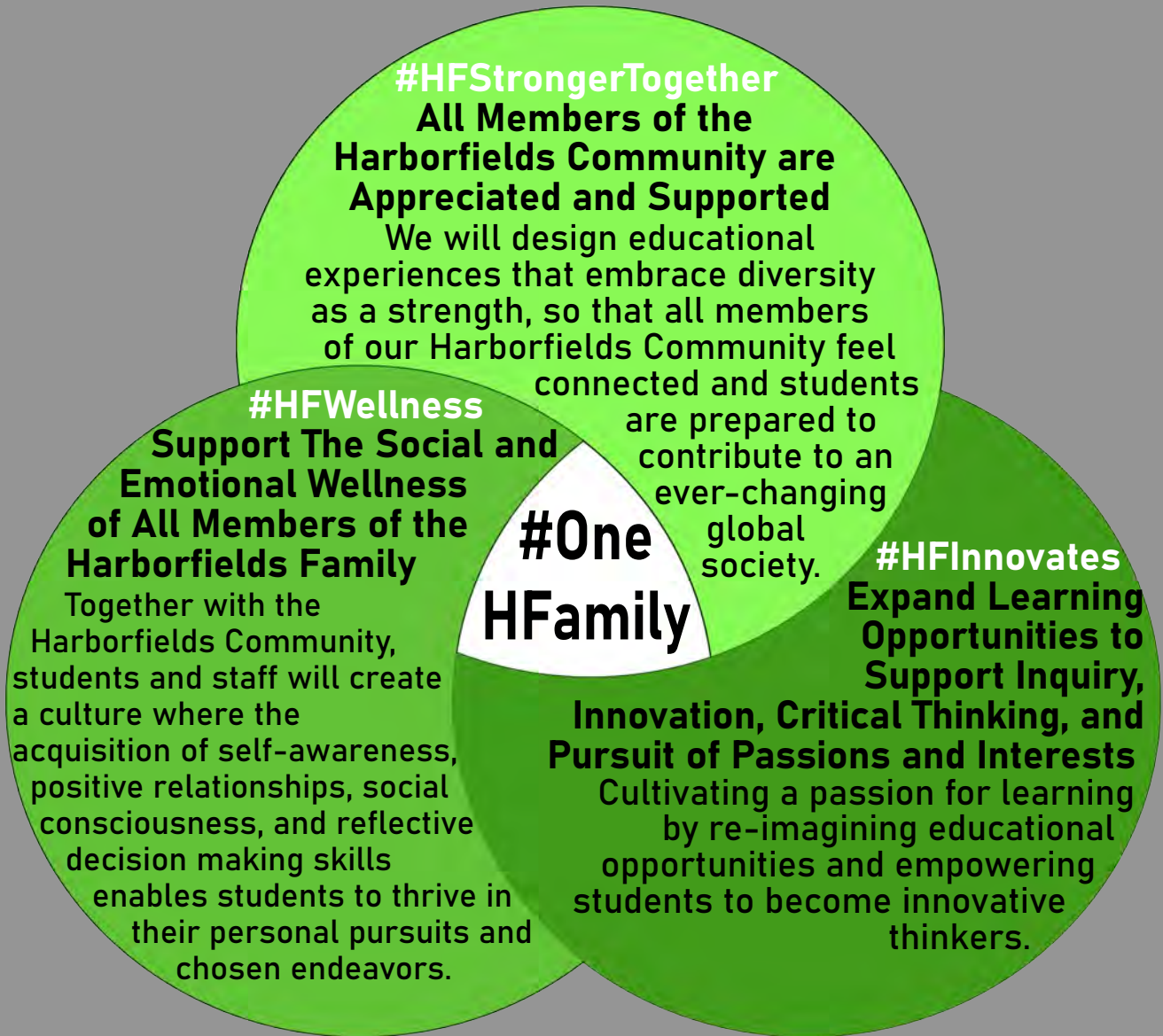

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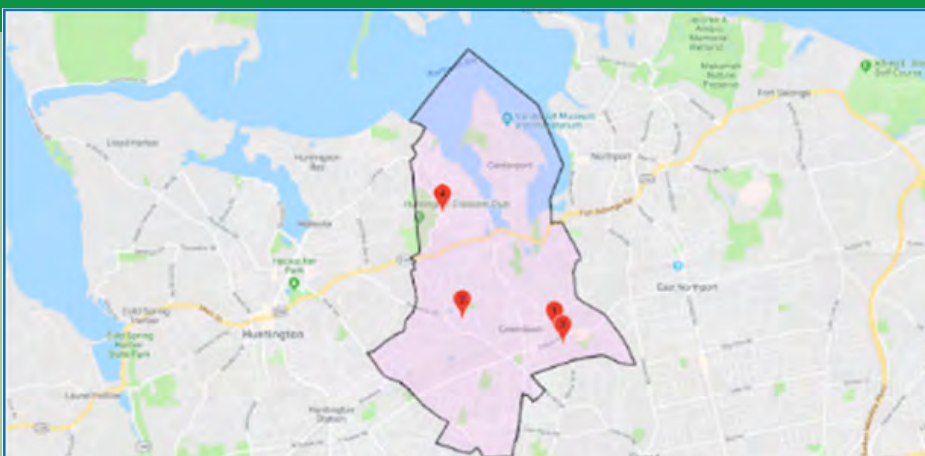

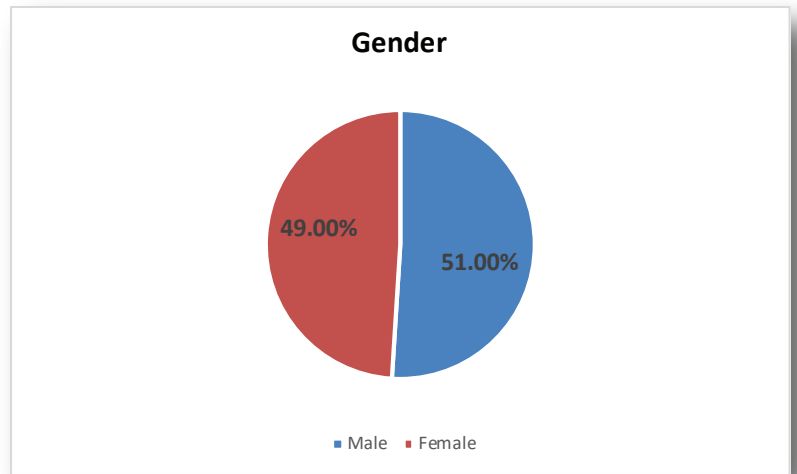
ABOUT HARBORFIELDS

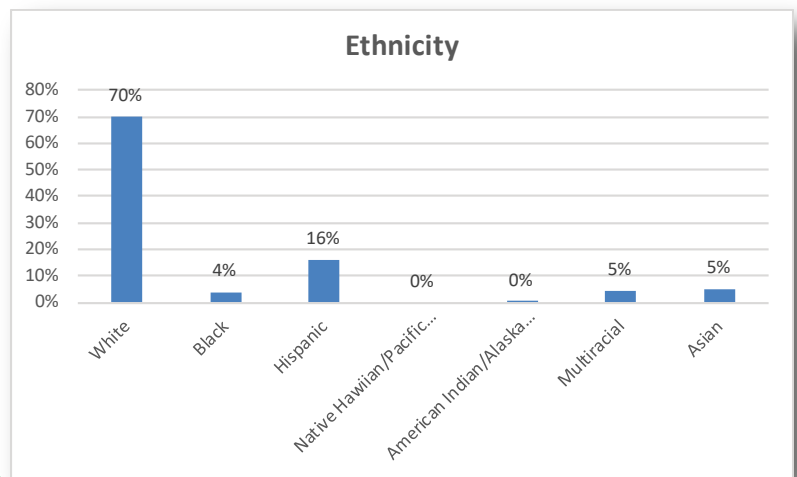

WASHINGTON DRIVE

Washington Drive Primary School offers a safe, nurturing, and supportive environment for children in grades K-2, fostering a lifelong love of learning through dynamic educational programs. Our students meet rigorous standards through critical thinking, hands-on learning, and technology, supported by a strong partnership between faculty and the school community.

This year, students embraced Social Emotional Learning (SEL) strategies such as five-finger breathing and positive self-talk. They participated in character-building and academic activities, including Project-Based Learning (PBL), Innovation Hour, Flag Day, Winter Wonderland, P.S. I Love You Day, the Kindergarten Teddy Bear Clinic, and the First and Second Grade Science Fairs.

Our students developed perseverance through the annual Principal's Challenge, celebrated with an exciting Mario Kart race. They also experienced their first solar eclipse, leaving with glasses as mementos and sharing them with students in Latin America. We introduced an Outdoor Classroom, and our second-grade students showcased their spelling skills in a grade-level Spelling Bee!

The Anti-Defamation League recognized our inclusive community, and we presented our work at the No Place for Hate (NPFH) Conference. We also raised awareness for limb loss and differences and honored veterans with a school-wide celebration and Wall of Heroes. Additionally, our students submitted a project in honor of International Women in Science. Parents engaged in Parent Academy, gaining valuable resources to support their children at home. Students enjoyed Principal's Storytime with Mrs. McNally and Mrs. Neira, a fun cooking show with surprise teacher guests, and various engaging activities. We are dedicated to continuing this educational journey and preparing our students for a bright and successful future.

This year, enrichment opportunities have sparked curiosity and creativity in our students. All students participated in Makerspace lessons like Inca Bridges, The Ping Pong Challenge, podcast creations, Owl Pellet investigations, and coding. Our LEAP Program provided advanced opportunities for identified students, who excelled in national competitions like Word Masters and the Continental Math League.

Our No Place for Hate Committee led an anti-bias initiative, introducing "Just Ask" by Sonia Sotomayor in classrooms to teach empathy and understanding. Students contributed to a kindness garden, symbolizing our commitment to respect. We also introduced Talking Circles in all classrooms, fostering communication, empathy, and a sense of belonging. This year, the PTA supported activities such as the Taste of Australia for third graders, the North Shore Land Alliance Water Program for fourth graders, and a talk by BMX biker Chris Poulis for fifth graders. The PTA also sponsored events like Math 24, Family Game Night, Third Grade STEAM Night, PARP, TJJL Read-In, and the Fifth Grade Luau, significantly enriching our students' learning experiences.

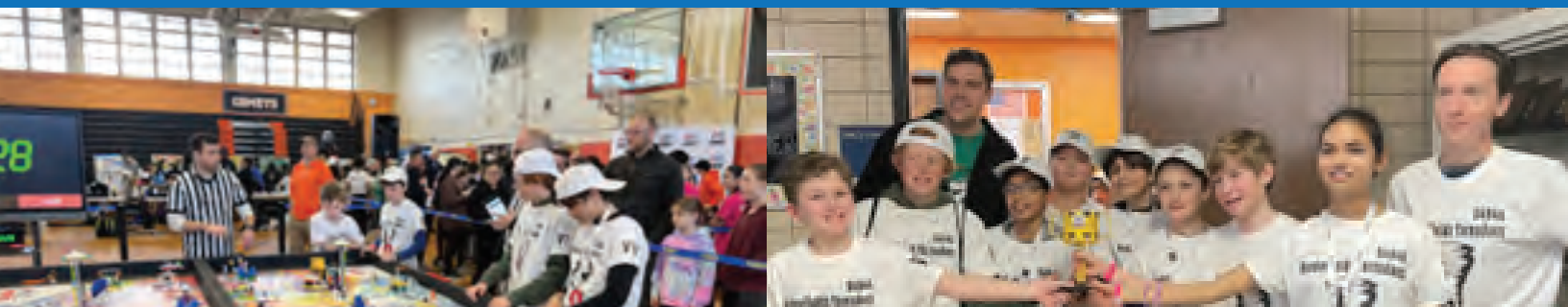

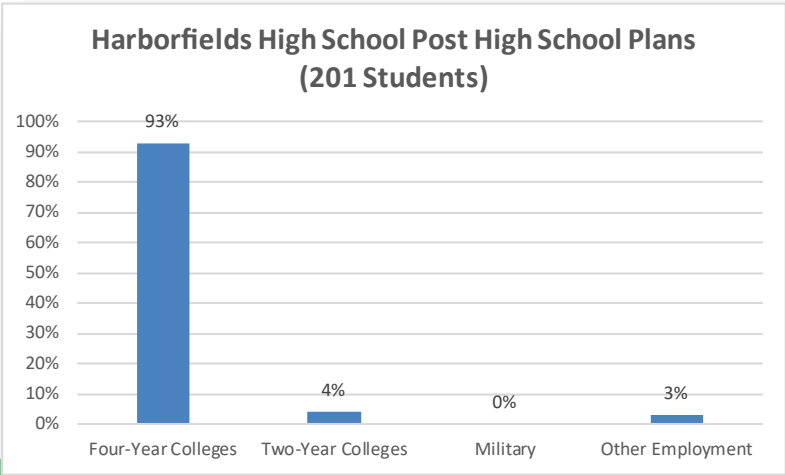
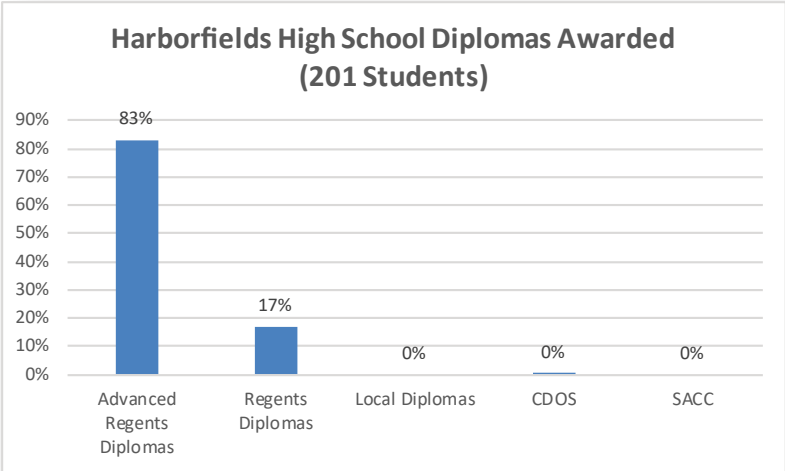

CAMS TRAINING

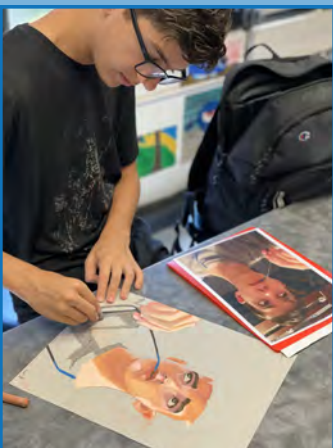

In Harborfields, our families of ELLs (English Language Learners) speak approximately 17 home languages and represent a diversity of cultures. Our 10 ENL teachers service approximately 155 students throughout the district, following the guidelines set forth by NYS CR Part 154 to provide the best model of instruction based on our students' proficiency levels in English, ranging from stand-alone classes to co-taught integrated classrooms. ENL teachers collaborate closely with each other and with the classroom teachers, school psychologists, social workers, and guidance counselors to ensure that our ELLs succeed academically, socially, and emotionally.

Program Highlights 2023-24:

- Washington Drive Primary (WDPS) School ELLs participated in Start with Hello Week by displaying photos of students and accompanying speech bubbles of "Hello" in the students' native languages. Additionally, our ELLs paved the way for Languages of the World Morning Announcements, where a new word is taught in multiple languages each month. Students recorded themselves saying the word in their native languages, which could be accessed by sound buttons displayed in the main hallway.
- Oldfield Middle School (OMS) ELLs created movie posters featuring gods and goddesses from Ancient Greece and participated in a red-carpet event to highlight their creations. Additionally, they reenacted The Diary of Anne Frank in their English classes.
- Thomas J. Lahey (TJL) ELLs attended a field trip to Sunken Meadow to learn about butterflies and their natural habitat. They experienced what it was like to see the world through the eyes of a butterfly.
- The ENL Foundations Program at Harborfields High School (HHS) continued into its second year of implementation to address the need for literacy instruction for Students with Interrupted Formal Education (SIFE), successfully helping these students access grade-level instruction.
- HHS ELLs visited the iconic American Museum of Natural History. To practice their oral language skills, students worked in teams to complete a scavenger hunt in the dinosaur and ancient civilizations exhibits.
- HHS ELLs, AP Spanish, and Leadership students participated in the Helping Hands peer-relationship-building event. Through various team activities, guest speakers, and a multicultural fiesta, students got to know each other and formed friendships. The relationships established became the springboard for the Helping Hands Peer Tutoring program between ELLs and AP Spanish students.
- The annual District-Wide ENL Recognition Night we celebrated the extraordinary achievements of our ELLs. WDPS students gave a heartwarming vocal performance, OMS students recited original poetry, and HHS students led the audience in an energizing dance performance.



BUSINESS & CAREER EDUCATION

The Harborfields Business & Career Education department provides a wide array of classes and activities for students interested in business, including college-level accounting, marketing, business law, computer applications, career awareness, and education courses.

This year, Harborfields students had the opportunity to earn up to 33 college credits and obtain two different CTE graduation pathways in entrepreneurship and education. Business students joined the DECA Club and Business and Marketing Honor Society of New York State. Business teachers and students celebrated National Teach Business Day in October.

Business students heard from over 40 guest speakers this year and participated in job shadowing experiences with Zebra Technologies, UBS Arena/Islanders, MetLife Stadium/NY Jets, Cox Media Group, Suffolk County Sheriff's Office, and Huntington Hospital. Over 20 students completed internships including medical and education internships. Students worked with younger students at TJL and WDPS during CS Week and the High School Heroes Program. Students in the education pathway learned how to care for infants using a simulator, write lesson plans, and review the district strategic plan.

The business law class had the opportunity to take a trip to the Suffolk County District Court in Islip. Students learned about the court process and had the opportunity to attend trial arraignments. Business Law students presented in a mock trial as a final exam project. Students were provided with standard trial rules including objections, a trial script, affidavits, and evidence and provided class time to work collaboratively in groups of prosecution and defense to build a case and present in mock trial format. All Career Awareness students attend a business etiquette brunch where they learn the dos and don'ts of business etiquette.

Harborfields hosted the first Career Connect, Trade and Talent Expo that exposed students of numerous post-secondary options. The purpose of the event was to broaden students' perspectives and provide them with the knowledge and inspiration necessary for making informed decisions about their future careers. Students enrolled in career awareness courses were given the opportunity to interact with professionals from diverse industries who showcased various careers from all 16 career clusters.

The Harborfields IAB is now the Harborfields Career Readiness Network! Ninth-grader Isabella DiPaola's logo was selected from numerous entries. The revised logo is a perfect fit for the new mission statement, *Unlocking Potential*.



K-12 COUNSELING SERVICES

The K-12 school counseling services offered by the guidance department during the 2023-2024 school year aim to create a nurturing and empowering learning environment for students to excel academically, socially, and emotionally. With a clear mission in mind, the school counseling department is dedicated to addressing each student's academic, career, personal, and social needs, ensuring they are well-equipped to tackle future challenges. Our comprehensive programming, aligned with the rigorous New York State counseling standards, facilitates students' exploration and connection to their future goals, providing them with a solid foundation for success.

In the 2023-2024 school year, some of our programming highlights include establishing Peer Pals at OMS which is designed to support new students to the Harborfields School District, hosting fall and spring college fairs and workshops to support our students college exploration and our Commitment Day celebration where the entire high school celebrated the impressive opportunities (college, career, military, etc.) awaiting our Class of 2024.



TECHNOLOGY

Harborfields Central School District creates a dynamic learning environment that prepares students to thrive in an increasingly digital and interconnected society. 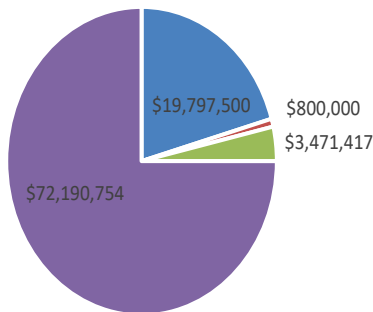

FINANCIALS 2023-2024

The Board of Education and District Administration develop an annual spending plan to ensure high quality educational programs, experiences, and opportunities for our students in a caring and motivating environment. The District's budget supports the ongoing implementation of the 5-year Strategic Plan through the prudent allocation of available resources and funding.

Approximately 77% of each dollar in the 2023-24 budget, and 76% of each dollar in the 2024-25 budget, was appropriated for instruction.

■ State Aid ■ Other Revenue ■ Reserves & Appropriated Fund Balance ■ Tax Levy

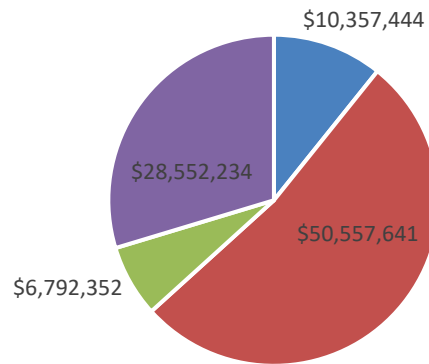

Budgeted Expenditures 2023-24

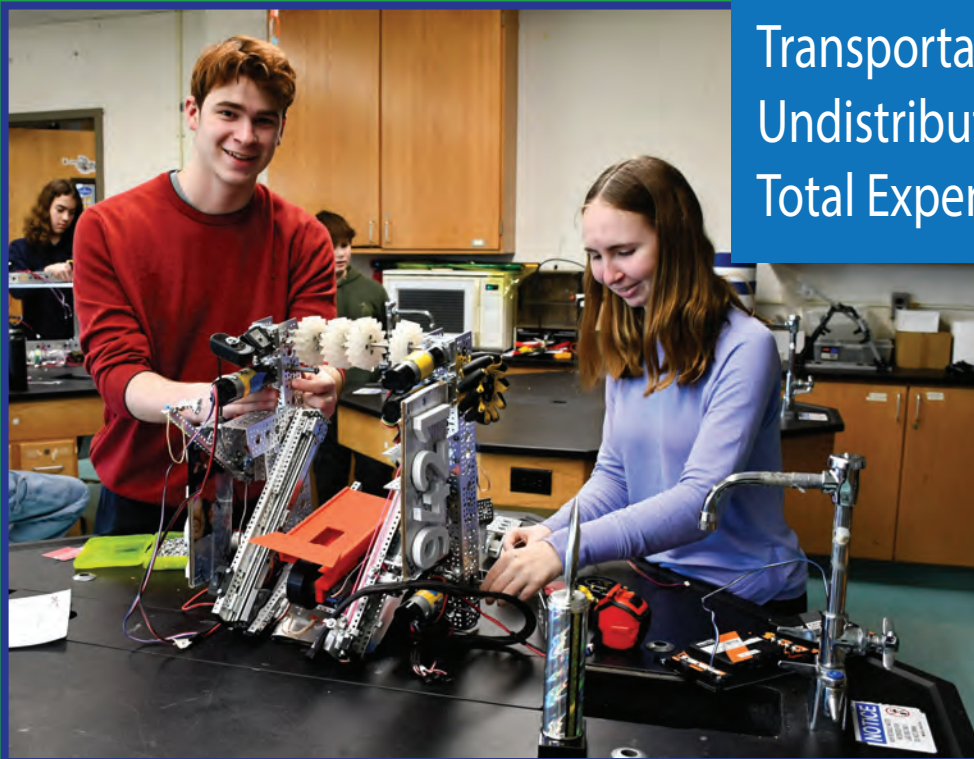

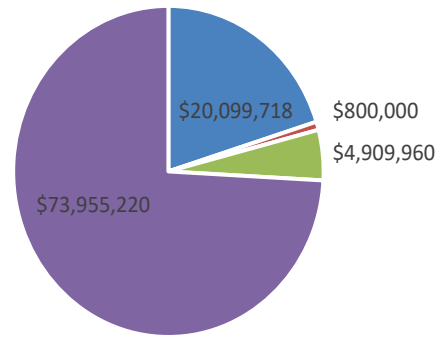

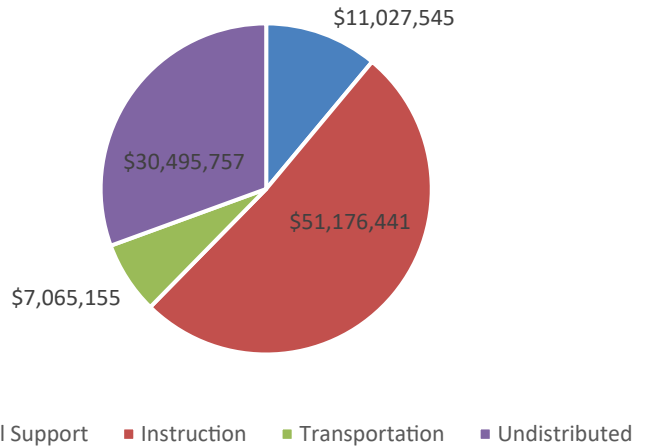
