Textbook Information	Discovering our Past: A History of the World. Published by McGraw Hill Textbooks will be used as a supplemental resource in the classroom and will not be checked out to students.
Course Description	This course covers World History from prehistoric times to the year 1500 and is aligned with the <u>Alabama Course</u> of <u>Study Social Studies Standards</u> . Content standards for this grade incorporate the strands of economics, geography, history, and political science. The curriculum encompasses the migrations of early peoples, the rise of civilizations, the establishment of governments and religions, the growth of economic systems, and the ways in which these events shaped the world.
Course Objectives	Students will analyze the development of government and legal systems. They will examine the history and impact of major religious and philosophical traditions as well as the connections between developments in science and technology and the growth of industrial economies. Students will learn to analyze a variety of primary and secondary sources such as biographies, autobiographies, novels, speeches, letters, artifacts, poetry, music, and works of art to support this study.

Cell Phone Procedures	Cell phones and earbuds/headphones will not be allowed to be used during classroom instruction time. Phones and earbuds/headphones will be put away in a location designated by the teacher and placed in silent mode. In secondary schools, students will have access to their phones and earbuds/headphones outside of classroom instruction time, such as between classes and during lunch, but devices should be put away when students are in the lunch serving line. Failure to follow these procedures will result in a disciplinary referral to the office.

Late Work Procedures	Students present in class on the day of instruction are expected to turn in all in-class and out-of-class assignments on time. Late work will be accepted for up to 1 letter grade deduction each school day until the unit test is administered to the student not to exceed 50% deduction of points. No work will be accepted after the unit test. Late work will only be accepted after the student completes the <u>late assignment google form</u> online. No assignment will be graded and input into PowerSchool until this form is completed. Students need to talk to Mrs. Breeden about late work and determine a new due date if necessary.
Make-up Work/Test Policy	Students with excused absences will be allowed to make-up all work within three days of returning to school. It is the student's responsibility to ask for make-up work. Students can get with a classmate or ask the teacher for help. Work that is not made up will become a zero (including quizzes/tests). Make-up tests are completed before or after school and must be arranged in advance.
Technology	Student laptops should not be hard-wired to the network or have print capabilities. Discs, flash drives, jump drives, or other USB devices are not allowed on Madison City computers. Neither the teacher nor the school is responsible for broken, stolen, or lost laptops. Laptops and other electronic devices will be used at the teacher's individual discretion.
Cheating/Plagiarism	A student who cheats will not receive credit for the work in question. If any other student has cooperated in cheating, that student is also considered to have cheated and will not receive credit. Cheating students will also be subject to the consequences in the disciplinary consequences in Section XXII of this CSC. Cheating is defined to include, but is not limited to: (a) copying someone else's work in or out of class and identifying and submitting it as your own (b) failing to quote and/or list appropriate citations for material derived from published sources (including the Internet) and identifying and submitting it as your own (c) the use of unauthorized notes, other materials, or assistance during the accomplishment of graded work in or out of class (d) any other situation in which the student attempts to or accepts credit for work not his or her own.
