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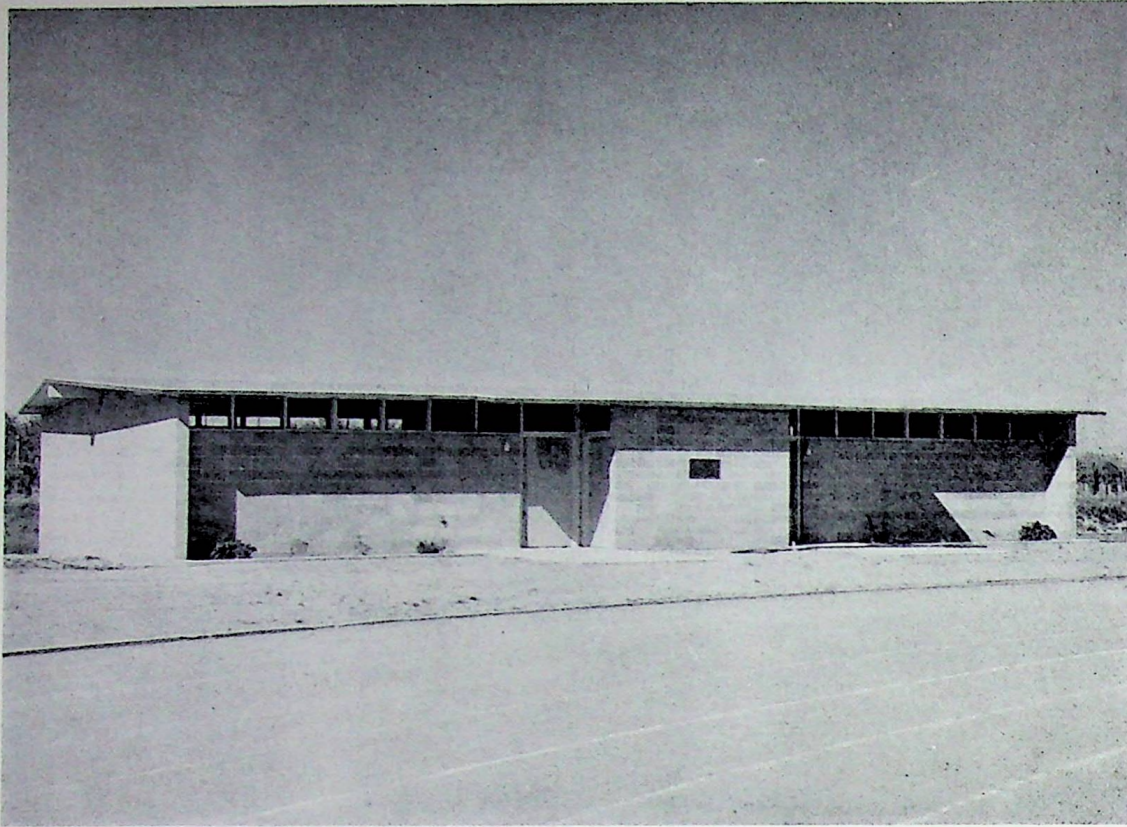

Upon graduating from high school in Ann Arbor, Michigan, in 1936, he continued his education at the University of Michigan where he received the B.A. degree. Later, at the University of Southern California, he received a master's degree in education, and this year he completed the requirements for a doctorate in education at the same university.

Mr. Nielsen served in the United States Navy four and one-half years.

Vice-principal Ejnar Peterson has been teaching mathematics at Kingsburg High School for thirty years. Only when he served as an officer in the United States Army Air Forces was his teaching interrupted.

Mr. Peterson was a member of the graduating class at Kingsburg High School in 1916. He later received his A.B. degree from the University of California.

Although he was born in Chicago, Illinois, Mr. Peterson has lived in Kingsburg since 1905.

The vice-president of the board, Mr. James Cassidy, has been a member since 1951. Mr. Cassidy states that his occupation is ranching.

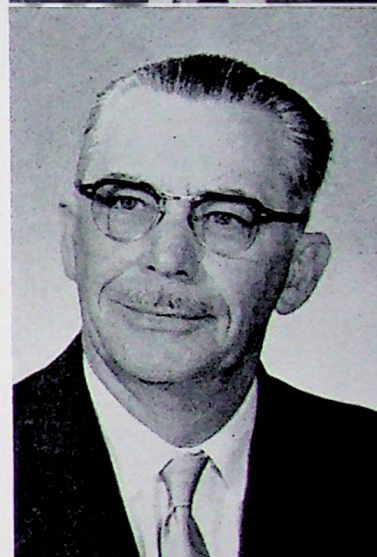
Mr. Luther Linda, also a rancher, holds the office of clerk and has been a member of the board for three years.

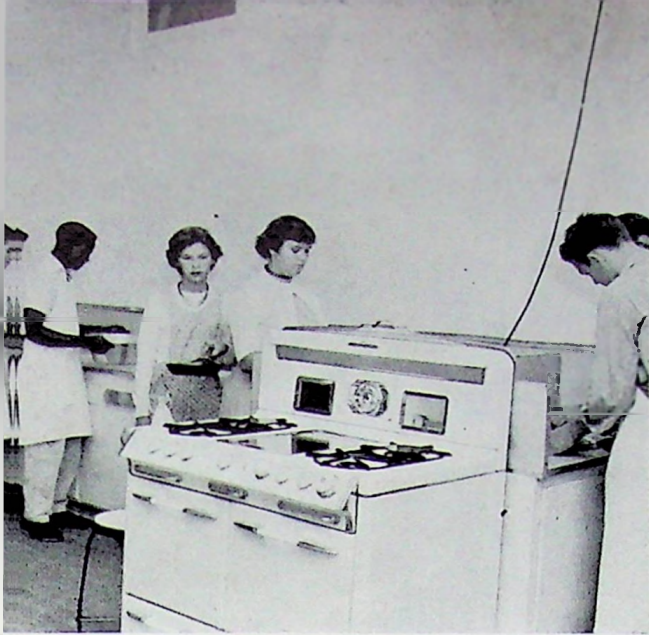

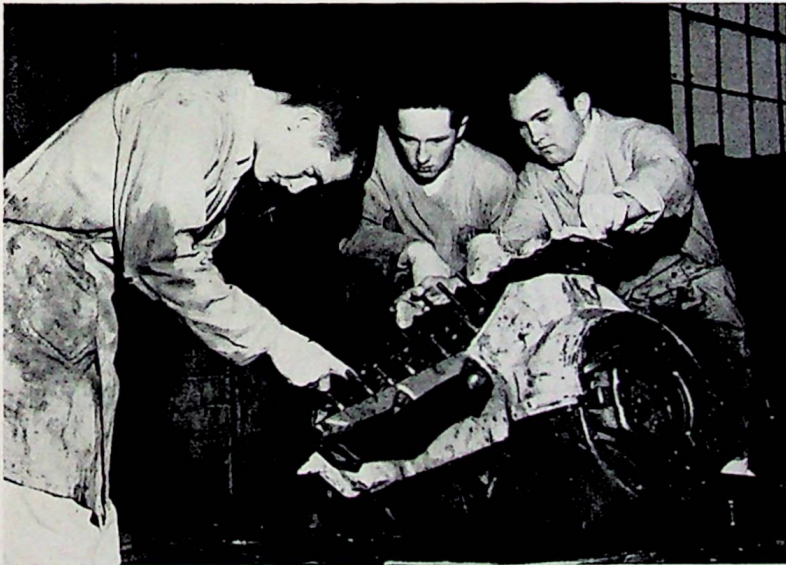

Mrs. Ray Boucher, school secretary, joined the K.H.S staff last summer.



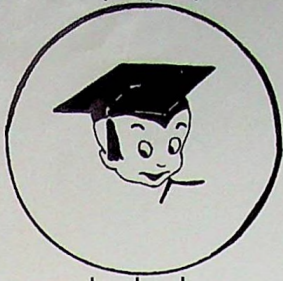

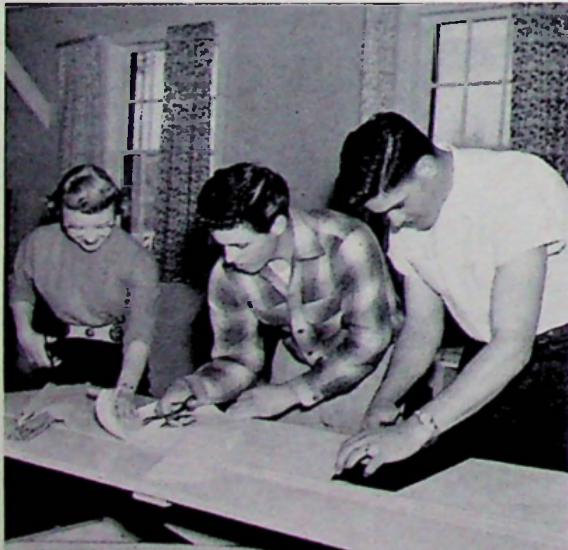
Starting the year off right, the class of '56" began taking part in school activities immediately.

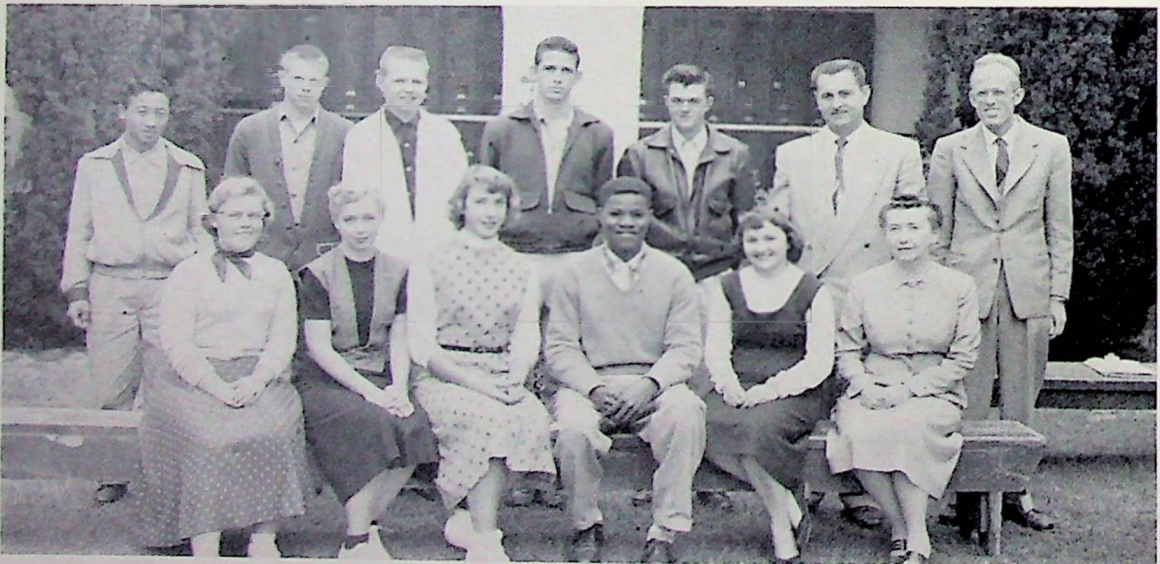

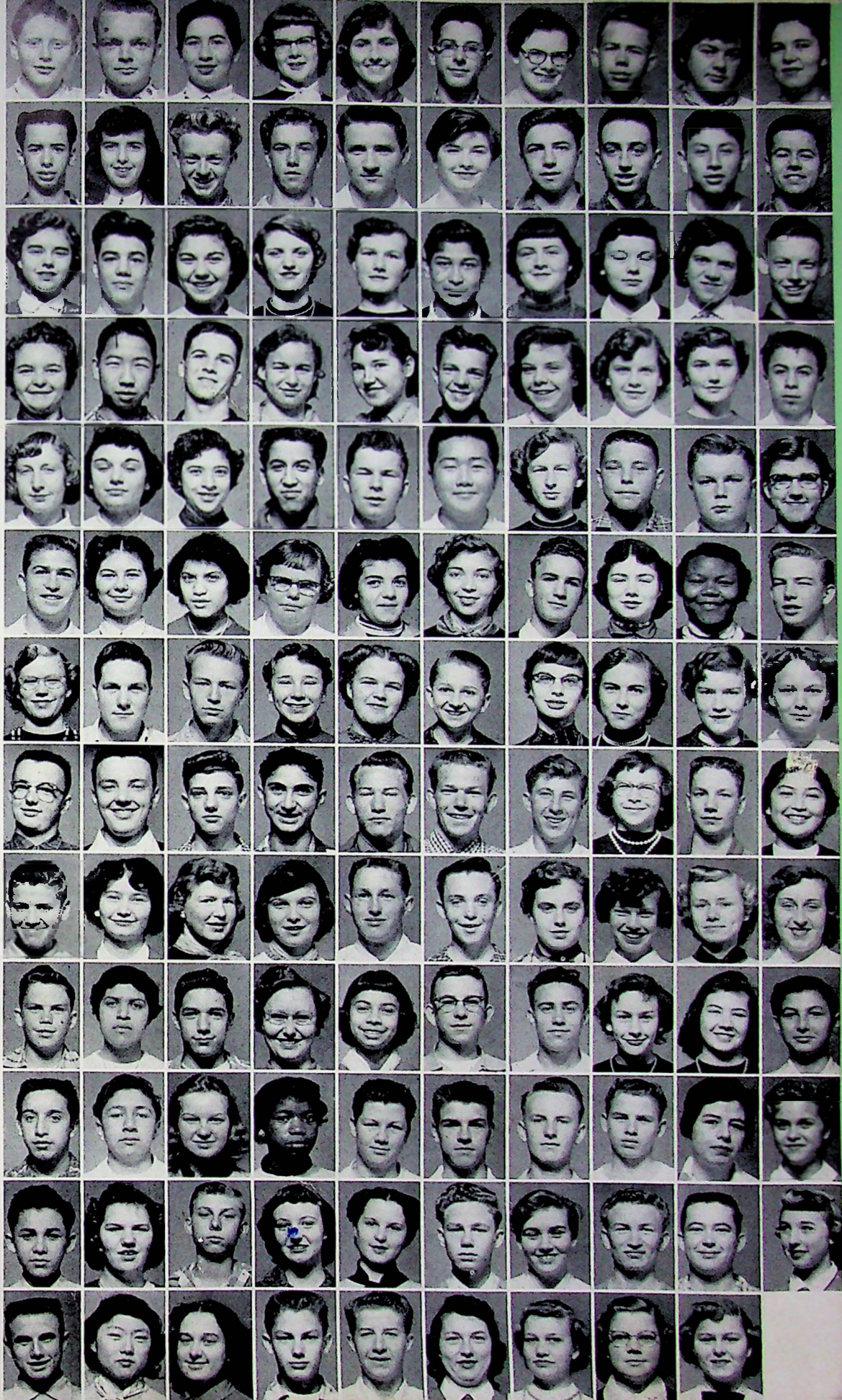

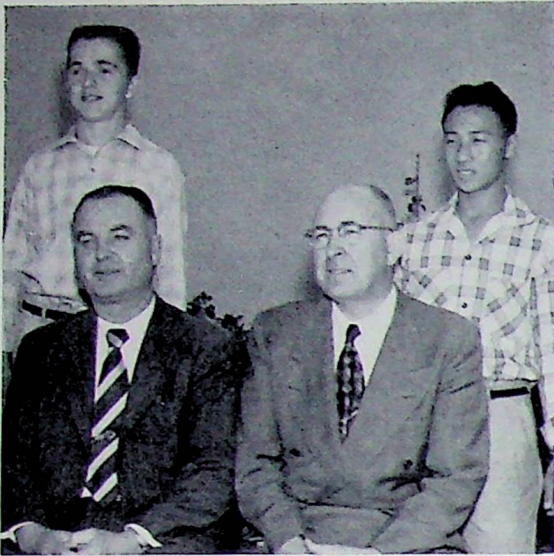

Each year the members of the various chapters donate money to the Seymour Scholarship Fund. These donations provide the income needed to give scholar-

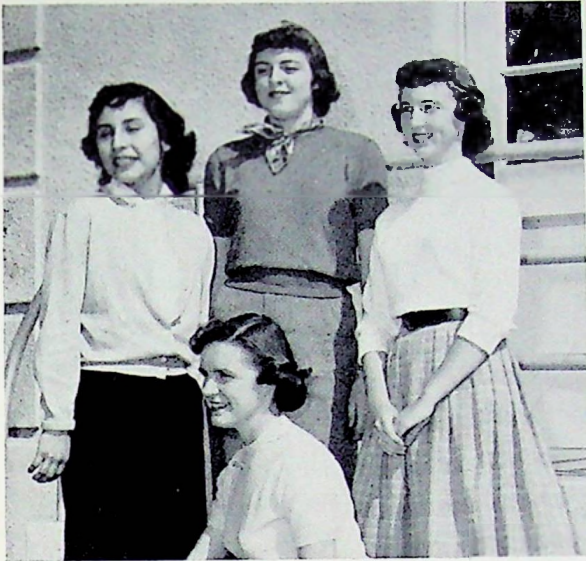

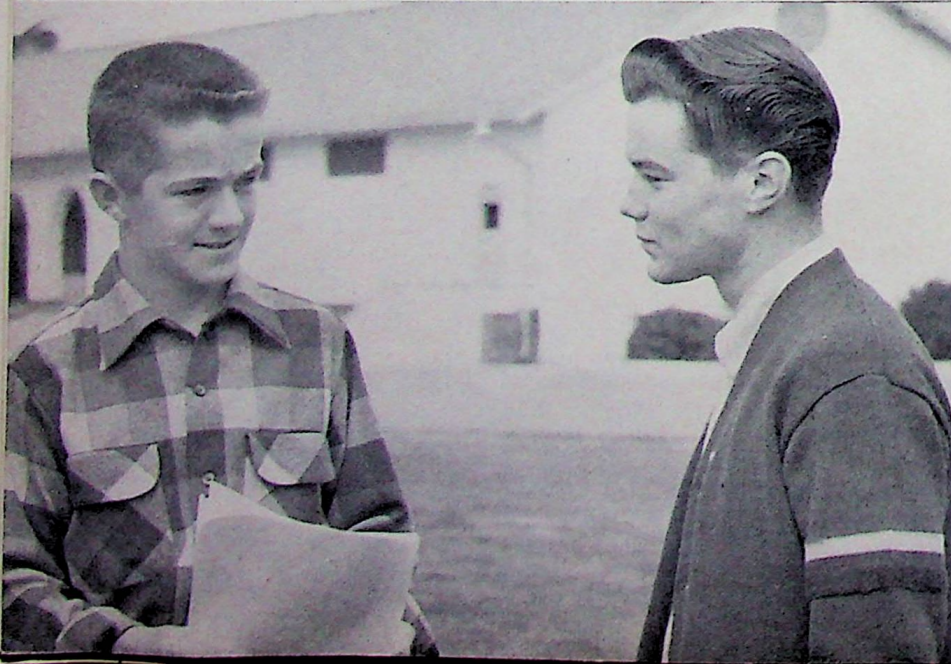

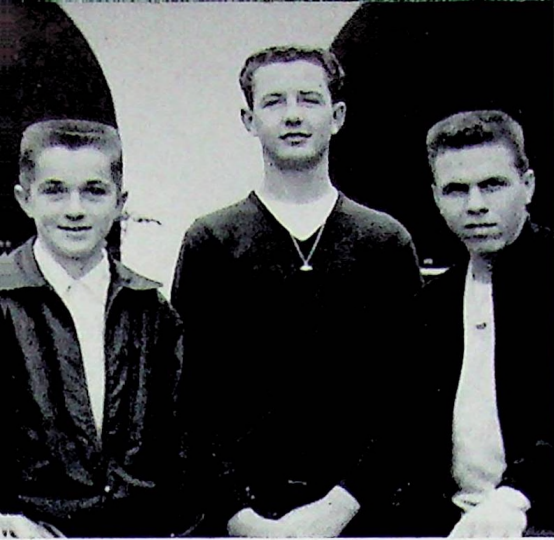

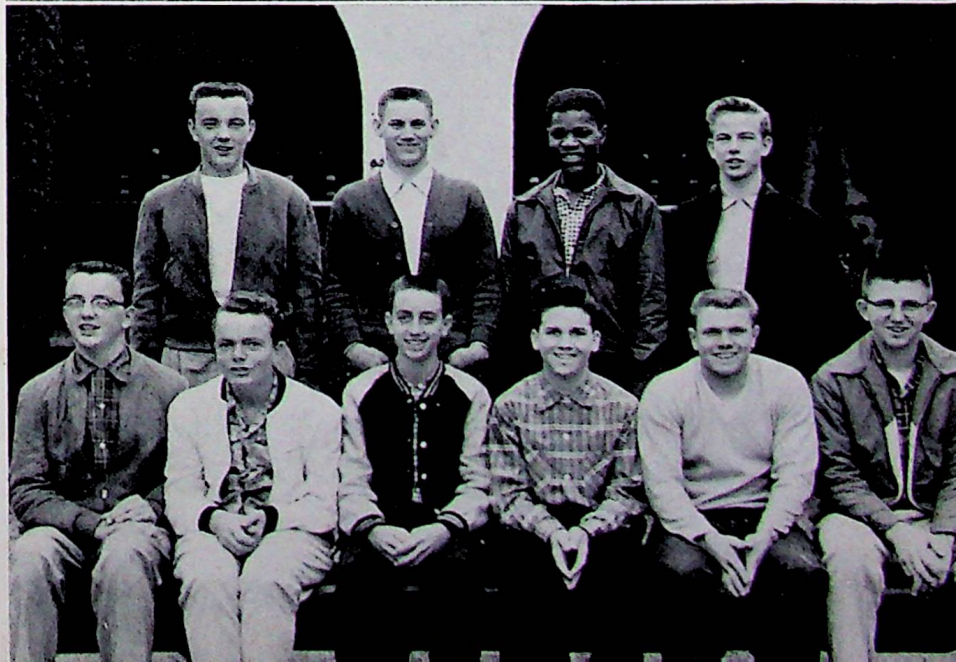

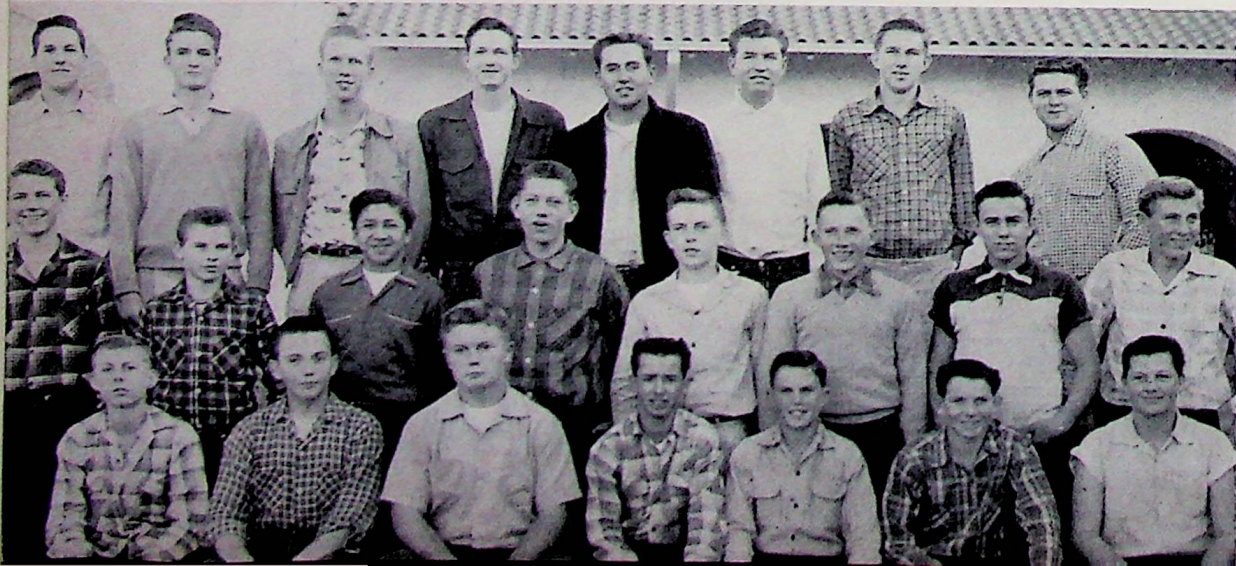

A fashion parade held during the assembly gave the students an opportunity to vote for the shirts and dresses they liked best. Prizes were awarded the winners of these contests.

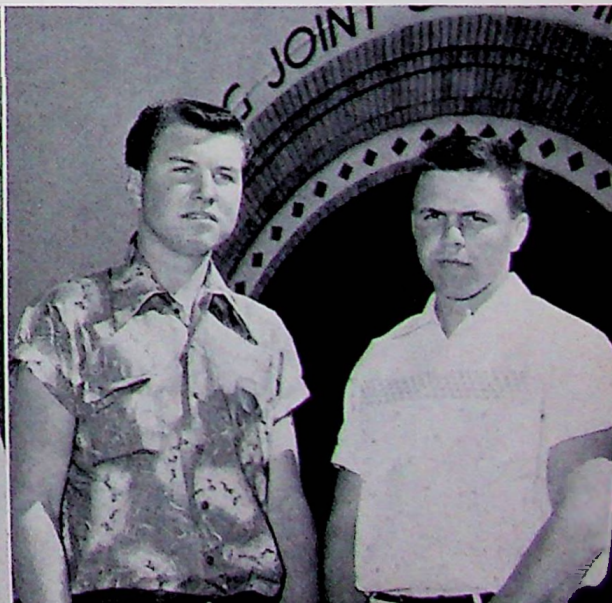

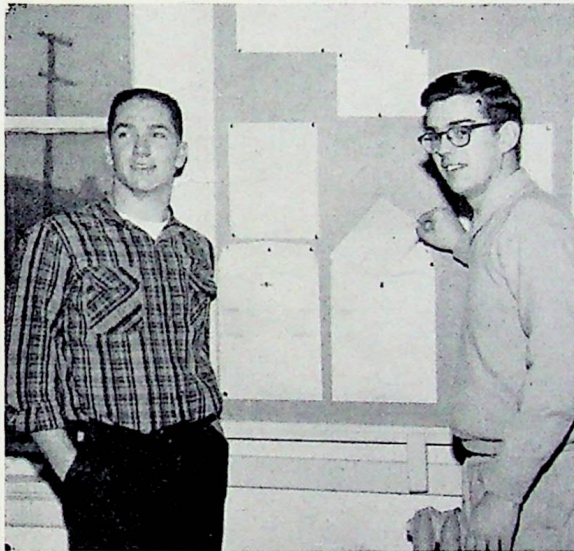
Gathering pertinent news around the campus and compiling it into readable facts was the job of the eleven valiant members of the Viking Voice staff.

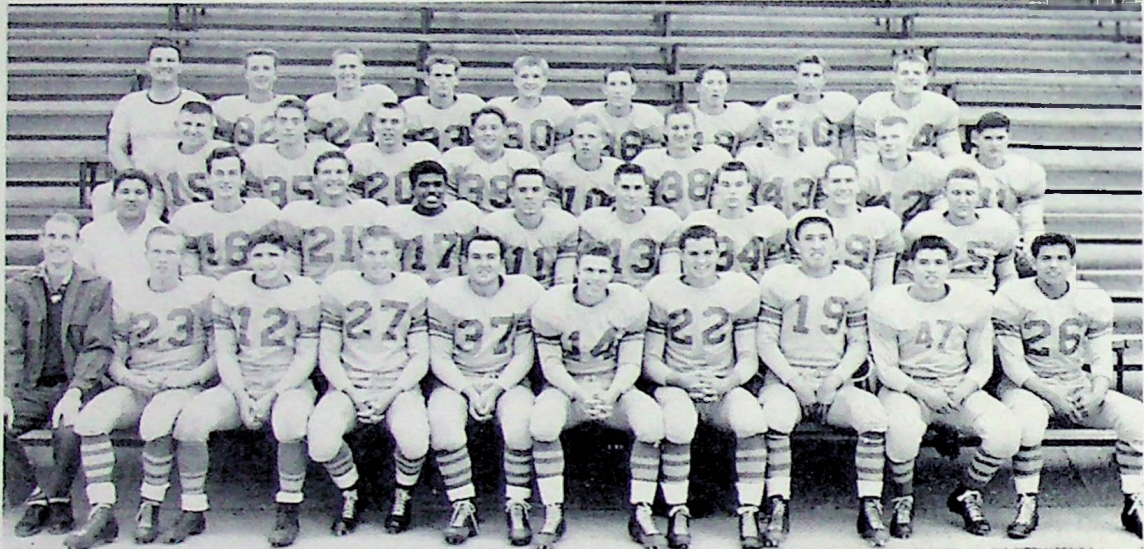

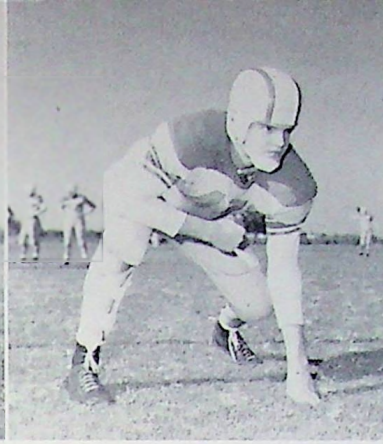

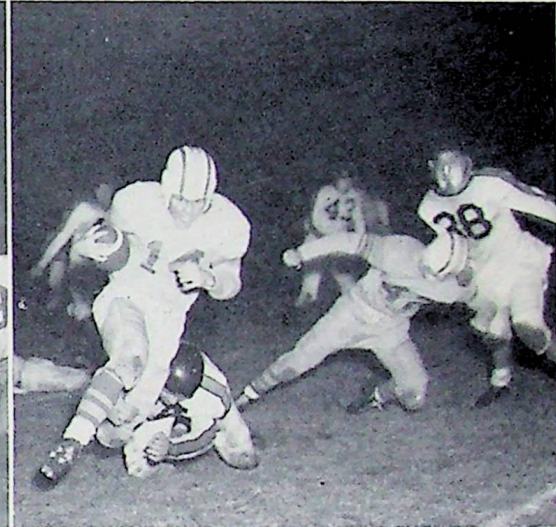

of Kingsburg jointly sponsored a banquet in honor of the football squads.

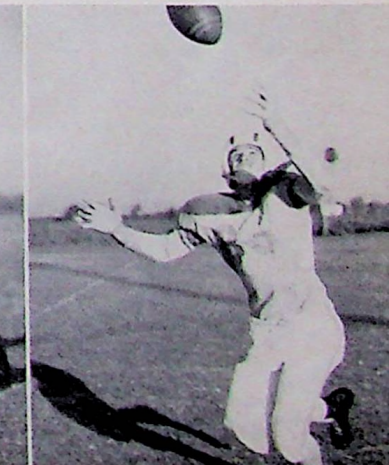
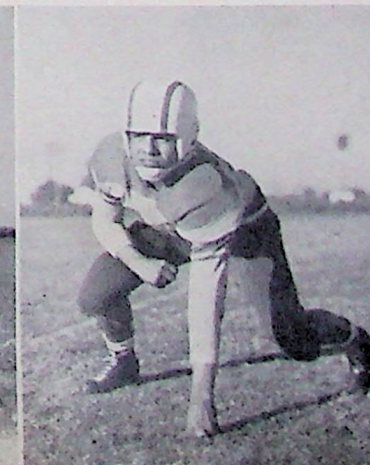
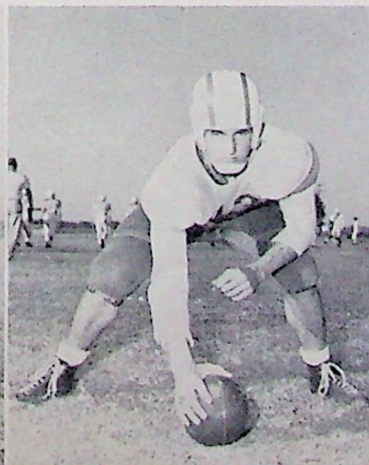
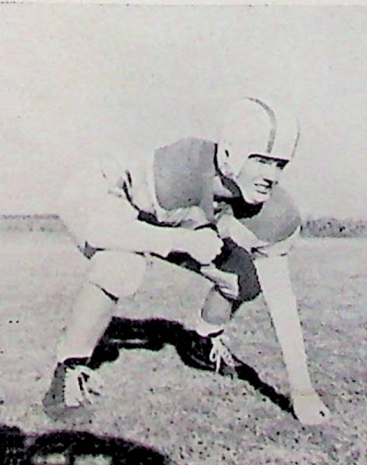

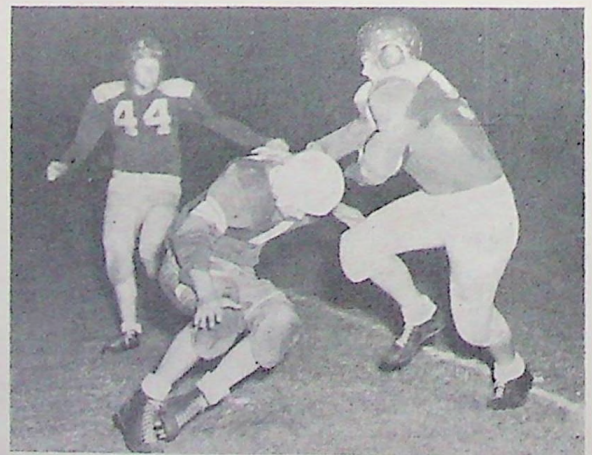
b class football

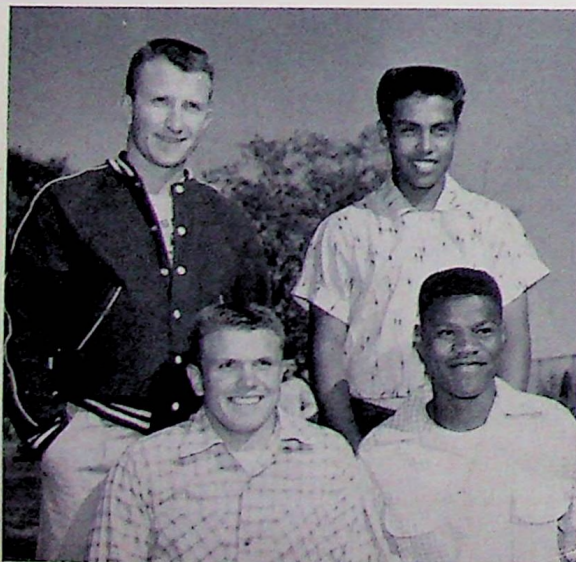

The starting five was a well-balanced unit with both speed and height. The reserves were substituted freely with the first string and worked in without a flaw.

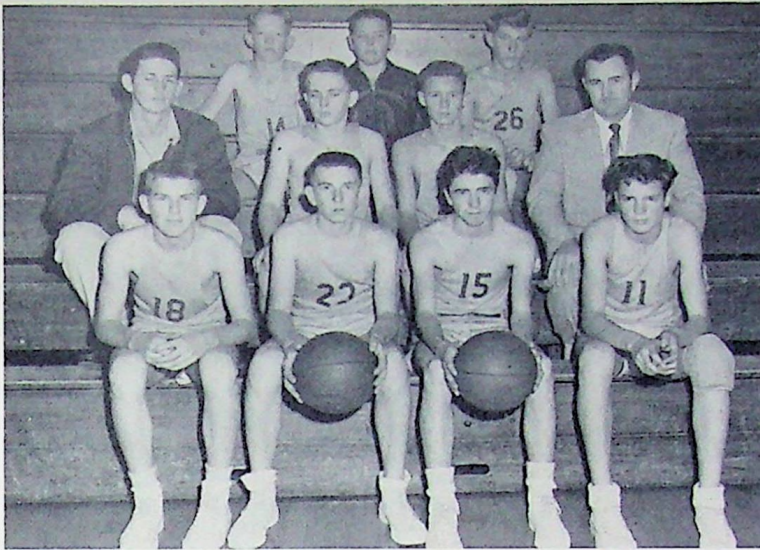

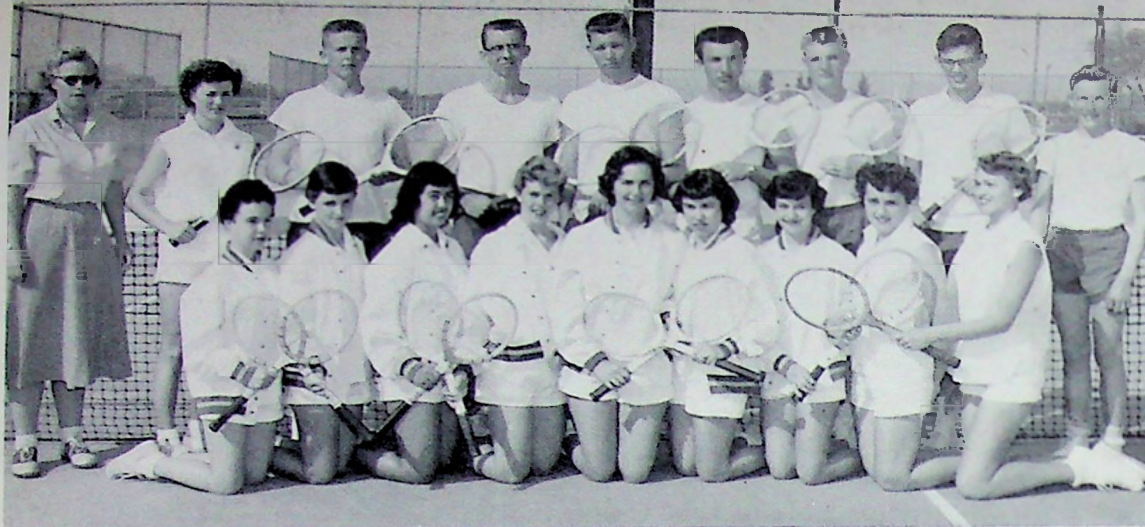

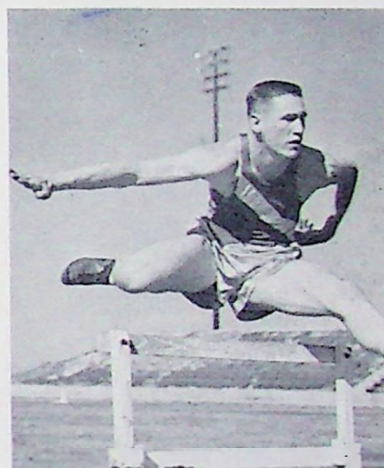
