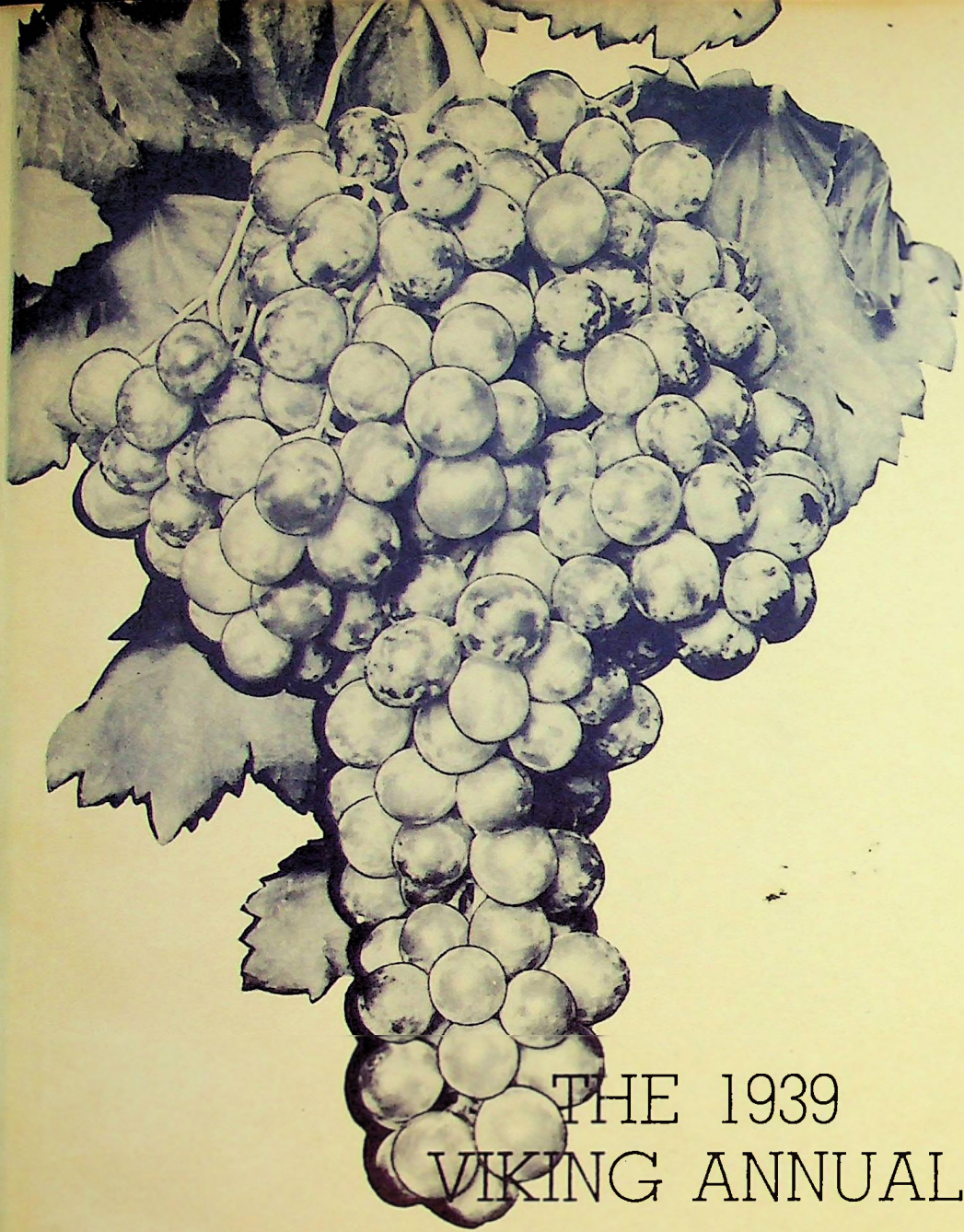

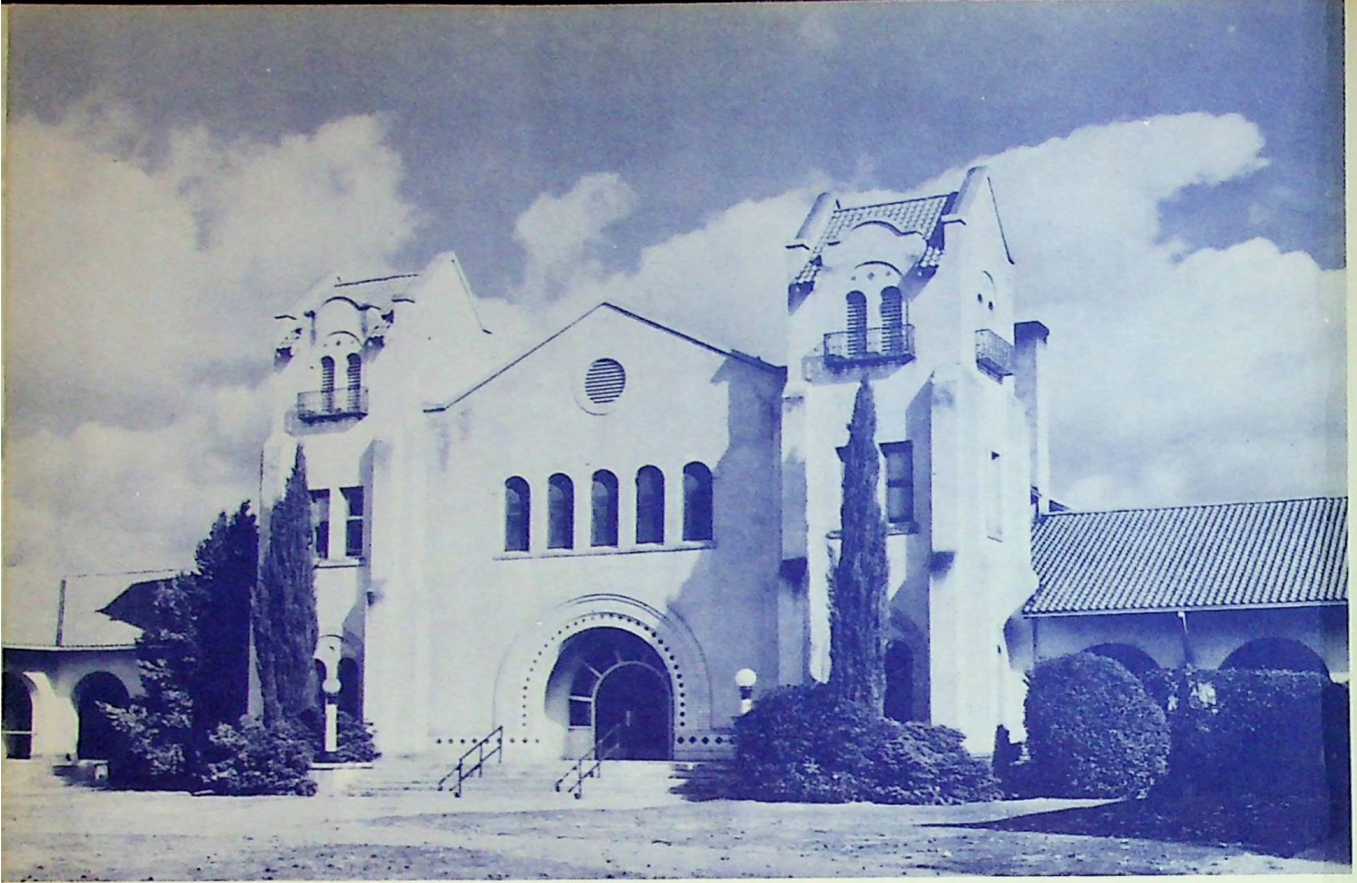
FOREWORD

In March, the local chapter enjoyed a St. Patrick's day party.

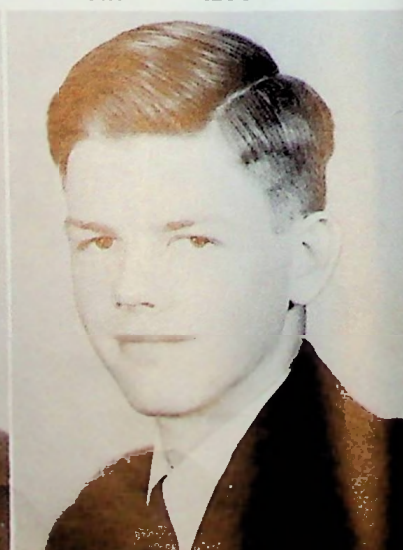
