| <p>Course Description</p> | <p>8th Grade Honors Language Arts is an accelerated learning environment, which requires students to work more independently in class and at home. Students are required to read at and above grade-level texts independently and at an accelerated pace. To help students prepare for college and future careers, the foundation for 8th Grade Honors Language Arts stems from the Alabama College and Career Ready Standards for incoming 8th graders who will eventually progress to 9th Grade Pre-AP English. Students will collaboratively then independently participate in the research process and compose a published product of their findings. Students will also implement Madison City's writing curriculum, Claim-Data-Commentary in written responses. Reading, writing, speaking, listening, and collaborative strategies are used purposefully to build knowledge and skills and to help students become independent readers, writers, and thinkers as they transition into high school. The primary goals of the course are to foster independent learning, encourage in-depth exploration of the content, and develop academic habits of mind.</p> <p>Outside/home and summer reading are required.</p> |
| <p>Course Objectives</p> | <p>Students will develop and strengthen critical thinking skills by reading, comprehending, and engaging with both literary and informational texts. Students will make text-to-text, text-to-world, and text-to-self connections. Students will be able to identify, define, and duplicate examples of figurative language found in texts. They will demonstrate their understanding of the text through various formative and summative assessments. Students will display the convergence of their independent thoughts and textual examples in the writing of paragraphs and essays, as well as develop clear and concise writing skills through the execution of writing assignments and the application of proofreading and editing skills. Students will also improve their writing through the increased understanding and application of grammar, mechanics, and vocabulary skills. Students will be able to respectfully engage critically and constructively in a dialogue of ideas through class discussion, small group assignments, and project-based learning. Students will develop and display clear written and verbal communication skills.</p> |

| MCS Technology and Cell Phone Procedures | <p>Students should bring their MCS chromebooks and chargers to class each day. Teachers monitor student activity and participation; however, students are responsible for their activity on school-issued devices and using their MCS accounts.</p> <p>Cell phones and earbuds/headphones will not be allowed to be used during classroom instruction time. Phones and earbuds/headphones will be put away in a location designated by the teacher and placed in silent mode. Students will have access to their phones and earbuds/headphones outside of classroom instruction time, such as between classes and during lunch, but devices should be put away when students are in the serving line. Failure to follow these procedures will result in a disciplinary referral to the office.</p> |
| Progressive Discipline (LMS Policy) | <p>Liberty Middle School Classroom Management Plan:</p> <p>Step 1: Verbal warning</p> <p>Step 2: Student/teacher conference with parent notification</p> <p>Step 3: Parent contact/conference</p> <p>Step 4: Detention</p> <p>Step 5: Referral to administration for repeat Class I violations and initial Class II and Class III offenses (Madison City Schools Code of Conduct)</p> |
| Grading Policy (MCS Policy) | <p>60% = Assessments (Tests, Essays, Projects)</p> <p>40% = Daily Grades (Classwork, Quizzes, Homework)</p> <p>Writing assignments may be assessed using Turnitin.com.</p> |
| Late Work Policy | <p>10% will be deducted off the assignment per week late. After three weeks, the maximum grade a student can receive on a late assignment is 65%. Each unit will have a cutoff date for late work. After this date, no late work for the unit will be accepted.</p> |
| Make-up Work/Test Policy | <p>Students with excused absences will be allowed to make-up all work within THREE (3) days of returning to school per excused absence. It is the student's responsibility to ask for make-up work. Students can connect with a classmate or ask the teacher for help. After the three day window for make-up work, the late work policy will become applicable. Work that is not made up will become a zero (including quizzes/tests).</p> |
| Test Failure Policy | <p>Students who score a 64% or below on a test/assessment may complete an additional task at teacher's discretion to earn a grade up to 65%.</p> |

For each assignment submitted on Schoology after the deadline, a Late/Missing Work Submission Form must be completed in order to receive a grade.</p> <p>If a student is absent on the day of the test, it is the student's responsibility to communicate with Mrs. Butler to schedule a day/time to make up the test. To receive credit, tests must be made up within three days of an absence.</p> |
