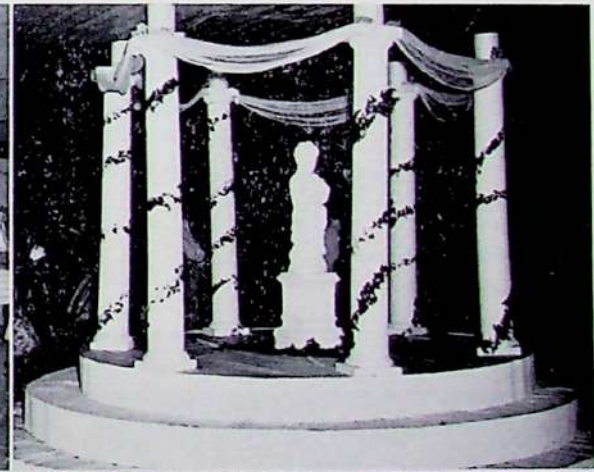

To start it off, the seniors welcomed the freshmen with the annual reception at the school cafeteria.

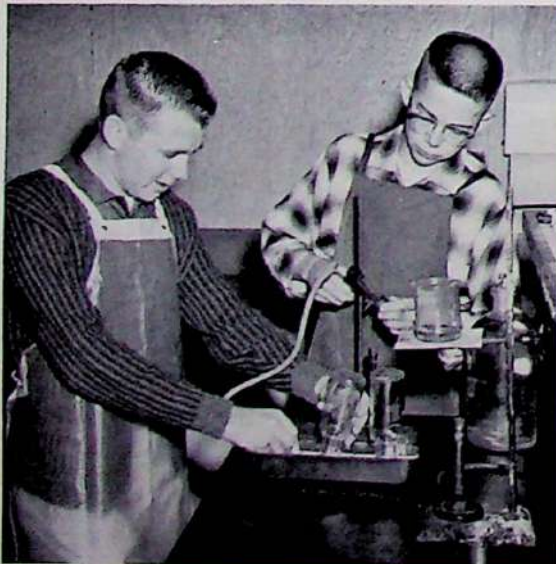
To add money to their treasury, the senior class sponsored a Valentine's Day dance on February 13.

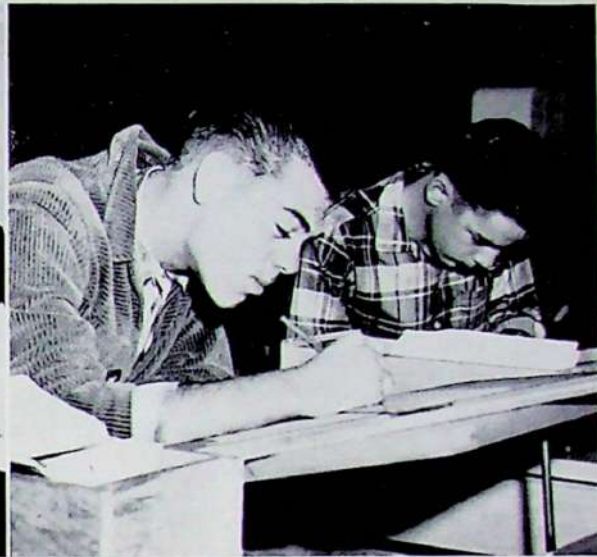

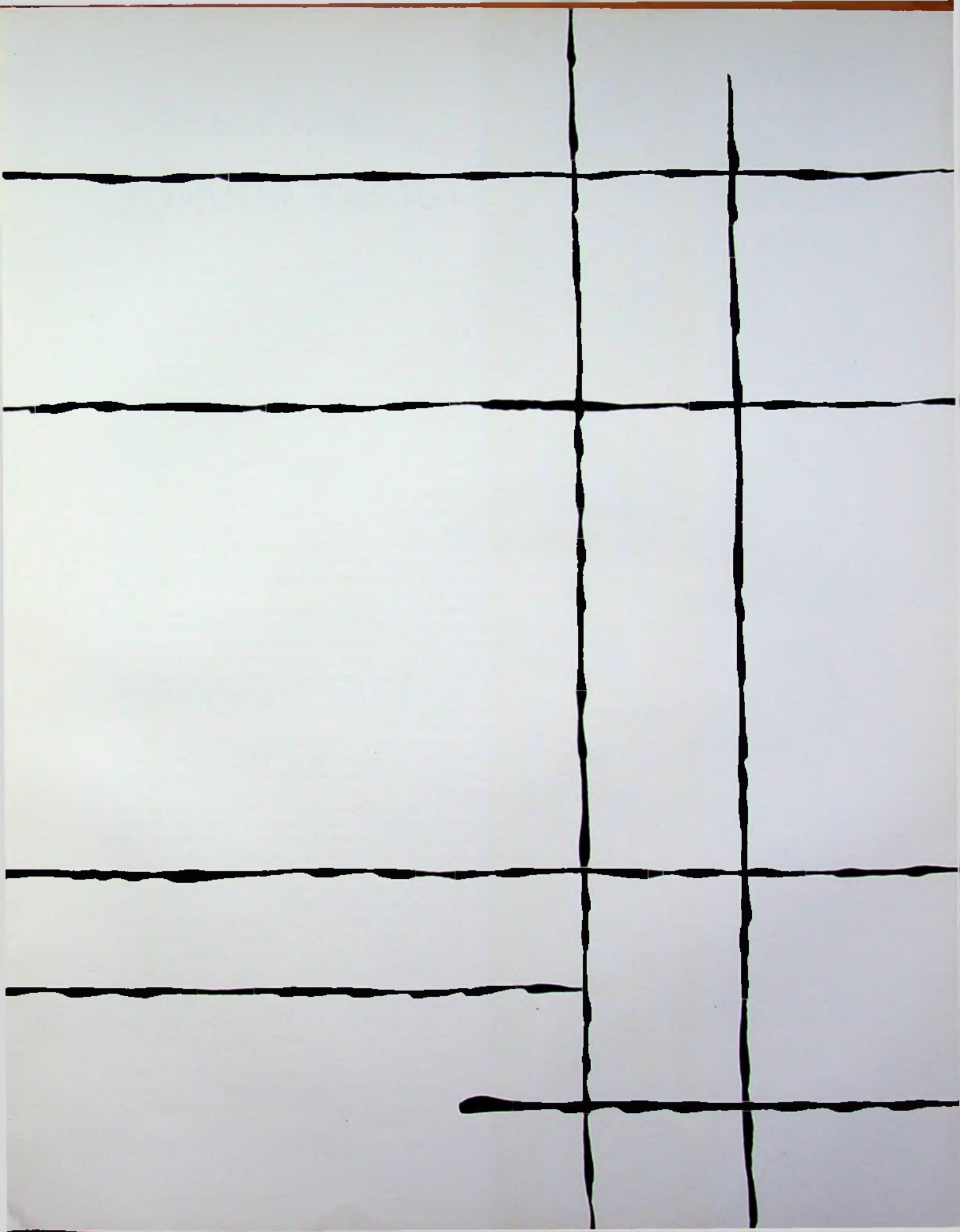

STUDENT COUNCIL

Members of the council include five student body officers, all seniors, representatives from each of the four classes, and the officers of the freshman, sophomore, and junior classes. The faculty adviser of the council is Mr. Einar Peterson, vice-principal.

Under the leadership of John Dodson, student body president, the council completed a successful year. Many useful and needed improvements were made for the school during the year, among which were the purchasing of forty-five football jerseys, fifteen sets of basketball uniforms, and forty-eight sets of track clothing for the athletic department, and providing a Christmas tree for the Girls' Athletic Association ball, "White Evening."

Representatives were sent by the council to district meetings of the California Association of Student Councils, where the opinions of the league high school students may be known through this larger organization and the delegates may have a chance to exchange ideas with other schools.

Eleven KHS students attended a leadership day at Reedley High School on December 7. After the general session, those attending were divided into various groups to discuss some of the present school problems. Entertainment was provided by the host school. The evening was concluded with an address by Assemblyman Charles B. Garrigus of Reedley, formerly a member of the KHS faculty.

The council adopted the following new rule and put it into effect in September of 1959: "All participants of an athletic event are required to purchase a student body card."

One of the projects in which the organization was actively engaged was the discussion of a closed campus. Several suggestions were made by some of the council members who served on the specially appointed committee. The council's final decision was to cooperate with the local police who should cite the offenders, rather than to close the campus.

In March, the student body officers attended an Associated Student Councils meeting at Caruthers High School. Five exchange students at Fresno State College formed a panel to discuss the topic of world peace.

A project day was held on February 27 for the purpose of beautifying the KHS campus. Students, faculty members, and custodians all helped to plant trees, shrubs, and flowers.

This representative group completed their year of leadership at KHS with a party in June.

With the reopening of school, picture taking soon got under way. Photographs were sized, identified and carefully checked, then sent to Berkeley for engraving. This work was done by the editor, Linda Lawrence.

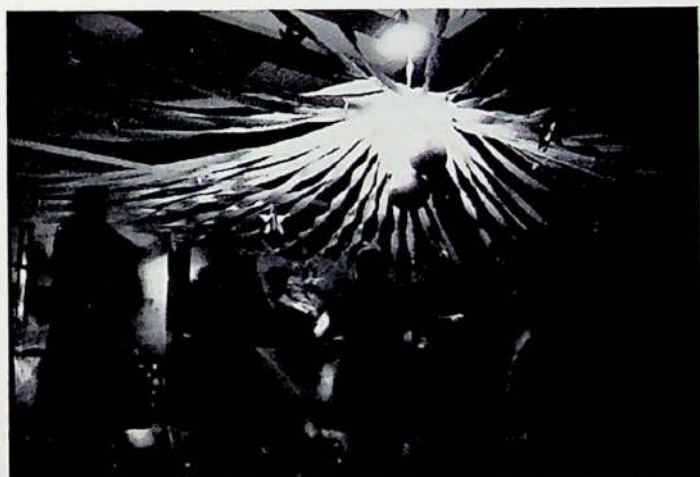

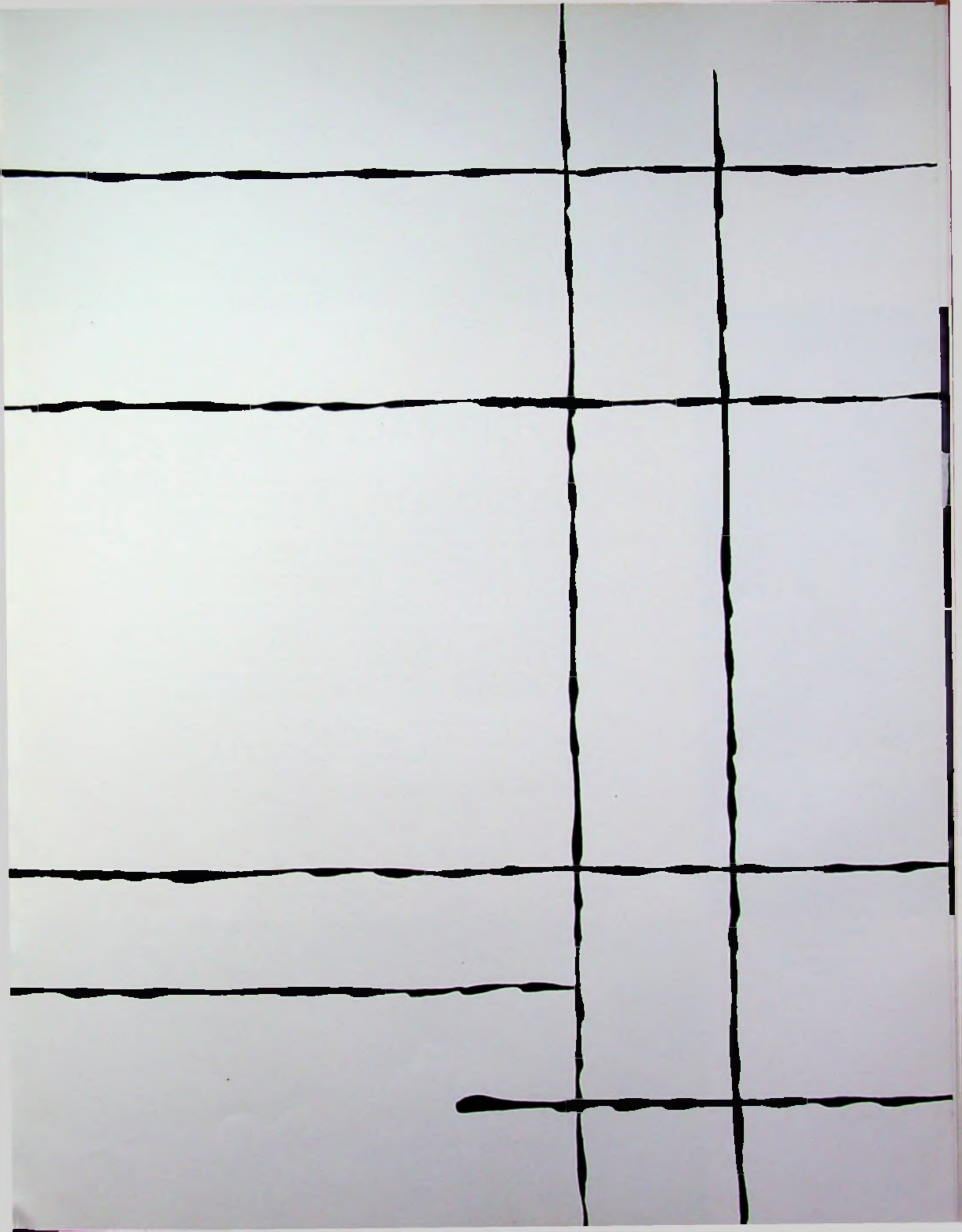

In an inspired pursuit of the Central Sequoia League football crown, the Kingsburg High School Vikings thundered off to a devastating start, winning all of their league grid contests but one—to the powerful Apaches of Sanger High.

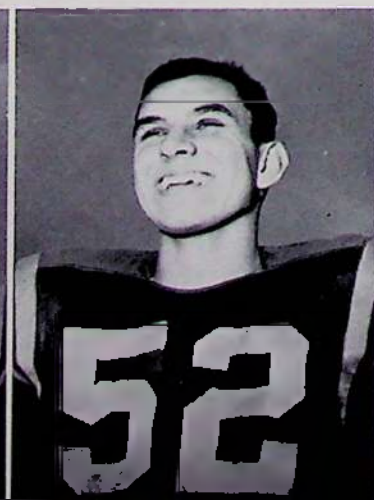
In what was probably the most crucial game of the 1959 season, the Kingsburg eleven exhibited one of the finest displays of sportsmanship, athletic ability and playing strategy ever witnessed from the Kingsburg stands.

But despite the efforts of a stubborn defense along with the drive and desire of the entire squad, Sanger's aerial attack proved to be exactly seven points too much for the Vikings as they went down in defeat, 27 to 20. The much-discussed game marked the first loss for Kingsburg since 1957. Thus, by an ironic single touchdown, the Vikings barely missed out on their ninth consecutive league championship.

The team was honored when Charles Moore, varsity coach, was selected as head coach for the North team in the annual Shrine Classic to be played in the Los Angeles Coliseum August 5. 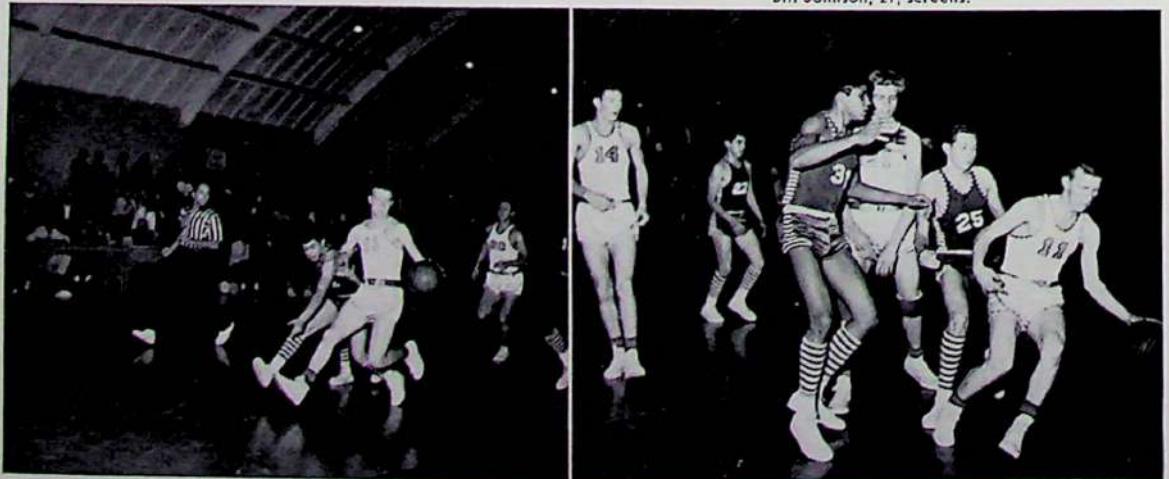
VARSITY BASKETBALL

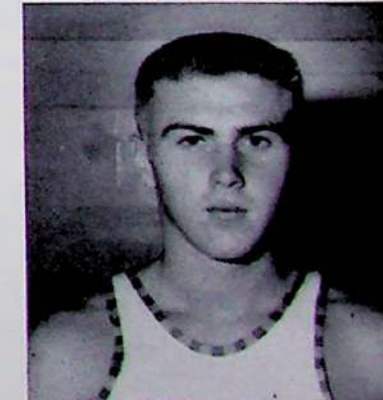

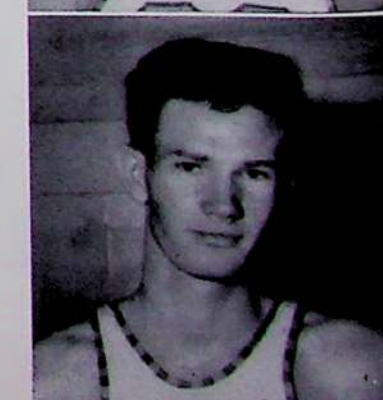

SWIMMING

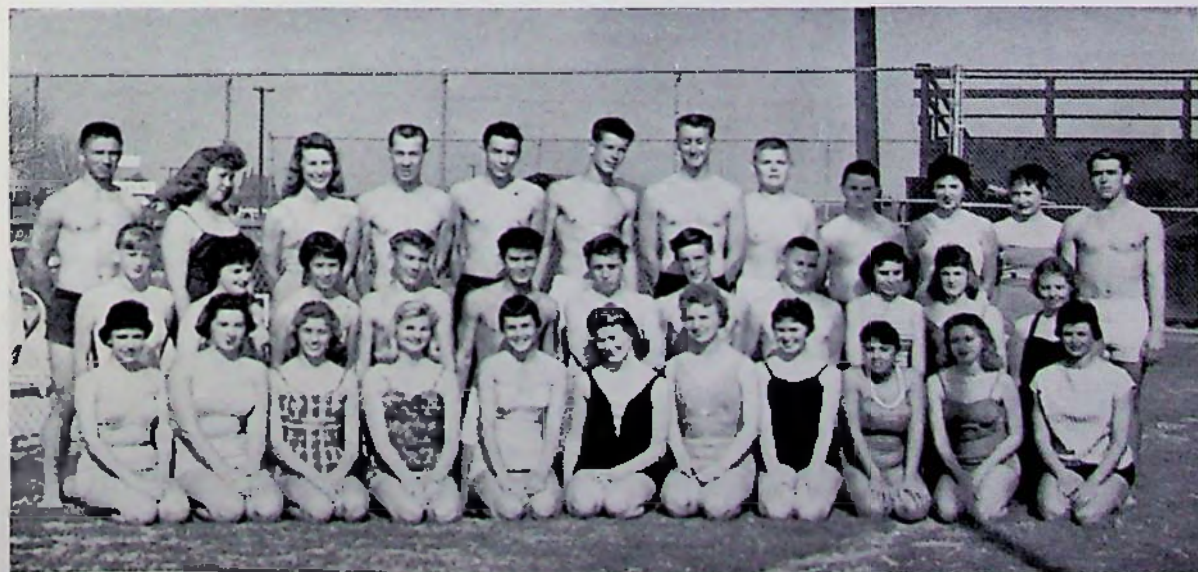
This year's swimming team, with many returning lettermen, had a very successful season.

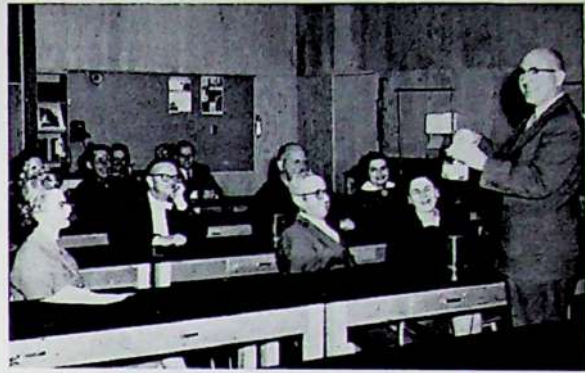


ACTIVITIES
