
THE RX/OTC PROBLEM

- 1 out of 5 teens have abused a prescription (Rx) drug to get high in their lifetime.
- 1 out of 10 teens have abused an over-the-counter (OTC) drug to get high in their lifetime.
- 70% of people who abused prescription pain relievers got them from friends or relatives.
- More people die from abusing prescription pain relievers than from cocaine and heroin combined.



DRUG TRENDS IN ORANGE COUNTY


Orange County Deaths by Drugs vs. Motor Vehicle Crashes

HOW DOES MY SCHOOL COMPARE?


Lifetime use of Prescription painkillers to get high (1 or more times)

Reason for Abuse

- Peer pressure
- To become more social
- Depression
- Escape
- To "fit in" peer acceptance
- "Feels good"

Young People Believe

- Less shame attached
- Lower consequences
- Lack of seriousness
- Non-addictive
- Because they are legal

OVER-THE-COUNTER DRUGS BEING ABUSED

Acetaminophenaches, fever Dextromethorphancough Pseudoephedrine ...nasal congestion

DEXTROMETHORPHAN (DXM)

Where is this found? Corricidin, Robitusin, Nyquil, Tylenol Cold & Flu

AKA: DXM, dex, and skittles

Effects on the Body:

Numbness of fingers & toes, nausea, and brain damage

PRESCRIPTION DRUGS BEING ABUSED

PAIN RELIEVERS

Examples:

Codeine, Fentanyl, Morphine, Hydrocodone, Oxycodone, Opana

AKA:

Hillbilly Heroin, Oxy, OC, China Girl, Roxie 30's, Percs, Vics

Effects on the Body:

Slows heart rate, breathing, and tolerance = addiction \rightarrow overdose \rightarrow ?



PRESCRIPTION DRUGS BEING ABUSED

STIMULANTS


The Drug: Ritalin, Adderall

AKA:

Skippy, The Smart Drug, Vitamin R, Rose, speed, uppers, ritz, rippers, bennies, blue pill

Effects on the Body:

Increase heart rate, lack of sleep, and serious heart problems

PRESCRIPTION DRUGS BEING ABUSED

DEPRESSANTS

The Drug: Xanax, Valium

AKA:

Xani bars, benzos, candy, downers, sleeping pills, tranks, barbs

Effects on the Body:

Poor motor coordination, slowed heart rate and breathing, and life-threatening withdrawal symptoms



METHODS OF ABUSE

- Ingesting excessive amounts
- Mixing cough syrup with soda or alcohol
 - "Robo-Fizzing" / "Sizzurp" / "Purple Drank"
- Ingesting handfuls of mixed pills at a time at a social gathering
 - "Pharming" / Bowl / Cocktail / Trail Mix Parties
 - Breaking time capsules on narcotic-based drugs to get an "instant" high
 - "Crushing"/ Snorting

LOCAL STORIES



CONSEQUENCES OF ABUSE

School

- Dropping grades
- Missing school/truancy
- Problem with school authority
- Consequences of zero tolerance policy
 - Suspension
 - Expulsion

Legal

- Stealing, supplying or selling prescription drugs to someone else is a FELONY
- Being arrested for driving under the influence of prescription drugs

TEACHING BEYOND NO...

- You can show youth more than just saying "No."
- Teach youth to take control of the situation by following these steps:
 - 1. Name the trouble
 - 2. Identify the consequences
 - 3. Invite them to do something else
 - 4. Remind them, "If you change your mind I will be here, call or text me."

FAMILY DINNERS

The more often kids eat dinner with their families, the less likely they are to smoke, drink or use drugs.





WHERE PEOPLE ARE GETTING THESE DRUGS?

- Over 70 percent of people who abused Rx pain relievers got them from friends or relatives:
 - For free (55%)
 - Bought them (11.4%)
 - Took them without asking (4.8%)



PREVENTION STRATEGIES

Reduce Access to Rx/OTC Drugs In Your Home

MONITOR - Take inventory SECURE - Lock your medications DESTROY - Properly dispose of expired/unwanted medications

Do not flush medications down the drain or toilet.

HOW TO PROPERLY DESTROY YOUR MEDICATIONS

STEPS TO FOLLOW:

1. Pour medications into a zip baggie.

2. Pour hot water into the baggie.

3. Insert kitty litter into the baggie, place in trash bin.

WHAT CAN PROJECT PATH DO FOR YOUR COMMUNITY?

- Youth education in classrooms (middle schools)
 - 1 hour interactive presentation
- Parent education
- Handouts and educational materials for both youth and adults
