Interagency Access Pass - Inclusive to the blind or permanently disabled

The Interagency Access Passport is a lifetime entrance pass to most national parks, monuments, historic sites, recreation areas, and national wildlife refuges that charge an entrance fee. The Passport admits the pass holder and up to 3 accompanying passengers in a private vehicle. The Passport also provides a 50% discount on federal use fees charged for facilities and services such as camping, swimming, parking, and cave tours. Available to citizens or permanent residents who are medically determined to be blind or permanently disabled.

Little League Challengers - Inclusive to all abilities and neurodivergent

Challenger Division Teams are coed with players ages 4 - 18, or 22 if participating in transition programs. Each team plays 8 - 12 games per season beginning in late April or early May and continuing through June. A soft tee ball is used and players may hit off a tee or from a pitch thrown by an adult or older youth. Children with many kinds of challenges are welcome, including Down Syndrome, autism, Spinal Bifida, cerebral palsy, Asperger's Syndrome, visual or hearing impairments, seizure disorder, and wheelchair users. Nearly half of our new referrals are children and youth with a primary diagnosis of autism spectrum disorder or mental health and behavioral disorders. Our Intake and Outreach team works with families to identify the program and level of care that best meets their needs. Programs include service coordination, skill builders, wraparound facilitation, and healthy transitions.

Our **Service Coordinators** work one-on-one with youth, ages 0-23, and their families to assist with education-based questions or concerns, systems applications and paperwork, resource navigation, meeting attendance, and call-in support.

Our **Skill Builders** are Qualified Mental Health Associates who provide on-site support for youth who experience escalated emotions at elementary and middle schools in the Bethel and Junction City School Districts.

Wraparound Facilitation is a long-term, intensive planning process that follows a series of steps to help youth and their families to be successful. They serve youth, ages 0-17, in Lane County with significant behavioral and emotional needs. Facilitators spend time getting to know each family and their story and then help the family build a team around the youth, including professionals and natural supports. They lead monthly team meetings and provide resources and support along the way.

Healthy Transitions positively impacts transition-age youth, ages 16-25, who live in Lane County. They improve access to support and community opportunities for youth who experience mental health challenges, might be outside traditional settings, are marginalized, or are at risk of disconnection from services. Healthy Transitions develops supportive relationships, improves life trajectories, promotes self-discovery and independence, and empowers youth and young adults to reach their goals. Services include Peer Support Specialists and Support Groups, Mental Health Counseling, Resource Navigation, Youth Empowerment, and Leadership Opportunities.
