At its April 16 meeting, the Board of Education approved a proposed budget of \$24,609,296 for the 2025-2026 school year. As in previous years, we have worked diligently to manage expenses, and I'm proud to share that this budget remains within the allowable tax levy limit of 2.67%.

As you review the proposed budget, you'll find

The play featured an incredible cast that delivered in every way imaginable. From endless puns and outstanding singing to excellent lighting and creativity, it was an absolute delight for all.


