Textbook Information	T'es branché, Level 1, Carnegie Learning - This text will be used as a supplemental resource.
Course Description	This course focuses on the language learner's ability to communicate about topics relating to themselves, such as self-description, basic needs, daily activities, preferences, everyday conversation, family, and friends. Students will read, listen to, speak, and write the target language at the novice level. Students will explore various aspects of target culture through authentic texts and speech, visuals, and hands-on learning. The final grade is calculated in the student's high school GPA. Upon successful completion of Level I French, the student receives a Carnegie Unit towards graduation.
Course Objectives	 Students will be able to: Communicate on familiar topics using words, phrases and simple sentences (sometimes memorized) Ask and answer simple questions and give basic information Write brief paragraphs about familiar topics in present tense Restate information using present and immediate future time frames on everyday life Read and understand simple texts on familiar topics and sometimes locate the main idea Understand words, phrases and simple sentences on familiar topics and sometimes the main topic of what is being said Present basic information on familiar topics Recite songs and short skits Gesture to enhance comprehension, use connecting words, prepositions and high frequency phrases Appreciate French culture around the world!
Course Outline	 Unit 1: Greetings and introductions, the French alphabet, accents, and pronunciation Unit 2: Preferences of pastimes and sports, weather, numbers, food Unit 3: Classroom objects and school subjects, telling time, places in school and the city Unit 4: Soccer and soccer clothes, the French café Unit 5: Family members, physical and character descriptions, dates, French-speaking countries and nationalities Unit 6: the French market and French foods Other cultural units include: Paris, the French-speaking world, French holidays, French music and commercials, French café culture, the game of pétanque, and much more!

Classroom Expectations	 Be on time and in class daily. Be prepared with an organized notebook and other supplies. Be alert and <u>active</u> in class activities. <u>Listen quietly and respectfully</u> when others are talking or during instruction. Respect your surroundings, classmates, and teacher. Keep your hands to yourself! Be open to trying new things and stepping outside of your comfort zone. We all make mistakes me too! Focus on what you can do instead of what you cannot do in French - you are a beginner, and perfect performance in French is neither expected nor required.

Late Work Policy	Students present in class on the day of instruction are expected to turn in all in-class and out-of-class assignments on time. Students will have one week to turn in assignments for excused absences. After one week, the assignment will result in a 0.
Make-up Work/Test Policy	Under normal circumstances, it is expected that students will submit previously assigned work upon return to school after an excused absence. All work missed on the day(s) of excused absences must be made up within a timeframe determined by the teacher.

Technology	Student laptops should not be hard-wired to the network or have print capabilities. Discs, flash drives, jump drives, or other USB devices are not allowed on Madison City computers. Neither the teacher nor the school is responsible for broken, stolen, or lost laptops. Laptops and other electronic devices will be used at the teacher's individual discretion.
Cell Phone Procedures	Cell phones and earbuds/headphones will not be allowed to be used during classroom instruction time. Phones and earbuds/headphones will be put away in a location designated by the teacher and placed in silent mode. In secondary schools, students will have access to their phones and earbuds/headphones outside of classroom instruction time, such as between classes and during lunch, but devices should be put away when students are in the lunch serving line. Failure to follow these procedures will result in a disciplinary referral to the office.

Statement on use of translators	Use of an online translator (e.g. Google Translate) is considered <u>academic dishonesty and plagiarism</u> . The assignment will receive a zero, and the student will be required to redo the assignment to show his/her own work and then partial credit will be considered. Multiple infractions will result in parent contact and office referral. Copying another student's work will also be treated as academic dishonesty and plagiarism for all students involved. Perfect language is not the goal, nor is it expected in this course. We want to see YOUR work only.
Cheating/Plagiarism	A student who cheats will not receive credit for the work in question. If any other student has cooperated in cheating, that student is also considered to have cheated and will not receive credit. Cheating students will also be subject to the consequences in the disciplinary consequences in Section XXII of this CSC. Cheating is defined to include, but is not limited to: (a) copying someone else's work in or out of class and identifying and submitting it as your own (b) failing to quote and/or list appropriate citations for material derived from published sources (including the Internet) and identifying and submitting it as your own (c) the use of unauthorized notes, other materials, or assistance during the accomplishment of graded work in or out of class (d) any other situation in which the student attempts to or accepts credit for work not his or her own.
