






Statements Regarding Projects




- a) There will be upgraded fire safety systems installed at all neighborhood schools to meet current building and safety standards
- b) Deteriorating plumbing and restrooms would be upgraded and repaired throughout the District to meet current state and federal standards
- c) Electrical wiring and power would be upgraded in all classrooms to keep up with current and future computer and technology needs
- d) Permanent classrooms would be built to replace deteriorating temporary classrooms
- e) Classroom intercom and telephone systems would be installed or renovated in all classrooms to increase student safety
- f) Structural earthquake safety improvements would be made to school buildings as necessary
- g) Aging ventilation and heating systems would be replaced to make buildings safer, healthier and more energy efficient

Summary of Statements Against




- a) Spending more money on school buildings will not improve students' education
- b) Lowell Joint schools are in disrepair because of poor fiscal management
- c) The School Board cannot be trusted to spend the bond funds as it promised
- d) The economy is too weak to ask voters to approve a bond to improve schools

Summary of Statements in Support



- a) It is worth paying more in taxes to improve the schools, because we need a good school system to maintain homeowners' property values
- b) If the bond is passed, by law, a citizens oversight committee will review all expenditures from the bond in order to guarantee the money is spent as voters approved
- c) The District will receive over 17 million dollars in state grants to repair and construct local schools. If local voters DO NOT approve a bond Lowell Joint School District's 17 million dollars will be given to other California school districts that have passed a local school bond
- d) All 6 of our schools are over 45 years old and require major repairs and upgrades
- e) Every school in the District will receive repairs and upgrades if a local bond is passed
- f) The proposed repairs and upgrades will reduce water and energy bills, allowing the district to dedicate more funds to the classroom
