



















Merrick Schools Mark 100th Anniversary

The official kickoff to Merrick's 100th-year education activities occurred on the 100th day of school, which was Feb. 13. Children and staff dressed up like they were 100 years old, or from the 1920s.

On that day, teachers treated students across the district to a presentation about "The Velveteen Rabbit," a book written in 1922, the same year the district was founded.

The district's 100th anniversary committee provided resources relating to themes they should focus on when learning about the past century. All three schools are in the process of completing a timeline activity to learn about the history of Merrick through the decades.

Students were tasked with researching, drawing, writing, interviewing and finding photos that are related to specific decades on this timeline.

The district will end the school year with each building creating a time capsule of items that will be buried on their property.
