

What is a Title I school?

- Title I was passed in 1965 under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). It is the largest federal assistance program for our nation's schools.
- Title I schools receive extra funding (Title I dollars) from the federal government. These dollars are used to:
 - identify students experiencing academic difficulties and help to these students
 - purchase additional staff, programs, materials, and/or supplies
 - conduct parent and family engagement meetings, trainings, events, and/or activities.

What are my rights?

- The families and parents of Title I students have a right, by law, to:
 - □ be involved in decisions made at both the school and district level
 - be provided with information on your child's level of achievement on tests in reading/language arts, writing, mathematics, and science
 - request and receive information on the qualifications of your child's teacher and paraprofessionals who are working with your child, please contact Dr. Ford at <u>mford@mauryk12.org</u>
 - request opportunities for regular meetings to formulate suggestions and to participate, as appropriate, in decisions about the education of your child. The school is required to respond to any such suggestions as soon as practicably possible.

What can Title I funds be used for?

- In general, Title I funds may be used for:
 - □ smaller class sizes
 - □ additional teachers and paraprofessionals
 - □ additional training for school staff
 - □ extra time for instruction (before and/or after school programs)
 - □ parent and family engagement activities, and/or
 - □ a variety of supplemental teaching materials, equipment, and technology.

How does our school use Title I funds?

How does our school use Title I funds?

In **2023-2024**, our school was allotted approximately **\$415,110** in Title I funds. We developed a Schoolwide Program, which means we plan to spend our funds on the following:

- Supplemental staff:
 - □ One full time Title I Facilitator/Interventionist
 - □ Four full time Title I Interventionists
 - □ One 120 Day Interventionist
- Programs/Materials/Supplies:
 - Supplemental supplies and equipment
 - Instructional Equipment
- Teacher Professional Development:
 - Balanced Instruction

What is the SIP?

• The SIP is the School Improvement Plan. It includes:

- the identification of the school planning team and how they will be engaged in the planning process
- □ a needs assessment and summary of academic and non-academic data
- prioritized goals, strategies, and action steps to help address the academic and non-academic needs of students
- □ teacher and staff professional development needs
- □ budgets and the coordination of resources
- The school must include family representatives on our school planning team.

What are our schoolwide program goals?

- By the end of 3rd grade, all students will be on grade level in reading as measured by State testing or other District benchmarks.
- By the end of 4th grade, all students will be on grade level for math as measured by State testing or other District benchmarks.
- By the end of each grade level, all students will be proficient in appropriate technology skills as measured by our school technology plan.
- All students will be critical thinkers, using our Engineering Design Process to solve problems in academics and real-world scenarios.

What curriculum does our school use?

- The Tennessee Academic Standards provide a common set of expectations for what students will know and be able to do at the end of a grade for each subject area.
- Tennessee's academic standards form the framework for everything taught at Randolph Howell Elementary STEM School.

How is parent and family engagement funded?

- Any district with a Title I allocation exceeding \$500,000 is required by law to set aside 1% of it's Title I allocation for parent and family engagement.
- Of that 1%, 10% may be reserved at the district for system-wide initiatives related to parent and family engagement. The remaining 90% must be allocated to all Title I schools in the district.
- You, as Title I parents and family members, have the right to be involved in how this money is spent.

School Plan for Shared Student Achievement

What is it?

This is a plan that describes how Randolph Howell Elementary STEM School will provide opportunities to improve family engagement to support student learning, RHESS values the contributions and involvement of families to establish an equal partnership for the common goal of improving student achievement. This plan describes the different ways that RHESS will support family engagement and how families can help plan and participate in activities and events to promote student learning at school and at home.

How is it revised?

RHESS invited all families to attend our annual School Forum last spring to review and revise this parent and family engagement policy, as well as the school improvement plan, our school-parent compact, and the family engagement budget. Additionally, family input and comments regarding this plan are welcome during the school year through an online form. The plan is posted on our school website for families to view and submit feedback throughout the year. All feedback received during the year will be used to revise the plan for the next school year. We also distribute an annual survey online and by mail to ask parents for their suggestions on the plan and the use of funds for family engagement. Families can also give feedback during several meetings and activities during the school year.

Who is it for?

All students participating in the Title I, Part A program, and their families are encouraged and invited to fully participate in the opportunities described in this plan. RHIESS will provide full opportunity for the participation of parents and family members with limited English, with disabilities, and of migratory children.

Where is it available?

The plan will be posted on the school website and social media. Families can also retrieve a copy of the plan in the front office of the school.

What is Title I?

Randolph Howell Elementary STEM School is identified as a Title I school as part of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). Title I is designed to support State and local school reform efforts tied to the challenging State academic standards to improve teaching and learning for students. Title I programs must be based on effective means of improving student achievement and include strategies to support family engagement. All Title I schools must jointly develop with parents and family members a written parent and family engagement policy.

2023-2024 District Goals

Math:

For the 2023-2024 school year, the district will improve the TNReady percentage of all students (K12) and student groups who meet or exceed expectations across all grade hands.

Performance Measure:

For grades K-2, increase the percentage of students above the 75th percentile in the national norms on the universal screener.
For grades 3-8 TNReady, increase the percentage of students who meet and exceed expectations from 25.7% to 35%.
For SWD 3-8 TNReady, increase the percentage of students who meet and exceed expectations from 10.9% to 18%.
For ED 3-8 TNReady, increase the percentage of students who meet and exceed expectations from 11.9% to 23%.
For B 3-8 TNReady, increase the percentage of students who meet and exceed expectations from 11.9% to 23%.
For B 3-8 TNReady, increase the percentage of students who meet and exceed expectations from 9.2% to 20.6%.
For BHN 3-8 TNReady, increase the percentage of students who meet and exceed expectations from 11.4% to 22.5%.

Reading:

For the 2023-2024 school year, the district will improve TCAP Reading and Language Arts percentage of all students (K-12) and student groups who meet or exceed expectations across all grade bands.

Performance Measure:

For grades K-2, increase the percentage of students above the 75th percentile in the national norms on the universal screener. For grades 3-8 TN Ready, increase the percentage of students who meet and exceed expectations from 26.3% to 36% For SWD 3-8 TN Ready, increase the percentage of students who meet and exceed expectations from 3.4% to 16% For ED 3-8 TN Ready, increase the percentage of students who meet and exceed expectations from 13.7% to 25% For EL 3-8 TN Ready, increase the percentage of students who meet and exceed expectations from 2.5% For EL 3-8 TN Ready, increase the percentage of students who meet and exceed expectations from 2.9% to 15% For BLN 3-8 TN Ready, increase the percentage of students who meet and exceed expectations from 2.9% to 26%

Math:

Increase the percentage of students in Math who are on track or mastered from: 20% to 24% (3rd Grade) 14% to 19% (4th Grade)

Reading:

Increase the percentage of students in ELA who are on track or mastered from: 19% to 25% (3d Grade) 28% to 33% (4f Grade)

Science:

Increase the percentage of students in Science who are on track or mastered from: 16% to 21% (3^{ad} Grade) 28% to 33% (4th Grade)
