Joyce Rhim, senior at Mineola High School, has been named a finalist in the 2014 National Merit Scholarship Program. She is one of only 15,000 students in the nation to reach finalist standing and is now eligible for one of the 8,000 Merit Scholarships. The next phase of this competition is underway and Joyce should receive final notification of her status this spring. The district wishes her the best of luck as she continues in the program. In addition to this latest recognition, Joyce has also been named an AP Scholar with Honor by the College Board and took third place in the New York State Science and Engineering Fair last year.

DUAL-LANGUAGE LEARNERS

Currently in its first year in the district, the dual-language program at Hampton Street School is being considered a huge success. Approximately 40 students per grade, grades K-2, are taking advantage of the program, which pairs two teachers – one who teaches mathematics and ELA in English, and the other who teaches science and social studies primarily in Spanish. There are currently two classes in each grade that switch between teachers for English and Spanish.

At the end of each unit, "bridging" activities help the children relate the unit vocabulary they learned in one language to the correct vocabulary in the partner language. Bridging is accomplished by many teachers through English-to-Spanish charts and by the use of a language learning technique called Total Physical Response. TPR adds a motion to a word or concept to help students stay focused, understand the concept and recognize it in the other language.

"The children seem to be really enjoying the program," said Hampton Street Principal Devra Small. "It's exciting to visit a class and hear children from English-speaking homes speak in Spanish about concepts such as the states of matter. It's also interesting to listen to the children during cooperative group work – sometimes one child will ask a question in Spanish and the other child will answer it in English, or vice-versa. The children understand one another and help each other to learn both languages."

As a multicultural district, Mineola has had an increase in the number of children whose primary language is Spanish. In order to meet these demands while offering a unique learning experience for English-speaking students, the district opted to pilot

Meadow Drive as well, based on the amount of student interest there.

Learning a second language provides wonderful enrichment, and research has shown that participation in a dual language program may increase achievement. Studies have shown that it takes five to seven years for students to be fully proficient in a language, which participation in this program will help accomplish from grades K-4.


Supporting Parents Through the New Math

As a result of feedback garnered from the Common Core Town Hall event the district hosted earlier in the year, Mineola has been increasing its support for parents in guiding their children through the new math curriculum. Recognizing that the new strategies can be difficult, Andrew Casale, math instructional leader at the middle school, has been working with teachers to create a series of helpful videos called "show me's," or screen casts and parent packets explaining each unit and the various strategies students can use to solve problems. In fact, Mineola has been leading the charge in providing parents, and students alike, with an abundance of information. Mineola has been asked to coordinate a countywide effort for districts to share their show me videos and compile a comprehensive tool for all units of study at all grade levels that is accessible to the other districts.

The math videos began as a grassroots movement in Mineola by teachers who saw that parents wanted to help their children but didn't know how. The videos, typically one to five minutes in length, include voice guidance as a teacher models the lesson using an interactive Smart Board. Videos are posted on the district website for most math modules in grades three and five as well as on YouTube under MineolaMath. As part of the countywide effort, the district has created a Google site where they post all videos of the new math. Videos can be accessed by searching CCVidHelp_Google Sites in a Google search browser. Other districts are using the model to create their own screen casts and will add them to this channel over time. The plan is to have a video for every lesson of each math module at every grade level. These efforts have been coordinated by Director of Technology Marc Licht.

For students with iPads, the district has supplied a breakdown of all math units in the students' e-backpacks for grades three through seven and student workbooks with similar information for those who do not have iPads. In addition, Meadow and Hampton recently hosted a second math night for parents to address any additional questions or concerns.

On the level of professional development, Nicole Bartone, math staff developer for K-4, has been creating specific protocols to support teachers in preparing each math module. This method has been proving successful in supplying teachers with best practices in implementing the new math curriculum, and the teachers are now brainstorming how to support students at all levels of understanding in their classrooms. Mrs. Bartone has shared the Mineola professional development model with New York State Education Department officials and they are planning a visit to Mineola to learn how the model might be replicated for other districts to follow. "We are finding that students gain a better understanding of concepts when teachers take the time to delve deeper into each topic," Assistant Superintendent Patricia Burns said. "Now, our goal is to continue working to better differentiate instruction for our students."

The district has been engaged in a pilot program where students are taking assessments aligned with the standards on their iPads and receiving immediate feedback from their teachers through the devices. This method is also supplying the district with specific data, indicating whether or not students are mastering specific standards. This pilot program is being instituted in two third-grade classes, a fifth-grade class and two sixth-grade classes for possible expansion next year.

She also appears on "New York Live," a daily lifestyle show at 12:30 p.m., covering everything from restaurants to Broadway. As a native of Mineola and a member of the graduating Class of 2000, Lauren literally puts local into our local news.

During her years at Mineola High School, she spent a great deal of time in the television studio learning the basics of production. She anchored "The Mustang Report," which was broadcast to students during homeroom. "I had access to a teleprompter at 16," she said. "Most high school students were not afforded that opportunity. Call it ironic, I guess, but I don't get to read a teleprompter when I do traffic. There's no time; I have to memorize everything on the spot."

Voted "Most Involved" by her peers in her

senior year, she participated in many sports, clubs and other activities. Most notably, she served as class president for all four years and was captain of the varsity volleyball team. Having such a full plate at a young age taught her that she could successfully balance a great deal of responsibility, a vital component in getting her to where she is today. "I wake up at 2 a.m. during the week; I'm in the studio live on the air by 4:30 a.m., and some days I can be out on location until 5 or 6 p.m. shooting a package."

After high school, Lauren went on to earn her BA in communications at Fordham University. Throughout her college years, she was able to score internships at some top entertainment companies as well as her first entry-level job at DreamWorks Pictures in NYC. "I lost a few jobs post-college due to mergers and acquisitions. It hasn't been easy but somehow the journey with a little bit of fate and luck brought me back to the career path I had always dreamed of." In the

winter of 2008, Lauren ventured into 30 Rockefeller Plaza, the home of NBC Studios, a place six years later she's proud to refer to as her second home.



"Mineola will always be my first home. It was a great place to grow up," she said. "As for school, it wasn't necessarily a subject or a class that helped me to get where I am, but it was the confidence my teachers had in me; which, in turn, gave me the confidence to go after what I always wanted. When I started out, I didn't know a soul in this business." She is now a three-time Emmy-nominated reporter.

Transportation Update

Assistant supervisor of transportation William Gilberg updated the Board of Education on the transportation department at the Board's March 20 meeting. "This is the best fleet we've ever had,' he said. "Under



the current plan, we will have an entirely new fleet in the next four years." Mineola is one of only 12 districts in Nassau County that owns its own fleet of buses. The district is committed to a five-year bus replacement plan, which will have all buses in the fleet under 10 years of age. A newer fleet translates to reduced costs for replacement of old or broken parts and higher fuel efficiency.

Work is underway for the on-site fuel station, which broke ground on March 10. Included in the 2013-14 school budget, the on-site station will yield a savings to the district buses, which now must travel out-of-route to fill up at specific stations and are a slave to gas station prices. With a fleet of 50 buses, the fuel station will realize a large savings for the district.

Mr. Gilberg also shared the launch of a districtwide program called InfoFinder LE, which enables all teachers and principals to access a student's bus number, bus stop and bus route in the event of an emergency.

In addition to the benefits of the new fleet and fuel station, he stressed the quality of his drivers and the praise they have received, especially during this difficult winter season. "I've gotten more phone calls this year with compliments about our drivers than any year before," Mr. Gilberg said. As the community is aware, this was a very difficult season with the ice and snow, but Mineola's drivers took extra caution and encountered no major incidents.

Capital Improvements to Begin

With the security cameras and transportation updates in place, the district will begin to focus its efforts on the capital improvement work that is still to come. The Jackson Avenue cafeteria project is in the works for the summer as well as brick pointing for all of the buildings. Both of these projects will be completed before the start of the 2014-15 school year. Due to a delay in the State Education Department's approval, the windows and doors planned for replacement under the November 2013 capital reserve proposition will likely be completed during nights and weekends in the fall of 2014.



The graduating class of Mineola High School hosts a Senior-to-Senior Day each year to build connections with the senior citizens in the community. Senior residents are invited to visit the high school for the event, which begins with lunch and ends with a free

"It's so great to see the same seniors come out for this event year after year," Superintendent Michael Nagler said. This tradition has been a staple at Mineola High School for more than 25 years.

Jackson Avenue School librarian Judy Shaughnessy started a book club this year for interested fourthgrade students. A total of 54 students signed up and have been meeting every few weeks to discuss the book in person, as well as through their Edmodo app on the



iPads in between meetings. Students chose one of four books to read in their free time and were given five weeks to complete their selection.

"The kids are really excited about incorporating their iPads," Ms. Shaughnessy said. "It's really teaching them the skills and rules of using social media to communicate, as well as enabling me to facilitate more discussions."

Phys-Ed Students of the Year


