The students of North Cache High School respectfully dedicate this volume of the "Polaris" to the Faculty, as an emblem of appreciation for the loving service rendered to them.



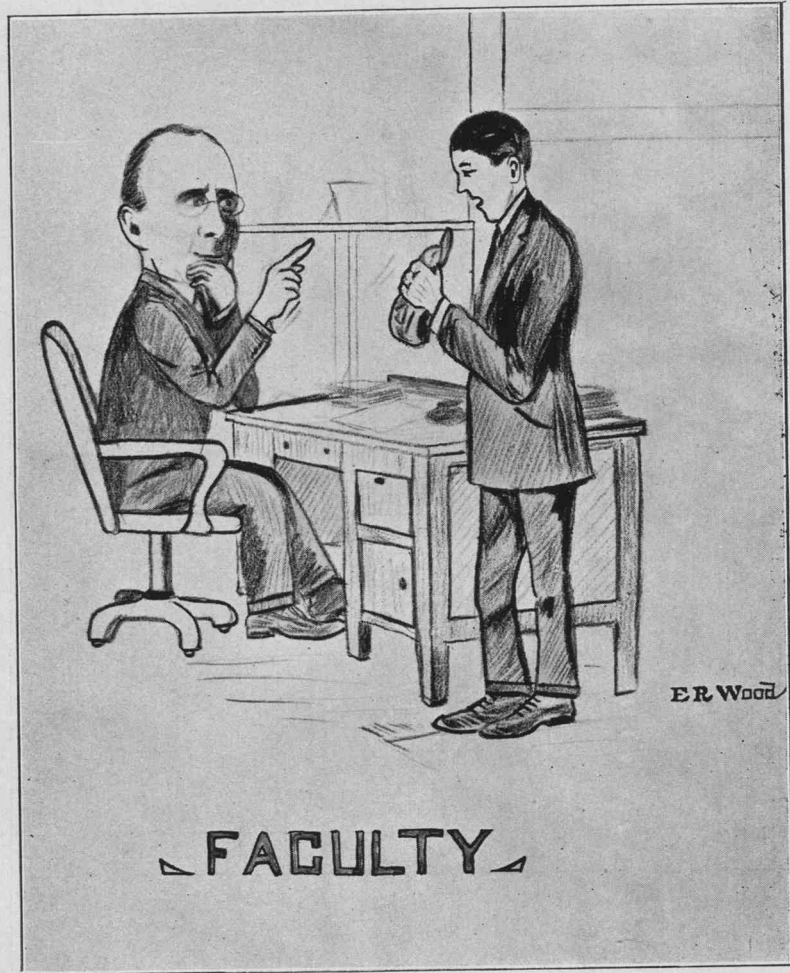
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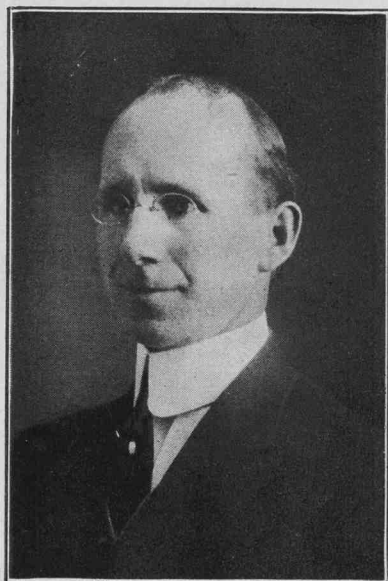


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FACULTY

The class of '24 won the class series for basketball and for debating, they were also healthy contributors to the Opera and athletics.



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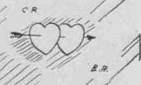
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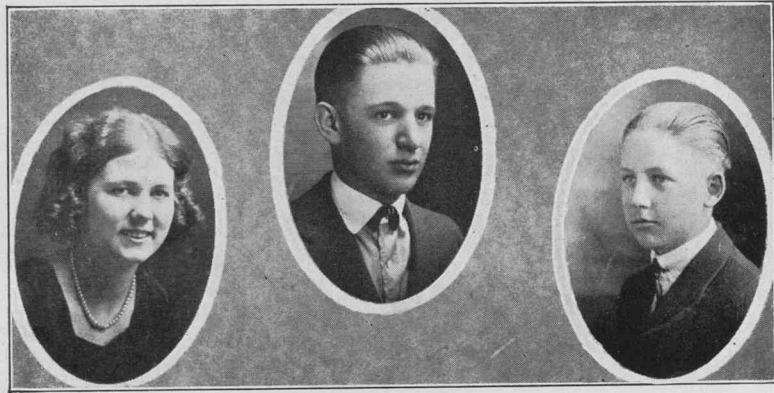

The State debating question for this year was Resolved: "That Utah should Establish a State Constabulary." Mr. William Funk and Mr. Eldred Bergeson representing the North Cache affirmative team won from Miss Dowdle and Mr. Larson of the South Cache negative team by a unanimous decision, at North Cache March 30, 1923.

The North Cache negative team represented by Mr. Vernal Seamons and Mr. Allen Bolschweiler won from the South Cache affirmative team, Mr. Campbell and Mr. Thatcher by unanimous decision at North Cache April 4, 1923. Our affirmative team won from the Logan High School negative team by two judges, April 14, 1923.

With such a splendid record North Cache was credited with the division championship for debating 1923.



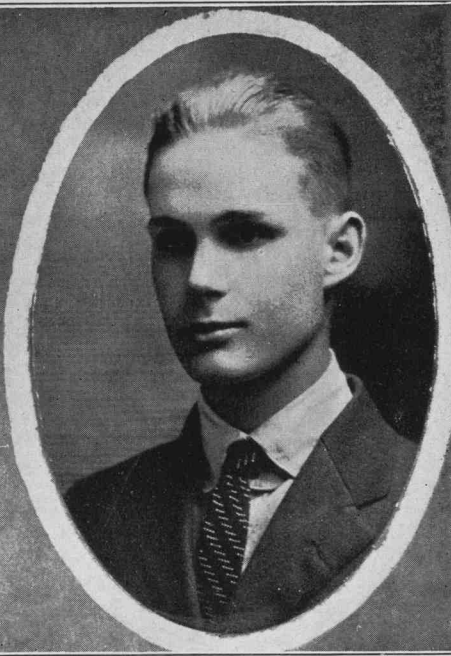

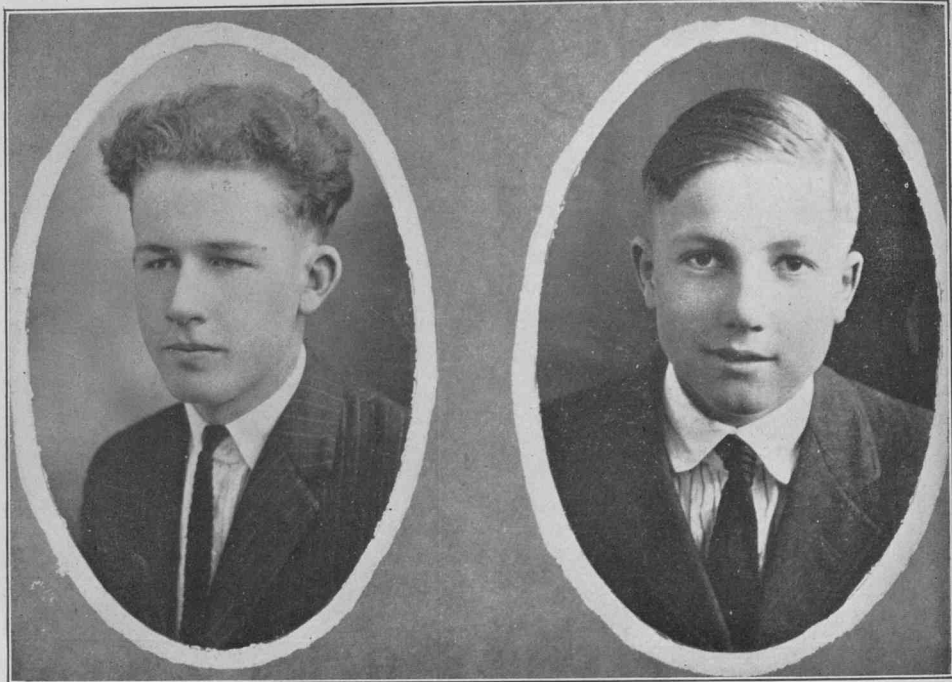

ATHLETICS



Coach C. B. Johnson

Coach Johnson a former athlete of the A. C. College began his coaching career for North Cache in 1917. Before this time Johnson captained the "A" basketball team, he was also a star performer in football and tennis.

Up until four years ago basketball was the main major sport at the school but *now* football is attracting much interest. Coach Johnson should receive much credit for this for in three years he has developed a football team that ranks high among the first and we look forward to the coming season as a most successful year.

Athletics 1923

While North Cache did not win a championship in any branch of athletics, her athletes brought recognition to the maroon and white. A better showing could have been made had it not been for the fact that both football and basketball teams were composed of nearly all new material who lacked experience.

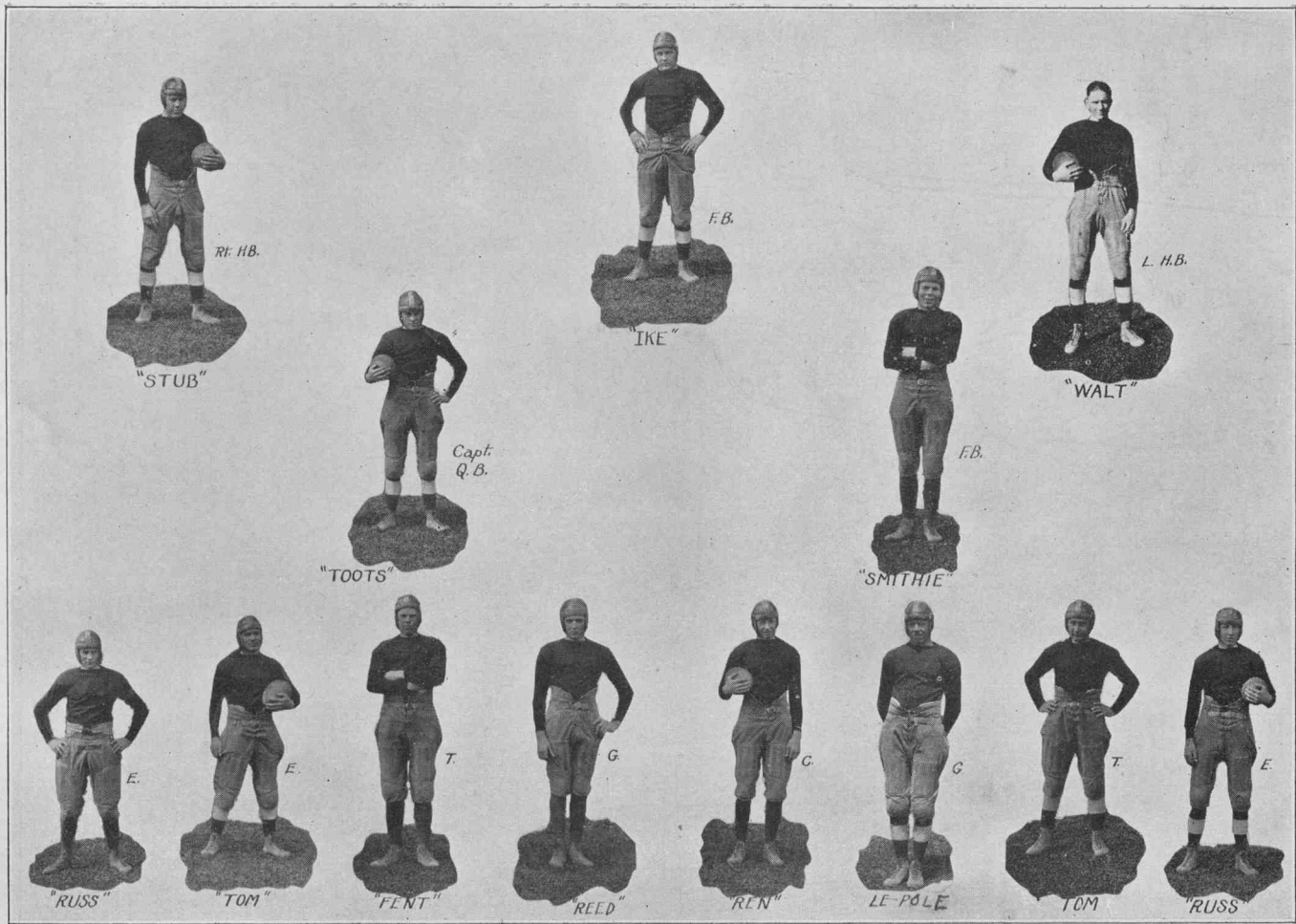
North Cache finished second among the four schools of the division in football, this was considered very good as Logan with practically all her old team back was the heavy favorite from the first. However, in the game to decide the championship North Cache held Logan to the score of 18-0, which was the lowest score that they had been held to by any of the schools.

Third place was the berth occupied by the maroon and white in basketball. Although Preston won the championship N. C. had the pleasure of winning one of the two games played with her. In the second game we fell short one point from tying the score.

Prospects for next year's team look bright as practically all of last year's men will be back to school. Since there was no adequate place to get in shape the track and field meet the N. C. athletes did not put in much training, but managed to nose out South Cache for 3rd place.

Tennis is just getting started at North Cache, so the disadvantage of playing on an indoor hard wood court proved bad for the team sent to Logan, who had to take fourth place in this event. A cement court is now being constructed, so from now on we will meet with no such disadvantage.

Taking into consideration that Coach Johnson had to work with new material in every branch of sport North Cache may feel proud that she took last place in only one event, Tennis, which is just being recognized by the schools of the state.
