

It was a Hollywood ending for a senior class who deserved nothing less. Bright skies greeted guests as they assembled for the Lynbrook High School Class of 2017 commencement ceremony. But as the speeches progressed, ominous thunderclouds began rolling in. Little raindrops could be felt as Principal Joseph Rainis made his way through the alphabet, and it looked like everyone might soon have to run for cover. But the rain held out, the last graduate received his diploma, mortarboards went flying and cheers rang out. The graduates dashed from the field, as the storm miraculously passed them by, hinting at a promising opening to "Class of 2017: The Sequel."

In her salutatory address, Hannah Burton spoke about achieving the seemingly unachievable. Diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes when she was in kindergarten, Hannah learned to cope and overcome the struggles she faced. "Everyone has different struggles, different obstacles and different distractions," she said, "but there is no challenge too big to overcome if you remain focused, motivated and zealous."

Valedictorian Thomas Postiglione recalled memories of high school and looked ahead to new beginnings. Speaking of life lessons they learned in high school, he said, "Success is not attributed to one individual. We all need each other to succeed. Don't try to be someone you are not. Instead, find your passion and pursue it." Looking ahead to the future, he said, "Dream big and never give up. Shoot for the moon because you will land among the stars."

Using a clever acronym, Principal Joseph Rainis addressed the Class of 2017 about sticking to the FACTs. He advised them to face their fears, have a positive attitude, show good character and use their time wisely. "Do not let fear limit your dreams or crush your goals," he said of fear. "Life is 10 percent what happens to me and 90 percent how I react to it," he said of attitude. When speaking of character, he told them to "live so that when your children think of fairness and integrity, they think of you." And of time, he said, "Get busy investing in your greatest asset because, in the game of life, time runs out and we never know when the buzzer will sound."

Superintendent of Schools Dr. Melissa Burak encouraged the graduates to take inspiration from the life and work of Louis Armstrong and his famous rendition of "What a Wonderful World."

"The world is waiting for what these graduates can offer," she said. "You already possess the passion to help others. Follow your passions. Sharpen your skills. Don't let others dampen your spirit. Please continue to make the world a better and more wonderful place for all of us."

LHS VALEDICTORIAN THOMAS POSTIGLIONE: *The Real Deal*

With a GPA of 101.72 and 10 rigorous college-level Advanced Placement courses under his belt, Lynbrook High School valedictorian Thomas Postiglione has had an impressive academic career, but he has also proven that he is more than the sum of his GPA.

"Grades are important, but your sanity is more important," said Thomas. "Make sure you're happy and do things you enjoy. Everyone is different and no one is perfect, find your niche and enjoy high school."

An AP Scholar with Honor, he was the 2015 school winner in the American Mathematics Competition and a 2016 silver medalist in the Al Kalfus Long Island Math Fair. As captain, he led the high school team to a fourth place finish in the 2016 Brookhaven National Laboratory Long Island High School Regional Science Bowl. Thomas said that his most memorable experiences in high school came through his participation in the science research program. He received honorable mention from the 2015 Long Island Science Congress, and submitted research to the Regeneron Science Talent Search.

But with all this success to his credit, Thomas says he has come to realize that failure is also a part of life. "We are meant to learn



from these experiences," he said.
"If you haven't failed at something at some point in your life then you're either not pushing your limits or you are extremely lucky."

Outside of school, Thomas attended special programs in engineering and mathematics at Cornell University, Johns Hopkins University and SUNY Old Westbury. His interest in technology inspired him to become a volunteer for e-Nable,

an online community that assembles 3-D printed prosthetic hands for people in need. He also volunteered at MercyFirst, helping struggling Long Islanders improve their lives by expanding their knowledge of robotics and 3-D technologies. In addition to all of these interests and accomplishments, he was also a member of the varsity baseball team.

"I would like people to remember me for who I am as a person rather than my grades," said Thomas. "Through my high school years, I have always tried my best to be kind, caring, and considerate. I would like to be remembered as a friend to all."

This winning combination of character and commitment to excellence will surely serve him well as he heads off to Yale, where he hopes to pursue a dual major in mechanical engineering and economics.

LHS SALUTATORIAN HANNAH BURTON: Working to Fulfill a Dream

Salutatorian Hannah Burton has that rare gift for turning adversity into opportunity. Diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes when she was in kindergarten, Hannah has been actively involved in furthering diabetes research and education. As she heads off to Cornell University in the fall, she has dreams of continuing what has become her life's work by becoming an endocrinologist.

"Ever since my diagnosis, I have had a passion for helping others who are just like me," said Hannah. "My doctors have made such a huge impact on my life and I want to do the same for other children with diabetes."

She has been honored for her involvement in Winthrop University Hospital's Pediatric Diabetes Program, where she proposed a research idea that she worked on developing with the pediatric endocrinology department. She also volunteers as a Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation youth advocacy leader, was a four-time JDRF Walk to Cure Diabetes team leader, and mentors children with Type 1 diabetes.

Hannah, who has a natural mind for math and science, was the school winner in the



2016 American Mathematics
Competition, and has participated in the DuPont Challenge
Science Essay Competition, the Toshiba/NSTA ExploraVision
Competition, the Long Island
Science Congress and the Nassau
County Science Competition. A student leader, she was a fouryear member of the Student
Government Association and served as class president her sophomore through senior years.

In addition, she was a member of the varsity tennis and track and field teams.

But all of these accomplishments did not come effortlessly to Hannah. "If you want to succeed, you have to work at it," she said. "You have to bypass the obstacles, ignore the distractions and remain focused on the work in front of you."

When asked to offer words of advice to entering freshmen, she said, "Try out everything that interests you and narrow down your activities to the ones that you feel most passionate about."

This formula has provided Hannah with a recipe for the sweetest kind of success—the kind that comes from working hard for causes true to the heart.

"The thing I enjoyed the most about middle school was changing classes and having the experience of learning from so many different teachers. Next year I am looking forward to a whole new environment at the high school, with new teachers, new opportunities and new challenges. 
High School, Here We Come!
