

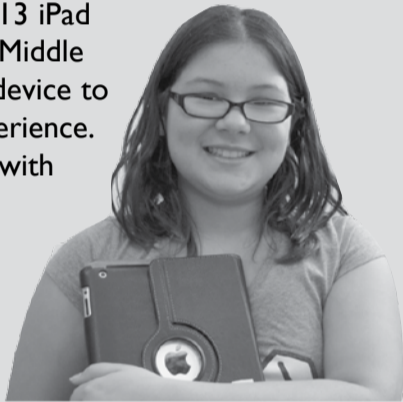

A MESSAGE FROM *Your Superintendent*

Dear Residents,

I hope this letter finds you enjoying what may be left of the spring recess. I know our next – and only (!) other - day off is Memorial Day, but as I'm sure you are all aware, it will be here in the blink of an eye. The coming weeks are jam packed with NWEA testing, state assessments, the budget vote and many wonderful concerts and events. I can assure you that the end of the year is just around the corner.

Speaking of budget - the district will be entering its sixth consecutive year of bringing you an estimated tax levy increase of approximately 2.5%. Jack Waters and I have been working closely and estimate that the budget will remain in this realm for the next five years, as well. The reorganization has helped us tremendously and has allowed us to maintain and even expand our program offerings, which was recognized a few months back with the Management Efficiency Grant (featured in Winter Newsletter, available on the website). That honor rewards us with more than \$213,000 for the next three years for being fiscally responsible and operating as efficiently as possible. Not only do our residents reap the financial gains of a district that is operating efficiently, but our taxpayers get rewarded with more money for taking the

initiative to do this itself.

These additional monies, in turn, enable us to expand our programs and offer cutting edge technology, such as iPads, for educational purposes to our students. The offering of such programs then earn us additional awards, such as the Apple Distinguished Program Award mentioned on page 1 of this newsletter. Awards such as these strike a nice balance for our students and our community – program and technology expansion, largely offset by grant monies and rewards, as well as our efficient operating budget. This cycle, which is an amazing one to be a part of, has enabled our district to deliver a robust educational program during a time when other districts are struggling to maintain the basics.

As a superintendent I am truly humbled by the amount of attention our district has been getting recently – Management Efficiency Grant, Apple Distinguished Program Award, Healthy Schools award, Design Award for Hampton's library, named one of the Best Communities for Music Education, a National Merit Finalist, the list just seems to go on and on. We are spending less than in years past, but actually accomplishing more. It's truly unbelievable how the reorganization has helped our district flourish.

Keep an eye out for the district's complete budget edition of the Outreach in the coming weeks. It will contain pertinent information regarding the May 21 vote, as well as again covering the new polling locations and voter registration information. In addition, any presentations that I make at a Board of Education meeting are always posted on the district website at www.mineola.k12.ny.us. I urge everyone to bookmark the site, which also links to my blog. You will also notice that my blog contains a bit more school news lately, as I am trying to highlight more and more of our students and great events in outlets beyond the Outreach and our local papers.

Anti-Bullying *Awareness*

In a districtwide effort to raise awareness of bullying and its effects on teenagers and their families, Mineola Middle School recently hosted Ryan's Story, an anti-bullying program based on Ryan Halligan, a 13-year-old middle school student from Vermont who committed suicide in 2003 because of bullying. Ryan's father, John Halligan, conducted the workshop, in which he recounted the story of his son's life and the ridicule he endured, the devastating impact that his son's suicide has had on his family, and the power of forgiveness. The presentations were conducted during school hours for all middle school students, and at one evening session for parents of students at any grade level.

In addition to the painful details that Mr. Halligan shared with students and parents, literature was handed out on how to help prevent one's child from becoming a victim of cyberbullying. This information is always available in the district's guidance departments, as well. The presentation was brought to the district through the Central Council PTA.

Senior Discovers Potential New Species of Spider

It was not a hair-raising ordeal when Mineola High School senior Gabrielle Ward discovered what is believed to be a new species of spider while conducting science research at Dowling College in December. In fact, she really didn't believe the discovery until her mentor Dr. Richard Wilkens confirmed that the spider did not fit either of the two species' specifications in its genus. The genus and species are referred to as the binomial classification of all living creatures and are part of the larger taxonomic classification system.



As part of Gabrielle's science research, she was responsible for classifying all spiders that were found living in a gall taken from the burn zone of the Pine Barrens on Long Island. A "gall" is found on the leaf of plants and is built by wasps in order for them to lay their eggs. Once their eggs hatch and their larvae are gone, the gall remains on the leaf and is typically inhabited by other insects and spiders. Gabrielle's research was part of a collective study titled "The Abandoned Gall Project" that Dr. Wilkens has been studying for the past two years. Gabrielle joined the project in June and plans to continue working on it through graduation.

"It's very rewarding to see something new and to know that you were the first person to ever see it," the high school senior shared of her experience.

In order for the species to be accepted as "new" in the science world, Gabrielle and her mentor must publish a paper that details the characteristics of the new species. That paper must be reviewed by a group of peers in the field and verified. Once verified, the paper is published and the new species is added to the books. Gabrielle, in addition to Dr. Wilkens, will be getting credit for the discovery of the spider.

The spider, which is part of the family Salticidae and the genus Sarinda, is smaller in size than a dime and is part of the jumping spider family. After the peer review is completed, this new species will be named Jackper, a name which Gabrielle chose in honor of a boy she used to babysit for who passed away three years ago from cancer. The entire process can take up to one year before the paper is published.

"It is very rare to discover a new species," science research teacher Dr. Ellen McGlade-McCulloh said of Gabrielle's findings. "It shows not only her scientific abilities, but also that she is a remarkable person by naming the species after someone other than herself."

"The drive and dedication of our research students never ceases to amaze me," science instructional leader John Gollisz noted. "Gabrielle has always strived to do her best and continues to impress me with her modesty and consideration of others."

"It's really remarkable that she gets to use this type of professional equipment and go through this process," Dr. McGlade-McCulloh added. "There are huge advantages for students who work off campus at labs while in high school."

Although undecided on which college she will attend, Gabrielle plans to study biology on the pre-med track. According to her teacher, as a result of her possible discovery, Gabrielle will likely be allowed to work in labs earlier than her college peers. The discovery will also increase her scholarship potential at many schools she has applied to and will open other doors for her in terms of courses and notoriety in the scientific arena.

Please note: It is not yet proven that Gabrielle has discovered a new species of spider, it is only believed to be new at this stage. The process will take up to six months to complete.

Just as Sweet the Second Time



William Winski, a fourth-grade student at Jackson Avenue School, was the winner of this year's Entenmann's Essay Contest, sponsored by the baking company. Third- through sixth-graders across Nassau County were eligible to participate, and more than 1,000 entries were received. William's essay was chosen based upon his description of Entenmann's butter loaf cake (pound cake) in response to the question, "What is your favorite Entenmann's product and why?"

In addition to winning Entenmann's products, William received an Xbox 360 with Kinect, two games for the system and a 32-inch flat screen television. William's sister Catherine won the same contest last year. He was the only first-place winner in the county.

DRAWING A Winner

Jillian Parrino, a fourth-grade student at Jackson Avenue School, was recently featured in Newsday as the winner of the newspaper's Kidsday Drawing Contest. With her theme depicting "Hope After Hurricane Sandy," Jillian won for the category of "Getting Along." After submitting work to the contest last year, she was encouraged by her mother to submit again this year. She also won a bookmark drawing contest and a field day t-shirt design contest at her school last year.

"I felt really excited that everyone was going to see my drawing," she said of the recognition. Jillian, who looks for the contest every year, plans to enter again next year. Her work was featured in the print edition of Newsday during the week of Dec. 23.



Skills to Save a Life

On Jan. 25, Jackson Avenue fourth-grader Nicholas Ramos sprung to action in the school cafeteria with a skill he had learned in the Cub Scouts a few years prior. While eating lunch, his friend and classmate Steven Jones began using the universal symbol for choking by holding his hands to his neck after eating a carrot stick. Nicholas asked another student to go get help, but decided to utilize the "back thrust" technique he had learned to see if he could assist his friend sooner. After three hits to the mid-back, the carrot dislodged from Steven's throat, and the pair resumed lunch.

"I was shocked that it worked," Nicholas said of his actions. "It felt good to help my friend."

In turn, Steven could not be more grateful for his friend. "I'm really glad he was the one who saved me from choking," he said.

The district would like to acknowledge Nicholas for his life-saving action that day and Steven for knowing how and when to utilize the symbol for choking.

Since the incident, the school nurse has taught all of the students the "back thrust" technique for dislodging food. Students at this age are discouraged from administering the Heimlich Maneuver, as they are more likely to cause more harm than help due to their size and strength.

ALL-COUNTY ARTISTS

Eighteen of Mineola's finest artists had their work displayed at the ninth annual All-County Art Exhibit, held on March 17, at Adelphi University's Ruth S. Harley Student Center. Over 1,000 student pieces were exhibited from across Nassau County.

The All-County Art Exhibit is produced by the Art Supervisors Association (ASA) of Nassau County, a nonprofit organization made up of supervisors and directors of art from the schools and districts of Nassau County. Student artists are recommended by their teachers for inclusion in the show, and from these, up to three students are selected from each teacher's list. "We are very proud of all of our artists and art teachers," said Supervisor of Fine and Performing Arts Peter Freeman. "Their talent is incredible and their work is always magnificent."

WRESTLER WINS 100TH MATCH

Mathew Long, a senior student-athlete at Mineola High School, won his 100th varsity match on Jan. 12. A hundred wins is a rare feat for someone on a small-school Division II team who averages only 36 matches per season. Add to that a number of missed games due to injury, and it makes Mathew's win even sweeter.

Wrestling at the varsity level under coach Dan Guido since the eighth grade, Mathew had only begun wrestling the year prior on the middle school team. Since then he has worked hard and participated in competitions outside of the school district, and as a result, has received many accolades for his success on the mat. In addition to being captain of the varsity wrestling team for the last two years, Mathew was named All-Conference in 2009, County Champion in 2011 and 2012, and MVP of all the Division II teams in 2012. His win as County Champion for 2013 also broke the school record for most consecutive county wins in wrestling.

"This is huge for me," the senior said of his accomplishment. "Wrestling has really defined my life and changed me for the better. I'm most appreciative of my dad for going the extra mile and driving me all over the place to competitions 12 months of the year just to help me perfect my skills."

In addition to wrestling, Mathew was captain of the school's varsity football team as well, earning an All-Conference title this year. He plans to enlist in the Army this fall and has already requested to try out for the Army's wrestling team.

"Mathew is the perfect example of where perseverance and hard work will get you," assistant wrestling coach Frank Massaro said. "He loves the sport. He wrestles all year long, and now he is bearing the fruits of his labor."

Ambassadors for Education

Margie Buttgerit, Garry Desire, Jodi Helming, AJ Hepworth and Michele HochHauser have joined Assistant Superintendent Patricia Burns as Teacher Ambassadors representing the Mineola School District in the Network Team workshops in Albany. The teachers and instructional leaders have had an opportunity to dive deeply into the new Common Core Learning Standards and the Six Instructional Shifts necessary to implement the new English language arts and mathematics standards in our district.

The "ambassadors" bring the information back to the district and share their expertise with the staff. In response to these trainings, our teachers have been engaged in writing curricula and aligning lesson plans, materials and student assessments to the new standards.

In addition, our teachers of grades pre-K-2 have begun teaching science based on the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS). The new science program, Knowing Science, is designed to engage our students in science by capitalizing on what they already know about the natural world to develop a deep conceptual base for future learning in science, and to focus on integrating science content with literacy and hands-on activities.



Creating a Better Climate

For the third year in a row, Mineola High School hosted a presentation for all students from the Alliance for Climate Education. ACE is an organization that promotes the education of climate changes and global warming to all schools across the country with the hope of sparking even a small change among students, their families and the community at large. The organization works closely with the school's Environmental Club on ways to recycle and reduce the school's carbon footprint.

An ACE representative spoke to students in grades 8-12 in a workshop that used real-world events, including the recent Superstorm Sandy, to illustrate points about the truth behind climate changes and their effect on areas around the globe. All students were encouraged to create a DOT – Do One Thing – that they could do in order to reduce their carbon footprint. They were also asked to encourage every member of their family to do the same.

“The goal with this program is to make responsible and environmentally conscious citizens of our students, and to encourage them to prevent further causes for global warming into the future,” science instructional leader John Gollisz said of the presentation. “The kids walk out knowing that everyone can make a difference.”

Last year, Mineola High School won the Greendependence Day Challenge and received a \$1,000 grant through ACE and the National Grid Foundation for its efforts to help the environment.



Granting Education

Christine Shields, an English as a Second Language teacher at Jackson Avenue School, has received a grant for \$250 from the Nassau Educators Federal Credit Union. She was chosen for the award based upon a proposal she submitted in September for a project involving digital cameras.

“Teaching ESL, there is a heavy reliance on visualization for students to increase their vocabulary banks,” Ms. Shields said. “The students will be able to internalize a word better when they are able to actually view it.”

She plans to apply the grant funds toward the purchase of six cameras, which she will use in small-group settings to have students complete their vocabulary sheets. The vocabulary assignments usually require students to draw a picture of what each word represents, but using the cameras will ensure that the word is more properly represented in real life.

ALUMNI PAY IT FORWARD

Over 50 graduates from Mineola High School's Class of 2012 returned to their alma mater to share their college experiences with current juniors and seniors as part of the high school's annual Alumni Day. Moderated by the Mineola High School Guidance Department, the alumni panel participated in topical discussions including the college application and decision-making processes, academic rigor and college life. Panel members encouraged juniors to take the SAT and ACT exams multiple times, apply to colleges as soon as possible, and complete financial aid and scholarship applications in a timely manner.

High schoolers remarked that the day answered numerous questions about the college process and relieved many of their worries. Summing up the impact of the event, guidance counselor Mr. Azzara stated, “It was education and community at its best – students helping students.”

KJOY Teacher of the Month

Deborah Andreuzzi, a first-grade teacher at Meadow Drive School, was recently honored by KJOY radio station with the distinction of being named Teacher of the Month. Nominated by her student Isabella's mother, Kelli Kaiser, Mrs. Andreuzzi received gift certificates to a salon for the honor. The school is also in receipt of a \$500 gift card to LearningRX. Mrs. Andreuzzi was selected through an intense online voting process. “I couldn't believe I beat out all the high school teachers who were in the running against me!” she said.

SPORTS CORNER

The 2013 winter sports season at Mineola left the school community with many great memories. Student athletes displayed teamwork and sportsmanship as they competed against all Nassau County had to offer. The wrestling program sent two wrestlers to the state meet in Albany. Both Mathew Long and Luigi Miranda advanced beyond the county level by taking their respective weight classes in the Division II County Championships. The boys winter track team finished in second place in their conference and the 4x800 team of Fredric Lang, Robert Lang, Joseph Mulder and Jake Tavernite won the division championship in the event. The girls bowling team finished 10th overall in the county and qualified for the playoffs for the first time in several years. They were lifted by strong bowling by Jaclyn Lusardi and Marissa Buonincontro. The girls basketball team battled all season and had some good wins over Roosevelt and VSS. Julie Falotico and Samantha Venus paced the team throughout the season. The girls track team practiced and competed hard as they moved forward with a smaller team than usual. Jenna Pareti was an All-County high jumper for the team. The boys bowling team finished with a 6-6 record and a third place conference finish. Although they didn't qualify for the playoffs John Lusardi, Scott Berger and eighth-grader Anthony Machietto led the team to a successful and enjoyable season with some impressive high games.

The boys basketball team had the best season the program has seen since the mid-1980's. The team was senior heavy as they were led throughout the season by point guard Brian Gaffney and shooting guards Malcolm Brown and Michael Waszczuk. Seniors Bobby Rogers and Thomas Behan and sophomore Stephen Gessner anchored the boards for the Mustangs. The team were Conference Champions and advanced to the second round of the county playoffs after defeating Lynbrook in the first round. Both games were held at Mineola in front of capacity crowds. Malcolm Brown, the conference Player of the Year, plans to play at Roanoke College in Virginia while Michael Waszczuk has been recruited by St. Josephs in Patchogue.
