BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees are five of the hardest-working citizens of Kingsburg, whose efforts are seldom fully appreciated.

The position of trustee is one of public trust and great responsibility. Board members are not selected on a political basis but on a basis of merit, and each member of the board is an officer of the state of California. All of the KHS Trustees have, or have had, children in the Kingsburg schools.

Board members have spent considerable effort on the building plans which are being carried out in 1958. Because of the pressing need of this program, the Board has met twice a month instead of once at the usual meeting on the second Monday of each month.

The function of the Board is to make policies for the KHS district. These policies are carried out by the employees. A sign in Principal Nielsen's office reads: "The secret of success is doing what you have to do better than you have to do it." This motto could very well exemplify the work of the Board of Trustees.

Dr. Paul Nielsen, district superintendent and principal, is a native of Denmark. Since 1946 he has been an educator in Colorado, Washington and California. He received the degrees of Master of Education and Doctor of Education from the University of Southern California.

This year Dr. Nielsen was instrumental in bringing about the California Association of Secondary School Administration self-evaluation program at KHS. Four school committees compiled a report which was sent to a visiting committee, who came to the school in April to make the final evaluation.

Einar Peterson, vice-principal of Kingsburg High School, has been teaching at KHS for the past 33 years. His record has been interrupted only by three years of service as a first lieutenant in the United States Army Air Forces from 1942 to 1945.

Mr. Peterson was born in Chicago, Illinois, but has lived in Kingsburg since 1905 where he graduated from KHS in 1916. He obtained his AB degree from the University of California, at Berkeley.

The cooks not only planned, cooked, and served all the noon meals, but they did extra things, such as fixing the food for refreshment period and cooking for special occasions.

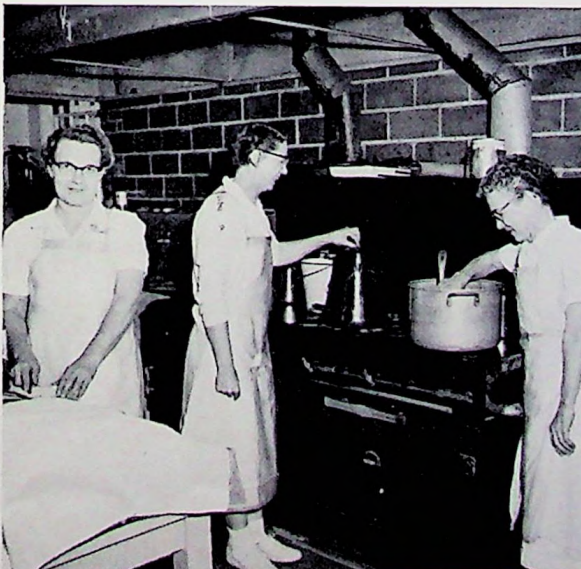
Transportation to and from school, to games, to class parties was handled by Mr. Lloyd Heath, director of transportation, and the bus drivers.

STUDENT COUNCIL

Kingsburg High School's student-governing body, known as the student council, has as its chief concern the best interests of the students and faculty.

Under the leadership of Don Jackson, student body president, the student council made many important decisions concerning various problems on the improvement of the school.

One of the projects that the council was actively engaged in was the sportsmanship trophy contest in which all the schools in the league competed. Each school graded itself with a point system. The student council of KHS was in charge of the tabulation of the points. The purpose of the contest was to promote better sportsmanship at games between schools.

The council was host this year to a Central Sequoia League Council meeting which convened in the school library on March 4.

Another important accomplishment of the council was that of making wrestling a sport at KHS.

Members of the student council include five student body officers, a group of representatives from each class, and officers from the freshman, sophomore, and junior classes. Since student body officers represent the senior class, senior class officers are not members of the council. Faculty adviser of the council is Mr. Ejnar Peterson, vice-principal.

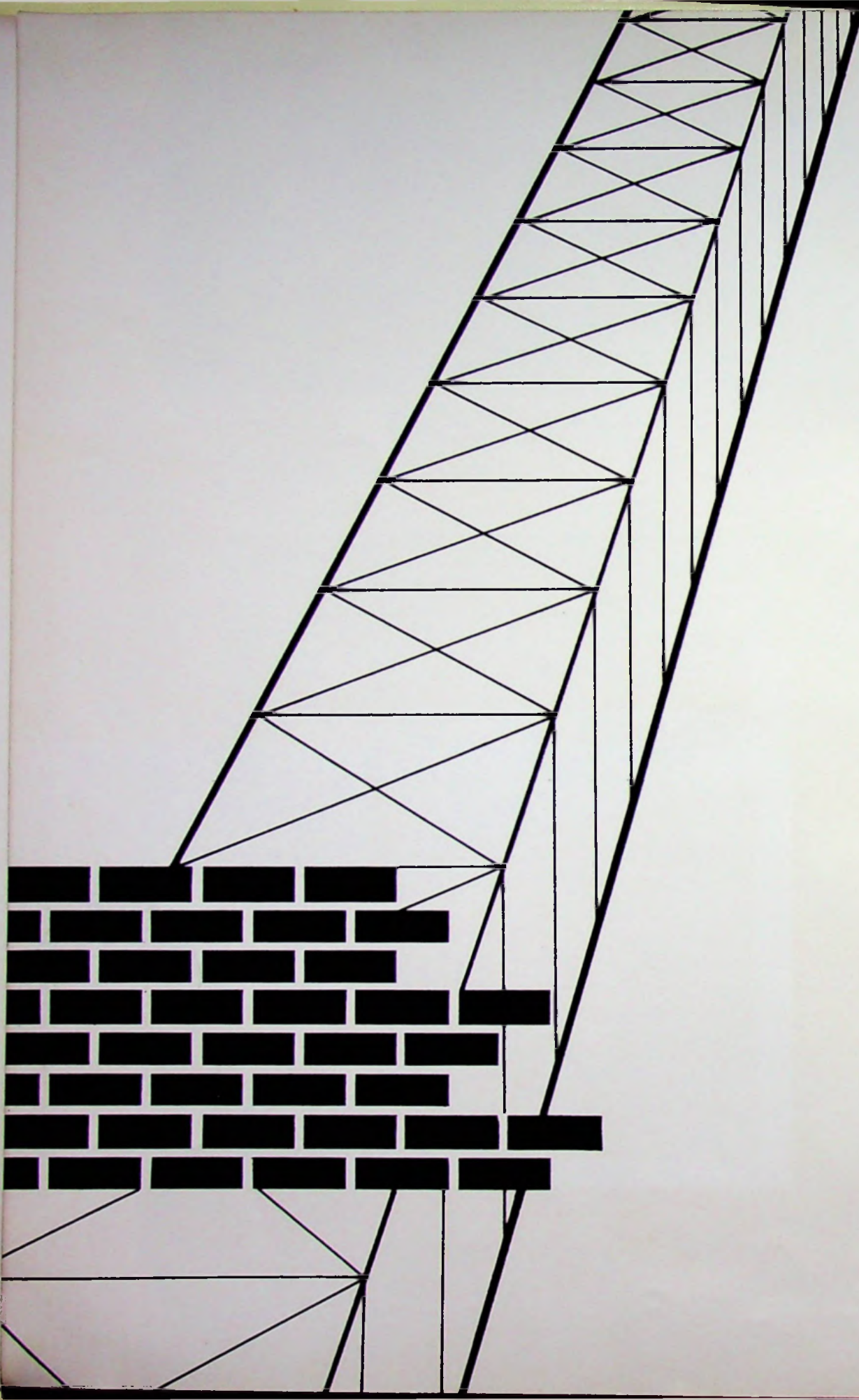

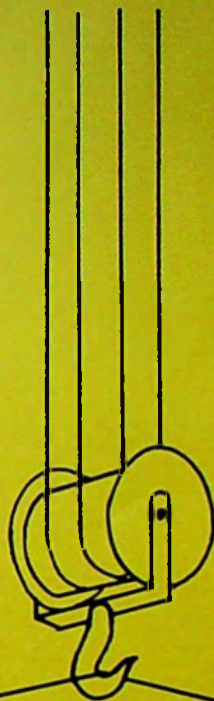

SENIORS

Much money was needed for the prom, which they gave to the seniors on May 31, 1957. The theme, "A Night in Atlantis," was carried out by transforming the gym into an underwater wonderland.

A Bermuda Day sponsored by the class on October 11 included a contest for the cleverest outfits. The seven winners each received a free meal in the cafeteria.

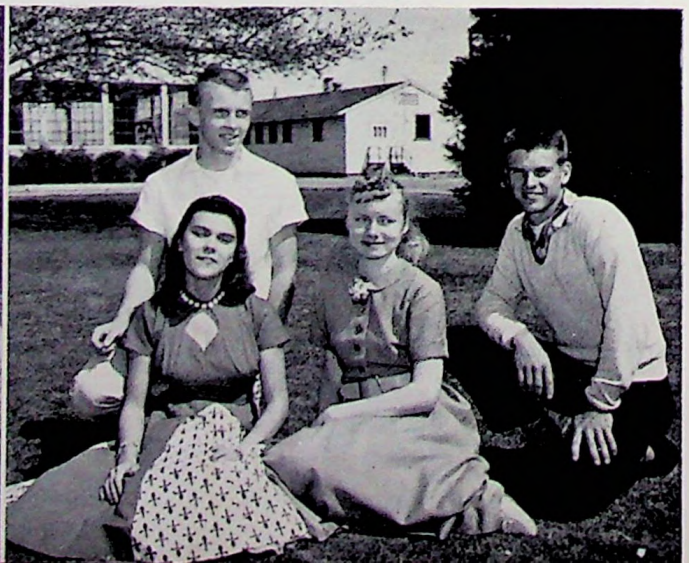
To add money to the treasury, the senior class sponsored a Christmas dance on December 21.

Many long hours of rehearsing went into the senior play, "Charley's Aunt," which was presented to the public on May 1 and 2.

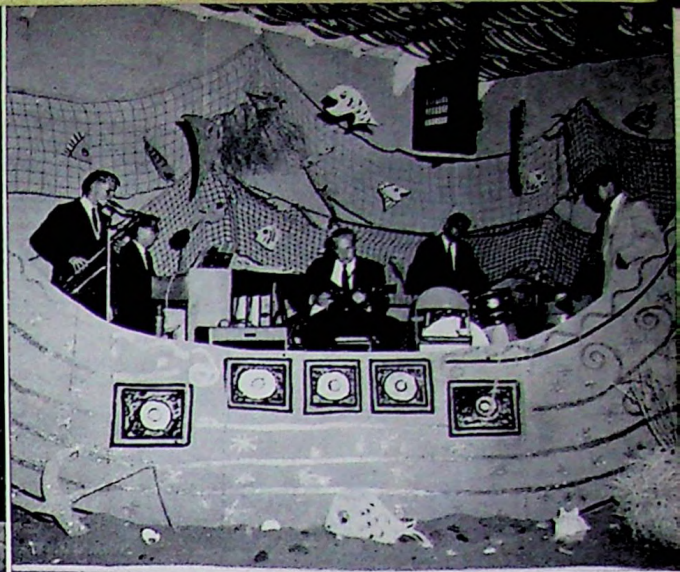

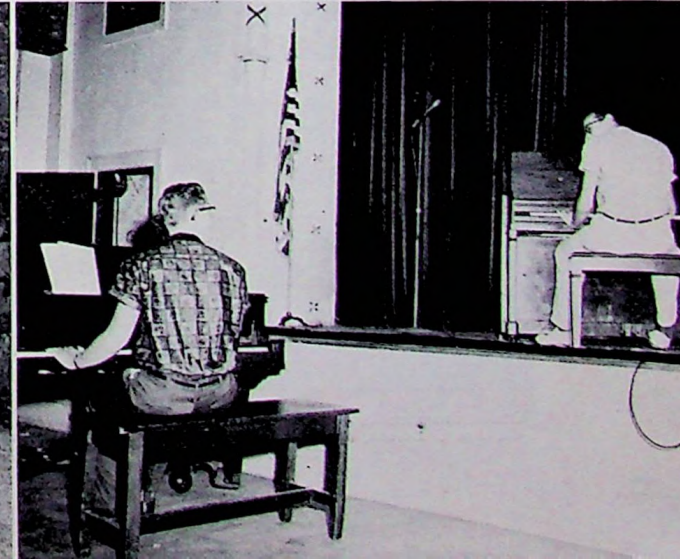

SOPHOMORES

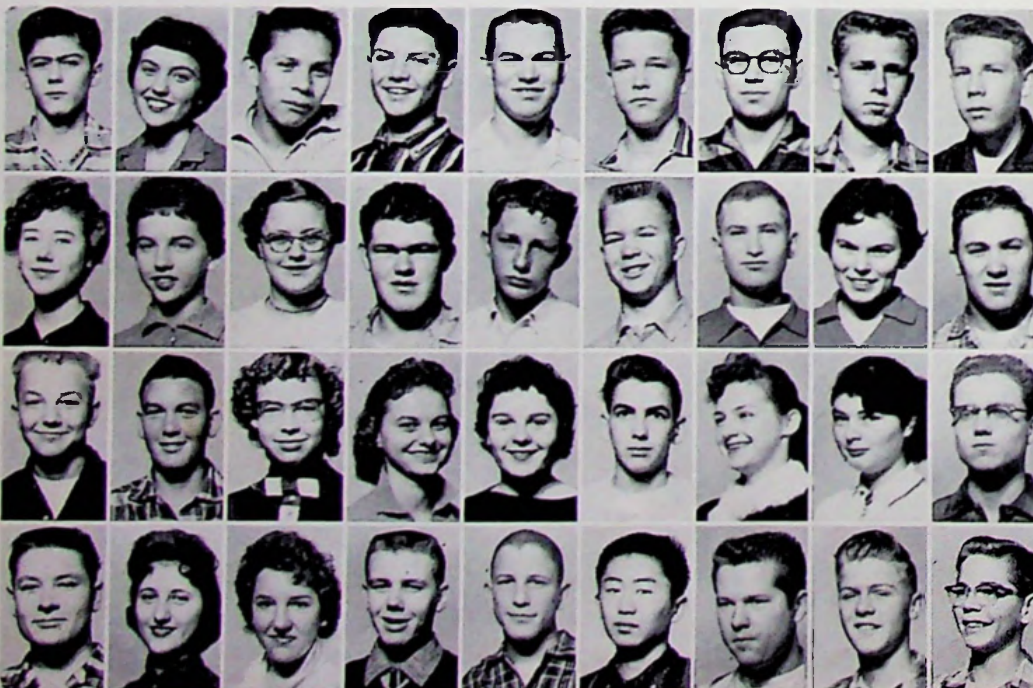
The sophomores started off a very busy year by giving a Halloween dance, which was the first school dance of the year. A huge black spider suspended by a red net was the center of attraction for the evening.

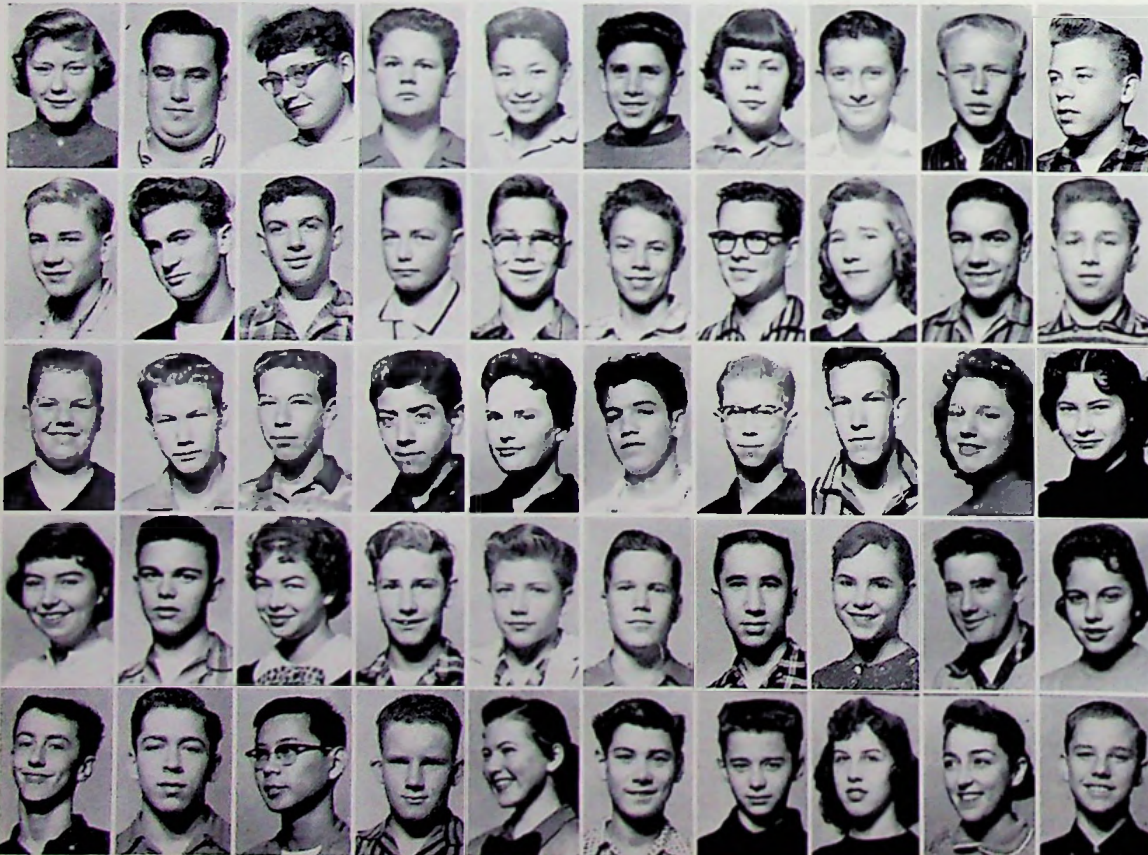
The year began with the annual reception given by the seniors at Burris Park.

The Kingsburg High School chapter of the California Scholarship Federation has been active since 1924.

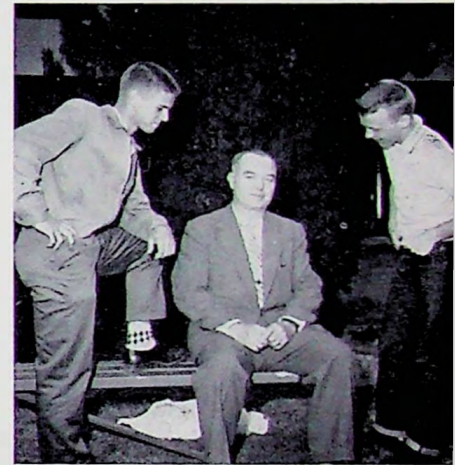

"To create, maintain, and extend throughout the home, school, and community high standards of Christian Character" is the purpose of the KHS Hi-Y club.

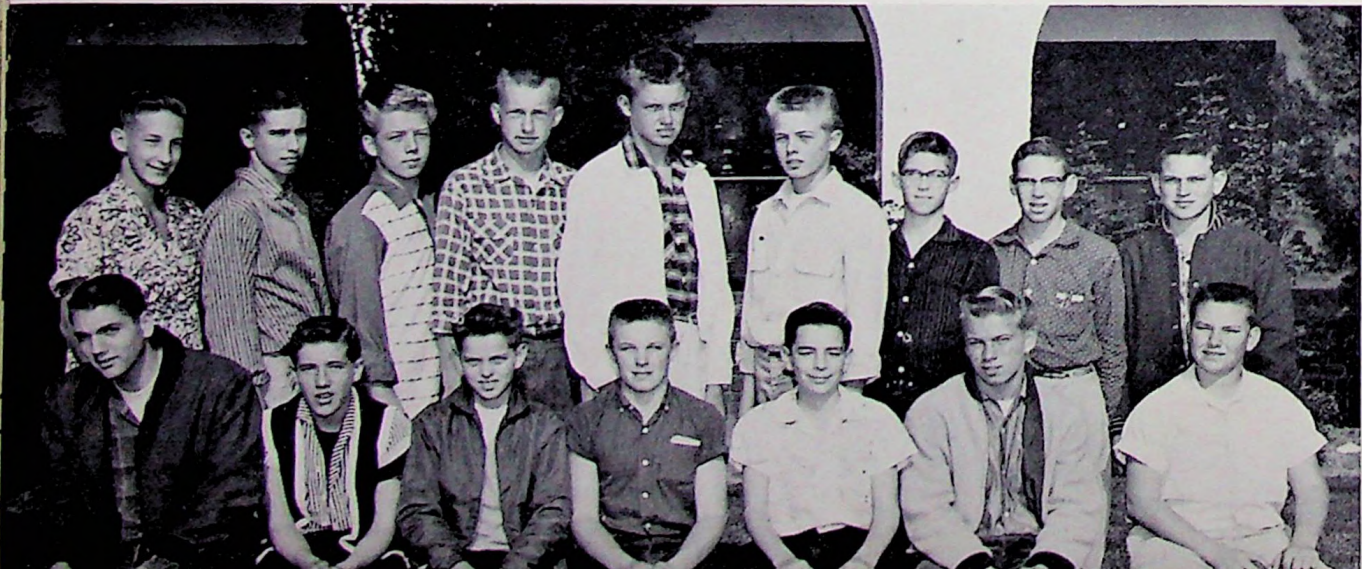
Mr. Murl Dodson served as adviser for the club this year. He was a great help in planning the meetings and the community-service projects which the club sponsored.

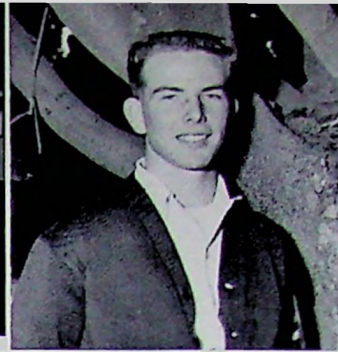

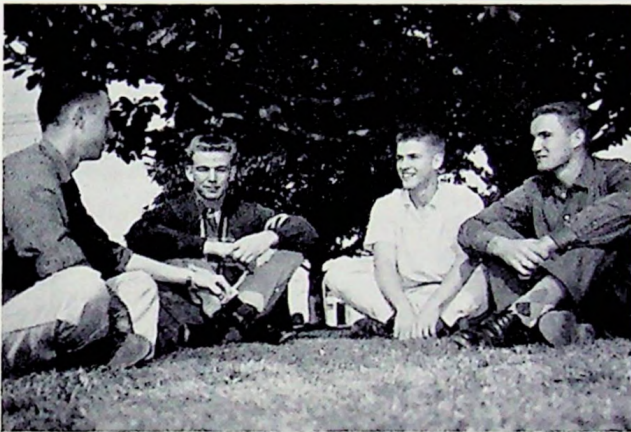

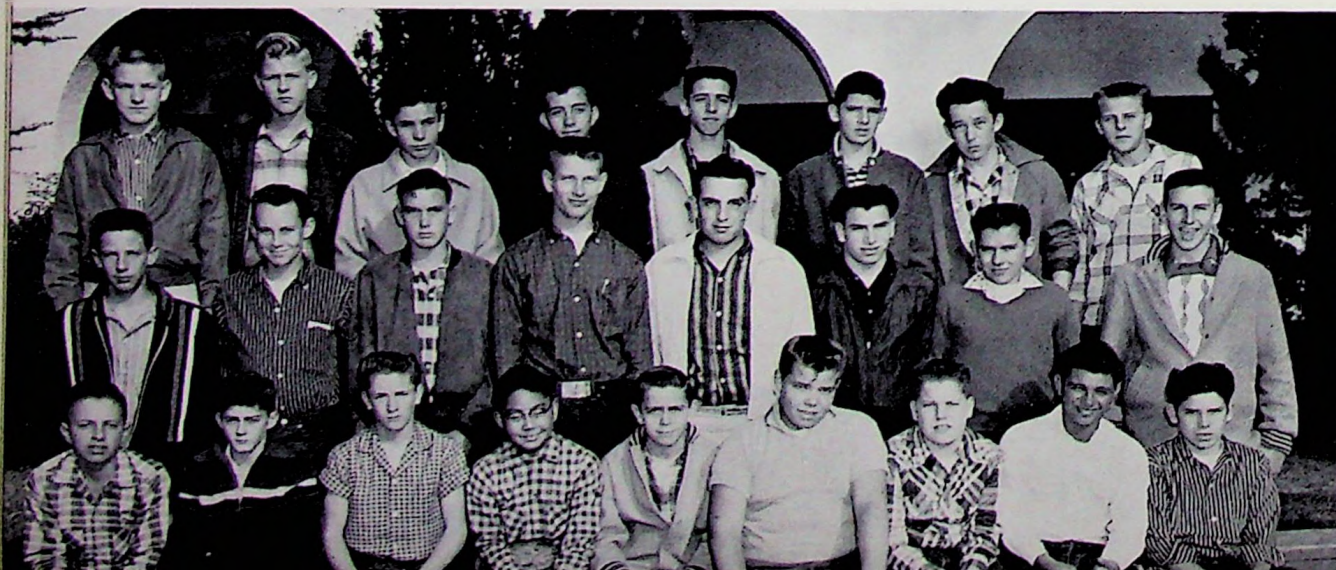
"Greenhorn" members were initiated on October 21, 1957.

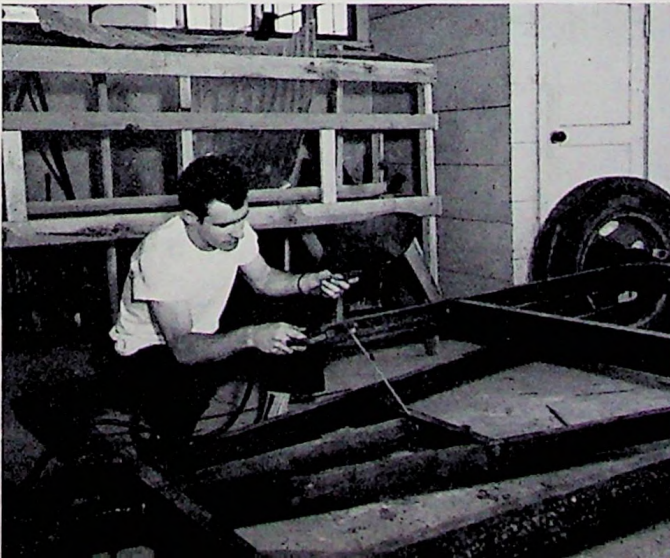

Y.F.C. is an interdenominational club sponsored by the Fresno County Youth for Christ. The meetings were held every Friday noon in the Baptist Church.

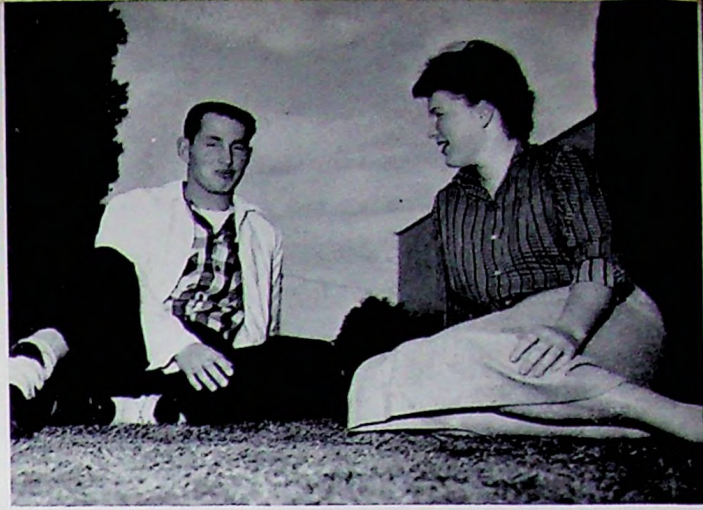

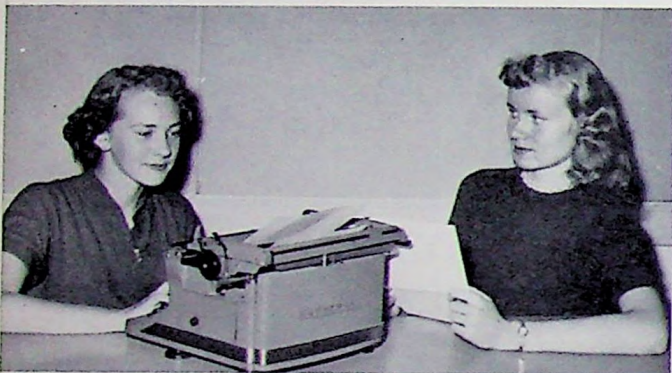

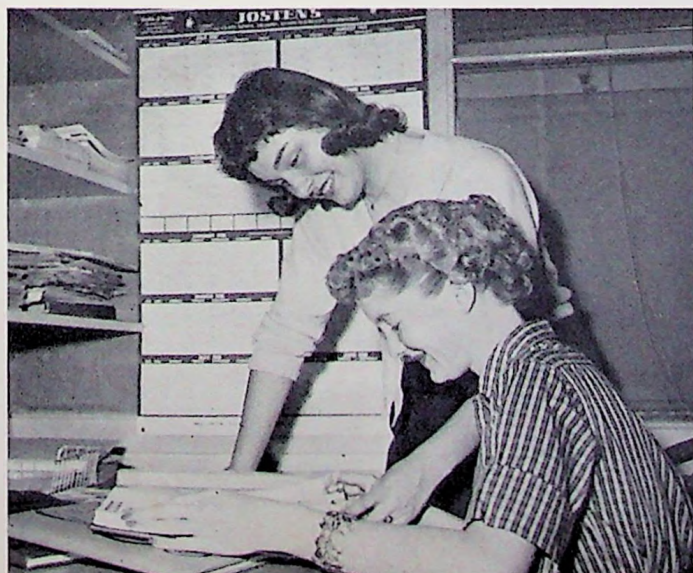

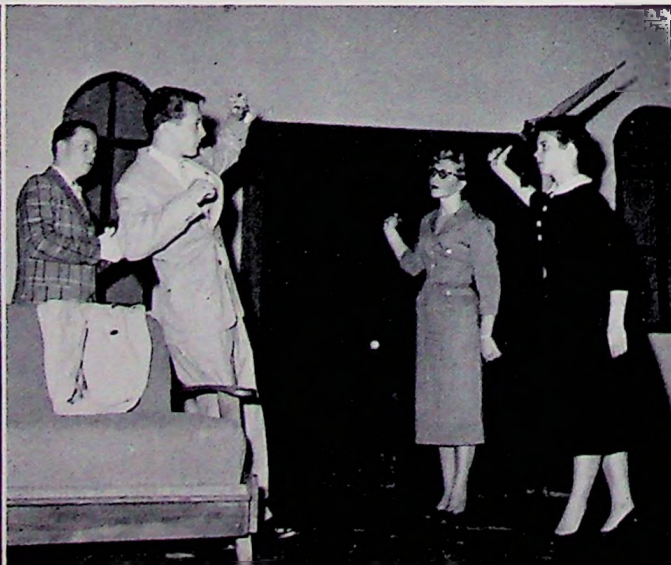

The music department improved measurably under the new directorship of James R. Flick.

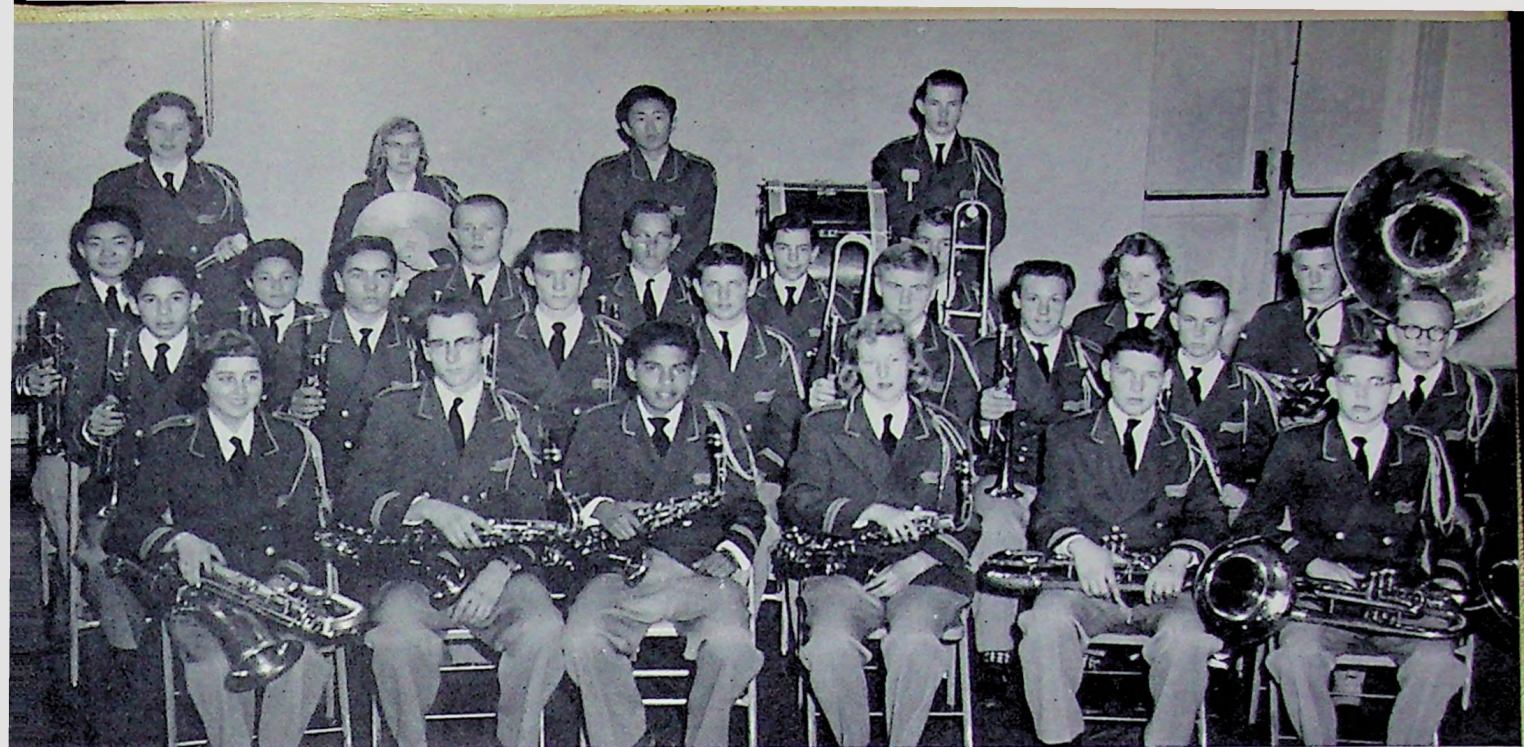

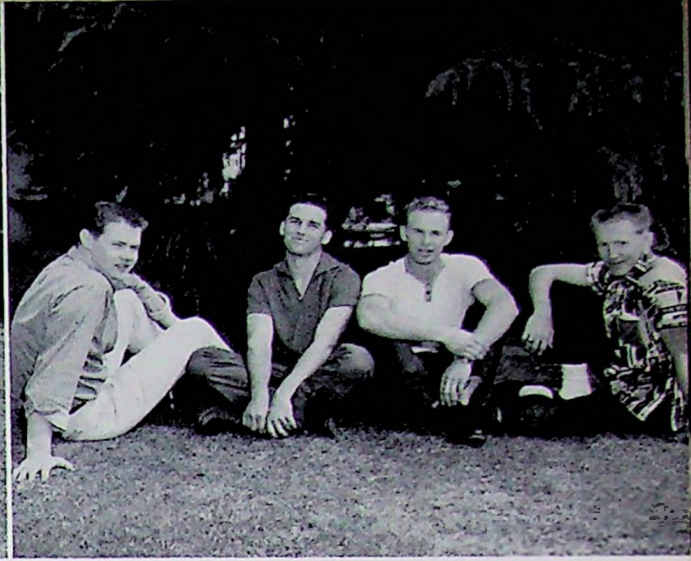

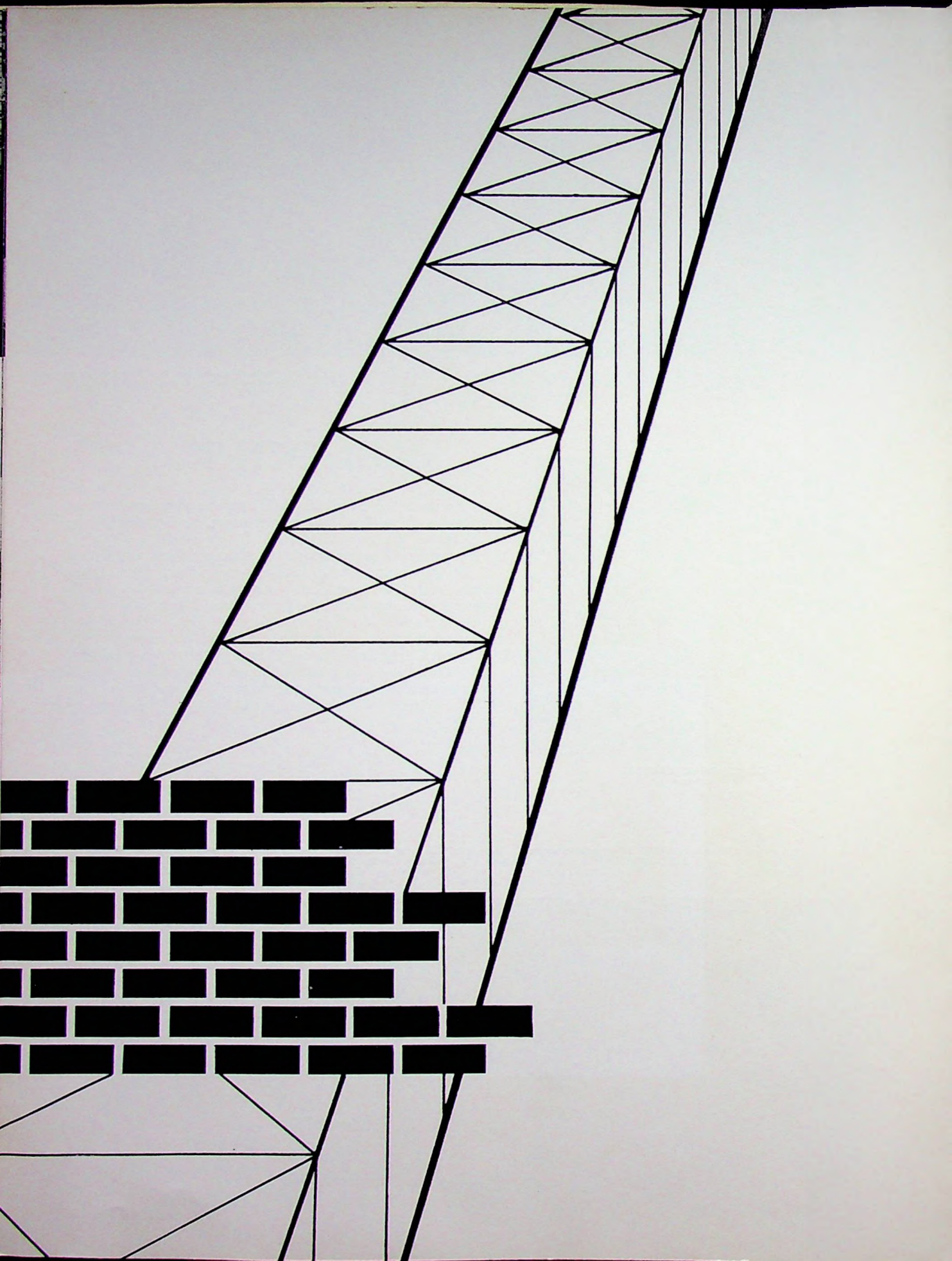
This year the Block K Club has been revived for the first time since 1951. It was sponsored by Coach Charles Moore.

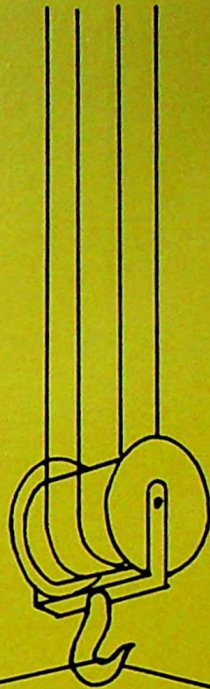

Block K members have performed several public services, and they have sponsored two special basketball games as money-raising projects.

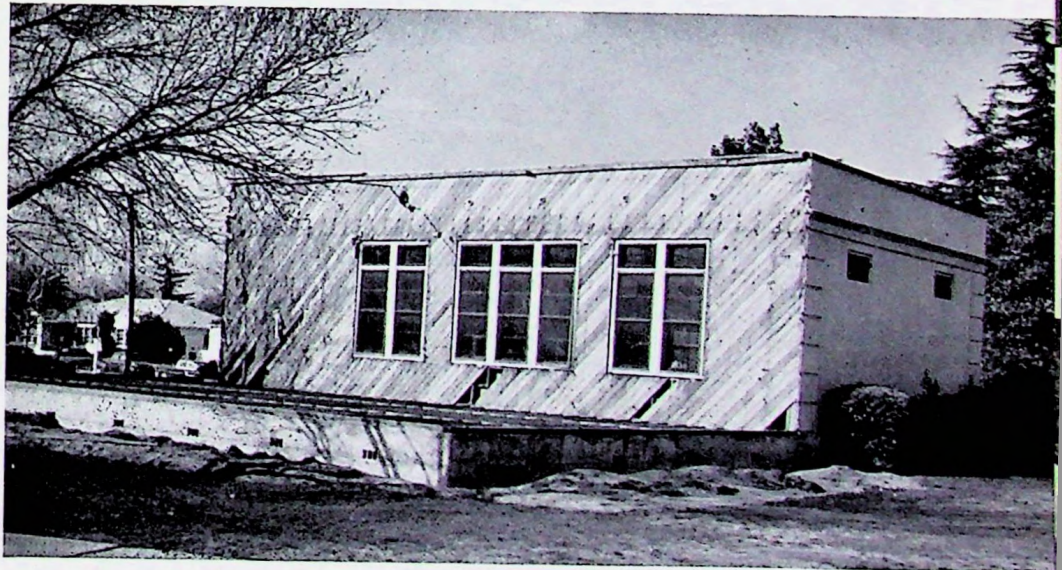

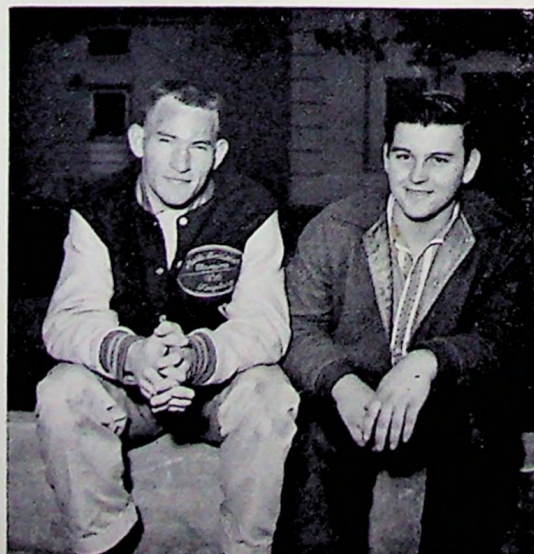

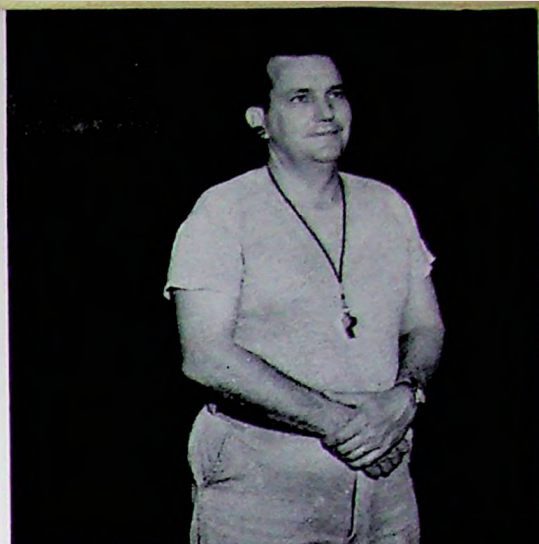
"B" CLASS BASKETBALL

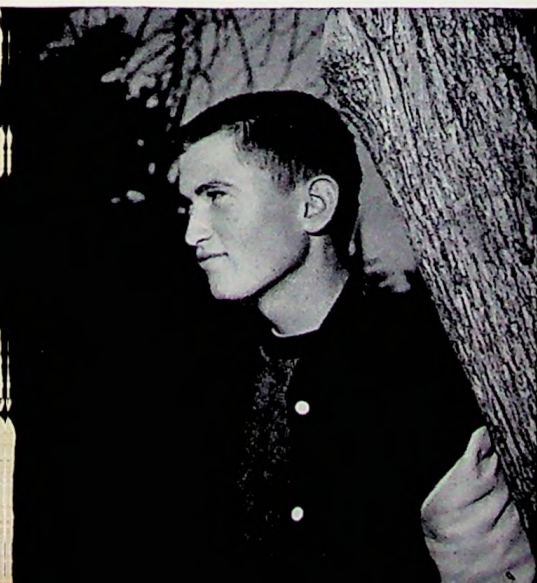

The sole member of the KHS cross-country team this year was Gary Otterson, a returning veteran.

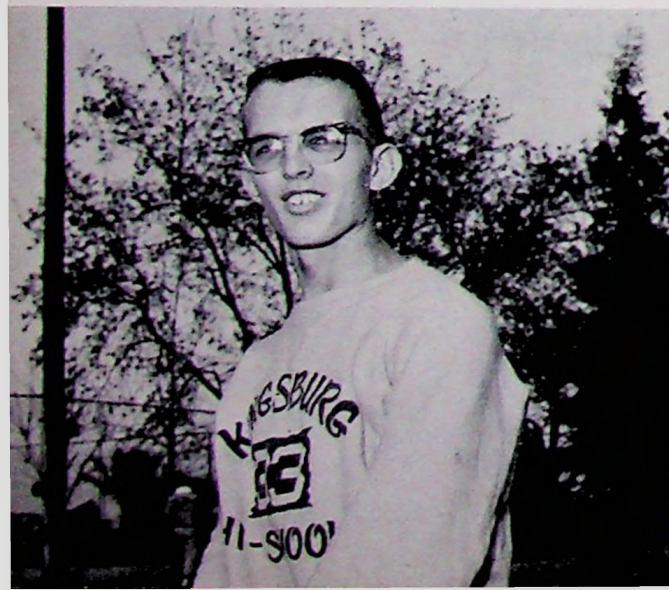
Being the only member of the team did not discourage Otterson, who under the coaching of Mr. Lowell Draper practiced hard each day and competed in two meets.

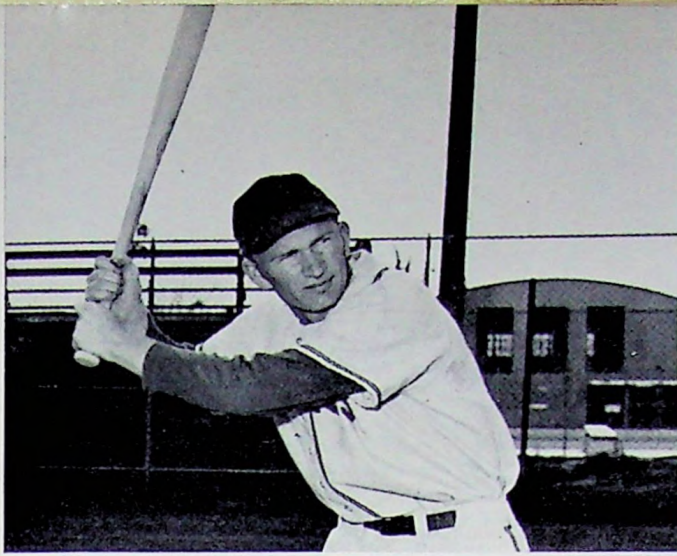
One of the races in which he competed was held at Roeding Park, Fresno, the other at Millerton Lake.

Other highlights of the colorful season were the West Coast Relays, the sectional meet, and the Central Sequoia League meet, which was also held here.

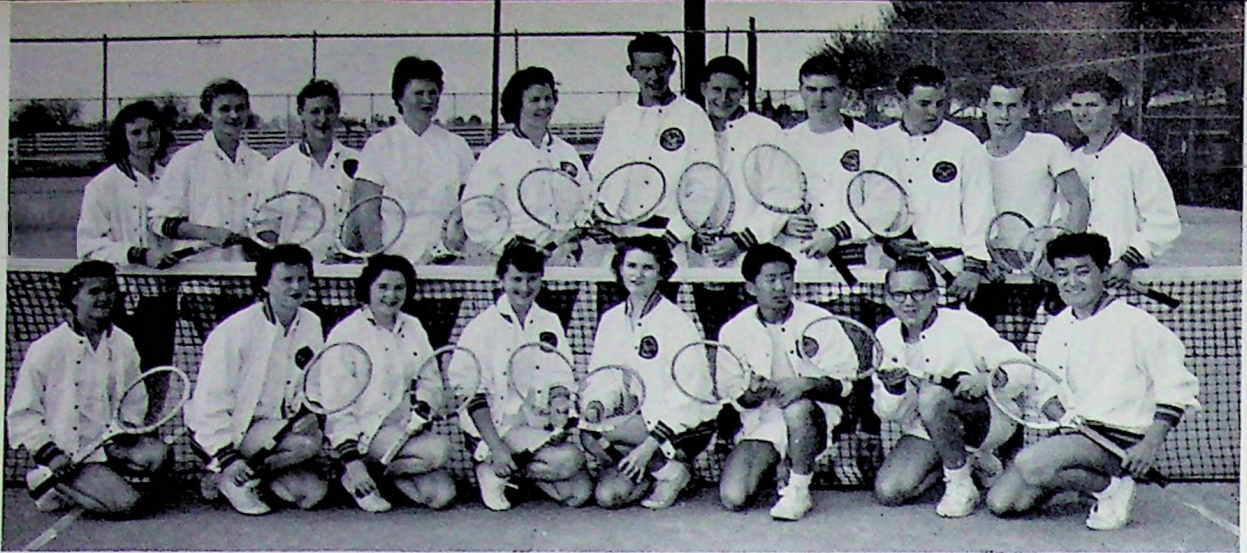

KHS got off to a very good start this year by triumphing over Le-moore whom they met in the first league match of the season.

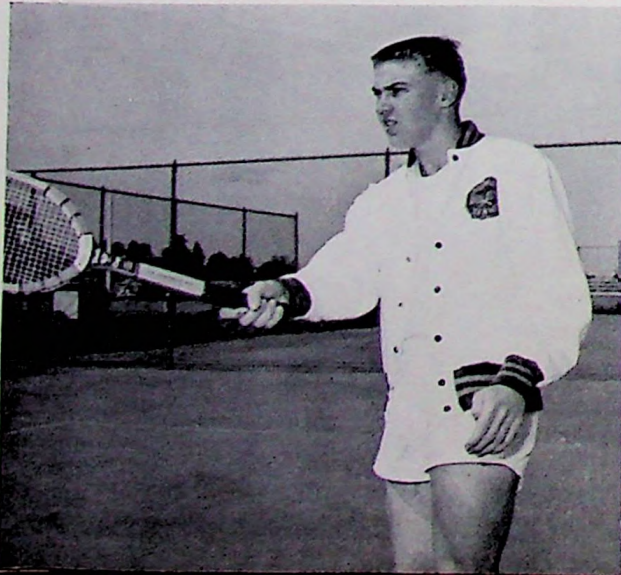

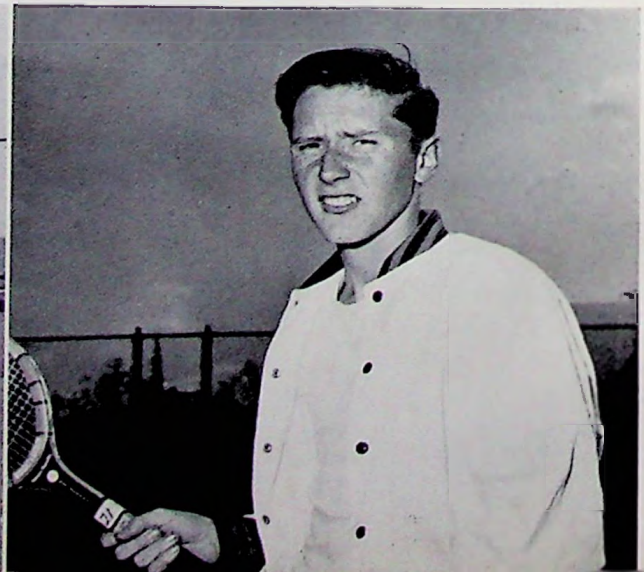

Swimming practice started late in April because of weather and construction difficulties.

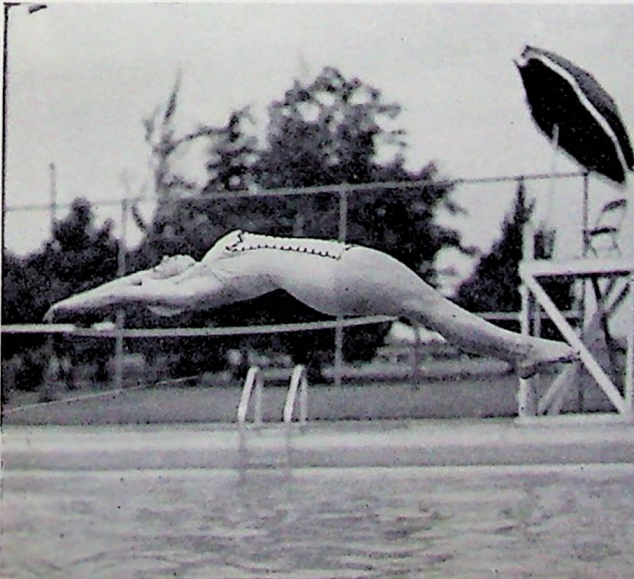
After a few weeks of practice the team was able to provide keen competition for the other schools during the remainder of the season.

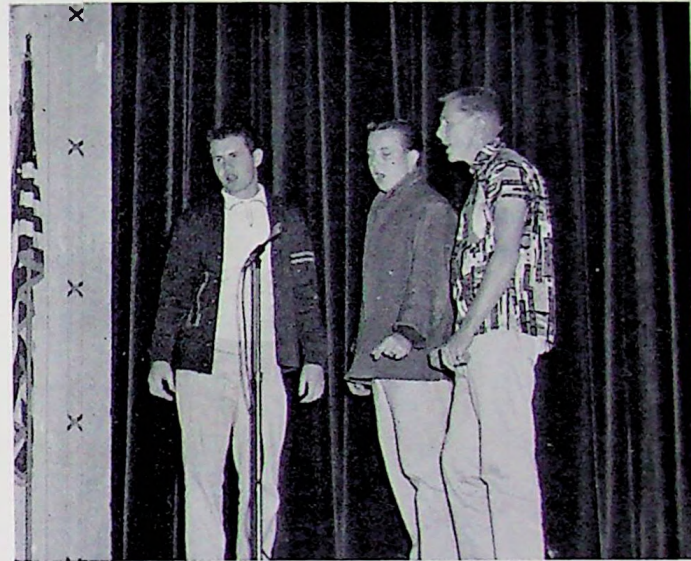
The Senior Girls' Career Day was held on February 25 at various places in Kingsburg and neighboring cities.

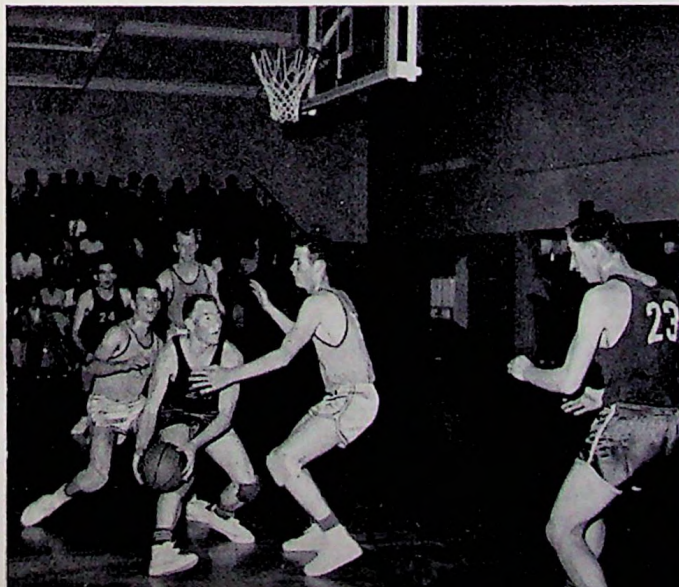

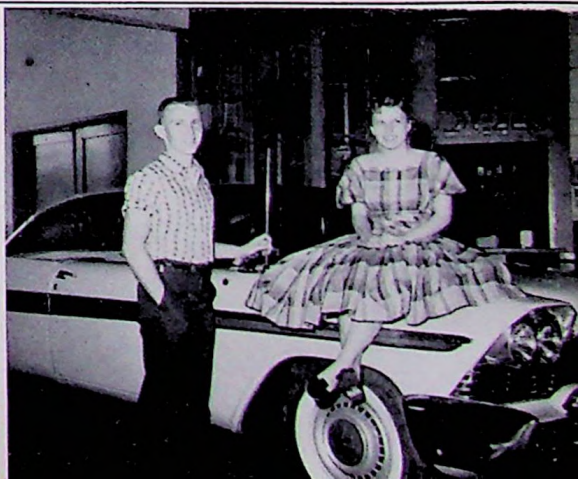

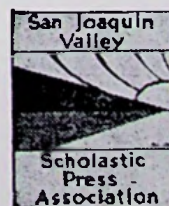
