#### Hello Everyone,

Yesterday was the first day since March 13, 2020 that we had all of our students, K-12, here for inperson instruction. It truly felt like the first day of school in September. I thank all of you for your hard work and dedication through these many months and these many changes in delivery of instruction as we pivoted to meet the requirements placed on schools.

Even as we enjoy this return, we must look to Fall's re-opening. The Erie-Niagara School Superintendents Association has written to Gov. Cuomo, urging him to direct state agencies to issue school opening guidance for the 2021-22 school year no later than June 4, with a clear and unequivocal commitment to full in-person teaching and learning.

On a related note, we're looking for stakeholder input on students' pandemic-related social, emotional, mental health and academic needs. **This SURVEY** remains open until 4 p.m., June 1<sup>st</sup>.

Vaccinations are credited for the declining cases of COVID-19 here and across the state. The ECDOH will host a Pfizer vaccination clinic from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturday June 19<sup>th</sup> here at the High School for ages 12 to 18 and adults, with the second dose 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on July 10. Details will be on our website when all information is available.

## **Preparing for Success!**

**Danielle Arnone/Academy of Business & Finance Presentation** 

May 25, 2021 Board of Education Meeting



Most of us are familiar with the unique partnership between Evans Bank and Lake Shore's Academy of Business and Finance. That's the one that gives students practical experience and insights into the world of banking and business professionals.

Most of us are not so familiar with the other activities and opportunities that take place behind the scenes. Danielle Arnone, AOBF Director and Internship Coordinator, shared that information at Tuesday night's Board of Education Meeting. Mrs. Arnone noted that students complete a Business Education Employability Portfolio (BEEP) that helps them learn workplace skills and how to showcase them in a digital portfolio. BEEP interviews were conducted virtually in January, but the students came in dressed for the interviews, she said, which they completed over Google Meets with AOBF board members.

In lieu of the traditional networking breakfast there was a "meet and greet" where students could share their experiences and expectations, and meet board members. "It's about connections and relationship-building," said Mrs. Arnone.

There also are virtual job shadowing opportunities with more than 200 different careers where students can get a peek at "a day in the life of ..." various professions. The website also offers Q&A videos; information on skills, education and licensing requirements; earning scales across the country, and a college search.

The AOBF gives students a jump start on how to succeed in the business world ... and it can give a jump on college, too. This year, a group looked at the AOBF curriculum to see where improvements could be made. The AOBF Financial Planning class next year will allow students to earn three ECC

credits under Consumer Finance. "Now, the AOBF students will be able to earn up to 13 college credits," said Mrs. Arnone. It's another way the AOBF helps prepare students for the business world.

Phases 2 and 3 of the

**Capital Project are** progressing. Completion of the new athletic addition is anticipated for this Fall. Other projects in these phases will continue into Fall of 2022. This work includes renovations to the school's art, life skills, music and science rooms, as well as a full auditorium renovation. **Pending New York** State's approval, Phase 4 work will begin this winter at the elementary schools, including site

work, roof top units,

internal mechanical and security work.



# Reminders!

### **Keeping Us Safe & Our Buildings Open**







Although the positivity rate is dropping, to keep our buildings open and staff, students and colleagues safe from COVID-19, we must continue to follow all protocols:

- Masks should be worn at all times.
- Social Distancing for 6 feet or more at all times. (The ECDOH considers someone a "close contact" if they are less than 6 feet for 10 consecutive minutes or more.)
- Frequently wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and running water are not immediately available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer and rub hands together until they are dry.
- Stay home if sick.
- Faculty & Staff should take breaks in separate locations to help minimize the spread of any potential COVID-19 that may affect your building.
- Avoid gatherings with people you don't live with.

If you are experiencing symptoms or have been advised by a healthcare provider to get tested, rapid testing is available.
