CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS
and
UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

To be eligible an applicant must have successfully completed a specific sequence of high school courses. Those required courses are referred to as the A-G subjects. Fifteen units (one year equals one unit) are required.

1. The **minimum** subject requirements (A-G subjects) are:

- a. History: 2 years history/social science, or government
- b. English: 4 years of college preparatory
- c. Mathematics: 3 years required, **4 recommended** (*must pass Math 1A + Math 1B or Math 1, Math 2, Math 3*)
- d. Science: (one physical and one life), 2 years required, **3 recommended**
- e. Foreign Language: 2 years of one language required, **3 recommended**
- f. Visual or Performing Arts: 1 year
- g. College preparatory electives: 1 year required

2. The scholarship requirement: Minimum grade of "C" or higher in all courses required.

3. SAT and ACT: The UC and CSU systems have updated their policies about admissions requirements for incoming freshmen: They will not be using the SAT/ACT in their admissions decisions for the Class of 2024. SAT/ACT scores may be used to satisfy Math and English placement decisions. For private colleges, students will need to consult each institution's individual website to see current testing admissions requirements.

KINGSBURG HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

MINIMUM GRADUATION REQUIREMENT: 230 Credits Total

CREDITS TO INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING:

- 4 years (40 credits) in English
- 3 years (30 credits) Math: (To include 10 credits of Math 1 or Math 1B)
- 1 year (10 credits) in Physical Science
- 1 year (10 credits) in Life Science
- 1 year (10 credits) in Health/Wellness
- 1 year (10 credits) in World History
- 1 year (10 credits) in U.S. History
- 1 semester (5 credits) in Civics
- 1 semester (5 credits) in Economics
- 1 year (10 credits) in Visual/Performing Arts
- 2 years (20 credits) in P.E. (unless excused by doctor for medical reason)

The remaining 70 credits or 7 classes may be chosen in any area.

- Summer school, early bird classes, P.E. athletics, P.E. band, P.E. color guard, and pep squad are options for students who desire more electives.
- Advanced Placement classes in Math, Science, Social Science, English, History, Spanish, Computers and Art are offered, some on a rotating basis.
- Regional Occupational Program (ROP) classes have specific grade level requirements. Some offer Dual Enrollment opportunities.
- Job Skills is open to **Seniors** in good standing only.
- Valedictorian status is determined at the end of the eighth semester and is based on the student's total weighted GPA.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT EXAMS

Cost is \$89.00 per test and payable in two installments:

Payment #1-((\$40) is due by November 1st. · **Payment #2**-((\$49) is due by March 29th.

Fee waivers are available to students who qualify-must apply by November 1st.

COLLEGE TESTING

SAT FEE is \$60.

ACT FEE is \$68 & **ACT** with Writing is \$93.

Fee waivers are available to students who qualify.

Many colleges are not requiring or have become test optional for 2024. Check for updates.

COLLEGE APPLICATION FEES

Each college or university application fee is approximately \$50 - \$90 per application. There is no cost for community college applications.

Advanced Placement courses are college-level classes that provide students with more rigor and subject depth and are an excellent opportunity in preparing for post-secondary education. AP Exams are administered at the end of the school year in May on the high school campus. Students who earn passing scores *may* be able to receive college credit. REQUESTING TRANSCRIPTS

Official and unofficial transcripts may be requested through the KHS Registrar, Mrs. Ortiz. She can be contacted by email or phone: cortiz@kingsburghigh.com, 897-5156, ext. 2007. **Please give advance notice for transcript preparation.** If a student was enrolled at another high school or took a class at a community college, contact must be made with that institution to request a transcript.

ATHLETICS

Students who will be playing a sport at a Division I or Division II university will need to establish eligibility through the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). In addition to course and GPA requirements, students must register and pay a fee (\$100) for a certification account: www.eligibilitycenter.org. Profile-only accounts are free. Please check with the NCAA for updates. Additional NCAA contact for prospective student-athlete questions: 1-877-262-1492.

Students desiring to play a sport at a smaller college/university may register with The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). For more information: PlayNAIA. Please check with NAIA for updated eligibility requirements and fee. NAIA contact number: 1-866-881-6242.

*Student athletes must meet athletic clearinghouse requirements **AND** the receiving university's entry requirements.

COLLEGE TESTING

College testing is offered throughout the year at locations in our local area. Many universities are not requiring SAT/ACT scores **or** have made them optional for the 2024 college application cycle. CSUs and UCs are not using them for admissions decisions; however, there are occasions when SAT/ACT scores may be used for Math and English placement, scholarship consideration, and special programs. Check college websites regularly for updates.

SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test): This exam is offered 7 times during the 2023-24 year. It is a three-hour test that measures reading, writing & language, and math skills. There is a fee, but there are waivers available for those who qualify. Students may register online at www.collegeboard.com.

ACT (American College Test): This exam is offered 7 times during the 2023-24 year. It is a two-hour 55-minute exam that tests students in English, mathematics, reading, and science. An essay portion is optional and takes an additional 40 minutes. There is a fee; fee waivers are available to those who qualify. Students can register online at www.act.org.

The College Board and Khan Academy have partnered to offer **free** personalized online SAT test prep at www.khanacademy.org/sat. Students can link PSAT/SAT scores to Khan Academy accounts and are able to access test preparation that includes full length practice exams along with thousands of questions, videos, lessons, and test strategies.

ASVAB TESTING

The Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery test is free and offered on the KHS campus twice yearly, fall and spring. This exam consists of a series of short subtests in a variety of subjects including science, math, language, and mechanical skills. The ASVAB is an excellent career exploration tool that helps students identify their natural skill sets and career areas for which they show an aptitude. It is used by the military to determine enlistment eligibility but is open to anyone. Visit www.asvabprogram.com to learn more. Test dates and sign-ups are announced in the daily KHS bulletin and the CCC Google Classroom.

MILITARY ENLISTMENT AND CAREER PATHWAY

Every year, a number of our graduating seniors pursue a career in one of the branches of the U.S. Armed Forces. Students are welcome to reach out to a local recruiting facility or ask Mrs. Peterson for current contact information for the branches they are interested in learning more about.





COLLEGE APPLICATIONS

Applications for **State Center Community Colleges** are online and are accepted at any time, but they encourage early applications for best class selection. Application workshops will take place in Civics/Economics classes in October.

California State University applications are due between October 1st and November 30th.
University of California applications are due between October 1st through November 30th (but becomes available Aug. 1).

Application workshops for both the California State University and the University of California will be held on campus in the College & Career Center from August through November. These workshops are extremely helpful, and we encourage any student considering applying to any University of California or California State University to take advantage of them.

Both admission applications and scholarship applications for **private schools** must be obtained by the individual from the college and are almost exclusively available online. Please see Mrs. Apgar in the Counseling Department or Mrs. Peterson in the College and Career Center if you have questions about how to contact private colleges.

Many private universities utilize the **Common Application** (<https://www.commonapp.org/>). This website is helpful because it allows a student to apply to multiple participating colleges, but it can be challenging to navigate. We encourage students to seek help from Mrs. Peterson or Mrs. Apgar if the colleges they are applying to use the Common App.
(UCs and CSUs do NOT use the Common App.)



Vocational and Career Technical Training - Community colleges offer a wide variety of technical training programs, as do a number of private institutions. Costs and application processes vary, and students are welcome to come to the CCC to get assistance navigating those processes.

HIGH SCHOOL ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

The State Center Community College District offers students the opportunity to complete college coursework while enrolled in high school. To participate, there is a minimum GPA requirement. Students must also submit a completed application and all documents to the college by their deadline. Credit and grade earned will be placed on the student's college transcript. 2023-24 SCCCD COLLEGE DATES – MATRICULATION PROCESS

(State Center Community College District Schools – Reedley College, Fresno City and Clovis Community)

1. Application Workshop: **October 10 & 11** (12 is the makeup day)
This workshop happens during Civics and Economics classes and is available and encouraged for all students. **Students need to know their Social Security number.** One application is good for all colleges in the district.

File the FAFSA in December to help ensure your first-year tuition costs are waived.
2. Online Orientation: (Opens December 1st), provided in Civics and Economics classes on **December 1 and December 4.**
This step is time sensitive. Students will be assigned an online registration date based on their orientation completion date and time. Students may complete the orientation independently. It takes about a half an hour.
3. Advising and Counseling: **March 19**
Reedley and Fresno City College Counselors come to KHS to advise students on course selection for Fall and/or Summer 2024. Students are assigned a time to come to the library. This too is a necessary step in order to register for classes in the priority Online Registration window. No make ups provided.
4. Online Priority Registration Window: **April 23 – April 25**
Students can register independently, but if they would like help (which we highly recommend as there can be glitches), they should sign up to get help in the CCC.

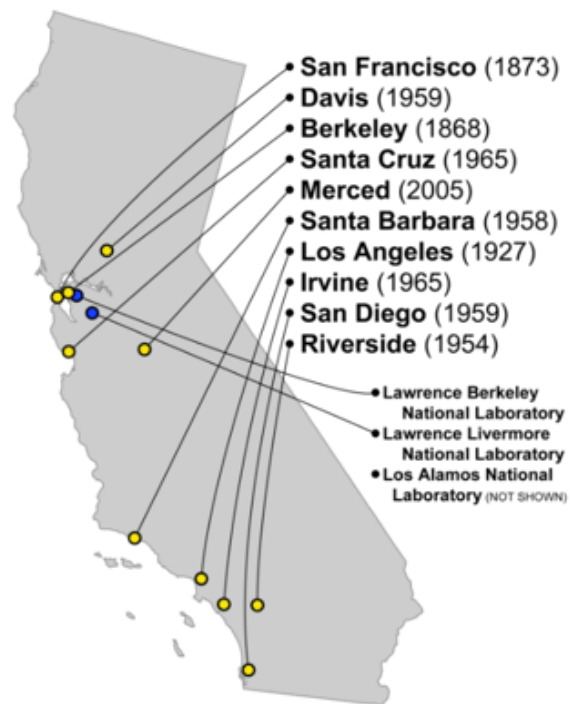

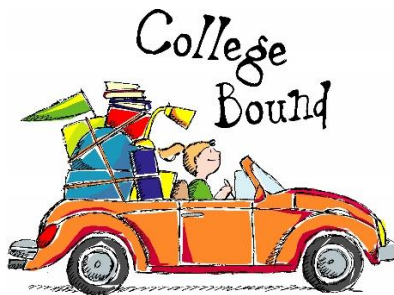
- Realistically, what can the family contribute to post-secondary education?
- Who is responsible for completing the applications?
- How many colleges will the student apply to? Who is paying the application fees?
- Is the parent or the student pursuing financial aid (scholarships and FAFSA)?
- How much can the student participate in the finances? (Summer work, part-time job)
- How will the final decision be made where the student will attend?
- Where will the student live? Summers?
- Does the student know how to be independent? (i.e. do laundry, clean, cook)
- Once in college, parents are not allowed access to grades; will students share willingly?
- Does the student have an understanding of their college's resources: academic support, career center, mental health, etc?

STUDENTS LIVING AT HOME

- Will the rules/curfews change for the student after graduation?
- Is the student required to participate in household chores, household bills, family activities?
- Who is responsible for car and health insurance, vehicle maintenance?
- Responsibility of personal bills belongs to whom; i.e. phone, Internet, gas, etc?

STUDENTS LIVING AWAY FROM HOME

- When are parents and families allowed for visits?
- Phone calls, emails, and texts are good communication; who initiates these? How often?
- Who maintains records such as financial aid and bank accounts? College fees?
- Will the student have access to health care? Does family's insurance cover the student on campus?
- How will the student do banking?
- Does the student get spending money, how much, and how do they account for that spending? Will the student need a part-time job?
- How often will the student come home? Will the student have access to a car while away?



FINANCIAL AID PROCESS

The **FAFSA** (Free Application for Financial Student Aid) is undergoing a major overhaul this year. Typically, this online application can be submitted from October 1st through March 2nd. **This year, it will not be available until sometime in December and will still be due March 2.** This application is used to award all Cal Grants, Pell Grants, California Promise Grant, Work Study Grants and federal student loans. Undocumented students may apply for the California Dream Act Application to be considered for state financial aid- that application can be submitted between December and March 2 as well. The form is somewhat complicated. We encourage all senior students and parents to attend the special workshop we hold on our campus each year to help understand the process. This year the workshop will be **held on January 22, 2024** in the KHS Library.

File your FAFSA OR California Dream Act Application using “prior prior” year taxes ASAP after *December 1* (tent) and before March 2.



Check the email you entered into the applications **weekly** for confirmation of your FAFSA and any follow up steps required.



Check your college-issued emails **weekly** for documentation requests and follow up steps. Handle these ASAP so your financial award is not delayed.

- **Confirm school of attendance**
- **Confirm graduation**



Work with your college’s Financial Aid office - **they will help you with unusual circumstances or questions.**



You will file a FAFSA or Cal Dream Act application every year your student is in college.

FINANCIAL AID OPT-OUT INFORMATION

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or California Dream Act Application (CADAA) determines a pupil's eligibility for financial aid to assist with a pupil's attendance at a college or career school. **California Education Code (CEC) § 51225.7** requires a local educational agency to confirm each 12th grade pupil's completion and submission of a FAFSA or CADAA unless the pupil is determined to be exempt or an opt-out form is completed by a pupil who is a legally emancipated minor, a pupil who is 18 years or older, a legal guardian, or parent, or a local educational agency on a pupil's behalf.

To opt a pupil out of the Financial Aid Application requirement, please complete this form and return it to your local high school counselor by March 1, 2024.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarship applications are due throughout the year but hit a peak in March and April. We publish a list of various scholarship opportunities as they arrive on campus and publicize them in Civics/Econ classes, the KHS website, and the Class of 2024 Google Classroom for seniors. Mrs. Peterson is happy to give assistance to students with questions about the applications.

Many scholarships require letters of recommendation, and all seniors attend a Resume and Cover Letter workshop in the CCC in October to help them prepare to ask recommenders for letters. Students should ask teachers, advisors, coaches, spiritual leaders, and employers in a way that allows them to decline comfortably if he or she does not have time to do a good job. It is important for students to give recommenders a minimum of two weeks to complete their letters of recommendation.

Some local scholarship awards are given based on the **Senior Profile** that seniors fill out in college and career workshops during their Civics/Econ classes. While it is not mandatory that students complete a Senior Profile, it is **highly recommended**. In some cases, scholarship donors come to the KHS office to read through the Senior Profile book to select their recipients. The Senior Profile highlights some personal student information such as family background, education, GPA and class rank, extracurricular activities and honors, and includes a brief autobiographical summary of the student along with their post-secondary goals.

Other local scholarships have their own application forms and must be applied for separately. Local scholarship applications are readily available to students in the CCC and it is to the student's benefit to fill them out **completely, accurately, and neatly** and turn them in **before** the deadline. It has been our experience that students who actively pursue scholarships on a regular basis are the ones who are awarded the most assistance. PARTICIPATION IN GRADUATION AND SENIOR WEEK ACTIVITIES

(KHS 2023-24 Student & Parent Handbook)

District policy provides that no students shall participate in commencement exercises unless he/she has completed all graduation requirements including 230 units of credit and required courses. Students also must have paid all bills owed to the school and have returned the signed letter agreeing to expected behaviors at all senior week activities and the graduation ceremony itself.

In order to participate in the graduation ceremony, a student must maintain a 95% attendance rate their senior year. A student cannot accumulate MORE than 36 periods of negative attendance occurrences, (unexcused absences, cuts, unexcused tardies, or tardy for more than 30 minutes) per year. Absences that are excused, court related or in conjunction with a school activity are not counted as negative attendance occurrences.

Mid-year graduates will not be allowed to participate in the graduation ceremony without petitioning the administration at least one month in advance of the ceremony.

For the welfare and safety of all, students wishing to take part in specific activities such as Grad Nite, graduation, and other events to be determined by the administration, may be required to submit to a personal search of themselves and their possessions. Due to deposits made to transportation companies we are unable to give refunds given for Grad Nite for any reason. Mature, responsible and thoughtful behavior is expected from all students at all times. Graduation and senior week activities are happy times, but behavior standards remain the same. The KHS faculty, administration, fellow students, parents, and community have high expectations. Seniors should keep in mind that the graduation ceremony is a privilege not a right and belongs to the class and not anyone individual. Seniors who repeatedly misbehave during their senior year may lose that privilege.

Senior Warning Letters

Seniors are to be role models for all underclassmen and should maintain excellent citizenship throughout their senior year, through senior activities, and the graduation ceremony.

- 1st Offense** Referral for behavior, attendance or attitude problems will result in a “senior letter of warning” stating that senior activities, and the privilege of walking in the graduation ceremony are at risk. Consequences as outlined in other discipline sections will also apply.
- 2nd Offense** Referral for behavior, attendance or attitude problems will result in a second “senior letter of warning” indicating a loss of some or all senior week activities. Consequences as outlined in other discipline sections will also apply.
- 3rd Offense** Referral for behavior, attendance, or attitude problems will result in a third “senior letter” and will result in the loss of the privilege of walking in the graduation ceremony. Consequences as outlined in other discipline sections also apply.

SCHOOL WIDE ATTENDANCE POLICY PROCEDURES

Students must maintain a 95% or better attendance rate to be eligible for extra activities *Students with 10 or more unexcused attendance marks must attend Saturday School.

Consequences/interventions for negative attendance (T = Tardy, H = More than 30 minutes tardy, U = Unexcused verified absence, L = Unverified unexcused absence, and C = Cut) to class cumulative

Unexcused Absence
1-9 Periods of Unexcused Negative Attendance: Warning
10 Periods of Unexcused Negative Attendance: Saturday School/Possible Letter Sent Home
16 Periods of Unexcused Negative Attendance: Saturday School Required/Letter Sent Home
24 Periods of Unexcused Negative Attendance: Saturday School Required/possible Pre SARB meeting
28 Periods of Unexcused Negative Attendance: Parent meeting and/or phone call home and loss of OFF CAMPUS Lunch privileges . Student placed on possible SARB contract.
36 Periods of Unexcused Negative Attendance: Possible referral to Superior Court/ Student will lose privilege to walk in Graduation (12th graders only) if they have MORE than 36 periods of unexcused negative attendance.

Step 3: on 17th excused absence- District SARB Meeting
Step 4: Additional excused absence- Follow SARB contract

SHORT-TERM TRAVEL STUDY

Students can request short term travel study/short term independent study for no less than 3 consecutive days and no more than 10 days under the discretion of KHS administration. Student and parent must meet with administration at least 10 days in advance and must be eligible to qualify for the program. A contract must be signed and the student must meet all the deadlines set forth in the contract. Once the contract is fulfilled and all work is graded the attendance will be changed. If the student does not fulfill the requirements, no credit will be given.

The Board of Trustees recognizes its responsibility for the education of all youths in the school system. The Board authorizes, (AR 6158), short-term travel study as an alternative means of meeting the classroom curriculum requirements for students who meet the established district criteria.

Frequently Asked Questions about the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and the California Dream Act Application (CADAA)

“What is the FAFSA/CADAA?” The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is the online application that allows a pupil to apply simultaneously for federal student aid (including the Federal Pell Grant, work-study opportunities, and federal student loans) and state financial aid such as the Cal Grant program. Many colleges and universities use it for their aid programs, too. The California Dream Act Application (CADAA) is a similar application that provides a path for some pupil who do not qualify for federal aid to apply for state and University-funded assistance. Applying for the FAFSA/CADAA could qualify you for free money through federal, state and university grants and scholarships that help cover the cost of your education.

“Do I need to have citizenship or DACA to apply for financial aid?” No, while you must be a citizen to apply for federal financial aid through the FAFSA, the CADAA is available to any California student that meets what is called “AB 540 criteria” that qualifies them for in-state tuition rates at a University of California or California State University campus, as well as state financial aid like the Cal Grant. Before deciding whether to apply, you can check <https://www.csac.ca.gov/undocumented-dreamer-students> to understand if you might be eligible for financial aid.

“Isn’t the application too long and difficult to complete?” Most applicants complete the FAFSA or CADAA in about 30 minutes. If you have questions, talk to your school counselor. If you need assistance with your application, sign up for a local “Cash for College Workshop” at: <https://www.cash4college.csac.ca.gov/>.

“If I want to learn a trade, can the FAFSA/CADAA still be of assistance to me?” The FAFSA/CADAA applications are not just for California associate’s or bachelor’s degree programs! FAFSA applicants can receive need-based Federal Pell grants, federal student loans, and other federal student aid for technical, trade, and vocational programs. CADAA applicants also have state financial aid opportunities at community colleges and at other schools and training programs. Pupils can check with the school they want to attend or use the federal government’s online College Navigator tool to find out which institutions participate in the programs: <https://nces.ed.gov/collegenavigator/>

“Does my family make too much money to benefit from the FAFSA/CADAA?” Financial aid is left on the table every year by pupils who didn’t apply because they erroneously thought they were ineligible. You really don’t know until you apply! Income and assets are factors in determining your eligibility, but so are things like the number of pupils in the family who are in school and the age of the parent(s). For pupils from families that do make too much to qualify for need-based grant aid, the FAFSA/CADAA can still be helpful, since it is used to determine eligibility for other federal and state financial aid such as the Middle Class Scholarship, work-study programs, federal student loans (usually at competitive rates and with more borrower protections than private loans, including options for income-based repayment and forgiveness programs for some careers) DREAM loans for CADAA applicants at UC and CSU campuses, and other types of aid. Your college may offer aid based on your FAFSA/CADAA info too, and your eligibility may be different depending on your school. Additionally, some scholarship programs use information from the FAFSA/CADAA as part of the application process. As most financial aid is awarded in date order based on FAFSA/CADAA filing date, it is a very good idea to complete the application as early as possible. This “place in line” can be used for opportunities that come up later, and also can be used if family financial circumstances suddenly change.

“What if I don’t want a student loan?” Filing the application doesn’t commit you to anything. You’ll just find out whether you might be eligible for aid!

“How is the FAFSA/CADAA data protected?” “I don’t want my information sold, and I don’t want my school to have it.” By law, your personally identifiable Information (PII) in the FAFSA can only be used in furtherance of administering financial aid, including research. Although your high school will know whether you completed the FAFSA, it will not have access to the information that you provide on your FAFSA. The California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) released a joint statement with the California Department of Education stating, “The information provided via the California Dream Act Application is used solely to determine eligibility for state financial aid and isn’t shared with the federal government or used for immigration enforcement purposes. The CSAC will protect this information to the fullest extent of the law.” To read the full statement, visit <https://www.csac.ca.gov/post/joint-message-california-department1education-and-california-student-aid-commission>

“If I choose to file an application, how will I know that my application is complete?” Once you submit the FAFSA or the CADAA, you will receive a confirmation of receipt at the email address you provided in the application. This will allow you to demonstrate that you’ve met the requirement of filing an application even if there are circumstances that will need to be addressed with the college/university’s financial aid office later.

Kingsburg Joint Union High School District FAFSA or CADAA Opt-Out Form

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or California Dream Act Application (CADAA) determines a pupil's eligibility for financial aid to assist with a pupil's attendance at a college or career school. California Education Code (CEC) § 51225.7 requires a local educational agency to confirm each 12th grade pupil's completion and submission of a FAFSA or CADAA unless the pupil is determined to be exempt or an opt-out form is completed by a pupil who is a legally emancipated minor, a pupil who is 18 years or older, a legal guardian, or parent, or a local educational agency on a pupil's behalf. This opt-out form permits a pupil to **opt out** of the completion of a FAFSA or CADAA form.

To opt a pupil out of the Financial Aid Application requirement, please complete this form and return it to your local high school counselor **by March 1, 2024.**

Submitting a Financial Aid Application Opt-Out Form does not prohibit a pupil from completing and submitting a financial aid application at any time in the future.
