

So So patiently they wait there For the day they know will be, When the big, wide doors will open And the students they will see.


Then the carefree, happy voices Will ring from every nook, Or softly whisper secrets 'Cross an ever-open book.








MATHEMATICS... INSTILLED IN STUDENTS




SOCIAL SCIENCES ...

HELPED THEM UNDERSTAND THEIR WORLD







FINE ARTS MADE POSSIBLE CULTURAL EXPRESSION









PHYSICAL EDUCATION




STUDENTBODY ... "SEEKING RECOGNITION"


STUDENT SENATE


SENIORS ... SOUGHT KNOWLEDGE IN


SOPHOMORES ... EAGER TO GAIN








ATHLETICS... "SEEKING PROWESS"


BASKETBALL... BROUGHT RECOGNITION







ORGANIZATIONS ... "SEEKING SELF EXPRESSION"


ACTIVITIES
