| Course Description | To help students prepare for college and future careers, the foundation for 8th Grade Language Arts stems from the Alabama College and Career Ready Standards for incoming 8th graders who will eventually progress to 9th grade Language Arts. The content standards focus on four specific areas: reading, writing, speaking and listening, and language. In 8th grade, students will analyze a variety of literature and informational text. The reading standards will require students to read and analyze a variety of fiction and informational texts to determine how literary devices interact, identify central themes, examine author's craft, and support these findings with textual evidence. Students will be guided through the research and writing process to produce writing in the narrative, expository, and persuasive modes along with guiding and implementing the Madison City writing curriculum, Claim-Data-Commentary. In addition, students will engage effectively in a variety of collaborative discussions and adapt speech to a variety of contexts and tasks along with building on and responding to the ideas of others. |
| Course Objectives | Students will develop and strengthen critical thinking skills by reading, comprehending, and engaging with both literary and informational texts. Students will make text-to-text, text-to-world, and text-to-self connections. Students will be able to identify, define, and duplicate examples of figurative language found in texts. They will demonstrate their understanding of the text through various formative and summative assessments. Students will display the convergence of their independent thoughts and textual examples in the writing of paragraphs and essays, as well as develop clear and concise writing skills through the execution of writing assignments and the application of proofreading and editing skills. Students will also improve their writing through the increased understanding and application of grammar, mechanics, and vocabulary skills. Students will be able to respectfully engage critically and constructively in a dialogue of ideas through class discussion, small group assignments, and project-based learning. Students will develop and display clear written and verbal communication skills. |

| MCS Technology & Cell Phone Procedures | Students should bring their MCS chromebooks and chargers to class each day. Teachers monitor student activity and participation; however, students are responsible for their activity on school-issued devices and using their MCS accounts. Phones and earbuds/headphones will be put away in a location designated by the teacher and placed in silent mode. | MCS Grading Policy | 60% = Assessments (Tests, Essays, Projects) 40% = Daily Grades (Quizzes, Homework, Classwork, and Participation) Writing may be assessed using Turnitin.com |
| Late Work Policy | 10% will be deducted off the assignment per week late. After three weeks, the maximum grade a student can receive on a late assignment is 65%. Each unit will have a cut-off date for late work. After this date, no work from the unit will be accepted. |
| Make-up Work/ Test Policy | Students with excused absences will be allowed to make-up all work within THREE (3) days of returning to school per excused absence. It is the student's responsibility to ask for make-up work. Students are asked to check SCHOOLOGY for any work missed in class. There is a weekly folder where the lesson will be available to access. Students can connect with a classmate and/or ask the teacher for help. After the three day window for make-up work, the late work policy will become applicable. Work that is not made up will become a zero (including quizzes/tests). |
| Test Failure Policy | Students scoring a 64% or below on a test/assessment will be provided an opportunity to complete an additional task (at teacher's discretion) to earn up to a 65%. |
| Novel Sale | Novels available for purchase (recommended but not required): • The Outsiders by S.E. Hinton • Iqbal by Francesco D'Adamo Novel sales will begin in August. More information will be shared in class soon. Students will have the option to purchase books through the LMS ELA department fundraiser. |
| Homework | Students may have homework if classwork is not completed during the class block. Students will be required to review and study for major assignments/assessments at home. |
