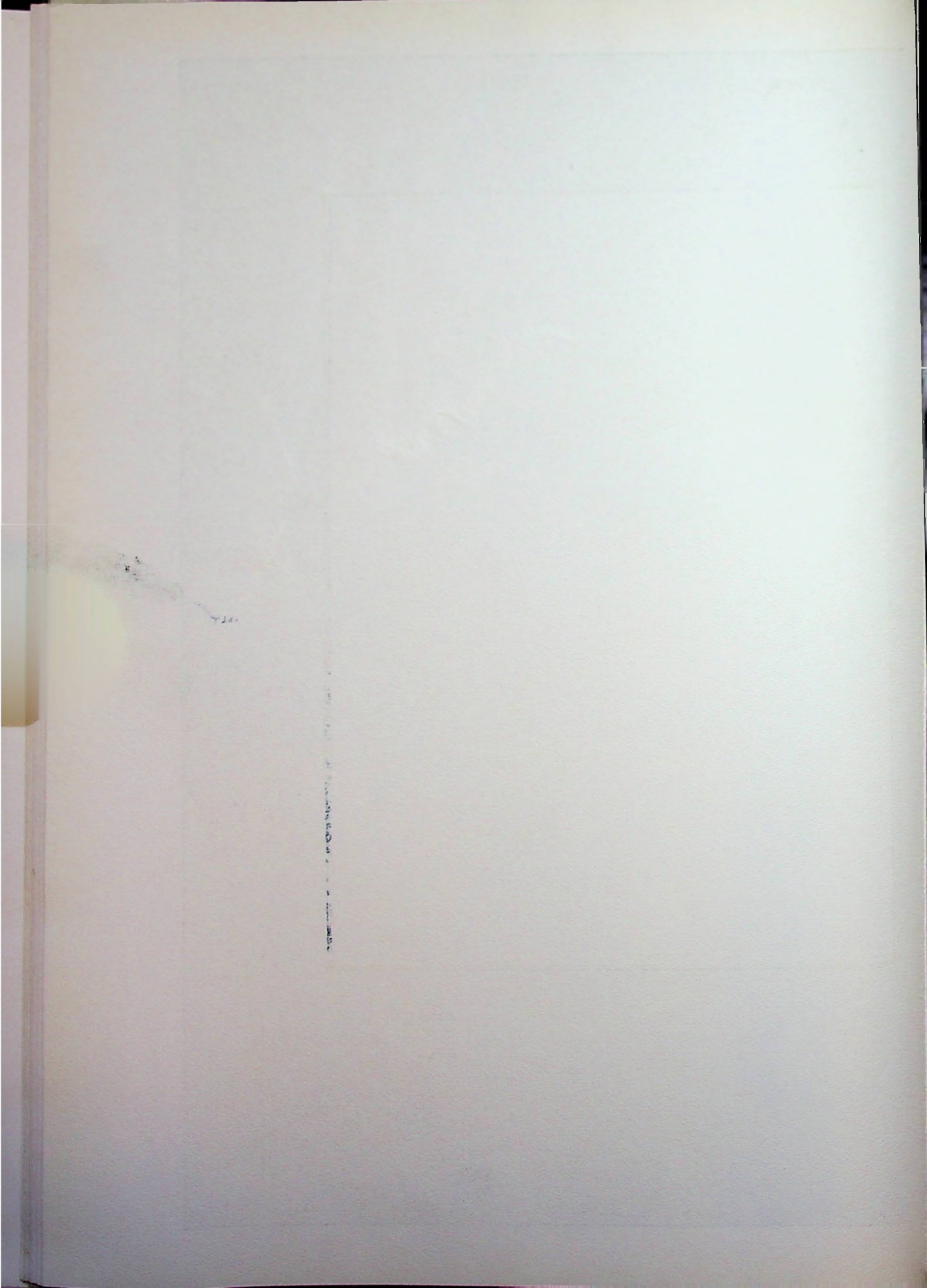
- The freshmen are proud of their abilities as salesmen. They were the winners in the contest for the sale of student body cards which was held at the beginning of the school year.

HEAVYWEIGHT FOOTBALL

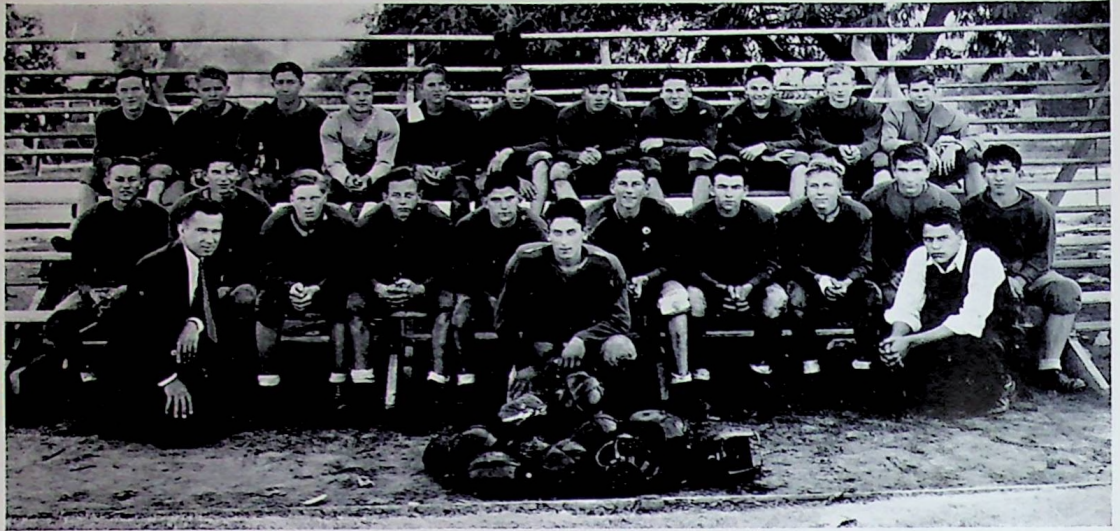

BOYS' BASEBALL

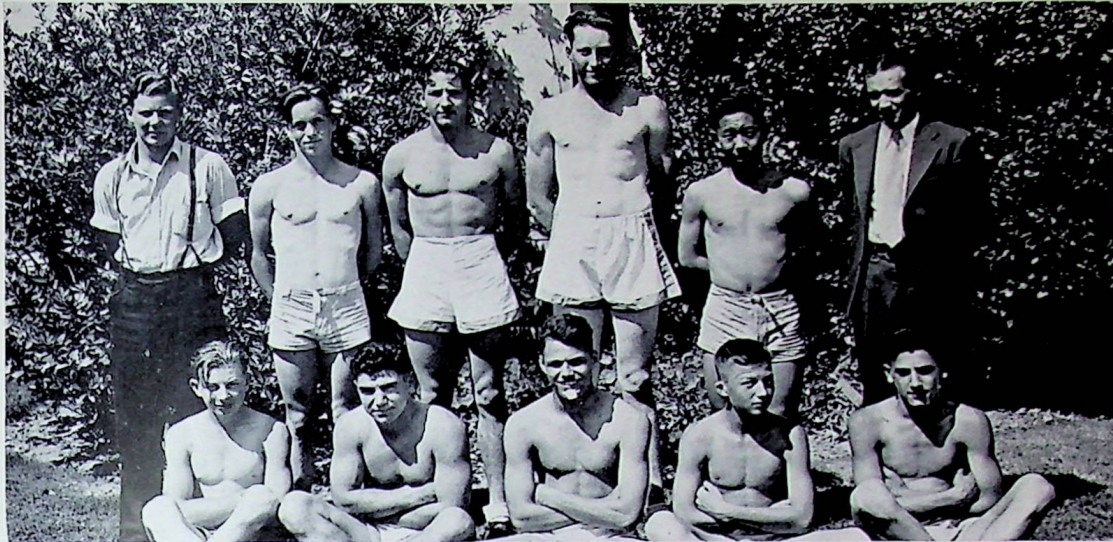

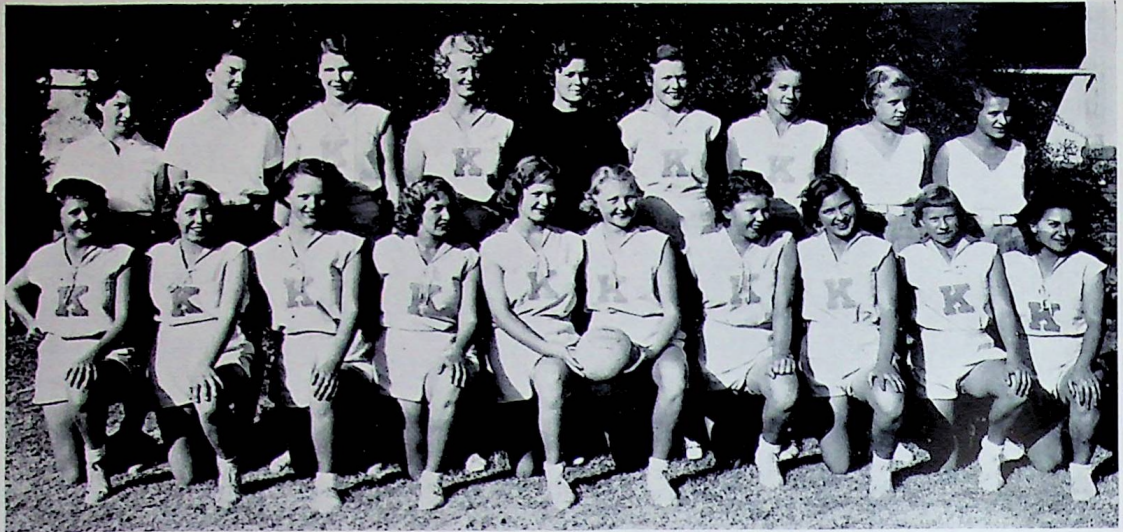

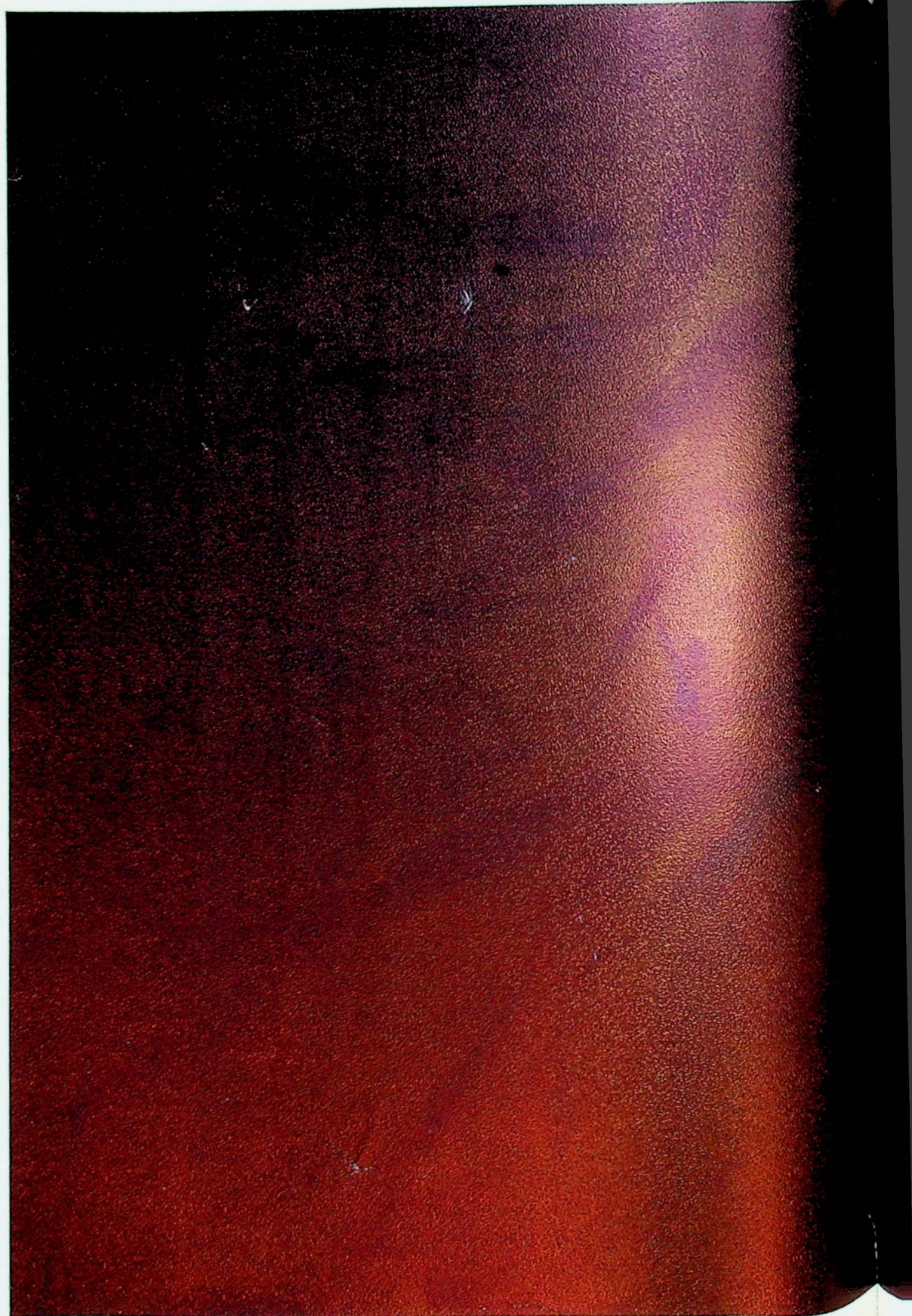
TENNIS

- Watch the K. H. S. tennis team go to town next year when we shall have new tennis courts.

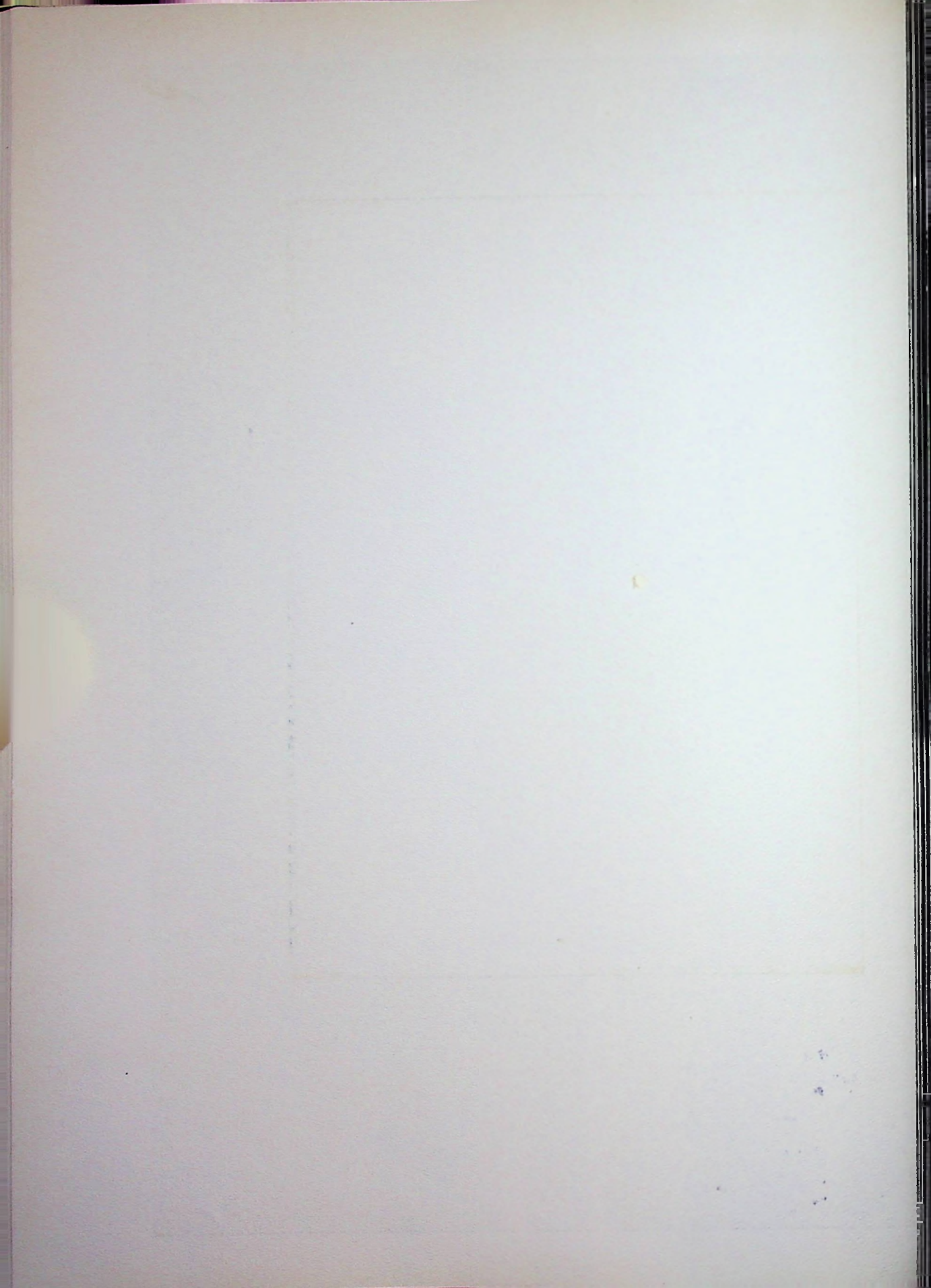




REFLECTION

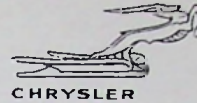
