
Our class of Sophomores is larger than any of the former classes, and with their talents, it shows a promising future. That of great orators, singers, actors, etc.


GIRLS' LEAGUE

A council, consisting of the president, vice president, secretary, and a representative from each class, constitutes the administrative body of the League.



"Oh Doctor," the High School opera this year proved beyond the shadow of a doubt that there is a great deal of musical talent at North Cache.


Under the direction of J. W. Pulsipher, the new music teacher, seventy-five students began work soon after Christmas. Every available minute from then on was "crammed" full with practice.
