The Board delegates to the Superintendent of Schools the responsibility of developing specific codes of 1 2 conduct which are appropriate for each level of school.<sup>1</sup> Codes of conduct for students in prekindergarten or kindergarten shall utilize alternative disciplinary practices such as restorative practices, 3 RTI<sup>2</sup>B, multi-teared system of supports, and behavior intervention plans. Exclusionary discipline shall 4 only be used as a measure of last resort.<sup>2</sup> The development of each code shall involve principals and staff 5 members of each level and shall be based on evidence-based behavior support and interventions.<sup>3</sup> 6

7 The following levels of misbehavior and disciplinary procedures and options are standards designed to protect all members of the educational community in the exercise of their rights and duties and to 8 maintain a safe learning environment where orderly learning is possible and encouraged.<sup>4</sup> These 9 misbehaviors apply to student conduct on school buses, on school property, and while students are on 10 school-sponsored outings. Staff members have the authority to enforce the code of conduct<sup>3</sup> and shall 11 12 ensure that disciplinary measures are implemented in a manner that:<sup>5</sup>

- 13 1. Balances accountability with an understanding of traumatic behavior; 14 2. Teaches school and classroom rules while reinforcing that violent or abusive behavior is not 15 allowed at school; 16 17 3. Minimizes disruptions to education with an emphasis on positive behavioral supports and 18 behavioral intervention plans; 19 20 4. Creates consistent rules and consequences; and 21 22
  - 23 5. Models respectful, non-violent relationships.

In order to ensure that these goals are accomplished, the school district shall utilize the following 24 trauma-informed discipline practices: restorative practices, RTI<sup>2</sup>B, multi-tiered system of supports, and 25 behavior intervention plans. 26

## **MISBEHAVIORS: LEVEL I** 27

This level includes minor misbehavior on the part of the student which impedes orderly classroom 28 guidelines or interferes with the orderly operation of the school and or classroom instruction, but which 29 can usually be handled by an individual staff member. 30

19	• The staff member employs appropriate disciplinary options.
20	• The record of the offense and disciplinary action shall be maintained by the staff
21	member.

37	MISBEHAVIORS: LEVEL II

This level includes misbehavior whose frequency or seriousness tends to disrupt the learning climate of the school and or classroom instruction. These misbehaviors do not represent a direct threat to the

- 1 health and safety of others but have educational consequences serious enough to require corrective
- 2 action on the part of administrative personnel.

4	• Continuation of unmodified Level I misbehaviors
5	School or class tardiness
6	School or class truancy
7	• Using forged notes or excuses
8	• Disruptive classroom, bus, or school-sponsored activity behavior
9	• Usage of a personal communication device when not authorized, if not drug related
10	• Bullying or harassment by any means (to include sexual, racial, ethnic, religious)
11	Horseplay/Physical Contact
12	• Possession of a toy weapon on school property. (Excludes toy weapons brought for
13	school sponsored or approved purposes)
14	Disciplinary Procedures
15	• Parent must be contacted on any documented offense.
16	• The student is referred to the principal for appropriate disciplinary action.
17	• The principal initiates an investigation if needed which could include collecting written
18	witness statements.
19	• The principal meets with the student and the staff member.
20	• The principal hears the accusation made by the staff member and allows the student the
21	opportunity to explain his/her conduct.
22	• The principal takes appropriate disciplinary action and notifies the staff member of the
23	action.
24	• The principal or designee contacts parent/guardian.
25	• The record of offense and disciplinary action shall be maintained by the principal.

6	This level includes acts directly against persons or property and whose consequences may or may not		
7	seriously endanger the health or safety of others in the school.

9	Continuation of unmodified Level I and II misbehaviors		
10	• Fighting		
11	• Vandalism (minor)		
12	• Stealing		
13	• Throwing items from a bus		
14	• Threats to others (including staff) – to include vulgar or obscene language		
15	• Inappropriate physical contact with students or staff		
16	Elopement from classroom/school building		
17	• Possession of fireworks not deemed an explosive by law enforcement		
18	Disciplinary Procedures		
19	• The student is referred to the principal for appropriate disciplinary action.		
20	• The principal meets with the student and the staff member.		
21	• The principal hears the accusation and allows the student the opportunity to explain		
22	his/her conduct.		
23	• The principal takes appropriate disciplinary action.		
24	• The principal or designee contacts the parent/guardian		
25	• The principal may refer the incident to the Director of Schools or Designee and make		
26	recommendations for consequences.		
27 28	• If the student's program is to be changed, adequate notice shall be given to the student and his/her parent(s)/guardian(s) of the charges against him, his/her right to appear at a		
28 29	hearing, and his/her right to be represented by a person of his/her choosing.

## 13 MISBEHAVIORS: LEVEL IV

14 This level of misbehavior includes acts which result in violence to another's person or property, or

15 which pose a threat to the safety of others in the school. These acts are so serious that they usually

16 require administrative actions which result in the immediate removal of the student from the school,

17 the intervention of law enforcement authorities, and/or action by the Board.

18 If a student's action poses a threat to the safety of others in the school, a teacher, principal, school

employee, or school bus driver may use reasonable force when necessary to prevent bodily harm or
 death to another person.<sup>7</sup>

24	• Death or Bomb threats
25	• Extortion
26	Assault on Student
27	• Use and or possession of a dangerous instrument
28	• Use, possession, sale, distribution, and/or being under the influence of tobacco/nicotine
29	or alcohol
30	• Use, possession, sale, or distribution of drug paraphernalia (to include any vaping
31	apparatus)
32	• Vandalism (Willful or malicious damage to real or personal property of the school, or
33	the property of any person attending or assigned to the school.
34	• Possession and/or use of explosives
35	Theft/possession/sale of stolen property
36	• Arson
37	Sexual misconduct
38	• Marketing/Possession/distribution/sale/transfer of any substance which is represented to
39	be or is substantially similar in color, shape, size or markings to a controlled substance
40	Use/transfer of unauthorized substances

1	• Victimization of any student or employee (harassment (sexual, racial, ethnic, religious),
2	bullying, cyber-bullying, and/or hazing)
3	• Off-campus criminal behavior that results in the student being legally charged and/or
4	convicted with a felony or with what would have been a felony if the student were an
5	adult, and the student's continued presence in school poses a danger to persons or
6	property or disrupts the educational process. <sup>6</sup>
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7	Disciplinary Procedures
8	• The principal confers with appropriate staff members and with the student.
9	• The principal hears the accusations and allows the student the opportunity to explain
10	his/her conduct.
11	• The parent(s)/guardian(s) are notified.
12	• Law enforcement officials are contacted.
13	• The incident is reported, and recommendations are made to the Director of Schools.
14	• If the student's placement is to be changed, adequate notice of the charges shall be
15	given to the student and his/her parent(s)/guardian(s) and his/her right to appear at a
16	hearing.
17	Disciplinary Options (not an exclusive listing)
18	Attend Substance Abuse Intervention Program (SAIP)
19	• Long-term out-of-school suspension (not more than 10 days)
20	• Expulsion up to 45 school days with approval from the superintendent or designee
21	• Alternative Learning Program up to 45 school days
22	MISBEHAVIORS: LEVEL V (ZERO TOLERANCE OFFENSES)
23	The below offenses have been deemed zero tolerance offenses under state law and by Board Policy.
24	Committing any of these offenses shall result in a student being expelled from the regular school
25	program for at least one (1) calendar year, unless modified by the Superintendent. Modification of the
26	length of time shall be granted on a case-by-case basis. Upon modification, the Superintendent shall
27	notify the Board. Students that commit zero tolerance offenses may be assigned to an alternative school or program at the discretion of the Superintendent. see Board Policy 6.309.
28	school of program at the discretion of the Superintendent. see Board Policy 0.509.
29	• Bringing to school or being in unauthorized possession of a firearm on school property.
30	• Unlawful possession of any drug, including any controlled substance, controlled
31	substance analogue, or legend drug on school grounds or at a school-sponsored event.
32	• Aggravated assault; or
33	• Assault that results in bodily injury upon any teacher, principal, administrator, any other
34	employee of the school, or school resource officer.
35	• Threatens mass violence on school property or at a school-related activity.
36	Disciplinary Procedures
37	• The principal confers with appropriate staff members and with the student.

10		Disciplinary Options
11 12		• For zero tolerance offenses, expulsion for no less than one (1) year. Student may make application for modification to the Superintendent of Schools.
13	ADDI	TIONAL GUIDELINES:
14 15 16	1.	For on campus offenses, a student shall not be suspended/remanded solely because charges are pending against him/her in juvenile or other court, unless the charge is one identified in Policy 6.309 as a zero-tolerance offense.
17 18	2.	A principal shall not impose successive short-term suspensions that cumulatively exceed ten (10) days for the same offense.
19 20	3.	A teacher or other school official shall not reduce or authorize the reduction of a student's grade because of discipline problems except in deportment or citizenship.
21 22	4.	A student shall not be denied the passing of a course or grade promotion solely on the basis of absences except as provided by Board Policy.
23	5.	A student shall not be denied the passing of a course or grade promotion solely on the basis of failure to:
24 25		a. Pay any activity fee;
25 26		b. Pay a library or other school fine; or
27		c. Make restitution for lost or damaged school property
