## History of the Senior III Class

On August 24, 1925 there entered in M. C. H. S. a freshman class which was considered by the other students as the dumbest and greenest rat class they had seen. But as time rassed and we grew accustomed to the ways of high school they were forced to change their opinion of us. We threw ourselves wholeheartedly into athletics, furnished several football and basketball players and participated in every activity. We were not conceited but as the year drew to a close we looked back with pride on the record we had made and resolved to win fame as Sophs.

On September 5, 1926 returning to M. C. H. S. as Sophs. we felt very superior to the "rats" and did not hesitate in letting it be known. We, living up to our motto, "win or die trying," were recognized as being the strongest, largest and most feared class in school. Under the guidance of Miss Fischer the victory of every contest undertaken was carried off by us and the officers of the Jeffersonian Literary Society were elected from our class. So strong were we in athletics that the entire school was challenged in a football game. We contributed to the school team a quarterback, two half backs, two guards, two tackles and one end. The success of our second year caused great predictions to be made for our Junior and Seniors years.

On September 5, 1927 we ventured into Junior land with a smaller class than the previous year, nevertheless just as an important one. The honor of breaking the state record for high jumping fell to one of our members. This year seemed like a brief stay in which we were deprived of our natural rights, therefore we longed for the next year when we would enjoy the Senior privileges.

At last the eventful day of September 4 rolling around found us in the dignified Senior seats with only twenty-five members of an original class of forty-five. five of which started together in the first grade of public school. The rest have fallen by the wayside or drifted to other places. We feel like what we are is largely due to the wise guidance of Mr. Tiller who has been our guide during the four years. And now as the time is near for our departure we give up our seats of honor to those who shall come next, with a feeling of sadness, yet we warn them to fill these places as we have done and think kindly of us in the years to come.








Alice Wilson, Best Ali Round Girl






Jimmie Moss, Best All Round Boy






We have Mr. Douglass with us this year for the second time as homeroom teacher, so of course we can truly say "This has been the 'best ever'".

Dancing and singing of course are all right, But they won't help you out if you're in a tight, There's just two things you certainly must know— The first is to cook and the next is to sew.










# Loving Cups


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

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
