Chemistry Students Go On Tour

The chemistry students with their teacher, Mr. Whiting, took a 335 mile trip Wednesday May 17, making a tour of Geneva Steel Plant and visiting Bingham Copper mine. The trip as rated by the students was said to be well worth the time and money spent not only from the education standpoint but for the fact that it opened the eyes of many to see some of the power that lies in this great country of ours.

The first stop was at Geneva Steel Plant, it was a test for the imagination to comprehend the immensity of it. It covers 1502 acres with an 312 acres reservoir for water to use in the process of making steel. Inside the plant they covered 14 miles by bus alone just going from building to building, and the rest of the time was spent walking through the factories witnessing the gigantic machinery at work. The factory produces enough electricity daily to supply all of Salt Lake with it's industrial area or enough to supply New York City without its industrial area.

After leaving Geneva the students stopped at Pleasant Grove High School to have lunch and then hurried on to Bingham.

At Bingham the students witnessed the biggest copper mine in the world.

The students proved to be very enthusiastic about the trip and suggest that more such field trips be taken at North Cache for the educational benefits they receive from them.

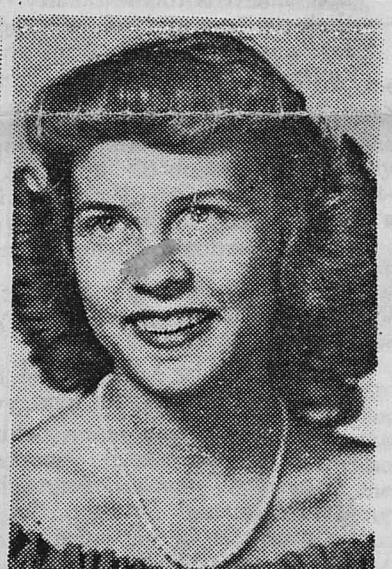
The male chorus will sing "Hark Listen to the Trumpeters", conducted by Carol Weeks and ac-

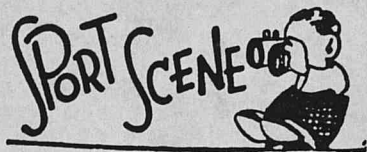

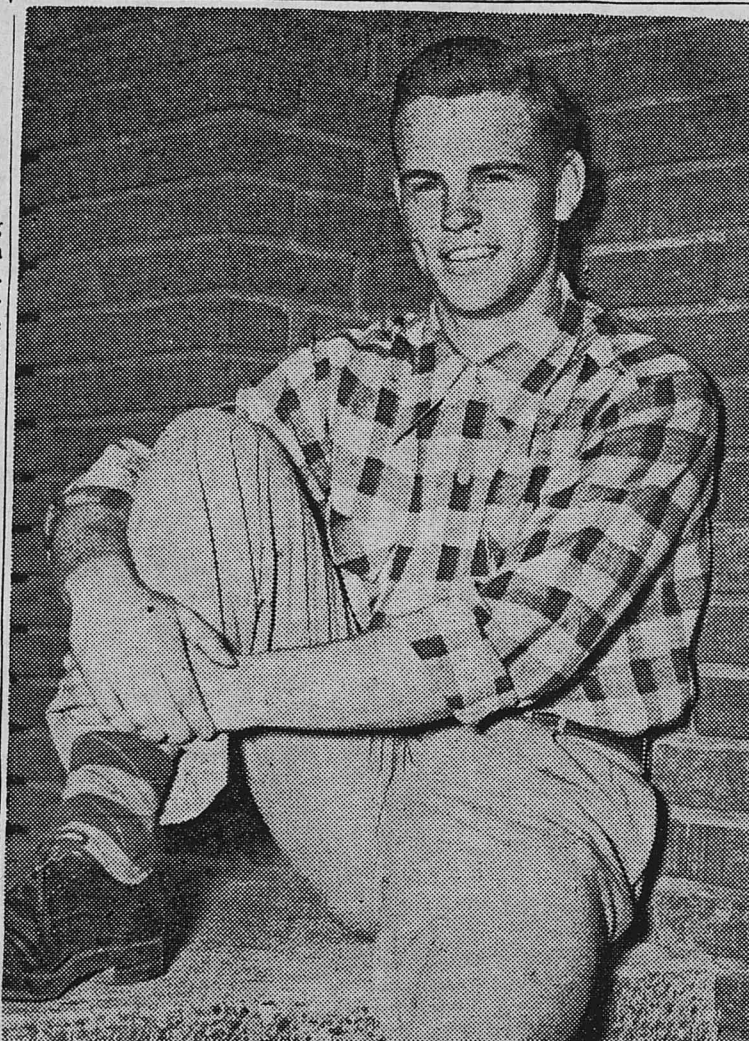
