

Mustang HAS ARRIVED!

In a special ceremony on May 13, Mineola High School officially accepted and acknowledged the donation of a mustang statue for the front of the school. The mustang statue was originally situated at Jericho Turnpike and Mineola Boulevard. The donation, move and beautification of the mustang was made possible by many members of the community, including: Avelino and Tony DeSousa; Justin Burke and Daniel Correia from Winthrop- University Hospital; Lou Caruso of J&L Concrete; Big Apple Building Supply; the Village of Mineola mayor, deputy mayor and trustees; and Winthrop University Hospital. The new mustang stands proudly in front of the school's main flagpole.

Eighth Year as Best Community for Music

For the eighth consecutive year, Mineola has been honored with the Best Communities for Music Education designation from the NAMM Foundation for its outstanding commitment to music education. Mineola is one of 476 districts across the country to receive this prestigious award for 2016.

The Best Communities for Music Education designation is awarded to districts that serve as a model for other districts and demonstrate outstanding achievement in their efforts to provide music access and education to all students.

"Our students are the beneficiaries of a community that supports music and the arts," said district Supervisor of Fine and Performing Arts Joseph Owens. "Receiving this award for eight consecutive years is a true testament to our community's belief in a well-rounded education for all students. This recognition is a true credit to all members of the Mineola UFSD community - students, parents, teachers, the administration and the Board of Education."

To qualify for the Best Communities designation, Mr. Owens answered detailed questions about funding, graduation requirements, music class participation, instruction time, facilities, support for the music program and community music-making programs. Responses were verified by school officials and reviewed by the Music Research Institute at the University of Kansas.

Why///ustang

The origin of association between Mineola and its now iconic mustang has evolved since as early as 1940. In the 1940s, the teams were known as the maroons, reflective of the school colors. In the 1950s, they became known as the Chiefs, for the Native American origins of our village namesake. At that time, the chief was depicted as riding a mustang.

By 1960, the high school's wrestling team began referring to themselves as "the mustang men," and as the decade progressed, all of the teams began to call themselves the Mustangs.

Superintendent Speaks at TED_X

Dr. Michael P. Nagler, superintendent of schools, was one of 20 speakers at the Digital Promise GVS Summit in April. Dr. Nagler was the only speaker from New York at the event, and spoke to an audience of approximately 3,000 guests.



Flags for Good Air

In a joint partnership with the Environmental Protection Agency, Mineola High School has become the first school in New York State to participate in the School Flags Program. Designed to track air quality index levels, the program asks participating schools to raise a flag each day based upon the area's air quality index. The goal is to protect students' health while

providing a learning opportunity as they track and measure local air quality levels. Mineola's Environmental Club, AP Environmental Science class and life skills classes are all assisting in the venture, which kicked off with a special ceremony on April 21.

"We're very lucky to work with a forward-thinking administration that provides our students with opportunities

for learning both inside and outside the classroom," said Principal Dr. Whittney Smith during the ceremony.

Each morning when school was in session, participating classes visited a specific website and analyzed local air quality. The group then raised one of four flags: a green flag indicated good air quality, yellow indicated acceptable air quality with low risk, orange is moderate-risk and indicates a possible air quality issue for sensitive groups such as those with allergies/asthma, and a red flag would indicate unhealthy conditions.

Mineola was chosen to launch the project in New York State due to a connection with a 1997 graduate who is now in charge of special projects at the EPA. It will continue in the fall.

Good Neighbor Grant

Nancy Regan and Eileen Burke of Mineola High School's Falk-Sysak Student Service Center joined Thomas O'Malley, of the Greentree Good Neighbor Fund, at the Greentree Foundation's annual luncheon held on the Whitney estate in Manhasset. The Greentree Good Neighbor Fund was founded in 2003 and has awarded more than \$2 million to organizations serving Town of North Hempstead residents. The Student Service Center

received a \$5,000 grant to continue its outstanding community service initiatives that help the Mineola community. It provides high school students with volunteer opportunities to over 14 different programs.


Leadership Training







Awarded for Writing

Congratulations to Mineola Middle School seventh-grader Catherine Winski for being recognized with a Regional Award in the 2016 Scholastic Art and Writing Awards Competition. Catherine was awarded the Silver Key in two categories: short story and humor. More than 320,000 works were submitted to the Scholastic Art and Writing Awards nationwide, and only the top 40% received some level of recognition.

Catherine also submitted a piece of writing to the Long Island Language Arts Council and won first place for grade seven in the 2016 Kenneth F. Gambone Writing Contest. The writing was in response to the prompt "Because kindness matters..." Catherine had her themed writing piece published in the luncheon program given by LILAC in May.
