

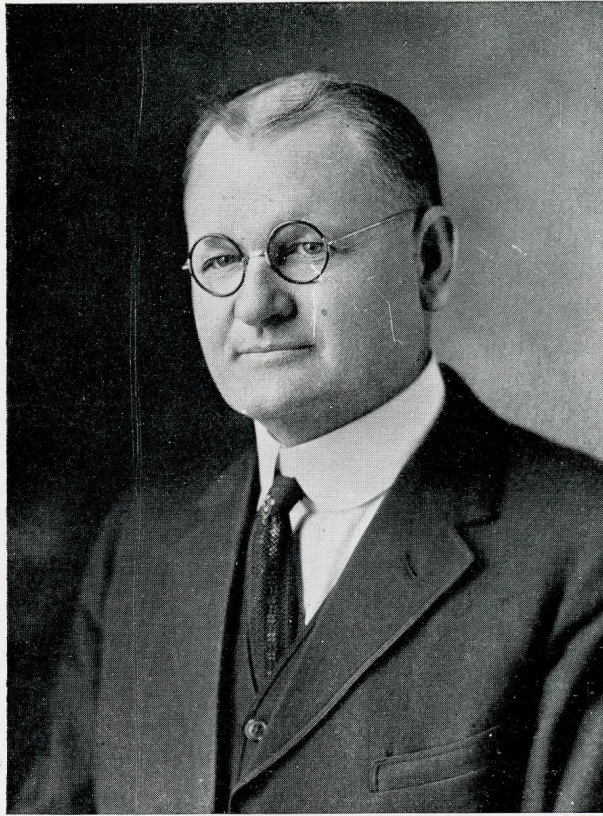

Advice To Under-Grads

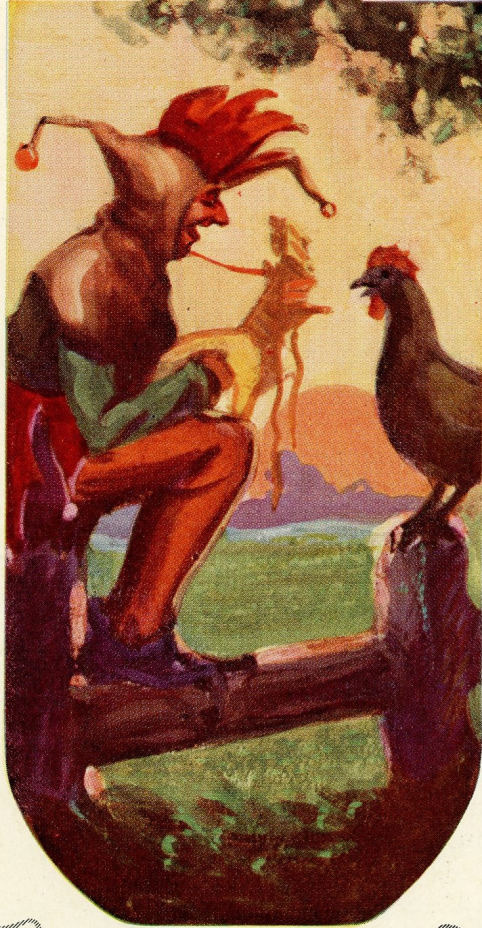


All you who would popular be

Senior III History

On August 28, 1922, there assembled at Morgan County High School a group of young people—the Freshman class. We were a green crowd and our realization of this fact was increased by the “ratting” which we received for the first few days. The faculty must have realized our timidity because they treated us mercifully.

The summer months of 1923 passed quickly and we returned to M. C. H. S. with the title of “Sophs.” We felt very important and entered heartily into the initiation of the Rats. This was the year in which we met Miss Simms and Miss McKenry and they have become dearer to us as time has passed.

Here it was 1924 and we were actually Juniors with hopes of a diploma in the near future. Our third year in high school began under the able guidance of Mr. Tiller, our new principal. It was with reluctance that we parted with Mr. Riddle, but our class joined in the hearty welcome given to his successor. It was in this year that our boys took an active interest in athletics, for more than half of the foot-ball team of 1924-25 consisted of boys from our class. The Juniors were also well represented in other athletic activities. It was also in this year that the Juniors and Sophomores organized the Jertersonian Literary Society and the Seniors and Freshmen the Wilsonian Literary Society. Mr. Lile, a member of the county board was added to our faculty in this year.

Our fourth year has arrived and we are Seniors at last. Our Freshman dreams, Sophomore hopes and Junior prayers are now realized as we stand on the elevated pedestal of Seniordom. The largest class in the history of Morgan County High School is finishing its career, with a total enrollment of 61, 9 of which started in the first grade of Hartselle City School together. Out of the 61, 30 began in the first year of M. C. H. S. in 1922.

Mr. Martin, a new member of the faculty of 1926, has served faithfully as our History and English teacher during our last year at school. With the untiring efforts of Mr. Snyder and Miss DuBose through our four years of high school life, we have been able to accomplish our aim—to be graduates of Morgan County High School.

Although happy in our attainment of this our ambition, we look back over the four years with mingled feelings of pride and regret. Our many happy days here cause us to feel sad at leaving but we are justly proud of our achievement.

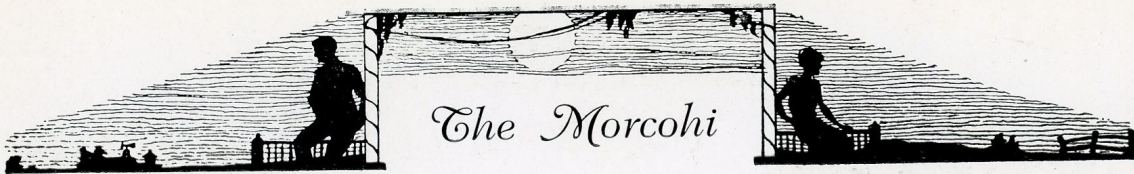
Will Evelyn Bean who always loved to trip the light fantastic toe, is now a popular chorus girl in Flo Ziegfeld's Follies.

Lazelle Lovelady is a popular ukelele Lady in sunny Honolulu.

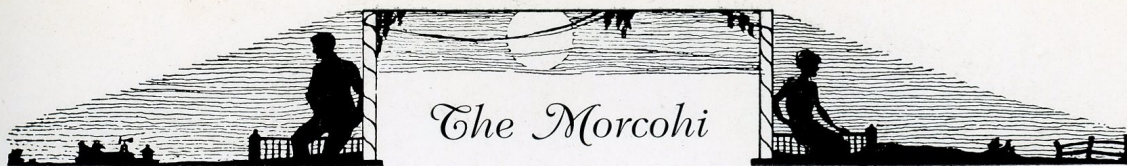
Katye Lu McCarley works at the candy counter at Kresses.

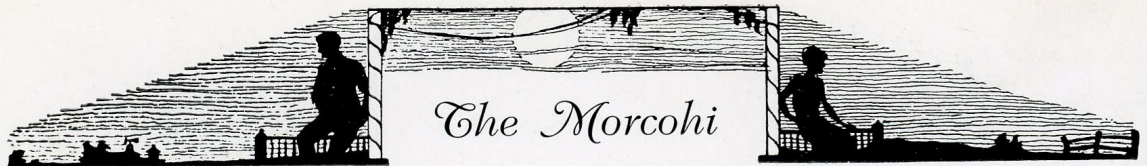

Hold us in a tie that binds.

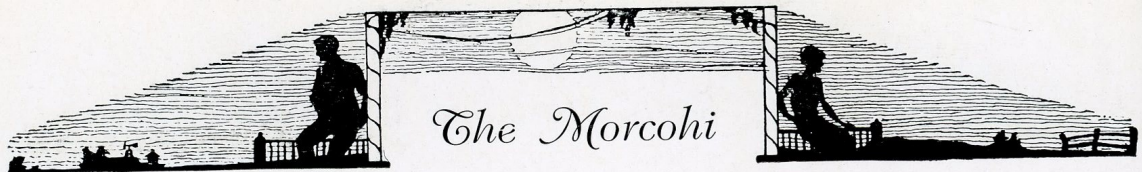
