Course Description	8th Grade Honors Language Arts is an accelerated learning environment, which requires students to work more independently in class and at home. Students are required to read at and above grade-level texts independently and at an accelerated pace. To help students prepare for college and future careers, the foundation for 8th Grade Honors Language Arts stems from the Alabama College and Career Read Standards for incoming 8th graders who will eventually progress to 9th Grade Pre-AP English. Student will collaboratively then independently participate in the research process and compose a published product of their findings. Students will also implement Madison City's writing curriculum, Claim-Data-Commentary in written responses. Reading, writing, speaking, listening, and collaborative strategies are used purposefully to build knowledge and skills and to help students become independent readers, writers, and thinkers as they transition into high school. The primary goals of the course are to foster independent learning, encourage in-depth exploration of the content, and develop academic habit of mind. Outside/home and summer reading are required.				
Course Objectives	Students will develop and strengthen critical thinking skills by reading, comprehending, and engaging with both literary and informational texts. Students will make text-to-text, text-to-world, and text-to-self connections. Students will be able to identify, define, and duplicate examples of figurative language found in texts. They will demonstrate their understanding of the text through various formative and summative assessments. Students will display the convergence of their independent thoughts and textual examples in the writing of paragraphs and essays, as well as develop clear and concise writing skills through the execution of writing assignments and the application of proofreading and editing skills. Students will also improve their writing through the increased understanding and application of grammar, mechanics, and vocabulary skills. Students will be able to respectfully engage critically and constructively in a dialogue of ideas through class discussion, small group assignments, and project-based learning. Students will develop and display clear written and verbal communication skills.

LMS General Classroom Expectations	 No cell phones allowed during instructional time. Keep all personal electronic devices (cell phones, air pods, headphones, tablets, etc.) stored in a backpack and silenced during class. Be seated and ready for class when the bell rings. Students repeatedly tardy to class will receive a detention per LMS policy. Come prepared for class. Bring all necessary supplies, including homework. Bring your school-issued Chromebook (fully charged) and charger daily. Respect your teacher, your classmates, and yourself. Listen and follow directions. If it's not yours, don't touch it. Keep your hands and feet to yourself. If you break something, be prepared to replace it (This also applies to school technology). The teacher dismisses the class, not the bell. All students must follow the Madison City Schools Code of Conduct. 			
MCS Technology & Cell Phone Procedures	Students should bring their MCS chromebooks and chargers to class each day. Teachers monitor student activity and participation; however, students are responsible for their activity on school-issued devices and using their MCS accounts. Cell phones and earbuds/headphones will not be allowed to be used during classroom instruction time. Phones and earbuds/headphones will be put away in a location designated by the teacher and placed in silent mode. Students will have access to their phones and earbuds/headphones outside of classroom instruction time, such as between classes and during lunch, but devices should be put away when students are in the serving line. Failure to follow these procedures will result in a disciplinary referral to the office.

MCS Grading Policy	60% = Assessments (Tests, Essays, Projects) 40% = Daily Grades (Classwork, Quizzes, Homework) Writing assignments <i>may</i> be assessed using Turnitin.com.			
Late Work Policy	10% will be deducted off the assignment per week late. After three weeks, the maximum grade a student can receive on a late assignment is 65%. Each unit will have a cut-off date for late work. After this date, no work from the unit will be accepted.			
Make-up Work/Test Policy	Students with excused absences will be allowed to make-up all work within THREE (3) days of returning to school per excused absence. It is the student's responsibility to ask for make-up work. Students are asked to check SCHOOLOGY for any work missed in class. There is a weekly folder where the lesson will be available to access. Students can connect with a classmate and/or ask the teacher for help. After the three day window for make-up work, the late work policy will become applicable. Work that is not made up will become a zero (including quizzes/tests).			
Test Failure Policy	Students scoring a 64% or below on a test/assessment will be provided an opportunity to complete an additional task (at teacher's discretion) to earn up to a 65%.			
Required Novels	Novels are required for purchase at the Honors level. Novels to be purchased: • The Outsiders by S. E. Hinton • Fahrenheit 451 by Ray Bradbury • Twelfth Night by William Shakespeare (No Fear Shakespeare version) • The Alchemist by Paulo Coelho Novel sales will begin in August. More information will be shared in class soon. Students will have the option to purchase books through the LMS ELA department fundraiser.			
Homework	At the honors level, students are required to complete reading outside of class. In addition to the required outside reading, students may need to complete unfinished classwork at home. Students will be required to review and study for major assignments at home.
