


California Risk Levels for COVID Infection





Public Health Updates


- LA County has moved into the Orange "Moderate" Tier
- Next band is Yellow "Minimal" Tier
- Based on new "Vaccine Equity Quartile" since California has exceeded 4,000,000 doses administered in this area, LA County will move into the Yellow Tier when:
 - Less than 2.0 daily new cases (per 100k) Ο
 - Less than 2.0% positive tests for entire county Ο
 - Less than 2.2% positive tests for health equity Ο quartile

Public Health Updates Impacting Schools

- Orange Tier allows more industry sectors to open and others to open indoors with more capacity
- Number of students allowed in childcare (technology learning pods), specialized services, and group assessments (Advanced Placement exams) now aligns to in-school instruction:
 - Seated no less than 3 feet apart, six feet is recommended
 - Maximum size of the cohort is based on the number of students that can be seated within the available space while maintaining the required distancing
 - No cohort can exceed 30 students and 2 supervising adults regardless of room size
- Special education services may be given now with two additional options:
 - May pull out a small group of students from the same classroom for services
 - May pull out students from general education classroom and group with other students requiring similar services, even if this places them with students not part of their stable classroom group, this group should keep the same membership day to day as much as possible

Adults on Multiple Campuses

- SUPERVISING ADULTS (Cohorts Childcare, specialized services)
 - An adult assigned to one cohort of children or youth, who does not physically interact with any other cohorts
 - A supervising adult may be assigned to 2 different stable cohorts if they offer specialized services/support that cannot be provided by any other supervising adult
- TEACHERS (Stable Learning Groups in person instruction)
 - Specialized instructors are allowed to interact with more students
 - Each teacher in the elementary schools reopened for full-grade in-person instruction may be assigned to work with up to 3 stable groups during the course of the school day or school week
- OTHER EMPLOYEES/STAFF
 - Individuals who work in a school facility in any capacity associated with teaching, coaching, student support, provision of therapies or personal assistance to individual students, facility cleaning or maintenance, administration, or any other activity required for the school to function.
 - There is no language in the public health documents that limits how many school sites an employee can work at as long as they are not assigned to support a cohort or stable learning group of students

Additional Updates

- Increased access to indoor use of gyms and weight rooms
- Choir practice can occur outdoors, with masks and physical distancing
- Band practice, including wind instruments, can occur outdoors:
 - Masks should be worn by all students except those playing wind instruments
 - Wind instruments necessitate increased physical distancing (more than 6 feet), use of instrument covers if available, special procedures for emptying spit valves









Elementary Pivot to Hybrid Instruction

- Grades TK-2 returned to campuses March 29
- Grades 3-6 returned April 5
- 6,587 elementary students chose to participate in oncampus instruction
- 50.8% of total enrollment



Childcare

- Technology Learning Pods are still in place for all students who were previously enrolled in a TLP
- TLPs are open when students are not participating in on-campus instruction
- All GUSD employees requesting childcare have been offered placement
- GUSD opened childcare at College View for preschool age children of employees and other essential workers













Cerritos Elementary Recess Organization





Graduations and Senior Activities

- Outdoor graduations will be allowed in Red or Orange Tiers
- Difference between the tiers is the capacity:
 - Red Tier = 20% of outdoor facility capacity
 - Orange Tier = 33% of outdoor facility capacity
