
"I feel that spirit week was well pre-



"A lot of hard work has gone into pep rallies this year to try to raise everyone's school spirit, but it has still declined."



Students take occupational courses






bands and food.


The money earned in these projects was awarded, in the form of scholarships, to many of the club's graduating seniors.


To raise money, the club sold concessions at volleyball games and had cookie and cupcake sales.




The local involvement that Peterson mentioned included selling apples and raking leaves for disabled Kingsburg residents.

Vikings crush Taft, claim valley title






Defense: Vikings' bread and butter




Norsemen pride and poise prove




Admirable play by the junior varsity and frosh-soph volleyball teams produced a second place finish in the Central Sequoia League.




Youthful Vikes will return starters



Wilson, Singh make all-CSL squad

Hustling JV's fight inexperience




Gallant fight for crown falls short




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Tax main issue for school officials


The biggest challenge for the Kingsburg Joint Union High School District Board of Trustees this year was to get KHS's tax revenue limit increased. After having their measure defeated in the November election, the Board, which included Mr. Lowell Carlson, Mr. Henry Esajian, Mr. Robert Quattrin, Mr. Jim Hamada and Mr. Don Jackson, regrouped for a second try in the spring.

The main problem faced by the administration was keeping spending within the budget allowed by the Board. The administration, which included Superintendent William Horstmann, Principal Don Witzansky and Assistant Principal Norma Mann, was in charge of the school's daily operation, while the Board set the budget, made district policy and held hearings for suspended students. There were times when the Board and the administration worked together. About these times, Mr. Witzansky said, "We have a congenial group and work well together."



English: Major subject, giant staff






History begins two-year change


Math adds up in subtracting year




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
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


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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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


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
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
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
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
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
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
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Karen Carpenter thanks troops
