

















What's new?


Saturdays, holidays and after school until eight o'clock found cast members rehearsing for the musical, "1776."


The cast of 42 boys and four girls recreates the battles of Congress prior to the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

"Cool, Cool, Considerate Men."




















Show 'n Tell




Cheer






Anxious



Talent


Culture










Compete


Represent




Working through the summer vacation to prepare for the school year, the 1975-76

A new table to work around in the Executive room not only helped the Executive Council, but also the yearbook staff in the rush to meet their deadlines.


































New Program teaches Sophomores SPELLING








Nurses and students learn at Sunshine Terrace, Hospital





TACKLE



JV and Soph pull out with a 7-1, 5-3 record










Winning streak held by Junior Varsity



















Sophomores develop wrestling, skills, holds

CLINCH



















NC - SC unite, form SV Sophomore team
