruments, and whether the item(s) to be searched by school officials are reasonably related to the contraband to be found. In addition, school officials shall consider the intrusiveness of the search in light of the student's age, gender, and the nature of the alleged violation.
- 3. Employees shall not conduct strip searches or body cavity searches of any

student. (Education Code 49050)

- 4. Searches of individual students shall be conducted in the presence of at least two District employees.
- 5. The principal or designee shall notify the parent/guardian of a student subjected to an individualized search as soon as possible after the search.

B. Searches of Multiple Student Lockers/Desks

- 1. All student lockers and desks are the property of the District. The principal or designee may conduct a general inspection of school properties that are within the control of students, such as lockers and desks, on a regular, announced basis, with students standing by their assigned lockers or desks. Any items contained in a locker or desk shall be considered to be the property of the student to whom the locker or desk was assigned.
- 2. Any items contained in a locker or desk shall be considered to be the property of the student to whom the locker or desk was assigned.

C. <u>Use of Metal Detectors</u>

1. The Board believes that the presence of weapons in the schools threatens the District's ability to provide the safe and orderly learning environment to which District students and staff are entitled. The Board also believes that metal detector searches offer a reasonable means to keep weapons out of the schools and mitigate the fears of students and staff.

The Superintendent or designee shall use metal detectors at District schools as necessary to help provide a safe learning environment. He/she shall establish a plan to ensure that metal detector searches are conducted in a uniform and consistent manner.

D. Use of Contraband Detection Dogs

1. In an effort to keep the school site free of dangerous contraband, the District may use specially trained, nonaggressive dogs to sniff out and alert staff to the presence of substances prohibited by law or Board policy.

2. The dogs may sniff the air around lockers, desks, or vehicles on District property or at District-sponsored events. Dogs shall not sniff within the close proximity of students or other persons and may not sniff any personal items on those persons without their consent.

The Superintendent recommends that the Board of Education approve a Clinical AffiliationAgreement between Glendale Unified School District and California State University, Fullerton and that the Assistant Superintendent, Human Resources, be authorized to execute the Agreement.

This Agreement will commence upon full execution and shall continue for three years. In accordance with the provisions of Sections 44225 and 44227 of the California Education Code, the Governing Board of any school district is authorized to enter into agreements with the California State Universities and Colleges, the University of California, or any other university or college approved by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing as a teacher education institution to provide teaching experience through practice teaching to students enrolled in teacher education curriculum of such institutions.

CLINICAL AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

This Agreement is entered into by and between the State of California acting through the Trustees of the California State University on behalf of CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, FULLERTON, hereinafter called the ("University") and GLENDALE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, hereinafter called the ("District"). The parties may be referred to collectively as the "Parties" and singularly as a "Party".

- A. University is an institution of higher learning authorized pursuant to California law to offer fully accredited health science programs and to maintain classes and such programs at District for the purpose of providing clinical training for students in such classes.
- B. District operates clinical facility which is suitable for University's Clinical training programs offered in BSN; School Nurse credential; MSN: Leadership, Women's Health Care, School Nursing, Nurse Educator, FNP Concentrations; and DNP. ("Program" or "Programs").
- C. The purpose of this Agreement is to set forth the terms and conditions pursuant to which the parties will institute the Programs at District.
- D. The parties will both benefit by making a Program available to University students at District.

THE PARTIES AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

I. GENERAL INFORMATION ABOUT THE PROGRAM

A. The maximum number of University students who may participate in the Program during each training period shall be mutually agreed by the parties at least 30 days before the training period begins.

B. The starting date and length of each Program training period shall be determined by mutual agreement.

II. UNIVERSITY'S RESPONSIBILITIES

A. <u>Academic Responsibility.</u> University shall develop the curriculum of the Programs and shall be responsible for offering health care education programs eligible, if necessary, for accreditation and approval by any state board or agency.

B. <u>Schedule of Assignments</u>. University shall notify District's Program supervisor of student assignments, including the name of the student, level of academic preparation, and length and dates of proposed clinical experience.

C. <u>Orientation Program</u>. University shall provide orientation to all students and ensure that all students receive clinical instruction and have necessary basic skills prior to the clinical experience at District.

D. <u>Records</u>. University shall maintain all personnel records for its staff and all attendance academic records for its students participating in the Programs. University shall implement and maintain an evaluation process of the students' progress throughout the Programs.

E. <u>Discipline</u>. University shall be responsible for counseling, controlling and disciplining students.

F. <u>Health Clearance.</u> University shall inform students of the students' need to comply with District's requirements for immunizations and tests, including but not limited to an annual health examination, negative tuberculin skin test/and or chest x-ray as required. Also, University shall inform students of the students' need to comply with District's policies and procedures regarding blood-borne pathogens, including but not limited to, universal precautions.

G. <u>Student Responsibilities</u>. University shall notify students in the Program that they are responsible for:

1) Complying with District's clinical and administrative policies, procedures, rules and regulations, including undergoing and passing any required background check;

2) Arranging for their own transportation and living arrangements if not provided by University;

3) Assuming responsibility for their personal illnesses, necessary immunizations, tuberculin tests, and annual health examinations;

4) Maintaining the confidentiality of patient information:

a) No student shall have access to or have the right to receive any medical record, except when necessary in the regular course of the clinical experience. The discussion, transmission, or narration in any form by students of any individually identifiable patient information, medical or otherwise, obtained in the course of the Program is forbidden except as a necessary part of the practical experience;

b) Neither University nor its employees or agents shall be granted access to individually identifiable information unless the patient has first given consent using a form approved by District that complies with applicable state and federal law, including the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act ("HIPAA") and its implementing regulations;

c) District shall reasonably assist University in obtaining patient consent in appropriate circumstances. In the absence of consent, students shall use de-identified information only in any discussions about the clinical experience with University, its employees, or agents.

5) Complying with District's dress code and wearing name badges identifying themselves as students;

6) Attending an orientation to be provided by their University instructors;

7) Notifying District immediately of any violation of state or federal laws by any student; and

8) Providing services to District's patients only under the direct supervision of the University faculty and/or District's professional staff.

H. <u>Payroll Taxes and Withholdings</u>. University shall be solely responsible for any payroll taxes, withholdings, Workers' Compensation and any other insurance or benefits of any kind for University's employees and agents, if any, who provide services to the Program under this Agreement. Students are not employees or agents of the University and shall receive no compensation for their participation in the Program, either from University or District.

I. <u>Background Checks.</u> If required by District, ensure that students complete any background check required by District and submit such results to District for review and approval.

J. <u>Workers' Compensation</u>. University will at its cost provide students with Workers' Compensation coverage while students are participating in District's clinical training program.

III. DISTRICT'S RESPONSIBILITIES

A. <u>Clinical Experience</u>. District shall accept from University the mutually agreed upon number of students enrolled in the Program and shall provide the students with clinical experience during the agreed upon dates and times (for pre-licensure students, the University faculty will be supervising the students).

B. <u>Implementation of Programs</u>. District agrees to cooperate with and assist in the planning and implementation of the Programs at District for the benefit of students from University.

C. <u>Orientation Program for University Instructors</u>. District shall provide an orientation for University instructors who will oversee students in the Program, and shall include all information and materials that University instructors are to provide during the student orientation required in paragraphs II.C and II.G.6) above.

D. <u>Access to Facilities</u>. District shall permit students enrolled in the Program access to District facilities as appropriate and necessary for their Program, provided that the students' presence shall not interfere with District's activities.

E. <u>Records and Evaluations</u>. University shall maintain complete records and reports on each student's performance and District staff shall provide input on student performance to University as requested (Only faculty can evaluate student performance for grading; District staff provide input on student performance at the prelicensure level).

F. <u>Withdrawal of Students</u>. District may request that University withdraw from the program any student who District determines is not performing satisfactorily, refuses to follow District's administrative policies, procedures, rules and regulations, or violates any federal or state laws. Such requests must be in writing and must include a statement as to the reason or reasons for District's request. University shall comply with the written request within five (5) days after actually receiving it.

G. <u>Emergency Health Care/First Aid</u>. District shall, on any day when a student is receiving training at its facilities, provide to that student necessary emergency health care or first aid for accidents occurring in its facilities. Any emergency health care or first aid provided by District

shall be billed to the student at District's normal billing rate for private-pay patients. Except as provided in this paragraph, District shall have no obligation to furnish medical or surgical care to any student.

H. <u>Student Supervision</u>. In the absence of University faculty, District shall permit students to perform services for patients only when under the supervision of a registered, licensed, or certified clinician/professional on District's staff. Such clinicians or professionals are to be certified or licensed in the discipline in which supervision is provided. Students shall train (students train vs. work), perform assignments, and participate in ward rounds, clinics, staff meetings, and in-service educational programs at the discretion of their University faculty and/or District-designated supervisors. Students are to be regarded as trainees, not employees, and are not to replace District's staff.

I. <u>District's Confidentiality Policies</u>. As trainees, students shall be considered members of District's "workforce," as that term is defined by the HIPAA regulations at 45 C.F.R. § 160.103, and shall be subject to District's policies respecting confidentiality of medical information. In order to ensure that students comply with such policies, District shall provide students with substantially the same training that it provides to its regular employees.

IV. AFFIRMATIVE ACTION AND NON-DISCRIMINATION

The parties agree that all students receiving clinical training pursuant to this Agreement shall be selected without discrimination on account of race, color, religion, national origin, ancestry, disability, marital status, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, age or veteran status.

V. STATUS OF UNIVERSITY AND DISTRICT

The parties expressly understand and agree that the students enrolled in the Program are in attendance for educational purposes, and such students are not considered employees of either District or University for any purpose, including, but not limited to, compensation for services, welfare and pension benefits, or Workers' Compensation insurance. Students are, however, considered members of District's "workforce" for purposes of HIPAA compliance.

VI. INSURANCE

A. <u>University Insurance.</u> The State of California has elected to be self-insured for its general liability, worker's compensation, professional liability, motor vehicle liability, and property exposures through an annual appropriation from the General Fund. As a State agency, the California State University, Office of the Chancellor, the Trustees, and its system of campuses are included in this self-insured program.

The Office of Risk Management in the Chancellor's Office administers the general liability, workers' compensation, property, and professional liability programs. The State Office of Risk and Insurance Management administers the motor vehicle liability program.

Under this form of insurance, the State and its employees (as defined in Section 810.2 of the Government Code) are insured for any tort liability that may develop through carrying out official activities, including state official operations on non-state owned property. Should any claims arise by reason of such operations or under an official contract or license agreement, they should be referred to the California State University, Office of Risk Management, 401 Golden Shore, 5th Floor, Long Beach, CA 90802-4210.

B. <u>Student Insurance</u>. The California State University Risk Management Authority maintains a Student Professional Liability Insurance Program (SPLIP).

Coverage is provided on a "claims-made" basis for claims which are both made against the Insured during the Policy Period and reported to the Carrier as soon as practicable, but not later than three (3) years after the Policy Period for claims arising from Professional Services which are rendered or Incidents which occurred during the Policy Period.

Insureds include CSU students enrolled in required credited coursework in addition to employees, faculty and staff of the CSU.

Coverage includes General, Professional, & Educator's Errors and Omissions Liability. Coverage limits are two million (\$2,000,000) each loss and four million (\$4,000,000) aggregate for all Covered Parties, and not per student. A party to whom the University is obligated by written agreement to provide such coverage are included as additional insureds.

C. <u>District Insurance</u>. District shall procure and maintain in force during the term of this Agreement, at its sole cost and expense, insurance in amounts that are reasonably necessary to protect it against liability arising from any and all negligent acts or incidents caused by its employees. Coverage under such professional and commercial general liability insurance shall be not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for each occurrence and three million dollars (\$3,000,000) in the aggregate. Such coverage is to be obtained from a carrier rated A VII or better by AM Best or a qualified program of self-insurance. District shall also maintain and provide evidence of workers' compensation and disability coverage for its employees as required by law. District shall provide University with evidence of the insurance coverage required by this paragraph. District shall promptly notify University of any cancellation, reduction, or other material change in the amount or scope of any coverage required hereunder.

VII. INDEMNIFICATION.

A. The University agrees to defend all claims of loss, indemnify and hold harmless the District and its officers, agents and employees from any and all liability for personal injury, damages, wrongful death or other losses and costs, including but not limited to reasonable attorney fees and defense costs, arising out of the negligent acts or omissions or willful misconduct of the University or its employees, officers, or volunteers in the performance of this Agreement.

B. The District agrees to defend all claims of loss, indemnify, and hold harmless the State of California, the Trustees of the California State University, California State University Fullerton and their officers, agents, volunteers and employees from any and all liability for personal injury, damages, wrongful death or other losses and costs, including but not limited to reasonable attorney fees and defense costs, arising out of the negligent acts or omissions or willful misconduct of the District or its employees, agents or volunteers in the performance of this Agreement.

VIII. TERM AND TERMINATION

A. <u>Term</u>. This term of this Agreement shall be effective upon execution and shall continue for three (3) years.

B. <u>Renewal</u>. This Agreement may be renewed by mutual agreement.

C. <u>Termination</u>. This Agreement may be terminated at any time by written agreement or upon 30 days' advance written notice by one party to the other, PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that in no event shall termination take effect with respect to currently enrolled students, who shall be permitted to complete their training for any semester in which termination would otherwise occur.

IX. GENERAL PROVISIONS

A. <u>Amendments</u>. In order to ensure compliance with HIPAA, the following provisions of this Agreement shall not be subject to amendment by any means during the term of this Agreement or any extensions: Section II, Paragraph G, subdivisions 4.a), 4.b), and 4.c); Section II, Paragraph H, to the extent it provides that students are members of District's "workforce" for purposes of HIPAA; Section III, Paragraphs H and I; and Section V. This Agreement may otherwise be amended at any time by mutual agreement of the parties without additional consideration, provided that before any amendment shall take effect, it shall be reduced to writing and signed by the parties.

B. <u>Assignment</u>. Neither party shall voluntarily or by operation of law, assign or otherwise transfer this Agreement without the other party's prior written consent. Any purported assignment in violation of this paragraph shall be void.

C. <u>Captions</u>. Captions and headings in this Agreement are solely for the convenience of the parties, are not a part of this Agreement, and shall not be used to interpret or determine the validity of this Agreement or any of its provisions.

D. <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all such counterparts together shall constitute one and the same instrument.

E. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement is the entire agreement between the parties. No other agreements, oral or written, have been entered into with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement.

F. <u>Governing Law</u>. The validity, interpretation, and performance of this Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

G. <u>Electronic Signatures.</u> This Agreement may be executed by facsimile or scanned signature of any party hereto, it being agreed that the facsimile or scanned signature of any party hereto shall be deemed an original for all purposes.

H. <u>Notices</u>. Notices required under this Agreement shall be sent to the parties by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid, at the addresses set forth below.

EDUCATIONAL AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

This agreement ("Agreement") is between the Trustees of the California State University (CSU) on behalf of California StateUniversity Long Beach ("University") andGlendale Unified School District("District").

University offers degree programs in a wide variety of disciplines, which are academically enhanced by practical experiences outside of the traditional classroom setting. For this Agreement, the District shall provide practical experience pursuant to the terms of this agreement and serve as a learning site offering facilities, resources and supervision to students. In consideration the mutual promises and conditions set forth below, the University and the District ("Party or Parties") agree as follows:

- I. <u>EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS</u> The following University educational programs are included in this Agreement and are governed by the corresponding Exhibit(s), incorporated as if fully stated herein:
 - Check all that apply:
 - Exhibit A Early Fieldwork, consisting of one (1) page
 - Exhibit B Basic Credential Programs, consisting of five (5) pages
 - Exhibit C Educational Administration, consisting of three (3) pages
 - Exhibit D-School Counseling, consisting of three (3) pages
 - Exhibit E School Psychology, consisting of four (4) pages

II. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- A. Term of Agreement The term of this Agreement shall be operative from date of full execution until terminated. Either Party may terminate this agreement upon thirty (30) days written notice. If either Party sends a Notice of Termination prior to the completion of an academic semester, all students performing services under this Agreement shall be allowed to continue their placement until the end of that academic semester.
- **B.** Relationship of Parties District (including its employees and agents) shall act in an independent capacity and not as officers, employees or agents of CSU or University. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to constitute a partnership, joint venture or any other relationship other than that of independent contractors.
- C. Indemnification University shall be responsible for damages caused by the negligence of its directors, officers, agents and employees, as defined by law, and agrees to indemnify and hold harmless District (including its officers, agents and employees) from any and all liability arising out of the negligent acts, omissions or willful misconduct of University directors, officers, agents or employees in the performance of this Agreement.
 - District shall be responsible for damages caused by the negligence of its directors, officers, agents and employees, and agrees to indemnify and hold harmless CSU and University (including its officers, agents and employees) from any and all liability arising out of the negligent acts, omissions or willful misconduct of District's directors, officers, agents or employees in the performance of this Agreement.
- **D.** Insurance- Each Party to this agreement shall maintain General Liability Insurance (or a program of self-insurance), comprehensive or commercial form, with minimum limits of \$1,000,000 for each occurrence and \$3,000,000 general aggregate, and workers compensation coverage as required by law. Students shall maintain general and professional liability, as well as educator's errors & omissions coverage, through the Student Professional Liability Insurance (SPLIP) program, in the amount of \$2,000,000 each occurrence and \$4,000,000 general aggregate.
- E. Confidential Student Information- Student records shall remain confidential as required by the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). Neither Party shall release any protected student information without written consent of the student, unless required to do so by law or as dictated by the terms of this Agreement.
- F. Finger-Printing- If District determines that the services provided by University's students involve more than limited contact with District's students, University students shall be finger-printed as required by the District before services commence pursuant to California Education Code §45125.1.
- G. Services Responsibility- District retains professional and administrative responsibility for services rendered at the District.
- **H.** Tuberculosis Testing- If District determines that the services provided by University students involve more than limited contact with District's students, University students shall provide District the results of a recent tuberculosis test.

- I. Student Safety and Personal Risk- The District shall inform the participating student of any potential health or safety risks associated with their field placement.
- J. Governing Law This agreement shall be construed in accordance with and governed by the laws of the State of California, except where superseded by federal law. All actions or proceedings arising in connection with this Agreement shall be subject to the exclusive jurisdiction of the state courts of the County of Los Angeles, State of California.
- K. Assignments This Agreement is not assignable in whole or in part.

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- L. Renewal This agreement may be renewed by mutual written consent of authorized representatives of the parties. Nothing herein guarantees any such renewal(s).
- M. Endorsement Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed as conferring on any Party hereto any right to use the other Party's name as an endorsement of product/service or to advertise, promote or otherwise market any product or service without the prior written consent of the other parties. Furthermore, nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as endorsement of any commercial product or service by University its officers or employees.
- N. Fair Labor Standards Act and Displacement of Organization Employees It is not the intention of this Agreement for students to perform services that would displace or replace regular employees of the District.
- **O.** Nondiscrimination During the performance of this Agreement, the Parties may not deny placement under this Agreement to any student on the basis of religion, color, ethnic group identification, sex, age, physical or mental disability, nor may they discriminate unlawfully against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, physical handicap, mental disability, medical condition, marital status, age (over 40) or sex. The parties will insure that the evaluation and treatment of students are free of such discrimination.
- P. Severability If any provision of this agreement is held invalid by any law, rule, order of regulation of any government, or by the final determination of any state or federal court, such invalidity shall not affect the enforceability of any other provision not held to be invalid.
- Q. Authority Each Party represents and warrants that the person(s) signing below on its behalf has the authority to enter into this Agreement and that this Agreement does not violate any of its existing agreements or obligations.
- R. Entire Agreement This document contains the entire agreement and understanding of the Parties, and supersedes all prior agreements, arrangements, and understandings with respect to the subject matter of this document. No amendment, alternation or variation of the terms of the Agreement shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by the Parties hereto.

BASIC CREDENTIAL PROGRAMS: STUDENT TEACHING

WHEREAS, the District is authorized to enter into agreements with the University, to provide single subject, multiple subject, and/or education specialist student teaching experience through practice teaching to students enrolled in teacher training curricula of the University; and

WHEREAS, any such agreement may provide for the payment for the services rendered by the District of an amount not to exceed the actual cost to the District of the services rendered; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined between the parties hereto that the payments to be made to the District under this agreement do not exceed the actual cost to the District of the services rendered by the District; and

WHEREAS, the honorarium or payment provided herein is intended to be transmitted promptly by the District to the Master Teacher as compensation for and recognition of services performed for the student teacher in the supervisory teacher's charge;

NOW, THEREFORE, it is mutually agreed between the University and the District as follows:

The State University and the District are as follows:

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SPECIAL PROVISIONS

1. <u>Scope of Services:</u> The District shall provide to University students teaching experience through practice teaching in schools and classes of the District not to exceed the units of practice teaching set forth in these Special Provisions. Such practice teaching shall be provided in such schools or classes of the District and under the direct supervision and instruction of such employees of the District as the District and the University through their duly authorized representatives may agree upon.

"Practice teaching" as used herein and elsewhere in this agreement means active participation in the duties and functions of classroom teaching under the direct supervision and instruction of employees of the District holding valid life diplomas or credentials issued by the State Board of Education, other than emergency or provisional or intern credentials, authorizing them to serve as classroom teachers in the schools or classes in which the practice teaching is provided.

2. <u>Rates:</u> Contingent upon the availability of funds each semester, the University may pay the District for the performance by the District for all services required to be performed under this agreement at the rates set forth below for each semester unit of practice teaching. The District shall be notified not less than 60 days prior to the semester if a change in the compensation rate is to be made due to the availability of funds.

If payment is made by the University, the RATE AND AMOUNT will be <u>\$20.00</u> per semester unit the student is enrolled in for the practice teaching experience.

3. <u>Assignment:</u> An assignment of a student of the University to practice teaching in schools or classes of the District shall be at the discretion of the University. An assignment is typically for approximately eight (8) weeks or for approximately twenty (20) weeks, but the length of an assignment can vary depending on the program and student.

The assignment of a student of the University to practice teaching in the District shall be deemed to be effective for purposes of this agreement as of the date the student presents to the proper authorities of the District the assignment card or other document given the student by the University effecting such assignment, but not earlier than the date of such assignment as shown on such card or other document.

In the event the assignment of a student of the University to practice teaching is terminated by the University for any reason, the District shall receive payment on account of such student except that if such assignment is terminated before the end of the eighth week of the term of the assignment, the District shall receive payment for an assignment for eight (8) weeks only. If a student is assigned by the University to another teacher of the District after an assignment has become effective, this shall be considered for payment purposes as an entirely new and separate assignment.


Absences of a student from assigned practice teaching shall not be counted as absences in computing the semester units of practice teaching provided the student by the District.

4. <u>Payment:</u> Contingent upon funds being available to University, and written notification of availability of funds to District, the District, within 45 days following the close of each semester or quarter of the University, shall submit an invoice and stipend report to the University for payment at the rate provided herein for all units of practice teaching provided by the District under and in accordance with this agreement during said semester or quarter. The Master Teacher Stipend Report shall be executed by a duly authorized representative of the District certifying that the District expended or became obligated to expend in providing such practice teaching an amount not less than the amount of the invoice. A sample stipend report is attached.

The University will pay the amount of such invoice from monies made available for such purpose by or pursuant to the laws of the State. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this agreement, the University shall not be obligated by this agreement to pay the District any amount in excess of the total sum set forth in the Special Provisions.

5. <u>Termination</u>: The District may, for good cause, refuse to accept for practice teaching any student of the University assigned to practice teaching in the District, and upon request of the District, made for good cause, the University shall at any time terminate the assignment of any student of the University to practice teaching in the District. The University may, upon good cause, withdraw from practice teaching at any time any student of the University assigned to practice teaching in the District.
