With soft melodious sound.





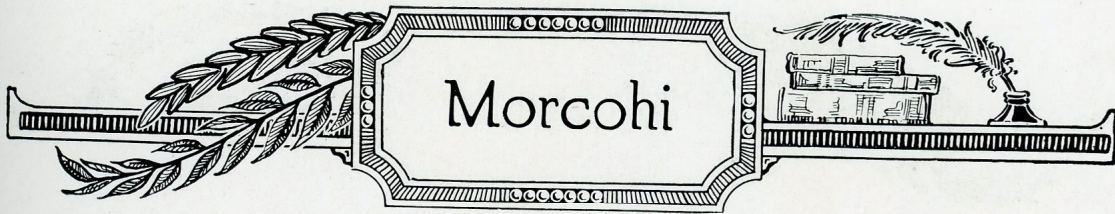
## *Class Knocker*

What else could we say in order to make us a more perfect senior class? Nothing! However, we will say that we believe that life has plenty in store for us, and that we are prepared for almost anything.



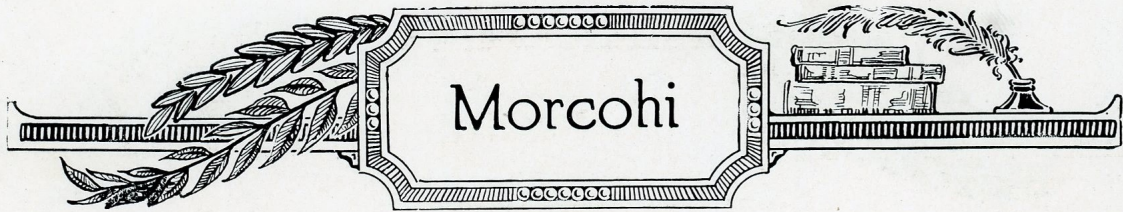


## *Some Ungranted Senior Privileges*

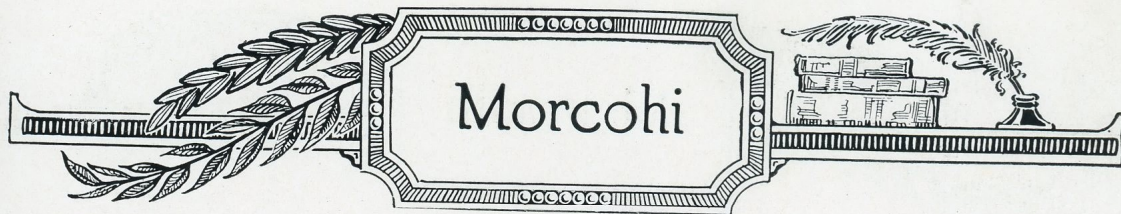
The pupils in this class are planning a most excellent exhibit for field day in April. First prize for sewing has been awarded to our girls for several years in succession.
