CAPITAL PROJECTS PLANNED FOR

COMMUNITY ENHANCEMENT

In a comprehensive plan addressing safety concerns, better quality fields for community use and the enhancement of facilities for students, the Board of Education unanimously adopted a resolution to seek voter approval on expending money from the district's capital reserve fund. With projects

planned for Hampton Street School and Mineola High School, the \$7 million expenditure would carry **NO** additional cost to taxpayers.

The capital reserve fund, which acts as a savings account for the district, was established by voters in 2010. Since the fund was established by voters, it requires a vote for money to be expended from the account; however, the money can only be used on capital projects. It is important to note that this capital reserve has not reached its

NATIONAL ACHIEVEMENT SCHOLAR

Mineola High School senior Claudia Serna has been named a Scholar in the College Board's National Hispanic Recognition Program, designed to recognize outstanding academic achievement among Hispanic and Latino high school students.

The NHRP recognizes 5,000 academically outstanding students of Hispanic and Latino origin each year. Qualification for recognition as a Scholar is based on the student's combined math, verbal and writing scores on the PSAT/NMSQT taken in his or her junior year of high school, as well as a GPA of 3.0 or higher. Students who earn this designation have scored in the top 2.5



percent among Hispanic and Latino test takers in the region.

In addition to this honor, Claudia has been named an AP Scholar with Honor and is a member of the National Honor Society, National Science Honor Society and Tri-M Music Honor Society.

Though the NHRP does not offer any financial award, the names of qualifying students are provided to admissions offices at colleges and universities throughout the country to encourage schools to recruit Hispanic and Latino students and provide financial assistance.



Project-Based Learning

In an effort to expand and enhance students' educational opportunities, the middle school has restructured its fifthand sixth-grade program for specials like art, family and consumer science, and technology. Under the new structure, instead of every elective operating independently, all three specials work together on one common interdisciplinary unit. Each teacher still provides students



with explicit instruction in the standards of his or her course, but the projects through which the children demonstrate their learning are linked.

In the sixth grade, students will work on creating projects related to the school's spring production of "The Lion King." Under this theme, students in family and consumer science classes are learning elements of costume design and sewing; in technology class, they are designing and engineering bones for the graveyard scenes; and in art class, they are using African-inspired symbols to create artwork for the sets.

"Our new special schedule has several benefits," said Middle School Instructional Leader Andrew Casale. "First, students are working across different subject areas on a common theme. They come to understand that problem-solving requires knowledge from many disciplines. As our districtwide STEAM initiative has taken off, we have really come to understand that expertise is not compartmentalized. Our new program also allows larger groups of students to come together and share in the same experience. Finally, it allows us

to harness the creative energy of our staff and students, creating opportunities for collaboration and discovery."

At the fifth-grade level, the focus is on nutrition and healthy lifestyles. Projects for this grade will include interactive lessons such as monitoring one's food intake through an app, reinventing recipes to make them healthier, and investigating how germs spread. Later in the year, students will be Skyping with scientists and nutritionists and designing MyPlate plates to take home.



A College Road Trip since 2002, the guidance the experience.

A tradition since 2002, the guidance department at Mineola High School has been hosting an overnight college road trip each fall for students in grades 10-12. The road trip stops at three or four college campuses with the intention of expanding student horizons and interests in a variety of schools. Students are given a guided tour of the campus, the opportunity to tastetest from the college cafeteria, a feel for the surrounding area, and a chance to speak with current students (sometimes Mineola alumni) and counselors from the school.

"Visiting a college is a huge factor in making a final informed decision," Assistant Principal of Guidance Jennie Fahey said of Each road trip gives 45 students who are in good standing the opportunity to experience new campuses. The 2014 trip focused on the Rhode Island area, while the 2015 trip featured stops at Boston University. Northeastern University, Suffolk University and Stonehill College. In addition to the two-day excursions each fall, a day trip is held each spring to one or two local colleges.

"We want to give students as many opportunities as possible to experience different areas, different schools and different types of campus settings," Mrs. Fahey said. "If a student takes advantage of each field trip, even just over two years, they have

the potential to visit at least 10 college campuses. It can be difficult for families to visit all of these schools on their own. I am happy we can provide this opportunity for our students, and most importantly they are given a great experience."

Senior Taylor Dalton attended the fall 2014 and 2015 road trips and agrees. "Now I have a totally clear view of what I am looking for in a school," she said. As a result of the road trips, she intends to apply to the University of Rhode Island and Northeastern University – two schools she may not have otherwise considered. "I became much more comfortable with the process and the types of questions to ask when visiting campuses," she said. "It really helped narrow down which types of schools I wanted to visit on

my own, as well."

"Going on the college road trip last year made me work much harder," fellow senior Kayleigh Bugalla shared. "It made me realize that college was coming up quickly and I needed to do well to get into the schools I liked." As a result of the trip, she intends to apply to Roger Williams University, Boston University and Northeastern University. "Visiting the campuses really gave me a sense of 'I can belong here,'" she added.

The college road trip is complemented by the many mini college fairs the school holds throughout September and October, which afford students more chances to meet with counselors from schools they may have visited and find out the specifics on their application processes.

CAPITAL PROJECTS UPDATE

Completed work includes districtwide masonry repairs and HVAC work and a science (STEAM) lab at both Hampton Street and Meadow Drive.



The district officially launched a new website and design on Aug. 26, just in time for the new school year. The new format is more user-friendly and allows more students to be featured. In high school, LeighMarie Weber was an active member of the color guard, winter guard, band, chorus and Student Service Center, and was a recurring face in the spring musical productions. It was her participation in the Student Organization, though, that ultimately shaped her future. Serving as a representative in her junior year, she was urged by then teacher and advisor Valerie Liese to run for the office of treasurer in her senior year.

"I was reluctant," she recalled. "But I wound up loving it, and it ultimately shaped what became my love for student advocacy. I'm really grateful to [Liese] for urging me to participate more."

LeighMarie graduated from Mineola in 2010 and continued her education at SUNY Cortland. Knowing the importance of being involved in campus life, she joined the school's student government association and became a senate member. Within a few months, there was an opening on the executive board and a friend urged her to interview for the position. She was offered the position of parliamentarian, then served as executive assistant to the president and went on to serve as president during her junior and senior years. During that time, her interest in student government continued to grow.

In her sophomore year, LeighMarie and a classmate were responsible for hosting and coordinating a Fall Fest at the campus, which featured each of the clubs at the school as well as fall-inspired activities. The event has since become an annual school tradition.

With the intention of becoming an audiologist, LeighMarie earned a B.S. in speech and hearing science from SUNY Cortland in 2014.

"That last semester, though, I would sit in my classes and just not want to be there," she shared. "With one class remaining to earn my degree, I had a conversation with one of my professors who helped me realize that being an audiologist was just not my passion."

And with that, LeighMarie changed her direction for graduate school.

"I began applying to colleges for a master's program in higher education and student affairs," she said. "My mom and grandparents all went to NYU and it has always been my dream to go there, but I never thought I would get in. When I changed my path, I figured I would try. It's very humbling and almost surreal. I still don't believe that I'm [at NYU] and will graduate from here. I hope that one day, my children will continue that legacy as well."

LeighMarie is enrolled in NYU's program for Masters for Higher Education and Student Affairs and is expected to graduate in May 2016. She currently works as a graduate intern in the Office of Multicultural Affairs at Fordham University and serves as an assistant to the graduate intern in the Student Activities Office of SUNY Maritime. In her role at Fordham, she serves as the coordinator for one of the diversity peer leader programs and promotes social justice work and dialogue on campus.

"I've always said I'm a people person," she said. "[My job] is very hands-on, and I'm learning every day. It's about personal growth and development. I've always had an empathy and passion for people, and I'm always learning from the students whom I encounter."

With this master's degree, LeighMarie hopes to begin work as an assistant director for a student involvement office at a college. In the long term, she intends to continue her studies and earn her doctorate in the field. She hopes to ultimately serve as vice president or president of a university.

Despite going away to college, LeighMarie's pulse on the Mineola community has remained strong. She is still residing in Williston Park, has remained close to a group of friends whom she grew up with and babysits for many local
